DRIVE TOTAL \$805,500; FORTY LODGES SLEEPING

DORMANT LODGES ANSWER TO PREXY GERM'S APPEAL WILL HELP PUT DRIVE OVER THE TOP

Led by St. Rochus Society, No. 113, Denver, Colo., which signed up \$4,500 in new insurance for the week, KSKJ lodges surged forward with another big push by writing \$19,000 and bringing the total in the current KSKJ Building Membership drive to \$805,500. Other lodges which contributed materially to the week's count were St. Joseph's No. 56, Leadville, Colo., and SS. Peter and Paul, No. 64, Etna, Pa., each with \$2,000.

Records show that the current average enlistment is \$115,000 new insurance per month, \$26,850 per week or \$3,891 per day. If lodges continue their good work at the present rate, the goal is assured before the drive closes at the end of the year.

Outstanding in the point of percentage is St. Agnes Society, No. 206, of South Chicago, Ill., which was the first to attain goal and followed its achievement by continuing its drive and giving it at the present date a 150 per cent rating. It is rumored that the ladies will not stop at that mark, but intend to increase it.

Most assuredly the campaign results would be enlarged if the 40 lodges which have not as yet enrolled a single member would heed the appeal of Supreme President Germ, published in last week's issue. ONLY one member from each the dormant lodges is what he requests! Surely that should be possible, and it could then be recorded that EVERY lodge in the Union was behind the drive. If, dear reader, you are a member of one of these negligent lodges, wont you see to it that your lodge will be counted in as one of the ACTIVE. There must be at least one person in your community who is eligible to join the KSKJ, and would if only you would ask him.

Every lodge owes it to itself and its community and to the KSKJ to sign up at least one member. Furthermore, what a grand expression of approval to Supreme President Germ and the Supreme Board, let alone inspiration would it be to have the campaign results show THAT EVERY ONE OF THE 185 LODGES OF THE UNION joined the drive!

FRATERNALS CAN HELP COURTS, DECREASE JUVENILE DELINQUENCY BUCKEYE CONGRESS TOLD

Akron, O. — Featuring the Ohio Fraternal Congress held here Oct. 26 and 27 was a giant parade held through the downtown section, bringing before the delegates and people an array of 40 units representing fraternal lodges.

Among the outstanding was the enthusiastic St. Mary's Cadets of KSKJ Lodge, No. 111, of Barberton, O., the sole representative of the Union in the gala display. Heading the Girls in Blue was mascot-leader, petite Lillian Adamic, on a miniature float comprised of a genuine KSKJ Booster wagon decorated for the occasion. The wagon was one of those given as awards in a membership drive held several years ago by the Union. That the girls represented the Union in grand fashion (aside from the word of this observer) was substantiated by onlookers who marveled at the precision of marching order and commented on the plehtritude of our girls. The SDZ and the SWU Slovenian organizations, were also represented.

Speaking before the representatives in session Judge Oscar A. Hunsicker, Court of Common Pleas Division of Domestic Relations, pointed out that fraternal lodges can help in keeping young people out of the Juvenile Courts.

Judge Hunsicker said an economic depression resulted

in a decrease in the number of juvenile delinquencies. This he attributed to more time for individuals to be attentive to one another; especially, the parents have more time to watch their children.

The delinquencies brought before his court can be categorized in the following classes, the judge related:

1. Children coming from the low economic group.
2. Children stranded because of broken homes, either through death, divorce or desertion.
3. Children who have no hobbies or who are not interested in athletics, music or other kindred activity.
4. Feeble-minded class which affords little chance for correction.
5. Children who have no church connections. The number of the latter was appalling.

Lodges can alleviate the number of mounting cases in Juvenile Courts, opined the judge, by co-operating with agencies in keeping youth guided into proper activities.

On the convention speaker's program were also John A. Lloyd, state insurance commissioner; Mayor Lee D. Schroy, E. Whitney Dillon, member of Law Committee National Fraternal Congress; Senator F. E. Whittemore, 24th and 26th Senatorial District Ohio; Carl V. Weygandt, chief justice of the Supreme Court of Ohio.

Editor Stanley Zupan represented the KSKJ.

OUR PAGE COOKING SCHOOL

- Frankfurter Casserole: 8 frankfurters, 1 medium-sized onion, minced, 1/4 cup butter, 1/3 cup flour, 3 cups canned tomatoes, 3 cups diced, cooked carrots, 3 tablespoons ketchup, salt and pepper.
Sweet Potatoes and Apples: 6 medium-sized sweet potatoes, 3 medium-sized apples, 1/2 cup sugar, 1/4 cup butter, 1 cup water.
Duchess Devils Food Cake: 3 cups sifted cake flour, 3 teaspoons baking powder, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1 cup shortening, 2 cups sugar, 4 egg yolks, well beaten, 4 squares melted chocolate, 1 cup milk, 8 egg whites.
