## UNDYING MEMORY OF THE DEPARTED

### Special Memorial Days

In the days of King David, when the two sons of Respha were crucified, the distraught mother daily took up her station at their gibbets "and suffered neither the birds to tear them by day, nor the beasts by night" until they were given honorable burial (II Kings, xxi, 10). The Church might be likened to this sorrowing mother. At the death of her children, her supplications ascend to God to grant eternal rest to the departed. The tolling bell summons the living to pray for the dead. On the day of death or burial, on the third, seventh and thirtieth day therefrom, special Masses and prayers are offered to beseech mercy for the deceased. When the funeral Mass is celebrated, the bereaved are comforted by the inspired words of Holy Writ breathing undying hope. Prayers are intoned that the Archangel Michael might conduct those who have gone before us to the light promised to Abraham and his seed. From the time that the remains are borne to their resting place there has begun a continual prayer for the departed.

### The Daily Memento

Time may lessen the grief of those who survive, but the Church daily continues in her remembrance of the poor souls in Purgatory. Every morning, in the Holy Sacrifice, the priest is enjoined to prayerfully recall the memory of those "who are gone before us and sleep in the sleep of peace." During the day, at the conclusion of every canonical hour, there is an imploring of eternal rest and perpetual light on the faithful departed. How often does the Church lay aside the vesture of gladness to don the black of mourning! This is done to recall to our minds the terrible day of final judgment, but at the same time to instil in us confidence in the divine mercy and hope in the unfulfilling promises of Christ. Just as from the rising of the sun to the going down of the same there is offered somewhere in this land of exile the unspotted Sacrifice of the New Law, so there is had an unceasing memory in prayer of the suffering souls.

### The Month of Special Memory

The month of November comes heralded by the signs of death in nature to recall to our minds a time of special commemoration of all the faithful departed. Just as on the first day of this month, the Church honors all the Saints, named and unnamed, so on the second day, she recalls, especially by the three Masses of all her priests, the loving solicitude expended on the dead whether known to men or known to God alone. Such providential care leaves not even the least of the departed unwept, unhonored or unsung and this is the only way that can profit them. So it has been through the history of the Church, in the days of her triumphs as well as in the days of her sorrows. The souls in Purgatory have never been forgotten. With these thoughts in mind, let us be enlivened with the spirit of the Church to contribute our share to help these souls who are unable to help themselves. In turn we

### JOSEPH ZALAR, PIONEER, DIES

Cleveland, O.—Friends and relatives from far and near and the local Slovenian colony mourned the death of Joseph Zalar Sr., who died last Thursday after a brief illness at the home of his daughter, Mrs. F. Susman.

Funeral services were held in St. Mary's Church Monday, at a Solemn Requiem High Mass offered by the Rev. Ludwig Kuznik. Burial was in St. Paul's Cemetery.

The deceased was born in Slovenia and came to this country while in his teens. He settled in Forest City, Pa., where for many years he worked in the mines. Sixteen years ago he came to Cleveland with his daughter, Mrs. F. Susman, with whom he made his home until his death last week. He was one of the oldest Slovenian pioneers in this country and comes from a lineage dating back 300 years.

Surviving him are sons Joseph, supreme secretary of the KSKJ, and Anton, daughters Mrs. U. White and Mrs. F. Susman, 58 grandchildren, 77 great-grandchildren and two great-great-grandchildren.

### Joes' One-Point Margin Gives Jays Win as Interlodge Opens; Defeat Two-Year Rivals

Cleveland, O.—In a fiery game billed as the headliner in the opening 1936-37 Interlodge Basketball League, the St. Joseph rambling Kay Jays edged their arch-rival, the Serbian quintet, 16 to 15, in a bitterly fought tilt.

The Collinwoodites led throughout the contest with the exception of a few moments in the waning minutes of the last period. It was a close, hard fought, mighty struggle between two powerful juggernauts. The teams lined up with the St. Josephs at a disadvantage, as Boogie Dolence, 170-pound charge of dynamite on a five-foot-seven frame, was in the tip-off position and was compelled to jump his adversary, who soars six feet skyward.

Despite the handicap the Kay Jays took possession of every opportunity and forged into the lead on a foul tallied by Olzewski and a two-pointer by Urbancic. Ahead 4 to 3 at the first eight-minute mark, 7 to 5 at the midway, and 11 to 8 going into the last stages of the battle, the Joes held to their slim margin and greeted the whistle, for it sounded the first victory over the Serbs in two years.

The Jays functioned as a unit, and the brilliancy displayed in the opener is a credit to the team as a whole. Functioning as one and deserving the plaudits of the crowd, the masterful exhibition of co-operation resulted in the first step of St. Josephs' march to the much-sought Interlodge diadem.

Back in the KSKJ athletic fold again this season are the familiar and redoubtable: Joe Debenak, Henry Urbancic, "Boogie" Dolence, John Blaglow, a newcomer, Leo Olzewski and Bill Kastelec, plus the following who are at the present time unable to participate as local KSKJ stalwarts because of business duties: Joe Nossek, George Jarem and Dutch Dachewicz. This roster is probably the finest lineup of basketball talent under St. Joseph's colors in the four years of the Jays' playing.

Five of the Joes' players manage to display their apti-

tude as important cogs in the local industrial aggregations.

We fellows in Cleveland are also vitally interested in the basketball activities of our brethren KSKJ societies. Has your lodge organized a team yet? #### Golden Booster Class Boosted to 15, Silverites Number 33

The KSKJ Juvenile Campaign last week received a triple indorsement, and that from Albert, Alberta and Edward Merlock, triplets, aged 14, who joined the Union under the colors of St. Aloysius' Society, Broughton, Pa. The new members will celebrate their 15th birthday on Christmas Day. Records show it is the third set of triplets to join the KSKJ.

Eighteen societies and a new-comer gave the current KSKJ Golden Booster Campaign a decided advance in last week's ratings, and inspired officials with a hope that the closing seven weeks of the drive will bring the drive to a fitting climax.

Eight of the number showing gains were Ohio lodges, and it was this spurt on the part of the Buckeyes that placed Ohio in first rank of the Intra-State standings. Last week the Missouri-Iowa-Nebraska section led the field, but the Ohioans tallied enough points to pace the parade with 40 points. The advance societies are Nos. 56, 206, 143, 29, 3, 59, 72, 105, 219, 169, 193, 150, 162, 224, 123, 11, 41, 50.

Society No. 95 of Pennsylvania was added to the active group, bringing the active unit total to 129.

Colorado's lead is still safe in the hands of No. 56, but Nos. 55 and 213 are not far behind and may overtake the leader in the final weeks of the campaign.

Outstanding in Illinois was the work done by No. 206, which added over 3,000 points to its record to retain third place and come within striking distance of its goal. Nos.

143 and 29 also gained 1,000 points apiece, and, if they continue at the same rate, should have no trouble in making a bid for first place honors.

Campaign followers are wondering just how St. Christine's, No. 219, of Euclid, O., goes about shooting to its total to high marks. The first society to make quota, the Euclidites set out to double their mark, and with that accomplished, they continued, and according to the present reports are a few thousand points shy of attaining FOUR TIMES their quota. A few thousand points is nothing to this active KSKJ society. They now have 37,451.

Nos. 63 and 169 of Ohio are expected to make goal shortly, as are Nos. 101, 193 and 207, the latter three already having passed the half-way mark.

It is believed No. 81 of Pennsylvania will be the first in that state and the East to make quota, but if No. 50 continues to tally a generous over-1,000 point addition to its marks, as it did last week, the odds on any wagers will change.

Pennsylvania has a new active society in No. 95, which made its appearance last week with 901 points for a starter.

In the individual ratings 15 members hold high honors and form the Golden Booster class. Mary Kotze, last week's addition to the high-rating class, brings the number of women in that circle to ten. A Golden Booster is one who enrolls 20 or more members.

Thirty-three members form the Silver Booster class, Lena Mikan meriting recognition in the current Honor Roll, including members who enroll 10 or more members. Members of the Silver Class enrolled 109 new members, while the Golden Boosters recruited 349 members.

St. Christine's of Euclid leads Ohio and has four Golden Boosters and two Silverites.
