A Vast Coal Reserve.

Government geologists, who have been measuring Wyoming's coal resources, announce that in one field, the Gillette, there are more than 14,000,000,000 tons in workable seams.

That is almost as much coal as has been mined in the United States to date from all mines, a total of about 17,800,000,000 tons.

Over this vast coal domain are scattered here and there several country mines and "prospects" from which small quantities of coal have been taken for domestic use.

All points in the Gillette field are within 60 miles of the nearest railroad shipping points, which is of low subbituminous rank, of a class often referred to as black lignite, and burns readily.

A considerable part of the coal in the Gillette field is owned by the United States and is subject to development under government lease.

After the fields now being exploited have been exhausted, there will be a rush to this huge untapped coal resources a general thing today, knowledge of this vast tract comes as astonishing information.
