## DELAVSKA TAJNICA ZA ZAVAROVANJE

Zastopnik organiziranega delavstva se strinja z njenim načrtom za zavarovanje proti brezposelnosti.

Charlottesville, Va. — Frances Perkins, načelnica zveznega delavskega departmента, se je v svojem govoru pred člani Instituta za javne zadeve odprto izrekla za zavarovanje proti brezposelnosti in predložila načrt, ki bi po njenem mnenju premagal potežko, ki ovirajo uveljavljanje te reforme.

Njen načrt predviduje združitev industrijskih držav v posebni grapi in imenovanje odbora, v čigar področje naj bi spadala uprava brezposelnostnega zavarovanja. Države New York, New Jersey in Pennsylvania na primer bi tvorile eno skupino, ker imajo slične industrije. Druga skupina naj bi uključevala novoangleške države, tretja južne, četrta zapadne itd.

Tako grupe držav, je dejala Perkins, bi lagje upravljale skupine brezposelnostnega zavarovanja kot posamezne države in s tem bi bilo odpravljeno tudi raketirstvo privatnih zavarovalnic.

"Brezposelnost je industrijska hazardna igra, katero je treba odpraviti," je rekla delavska tajnica. "Delodajalci kopijo rezerve, da lahko plačujejo dividende in valed tega je potrebno, da prispevajo tudi v sklad, iz katerega naj bi delavci, ki izgube zasluge ne po svoji krvidi, prejemali podporo."

Perkins je namignila, da bo v doglednem času prišlo do federalnega zavarovanja proti brezposelnosti, kajti to kažejo eksperimenti v zvezi z izvajanjem zakona federalne kontrole nad industrijami.

## Ekonomika konferenca zaključuje svoje posle

Najbrž ostavi komisijo za seboj. Sovjetska delegacija odgovorila Kanadčanom

London, 18. jul. — Mednarodna gospodarska konferenca dokončava ta teden svoje posle, prav za prav — nedelo. Vsi podseki majmo predložiti svoja poročila MacDonaidu, predsedniku konference, najkasneje v petek. Prihodnji teden, 27. julija, se ekonomika konferenca razide in najbrž se nikdar več ne snide.

Državni tajnik Hull, vodja ameriške delegacije, ne verjam da bo konferenca brez vsakega rezultata. On pričakuje, da konferenca pusti za seboj stalno komisijo, v kateri bo zastopanih okrog 15 držav in ki bo zborovana v Londonu ali Ženevi. Tej komisiji bo poverjena naloga, da sestavi razne valutne, carinske in druge načrte, katere potem predloži vladam v razpravo in odobritev.

Sovjetski delegat Ozerski je včeraj objavil odgovor na obtožbo kanadske delegacije, da je sovjetska konkurenca z lesom na mednarodnem trgu nepoštena, kajti sovjetski državni lesni trust ne ukluje v ceno vseh stroškov kakor to delajo druge države.

Ozerski je odgovoril, da so v cenah včetisti vsi resnični izdatki, ki jih imajo sovjeti s produkcijo. Obtožba, da so ruski gozdarji sužni, ki sovjete zelo malo stanje, temelji na laži. Rusija je danes edina država na svetu, ki nima brezposelnosti in položaj njenih delavcev se stalno izboljšuje.

## Post v Sibiriji; nov rekord

Litvansko-ameriška letalca došpela mrtva v svojo domovino.

Novosibirsk, USSR. 18. jul. — Wiley Post, ameriški letalec, ki je sam na poletu okoli sveta, je danes zjutraj poletel v Irkutsk, kamor ima dospeti zvečer. Tam ostane čez noč in jutri zjutraj je namenjen v Kabarovsk, ki je njegova zadnja postaja v Sibiriji. Post je v treh dneh preletel polovico poti okoli sveta — okrog 7000 milij — in je brez malega 71 ur na dobičku v primeru s svojim zadnjim poletom. V Novosibirsku je počival le dve uri. Uživa čisto malo jedil, da je ves čas lačen in to mu pomaga krotiti spanec.

Kovno, Litvanija, 18. jul. — Trupli Stephen Dariusu in Stanleyu Girensu, dveh čikaških letalcev litvanske narodnosti, ki sta zadnjo soboto poletela iz New Yorka in se v pondeljek zjutraj ubila v Nemčiji, ko jima je zmanjkal gasolina, potem ko sta srečno preletela 4000 zračne poti, imata danes dospeti v Kovno. Letalca sta bila samo še 400 milij od cilja, ko ju je doletela smrť. Edino logično pojasnilo njune nesreče je, da sta v noči od nedelje na pondeljek izgubili smer in potratila gasolin, nakar sta iskala primeren kraj za pristank in sta smrekov gozd smatrala za travnik pa sta treščila v gosto lesovje nedaleč od Solina blizu poljske meje.

Na letališču v Kovnu ju je pa vso noč čakala množica okoli 10,000 oseb. Litvanska vlada je sklenila, da ju pokopuje na državne stroške in z vojaškimi častmi.

Predsednik unije električarjev resigniral

Washington, D. C. — H. H. Broach, predsednik mednarodne bratovščine električarjev, je te dni podal ostavko zaradi slabega zdravja. Eksekutivni svet unije je na Broachevo mesto postavil D. W. Tracyja, prvega podpredsednika te organizacije. Broach je postal član unije v starosti 16 let in je imel več važnih pozicij predno je bil izvoljen za najvišjega uradnika bratovščine. ## ROOSEVELT ŠE NI DAL SPLOŠNEGA PRAVILNIKA

Industrijske organizacije že vedno kolebajo med prepričljivimi minimalnimi mezdi in maksimalnimi delovnimi časimi.

Washington, D. C. 18. jul. — Predsednik Roosevelt in njegov federalni industrijski administrator se še nista odločila za splošen začasni pravilnik za vse one industrije, ki še niso predložile prostovoljnih pravilnikov, dasi bei čas. Poročila, da se tak pravilnik pripravlja, se ponavljajo že par tednov, toda Roosevelt ima vsekakor pomisleke in — strah pred industrijskimi magnati.

Nadaljnji pravilniki kapljajo pologoma. Pravilniki oblačilne industrije prihajajo v sekcijskih: vsaka krojaška in šivilska stroka predlaga svojega in vse divizije se odločajo za 40 ur delovnega časa, dočim se minimalna meza razlikuje z ozirom na krajevne razmere.

Predjetniki za dobavo gradbenega materiala so se izrekli za 40c na uru minimalne meze in 40 ur v tednu maksimalnega delovnega časa.

Illinoiska asociacija čistilcev in barvarjev oblek je postavila v svoj pravilnik 44 ur maksimalnega delovnika in \$14 tedenske minimalne meze za odraščene trgovske pomočnike.

Voditelji "beauty shopa" ali lepotičarskih salonov imajo načrt za 42-urni delovni teden in \$15 tedenske minimalne plače v državah na severu in \$14 na jugu.

Administrator Johnson pripravlja veliko kampanjo za privabilitev trmolagih kapitalistov pod kontrolo vlade. Kampanja bo podobna oni za razpečevanje Liberty bondov med vojno. Natančili bodo velike plakate s sliko srditega orla in z napisom "We Do Our Part." Ti plakati bodo nalepljeni na tovarnah, katerih lastniki se podvržejo federalni kontroli.

## Napoveduje zrušitev privatnih unij

Delavski vodja pravi, da delodajaci ne smejo zanikati delavcem pravice do organiziranja v svojih unijah.

Kansas City, Mo. — Martin Francis Ryan, predsednik bratovščine železniških izprevodnikov, je napovedal polem kompanijskih unij. Rekel je, da je kongres postavil te unije izven zakona, ko je sprejel načrt federalne kontrole nad industrijami in da njegova unija dobiva dnevno številne prošnje od članov kompanijskih unij, ki želijo postati član bratovščine.

"Bojazni pred odslovitvijo je zadrževala te delavce od vstopa v svoje pravne unije," je rekel Ryan. "Ta bojazni je bila odpravljena, ko je kongres sprejel in predsednik Roosevelt obdrobil zakon federalne kontrole nad industrijami. Noben delodajalec se ne bo drznil kršiti tega zakona in zanikal delavcem pravice, o katerih sta kongres in načelnik ameriške vlade izjavila, da so njihove.

"Zakon je tako sestavljen, da ga lahko vsak razume. Nobena železniščica, ki hoče vzdržati kompanijsko unijo, nima za to legalne in moralne opore, na katero bi se naslanjala. Nikakogar razloga ni, zakaj ne bi delavci, ki so uposleni v železniških delavnicah, postali članji pristne unije, ki jim edina lahko nudi protekcijsko."

Chicago. — Dne 10. julija je bil v Chicagu "tag day" ali nabiranje prispevkov na ulicah za spomenik pokojnega župana Cermaka. Ženske so pa ves dan nabrali komaj \$6200. Odbor za spomenik bo zdaj iskal privatne prispevke od bogatih Cehov in demokratov.

## Vrednost delnic poskočila

New York. — Delnice na iljini newyorske borze so v začetku tega meseca porastle v tržni vrednosti na \$36,348,748,000, za več kot tri milijarde. Porast vrednosti delnic od 1. aprila znaša \$16,433,855,000.

Skoraj vse industrije zaznamujejo porast vrednosti delnic.

## BRITSKI DELAVCI SE ZANIMAJO ZA "NEW DEAL"

Rooseveltov program izvral živahne diskusije med voditelji britskega delavskega gibanja

London. — Ekonomski eksperiment, ki ga v Ameriki osnačujejo za "new deal", zlasti pa zakon o vladni kontroli industrij, je izvral živahne diskusije na tej strani Atlantika.

Veliko se govori o možnosti uveljavljenja sličnega programa v tej deželi, kjer se je do sedaj vzdrževalo mnenje, da je ameriško delavsko gibanje ostalo za desetletja zadaj za britskim, v kolikor se to nanaša na reforme, katerih cilj je izboljšanje položaja delavcev.

Britski kongres je sestavljen, da ga lahko vsak razume. Nobena železniščica, ki hoče vzdržati kompanijsko unijo, nima za to legalne in moralne opore, na katero bi se naslanjala. Nikakogar razloga ni, zakaj ne bi delavci, ki so uposleni v železniških delavnicah, postali članji pristne unije, ki jim edina lahko nudi protekcijsko."

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Kot program ameriške vlade, tako tudi Bevinov načrt vsebuje zahteve za skrajšanje delovnika, toda v tem osrnu on ne gre tako daleč kot ameriško delavsko gibanje. Bevin meni, da bi uveljavljenje delovnega tedna 40 ur odpravilo brezposelnost v Angliji, kar je najbrž resnična, ker ima Anglija le krog tri milijone brezposelnih, toda poleg tega je on proti vsemi nadaljnji redukciji mezd.

## Fašisti preslavljajo morilce Rethenaua

Odkritev spominske plošče morilca. Katoliškim poslancem so odvzeli mandate

Berlin, 18. jul. — V navzočnosti Hitlerjevega štabnega generalnika fašističnih sunkovnih čet in velikega števila fašistov so včeraj med slovensnimi ceremonijami odkrili spominsko ploščo v Burgsalenku na poslopju, v katerem sta se leta 1922 sama usmrtila dva mlada morilca nemškega zunanjega ministra Rethenaua, ki je bil žid. Ko sta morilci ubili ministra, sta zbetala semkaj in se ustrelila, ko jima je bila policija za petami.

Plošča ima napis: "Tu sta 17. julija 1922 umrla dva mlada in junaška Nemci, poročnik Erwin Kern in poročnik Hermann Fischer, ki sta se borila za narodno Nemčijo."

Ultranacionalistični časopis "Deutsche Zeitung" je bil včeraj na odlok Hitlerjeve vlade ustavljen za tri mesece, ker je pisal, da je italijanski minister Balbo, ki je povedel floto letel v Ameriko, židovskega rodu. Uredniški lista je bil poslan v zapornico.

Večje število katoliških poslancev in poslank v rajhstagu in pruskih zbornic je morda odložiti mandate.

London, 18. jul. — "Daily Herald," organ delavske stranke, poroča, da so bili zadnjo soboto veliki izgredi med fašističnimi četami v Hamburgu, ki so zahtevala boljšo plačo. Na odredbo Hitlerja je bilo 12,000 četničkov odštoljenih in več sto vrzelih v zapornico.

Nato poda tajnik federacije svoje poročilo, ki je kot sledi:

Bratje zastopniki:

Moje poročilo kot tajnika federacije bo tudi bolj kratko in deloma zaradi tega, ker je predsednik večjidel o vsem precej podrobno poročal. Od našega zadnjega sestanka pa do danes ni bilo v poslovanju federacije nikakih znatnih sprememb, niti ni bil storjen kak večji korak z ozirom na izvajanje osnovne ideje J. B. F., razen kar se je izmenjaval med organizacijami glede informacij in poročil, kar pa je bilo dovolj redno. Da ni bilo kaj več podvzetega, so krijeve okolnosti, v katerih se naše organizacije nahajajo.

Na našem zadnjem sestanku smo imeli trdo nado in verovali smo, da se bodo razmene popravile, toda medtem smo doživeli obratno. Te nezgodne razmene ne samo da zadržujejo napredek v organizacijah, temveč celo ogrožajo njih obstanek. Vsa ka do organizacij, ki tvorijo federacijo, je nazadovala v preteklem letu na članstvu in v imovini. To nas mora še bolj uveriti, kako je potrebno, da pospešimo z delom za federacijo, oziroma z delom za zdržitev vseh naših podpornih organizacij.

Članarino za leto 1932 sta plačali S. N. P. J. in S. S. P. Z. in to jednota vsoto \$297.93, zveza pa \$53.01. Za leto 1933 je plačala samo S. S. P. Z. in sicer \$43.92. Vsega skupaj vplačano \$394.86.

Ostale organizacije se niso javile, razen H. B. Z., katere glavni odbor pa je zaključil, da radi primanklja v upravnem skladu za enkrat ne plača. Glavni odbor je tudi zaključil, da letos zajednica ne pošlje zastopnikov, toda z br. Sankovičem sva prisotna vseeno. In mene veseli, da sva prisotna, posebno ko vidim tako lepo število zastopnikov drugih organizacij takoj. To znači, da se je ideja federacije že globoko ukorenjila med nami in da se našemu cilju vse bolj približujemo.

Kakor vas je predsednik že obvestil, je zadnje leto pristopila federacija Jugoslovanska katoliška jednota.

Blagajnik Milojevič poroča, da je denar federacije naložen pri Peoples Pittsburgh Trust Co., in sicer vsota \$394.86 kot je tajnik poročal. Aleš: Br. Cainkar je v svojem poročilu priporočil, da bi sprejeli nekako resolucijo glede trideseturnega delovnika, namreč da se urgirajo društva, da jih sprejemajo in pošljajo svojim kongresnikom in drugim zavodnikom. Predlaga, da se zadevna resolucija sprejme. — Sprejet.

Grill: Mislim, da je precej težko reševati to vprašanje, kaj danes je vsakega člana najvažnejši problem, kako si bo zaslužil svoj kruh. Vprašanje doma je težavnina stvar, in dobro je, da se o tem razpravlja. Treba je najti način, kako bi se ločili tega dela skupno.

Cainkar: Poročila odborov smo slišali in ista niso posebno ugodna. Slišali smo, da se ni veliko delalo, razumeti pa je treba, da se ni moglo in to ne pomeni, da moramo prenehati z delom in s poskus, ali mogoče prenehati s federacijo. Ravne razmere so nas veliko naučile in ravno sedaj je čas, da se organiziramo in skupno delamo ter najdemo način, kako nam bo mogoče našim starim in onemoglim poskrbiti za streho in kos kruha. Na zadnjem konferenci je bila sprožena misel, da bi se gledalo za večje kompleksne zemljišč in da se bi federacija zavzel za naseljevanje takih članov, ki bi še lahko delali, pa ne morejo dobiti več dela, ker izgledajo stari. Takrat smo to sugestijo sprejeli nekako brezbrizno, vendar pa stvar zasluži, da si jo bolj natančno ogledamo.

Prisel je do zaključka, da naše organizacije nimajo dovoljne kontrole nad bolnimi člani in je ne bodo imele, dokler bodo tako vsaka zase poslovale. Potem je potreben tudi boljši sistem in več praktičnosti v poslovanju. Meni, da bi zdravniki morali biti najeti in plačani direktno iz gl. urada.

Milojevič smatra, da bi pomagalo, ako bi se večkrat opozarjalo društva in apeliralo na člane iz gl. urada, da bolje nadzira bolnike in pazi, kake člane se sprejemata v organizacijo.

Aleš odgovarja, da ima Milojevič dobro željo, toda izkušnje nas uči, da apeli ne zadežejo veliko. Apeliralo in priporočalo se je zopet in zopet; to se vrati i sedaj od gl. urada pošdinih organizacij, pomaga pa vse manj, največkrat nič. Podvzeti je treba drugačne mere.

Lotrič poveda, da so podpo-

re prevelike; član ima priliko, da je zavarovan pri dveh, treh in več organizacijah in se mu izplača biti bolan. Predlaga, da federacija osvoji nekakve regulacije, kar naj bi se izvajalo pri vseh, namreč da se takim, ki so drugod zavarovani za dva dohoda ali več, ne dovoli več ko za en dolar, ako se želi zavarovati za bolniško podporo še pri kateri drugi jednoti ali zvezzi ali zajednici. Predlog je sprejet.

Lenko misli, da ta sklep ni uместen in da bi se to moralno prepustiti posameznim organizacijam, da sprejemajo kogar hočejo.

## Naše telo

Država brez strankarskega prepira.

Najnovejša raziskovanja so pokazala, da nimajo naši veliki možgani večinoma nič opravka z vodstvom notranjega obrata v našem telesu. Ohranitev ne sprememjenje sestave krvi, vzajemno razmerje med dihanjem, krvnim obtokom, izločevanjem itd. potekajo čisto nezavisno od volje pod vplivom sil, ki niso podprtje možganom. In to je dobro, ker se vršijo ti procesi tako najbolj.

Med temi nezavisnimi silami imajo največjo besedo znani "harmoni" in "samostojni živčni centri". Preden so jim prisli na sled, so odkrili celo vrsto svojevrstnih "avtonomnih regulacij" v telesu. Velik del krvi se pretiči v te organe, da si nabere hraničnih snovi. Tako se dogaja, da imajo možgani med prebavo priljivo malo krvi, kar ima za posledico znano zaspanost po jedi.

Najvažnejši so pa pripomočki, s katerimi si organizem ohranjuje nesprenemjeno sestavo krvi. Ne glede na temperaturo, ki se uravnava z znojenjem, večim ali manjšim delovanjem mišic itd., mora telo skrbeti za to, da se koncentracija soli in hranil v krvi ne spremeni. To se dogaja lahko zavestno, s tem, da občutimo nedostajanje hranil in mogoče kot glad in žejo, ali pa brez načne volje z "notranjimi transakcijami". Tu odločujejo novo odkritie: harmoni in samostojni živčni centri. Harmoni se izločujejo iz žlez v krvi in povzročajo n. pr. porast ali padec krvnega tlaka, povečanje ali zmanjšanje sladkorja, pospešitev ali zadržanje rasti itd. Vsak harmon ima svojo protivnico, ki učinkuje povsem nasprotno. Tako zmanjšuje insulin količino sladkorja v krvi, adrenalin pa poveča. ### Editorial Comments

#### Well Worth Repeating

It is well worth repeating the fact that fraternal societies are carrying on their fraternal work through the present financial storms—without any government assistance—because they operate on fraternal, co-operative and mutual basis, and because they are operated in the interest of their membership and not for private gain. While, on the other hand, we noticed that the federal reconstruction finance corporation came to the assistance of the old-line commercial—private—insurance companies to the tune of more than eighty-two million dollars since its establishment in February, 1932, not one fraternal society has received a dollar from that source. And in spite of this—in spite of the most pressing demands for various loans upon the societies—all of the fraternal societies are still in existence and doing business.

Private insurance companies are operated primarily in and for the interest of the few, while fraternal societies carry on their fraternal work solely in the interest of their entire membership; therein lies the difference between the two.

#### Also Worth Repeating

Following are a few facts and figures that will well bear repeating:

"The fraternal societies on the American continent have paid more than four billions of dollars in benefits to their members and their beneficiaries. They have a membership of approximately ten millions of people, with insurance in force of over ten billions of dollars, and assets of more than one billion dollars."

When we let those facts and figures seep into our minds, we will recognize the importance and magnitude the fraternal societies play among the working people in this country, where social legislation is practically unknown. The entire work now in the hands of fraternal societies really belongs to state and federal protection, but until such time arrives, which eventually must, we as wage earners must protect ourselves through our fraternal societies which to us offer the best means of protection.

#### Look Up Former Members

We believe that the time is close at hand—at least in some localities—when we should see the members who became passive or suspended during the past two years because they were unable to meet their obligations. Invite them to come back into your branch. They need the protection the SNPJ is offering to them, and they will be glad to become again members of the branch they had been a member of, if they are approached and invited to come back to their old lodge and the Slovene National Benefit Society. Act now.

It may be pleasant to have an artistic temperament but you'll be more likely to succeed if you know how to handle a hammer and saw.

### Official Notice

#### DISCONTINUANCE OF SPECIAL ASSESSMENT

In accordance with the decision of the Administrative Committee at its meeting July 14, the members insured for disability benefit shall no longer be required to pay the 10c special assessment into the disability fund after August 1, 1933. Members shall resume payment of regular assessments beginning with August 1, which members and branch secretaries are requested to note.

That the special assessment was not discontinued with July 1, when the new by-laws became effective, is due to the fact that the disability fund maintained but a marginal reserve at the close of the month of June, and a large number of disbursements according to the old by-laws were anticipated during the month of July. Every argument that the special assessment was no longer in effect with the validity of the new by-laws is without ground, as the same section remains unchanged in the new by-laws. Any branch failing to remit the special assessment for the month of July shall be proceeded against according to the by-laws.

A number of questions regarding the new classes of insurance have been received by the Supreme Office, to which we hereby reply that the members will be advised in regard to this matter immediately upon completing all necessary preparations for the changes. Members are requested to defer any inquiries until such time.

### Kumer's Comments

Universal, Pa.—Perhaps it doesn't pay to be too self-conscious, and perhaps nobody noticed it anyway but an article which appeared in the Prosveta two weeks ago disturbed me no little bit. The haunting picture of myself in the villainous role of the Rudolph Rossendale type, washing my teeth and crying "Curses! foiled again, but my chance will come and vengeance will be mine", has pursued me since.

No, Andy, I am not and I was not disgusted with the convention, I am sorry if you understood me to feel that way. In fact person would have to be decidedly unfair to experience a feeling of disgust in the face of the convention's generally fine work — its decision to continue its progressive tendencies, its plan for reinstating old members and its change of benefit scales—to mention just a few things which were done at the convention. But since I am practically forced into an admission I may as well say that some things occurred which were not entirely to my liking.

In the first place it is somewhat mystifying to me to conceive where the Society will benefit greatly by the reduction in salaries which it effected of the Supreme officers and other employees who have never been overpaid—in comparison to the salaries of similarly employed executives and employees in any line of either private or public business. The total savings effected will not—I believe—compensate for the unconscious decline in incentive which will undoubtedly occur, resulting in a loss to the Society.

Another feature of the convention which was not entirely to my liking I had intended to "let well enough alone," but now I must explain—and therein lies a story:

At our last Federation meeting during a lull in the regular routine of business, readings were given of the reports of members of the Supreme Board regarding their work during the term of their incumbency. One report in particular caught the attention of the delegation. It was a masterpiece—no mistaking that; in fact for sheer artistry it was unsurpassable. So profound was its effect on the delegation present that one of the delegates jocosely made a motion that the author of the report be sent \$25 as a token of appreciation for his excellent work in the interests of the SNPJ. Incidentally the Convention delegates who were present could not have missed the attitude of the Federation members toward the author of this report.

Now one's literary expressions are not necessarily a true and complete criteria for one's character yet it cannot be denied that they do go a long way in showing what it is, and "tootin' your own horn" too much does not commend itself to a person of normal intelligence at any time.

# A Summary of the Proceedings of the Tenth Regular Convention

## SESSION 11

May 27, P. M.

Report of Compensations committee was read. The following was accepted:

Delegates per diem for X. regular convention	\$6.50
Supreme president	\$42.50 per week
First vice-president	40.00 per year
Second vice-president	20.00 "
Supreme Secretary	42.50 per week
Ass't secretary	41.00 "
Supreme treasurer	40.00 "
Chief editor	42.50 "

Chairman Supervising comm.	13.50 per month
Supreme supervisors	9.00 "
Chairman judicial comm.	34.00 "
Chairman Investment Comm.	30.00 "
Investment committeemen	20.00 "

The supreme board shall determine medical examiner's salary which is not to exceed \$100 per month.

Amended section 2 provides that when travelling on Society's business, supreme officers who are employed in the supreme office shall receive transportation fare plus \$3 daily for other expenses as well as sleeper berth fare if so determined by the administrative committee.

Other supreme officers and members who shall travel on Society's business shall receive transportation fare plus \$7.50 per diem, and if necessary to travel at night in order to reach destination on time, they shall receive fare for sleeper berth.

A motion to reconsider the decision on Article XIV (Vacations) was offered and carried. After a long discussion it was decided that officers and employees of the Society shall have one week vacation with pay.

Article XXXIII accepted unamended.

Article XXXIV, sec. 1, is amended so as to provide that new lodges may be organized only in U.S.A. Other sections define how new lodges may be organized. Sec. 9 states specifically that members of a new lodge shall pay the regular assessment for the month in which they are admitted to membership.

Article XXXV accepted with minor amendments. No changes in Art. XXXVI. An amendment to Art. XXXVII provides for an additional lodge office, that of agent for Society publications.

Section 4 as accepted: Any member in good standing who is proficient in the language of the Society, and who agrees with the declarations of principles of the SNPJ, and has been a member of the lodge at which he is a candidate for at least three months, and of the Society for one year, may become an officer of a lodge.

Supreme officers employed in the supreme office, members who have been guilty of fraud or embezzlement in any organization, or who are church officers or representatives of any Life Insurance Company, cannot be elected to lodge office.

First two sections of Art. XXXVIII are unchanged. Sec. 3 provides that payment of assessment and other moneys shall be by Postal or Express money order only.

## SESSION 12

May 29, A. M.

### Report of Appeals and Complaints Committee:

Nineteen cases were reported at this session among these being the case of Anton Kolar, Lodge 66, Breezy Hill, Kansas, who charged that he did not receive full amount of sick benefit due him. The committee confirmed the decision of the Supreme Judicial Committee.

Another case was that of Rose Grecic of Lodge 223, Luxor, Pa., who claims that she did not receive all sick benefit due. Investigation and hearing of the lodge's delegate disclosed that Sis. Grecic is not entitled to sick benefit as per provisions in Sec. 16 and Sec. 18 (e) of Article XXIV.

Bro. Andy Spolar of Lodge 39, Chicago, charged that the Supreme secretary withheld payment of a loan which had been approved by the Investment committee. The committee found that the Secretary acted in accord with the administrative committee, as per section d) of Article 11, and that, therefore, the complainant has no grounds, and the expenses in this connection should properly be borne by the complainant.

### Report of Resolutions Committee

Five resolutions were presented and accepted at this session as follows:

WHEREAS it has been clearly proved that Tom Mooney and Warren Billings, labor leaders of San Francisco, were unjustly sentenced and imprisoned seventeen years ago, and

WHEREAS Mooney and Billings were the victims of class justice because of their wartime activities for the workers and against war profiteers in California, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED that the Tenth Regular Convention of SNPJ in session in Chicago in May, 1933, joins the workers' organizations in their demand for unconditional release of Mooney and Billings from prison, in order that in a measure at least, the injustice done them may be righted.

RESOLVED that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the governor of California.

2.

WHEREAS the negro youths under death sentence in the Scottsboro case are the victims of racial prejudice commonly expressed in the South by lynching and by inhuman sentences fostered by a prejudiced sentiment, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED that these negroes be given an impartial and fair trial.

Resolved that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the governor of Alabama.

3.

WHEREAS, organized miners of Illinois are forced to endure hardships brought about by the present economic conditions, and by internal strife in the unions, and

WHEREAS, this strife is the outcome of a reactionary administration of the old UMWA which refused to concede to miners the privilege of electing officials and managing their affairs in a free and democratic manner, and

WHEREAS, this reactionary leadership was responsible for a reign of terror in a number of Illinois counties, during which many progressive miners were killed and injured, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED that the Tenth regular convention of SNPJ in session in Chicago in May, 1933, expresses its sympathy and moral support to the miners who rebelled against the old Union and organized the Progressive Miners Union, and

FURTHER, that progressive miners have been and to an extent are today the backbone of the SNPJ, and it is, therefore,

our moral duty to support them whenever and wherever they are engaged in a just dispute.

4.

WHEREAS the Tenth regular convention of SNPJ in session in Chicago in May, 1933, enacted articles of the by-laws which cover the text and contents of the Resolution for Voice of the Members in Prosveta which was accepted at the Ninth Convention, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED that the above mentioned resolution is hereby repealed, said repeal to be effective July 1, 1933.

5.

WHEREAS the Tenth regular convention of SNPJ ruled that real estate loans to members shall be discontinued, and as this ruling precludes the renewal of old loans the terms of which are from two to five years, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED that the Tenth regular convention gives the Investment committee the power to renew all such loans if the value of the property has not decreased so much as to endanger the security.

Submitted resolutions on Soviet Russia and Jugoslav Day were rejected by the committee.

The Committee on investigation and review of the administration reported on cases of Lodge 518, Detroit, and Lodge 318, Baggaley, Pa. In the latter, Judicial committeeman Podboy was accused of falsification of the minutes in the trial of a member. The committee found Podboy innocent as the by-laws were not violated in any way, and considers the accused to be a victim of personal vengeance.

Election to decide the next convention city followed, and the city of Cleveland, Ohio, was selected.

### SESSION 13

May 29, A. M.

Supreme president Victor Petek of the Jugoslav Benefit Union "Sloga" addresses the convention, and expresses greetings and best wishes in the name of his organization.

A formal charge in English against the Excursion bureau was presented to the Investigation committee by Delegate Vratarich of Lodge 204. (See pp. 214-215 of the Slovene minutes.) The committee read the minutes of its meetings held to investigate these charges, in which appear the testimonies of members of Excursion bureau, Zupancic, Olip, Alesh and Cainkar, and of Brothers Malovrh and Vratarich.

The committee reported to the convention that they audited the vouchers and books of the bureau (these were found to be poorly set up) and that apparently these were in order.

The committee recommended that the Society shall not engage in any similar enterprise in the future.

Motions and contrary motions on the report bring protests and explanations by members of the committee who state that the case is closed as far as they are concerned.

A motion by Zaitz that those concerned testify to the convention, which shall debate the issue, and that the time so taken up shall be made up by a special evening session, carries by majority vote.

The following brothers: Zupančič, Olip, Alesh, Molek, Cainkar and Zaitz made their individual reports and statements before the Convention, whereupon a motion that all concerned be cleared of any and all suspicion and the matter closed, was adopted.

### SESSION 14

May 31, A. M.

#### Report of by-laws committee

Article VII, Sec. 1 accepted as recommended, as also sections 8, 9 and 10 of Art. XIV. An amendment to sec. 4, Art. XXXVIII provides that the administrative committee may make exceptions to the rule that all lodge secretaries must be subscribers to Prosveta Daily. The rest of this article accepted as recommended. Articles XXXIX to XLII accepted as recommended.

Majority and minority decisions of Section 1, Article XLIV are presented. The majority decision to amend this section so that a new 50c sick benefit class be established, and that no new members be accepted to the \$3.00 class is accepted. Sec. 2 accepted as recommended.

Class "A" assessment scale for death benefit was accepted as recommended. Amended Art. XLVI, Special Assessment, provides that the administrative committee has the right to decrease benefits or increase assessment. Amended Sec. 2, Art. XLVII provides that sick benefit shall not be paid for the first 5 days of period of member's disability.

Scales for the three sick benefit classes accepted as presented. Accepted also the decision that the card system of record for the \$3 class be reestablished. Sec. 12 allows that a disabled member may attend a theatre with the doctor's permission. All the other sections and subsections (with one exception), are excepted as recommended, as is all of Art. XLVIII.

### SESSION 15

May 31, P. M.

Two resolutions submitted by the Resolutions committee were accepted as follows:

RESOLVED that the Tenth regular convention of SNPJ in session in Chicago in May, 1933, expresses its sincere thanks to the Chicago SNPJ lodges for the banquet given in honor of the convention members on Saturday evening, May 27, and for all the other programs and entertainments.

2.

BE IT RESOLVED THAT IF two or more lodges in a community desire to merge in order to decrease lodge and administrative expenses, they may do so if the members of each lodge vote in favor by two-thirds majority.

All the members must be notified in writing of the meetings, the purpose of which must be stated. Members who paid assessment for the previous month may vote on the question.

The united lodges shall retain one of the lodge numbers, but a new name shall be selected, as well as new officers if the officers of the lodge whose number is retained are not willing to function until the end of the term. All the assets and liabilities shall immediately be transferred to the merged lodge. Members who do not agree to the merger may transfer to any nearby lodge.

The case of Frank Krabanja, Lodge 225 was reported by the Investigation committee, and the committee's decision to approve the decision of the Judicial committee in this case is accepted.

#### Report of Committee on Review of the Administration

All the supreme officers were called before this committee and questioned as to their respective departments, as were also the office employees, the janitor and the chairman of the supervising committee. On the basis of these reports, the committee prepared and presented six recommendations.

#### Report of Publications and Institutions Committee

A resolution submitted by this committee for the establishment of an SNPJ farm was rejected by the convention.

The minutes of the committee's meetings were read, in which it is stated that Godina, Cainkar, Molek, Alesh and others were heard in the matter of Prosveta daily with a view of determining the best course to pursue in order that the daily may be retained. A resolution to this end is read, and on motion of Zaitz copies of this resolution are prepared and distributed to each delegate.

The Appeals and complaints committee here reported on the cases of Valentin Podobnik of Lodge 234, Andrew Bigovich of Lodge 374, and delegate Drop of Lodges 23 and 260.

Follows a debate on the Prosveta daily. The resolution accepted is as follows:

WHEREAS the Prosveta daily was of greatest assistance in the development of the SNPJ, and is still the best means toward further growth, and

WHEREAS the paper is in a critical financial condition, and as the Tenth regular convention of SNPJ in session in Chicago in May, 1933, realizes the necessity that Prosveta daily be continued; to this end, therefore,

#### BE IT RESOLVED that

a) The Prosveta and printing departments be merged, and that the present system of voluntary subscriptions be retained,

that 5 members of a family who receive the weekly, may be grouped for one daily subscription (instead of only 3 members as at present), but if one member of the family ceases to be a member, he shall pay the difference towards the subscription if he desires his own paper, or the term of his subscription shall be shortened accordingly.

b) The supreme board may give financial aid to Prosveta daily from the administrative fund, if necessary.

c) The wall calendar may be discontinued for the benefit of the daily, if necessary.

d) Mladinski List may be merged with Prosveta and the reading matter of the former published in Prosveta, and the funds for issuing Mladinski List transferred to Prosveta.

The daily can not be discontinued except by two-thirds vote of the entire supreme board. The administrative committee and the business manager shall see that campaigns for new subscribers and advertisers are conducted at all times.

### SESSION 16

June 1, A. M.

The Publications and Institutions Committee submits this resolution on the printing department which is given as it was accepted:

WHEREAS the SNPJ has always championed principles of organized labor and the Prosveta constantly advocates unionism and defends workers' rights, and

WHEREAS the present economic crisis has dealt a heavy blow to Prosveta since large numbers of members are out of work, and many subscribers have been so lost, while on the other hand, the printers' wages in these critical times are extremely high, especially if we consider the financial condition of Prosveta and its struggle for existence, and

WHEREAS it is in the interest of printers and the unions to consider the present situation of Prosveta and its subscribers, and to help to save the Prosveta, since they would gain nothing with its suspension but would lose materially, and since it is in the interest of the SNPJ and the labor movement generally to do whatever possible to save the daily, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED that the Tenth regular convention instructs the administrative committee not to sign the four year wage agreement with the printers' union because this term is too long, and because the wage scale disregards the situation of the Prosveta and of our members, and further

That the administrative committee undertakes such steps to save the daily as the financial condition of the paper demands, that is, if necessary, move the Prosveta to another city where the wage scale is lower.

#### Report of By-laws Committee

All sections of Articles XXVIII, LII to LXV accepted as recommended. Article LXVIII provides for class "B" 20 year paid-up insurance, and also that loans for assessment may be made to members carrying this insurance from their accrued reserves. This article accepted as recommended.

Five resolutions submitted by the Resolutions committee and accepted as follows:

WHEREAS social insurance and legislation against unemployment, sickness and accidents, and old age disability is extremely necessary to the workers in America, and

WHEREAS social insurance is the means through which the workers will eventually be relieved of maintaining their own benefit societies, as this social work will be in the care of the state, and as it is, further, a step forward on the path to the workers' ultimate goal, namely, the socialization of the means of production and distribution, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED that the Tenth regular convention of SNPJ approves the movement to bring about such legislation and recommends that the members of the Society support it morally and materially wherever possible.

AND WHEREAS the Continental Congress at its session in Washington, D. C., May 6 and 7, 1933, clearly showed the American workers and farmers the way to achieve the goal of social legislation and a new economic and social system in this Republic.

IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED that this convention approves the decisions of the Congress, and that the Society publications shall write in accordance with these decisions and declarations.
