

# Short History of Slo-

4. Upheaval in Literature. Symbolism Among Slovenes

Naturalism among the Slovenes was a very brief episode. It did not have much of an opportunity to develop because before it reached the Slovenes through the Germans, the originators, the French have already rebelled against it.

When in 1899, Cankar's "Erotica" and Zupancic's "Casa opojnosti" (Intoxicating Cup) were published there arose in the modern circle cry and joy over the conquest of the old and inadequate movements. I may be said that Cankar's and Zupancic's appearance was rather stormy and caused quite a sensation. The two were joined by Dragotin Kette and Josip Murn making it a quartet which was known and knew itself from the collegiate days in Ljubljana.

However, the modern style and the movement did not come without a harbinger. In the case of Slovene literature, Ksaver Mesko was the man who prepared the way. Ksaver Mesko was born at Sv. Tomaž on October 28, 1874. He finished his education in Slovenia and was consecrated priest in 1898. Even in his Gymnasium days, Mesko was interested in literature and wrote novels under the influence of the Russian realists,

especially of Tolstoy with an admixture of smybolic psychology and soon became a pure psychological writer or a Symbolist as they have been called.

His more popular poems are: Moje, poti, Izgubljena duša, (Lost Soul), Razne poti, (Various Paths), Sen poletne noči (Summer Night's Dream). His best novels he published in a collection called "Ob tihih večerih" (On Silent Nights).

Mesko is an emotional-lyrical person, humble and modest as a woman and endowed with deep feelings, full of love for the poor and suffering, for those ailing in the mind, the weak, and those who were derided. He does not love cutting satire, and he never displays the firmness of character of man. The best things which he has created are his emotional-lyrical novels which have found their way into the world in translation.

Of a completely different nature was Ivan Cankar, who united lyrical and pointed satire. Besides Zupancic, Cankar is the best worded and reaches the heights of world contemporary literature. The name of Ivan Cankar is known throughout the literary world of Europe. He has been translated into all of the Slav languages and even into Cerman, Italian and English.

# Ivan Carker

Ivan Cankar was born on May 10, 1876 at Vrhnika. In 1886 he began his studies at the technical school at Ljubljana and completed his under graduate studies in 1895. He then went to Vienna and enrolled at the Technical Institute but he never completed. His interest in literature would not leave him continue in the technical studies. For a time he remained in Vienna satisfy-

ing himself with the money he received from awards which he received from the product of his pen. For a short while he was a journalist in Vienna. In 1909, he returned to the homeland and remained for most time in Roznik. In the last years of his life he passed in Ljubljana. On December 11, 1918 he died from an attack of pneumonia. Ivan Cankar was in his sixth year of the Realka

when his first poem appeared in the Ljubljanski Zvon. Askerc was his model. In content and form Cankar's poems of a few years later show the strong influence of Askerc. This influence continued until the year 1895 when Cankar went to Vienna.

When however, Cankar came to Vienna and there discovered false pomp and interior rotteness, foul smelling poverty of large city life, and himself experienced the bitter suffering of student want, waywardness which surrounded him, the terrible condition of the Bohemian quarter, his lyricism became of an altogether different nature. In the Vienna cafes he met like spirits and together they have "wished a new life an unquiet life, new deeds, battles and storms and-accidentally, we came upon naturalism. In his Vienna poems, most of them of an erotic nature he came very sympathetic with the spirit Heinie and the boulevard poets of Paris-a spirit of romance, saturated with naturalistic ideas, longing and sorrow, sin and penance, are evidenced in them expressed so blatantly and with a blasphemous cynicism. That is the background for his epoch making and sensation book "Erotica" published in 1899. (The blast phemous parts of the book have been expurgated from the edition of 1902 by Cankar himself-Ed. Note). With the poems of Cankar not only struck a new note
