### Why So Much Modesty?

The New York State Economic Council group of professors, retired preachers, press agents for the type of industrialists finance so-called "Law and Order" society may rightfully lay claim to being the most modest organization of its kind in the world. Compared with the Citizens' Alliance, which has secrecy but absolutely no modesty, New York Council is a shrinking violet.

Among the outstanding principles of the organization are the following: (1) all unemployed and farmers on relief shall be barred from voting, (2) picketing shall be limited to a mere announcement of the dispute, (3) sympathetic or general strikes shall be barred, (4) no social insurance of any kind, (5) workshops shall be illegal, and (6) taxes shall be limited.

Such lily-white modesty is refreshing these days of unmitigated chiseling. The council should have added that it further believes (1) no one should be permitted to vote who disagrees with its platform, (2) no strike should be permitted, (3) strikebreakers should have authority to call out the militia, (4) organizations like the Citizens' Alliance should have the right to issue injunctions against governors who declare martial law, (5) taxes for those receiving over \$2,000 a year and (6) newspapers should have the power to appoint the chief of police whenever the council cannot agree on a candidate for the job.

In this way the organization could boast a 12-point program which would solve all social, economic and political problems of the troublesome times. But it is not likely that the will make much of a showing in this busy world. It is too modest.

### That "Foreign Red" Bogey

The resolutions committee of the California department of the American Legion voted unanimously a resolution which had been presented to them, censuring Secretary of Labor Frances Perkins for not deporting aliens.

This is good news, for everything indicates that Miss Perkins is enforcing the law, without fear or favor. Other statements of Legion officers declare that "foreign Communists with help from 'liberals' and 'radicals' in our colleges, are causing strikes and trying to ruin recovery.

This statement is provably false. No single important strike for a year can be traced to foreign agitators of any sort, and nine of every ten strikes of the same period are have been strikes against the lawlessness of employers.

The law, passed by Congress and signed by the President, declares that workers have the right to organize and bargain collectively with their employers, and that they may choose an organization which shall speak for them without interference, influence or coercion.

But Big Business, from steel to shipping, persistently, openly, brazenly defied and violated that law. It has put pressure on its workers to keep them out of recognized unions. And the workers, in increasing numbers, striking against this organized violation of Federal law meant for their protection.

### A Labor New Deal

The A. F. of L. has issued a call for the annual convention which will meet in San Francisco October 1. The call declares that experience has shown that, notwithstanding plain provisions of Section 7A of the N.L.R.B., workers have been prevented from exercising the right to organize and to engage in collective bargaining... Workers have been compelled to resort to the use of strike measures in order to force employers to concede the exercise of a right guaranteed by law.

## MOONEY FIGHTS FOR WRIT

The United States Supreme Court will have an opportunity to pass on Tom Mooney's petition for a writ of habeas corpus to free him from prison, his attorneys announced last month after Federal Judge A. F. St. Sure in San Francisco declined to reconsider his decision denying Mooney the writ.

Friends of Mooney announced also that they would file a bill for a pardon with California's new governor, Frank P. Merriam. Similar appeals to four previous governors failed.

## "DYNAMITE"

**Chicago.**—No one can form an authentic picture of present-day America, together with a prophecy of its future development, without a thorough study of its background. And no one can maintain his spirit and energy in the whirlpool of labor conflicts in which he finds himself engulfed and comprehend the scope and significance of the movement until he possesses knowledge of the tremendous labor struggles that have been waging since the middle of the nineteenth century.

No better avenue toward the acquisition of such a background is open than the conscientious reading of Louis Adamic's revised edition of "Dynamite," published this month by the Viking Press. As the subtitle indicates, the book is a "story of class violence in America." After reading chapter upon chapter of actual class "wars" in which the use of force developed from the crude killings of the Molly Maguires in 1865 to the systematic, smooth working of racketeering in the last two decades, no subtitle could more adequately describe the struggle of employee against employer in a too-often futile attempt to better general living conditions.

The book is invaluable to the average reader in that it is a concise, chronological summary of the labor movement from the beginnings of America to the strikes of 1934. It is written from an unbiased viewpoint in the fascinating style, characteristic of Adamic's works, which combines interest with simplicity.

The reader learns about the riots of 1877, during the great financial panic, and the origin of dynamite as a revenge for failure to comply. The story of the Haymarket tragedy and its consequences is dramatically told. Just how the labor movement became a "racket" is explained through the history of the Knights of Labor and the emergence of the American Federation of Labor.

The story continues to the rise of Dubs, the violence in the West, the activities of the Wobblies, and the tragic McNamara affair. Everyone should be familiar with the facts behind the Mooney-Billings frame-up and the Sacco-Vanzetti case. Nor does the author rest content with historical data only. He presents the cause and origins of racketeering, sabotage, and the rise of unemployment. He brings his study to the immediate present, recounting the spurt in the activities of labor prompted by section 7a of the NIRA, which took form in strikes throughout the country.

No one, whether actively engaged on the picket-line, a student of economics, or just another unemployed—a victim of the depression—can afford not to acquire the knowledge and background furnished by "Dynamite," the timely book "just off the press."

## 10,000 ALUMINUM WORKERS ON STRIKE

## Mellon Buys \$1,500,000 Painting

**Pittsburgh, Pa.**—While 10,000 strikers are grimly picketing six plants of the Aluminum Company of America in their fight for union recognition and decent living conditions, word comes via Associated Press that Andrew Mellon (another name for the aluminum trust) has just bought a famous Raphael painting for a million and a half dollars. The strikers have been out since Monday, and three plants in Pennsylvania and one each in New York, Illinois and Tennessee are involved. The painting "Alba Madonna" named for the Spanish Duke of Alba, the Mellon of his day—has been knocking around since early in the 16th century, and has had a variegated history.

Once owned by the Czar of Russia, it has now been purchased by the Czar of aluminum and whiskey (and the United States Treasury in the last administration). An interesting point is that the painting was sold to anti-labor Mellon by the Soviet Hermitage Museum in Leningrad, if the report is correct. Mellon (the greatest Secretary of the Treasury since Mellon) is supposed to be grouse shooting in dear old Scotland.

## THE NEW DEAL

Capitalist politics in this country for over a century has been one of booty for the winners in addition to serving particular class interests. The civil service reformers have for a half-century been trying to check this vulgarizing of public office. The New Deal has enormously expanded this booty politics. When Roosevelt became President in March, 1933, there were 110,000 Federal employees

not under civil service; today the number has increased to 199,000.

One high Federal job-holder in Colorado sent a notice to applicants for government positions to get a recommendation from the chairman of a county, state or central committee of the Democratic Party. Want a job or relief? Be a good Democrat. The New Deal will take care of you.

## On the Thirtieth Anniversary of the S. N. P. J.

### Instructions and Explanations for the Campaign

The Supreme Board at its annual meeting held in February laid plans for a jubilee campaign by which to secure new members in both the adult and juvenile departments. The campaign officially opened March 1 and closes December 31, 1934, members accepted at any time during the dates specified will be entitled to privileges of the campaign, and the proposers and tators to the awards which are as follows:

### Juvenile Department

For each individual new members up to 5, a member will receive	\$ 2.50
" 10 "	5.00
" 15 "	10.00
" 20 "	15.00
" 25 "	20.00

It is to be understood that awards will be given only as specified above, both as to number and amount. (This is mentioned to prevent unnecessary correspondence as to how much will be given for, let us say, 8 or 12 members.)

Members of the juvenile department who enter during the campaign will be exempt from payment of two monthly assessments, and the Society will pay the expense of the medical examination up to the sum of 50c.

### Adult Department

The Society will pay \$1.00 for each newly-acquired member between the age of 16 and 35 years. The branches and individuals participating in the campaign—of which the Supreme Office will be notified—will, in addition to the prizes mentioned, receive \$10.00 in cash for 25 or more new members secured.

During this campaign the Society will bear the expense of medical examination for every new member between the ages of 16 and 35 years. The branches and individuals participating in the campaign will be exempt from payment of \$2.00, and each such member will be exempt from payment of \$1.00 initiation fee for the bullet fund. This means that every new candidate will pay \$1.00 in addition to that into the sick benefit fund as specified in the by-laws.
