Why So Much Modesty?

The New York State Economic Council group of professors, retired preachers, press agents for the type of industrialist finance so-called "Law and Order" society may rightfully lay claim to being the most modest organization of its kind in the world. Compared with the Citizens' Alliance, which has secrecy but absolutely no modesty, New York Council is a shrinking violet.

Among the outstanding principles of the organization are the following: (1) all employed and farmers on relief shall be barred from voting, (2) picketing shall be limited to a mere announcement of the dispute, (3) sympathetic or general strikes shall be barred, no social insurance of any kind, (5) unions shall be illegal, and (6) taxes shall be limited.

Such lily-white modesty is refreshing these days of unmitigated chiseling. The council should have added that it further believes: (1) no one should be permitted to vote who disagrees with its platform, (2) no strike should be permitted, (3) strikebreakers should have authority to call out the militia, (4) organizations like the Citizens' Alliance should have the right to issue injunctions against governors who declare martial law, (5) taxes for those receiving over \$2,000 a year and (6) newspapers should have the power to appoint the chief of police whenever the council cannot agree on a candidate for job.

In this way the organization could boast a 12-point program which would solve all social, economic and political problems of the troublesome times. But it is not likely that will make much of a showing in this busy world. It is too modest.

That "Foreign Red" Bogey

The resolutions committee of the California department of the American Legion voted down unanimously a resolution which was presented to them, censuring Secretary of Labor Frances Perkins for not deporting millions.

This is good news, for everything indicates that Miss Perkins is enforcing the law, without fear or favor. Other statements of Legion officers declare that "foreign Communism with help from "liberals" and "radicals" in our colleges, are causing strikes and trying to ruin recovery.

This statement is provably false. No single important strike for a year can be traced to foreign agitators of any sort, and nine of every ten strikes of the same period are have been strikes against the lawlessness of employers.

The law, passed by Congress and signed by the President, declares that workers have the right to organize and bargain collectively with their employers, and that they may choose their organization which shall speak for them without interference, influence or coercion.

But Big Business, from steel to shipping, persistently, openly, brazenly defied and flouted that law. It has put pressure on its workers to keep them out of recognized unions. And the workers, in increasing numbers, striking against this organized violation of Federal law meant for their protection.

A Labor New Deal

The A. F. of L. has issued a call for the national convention which will meet in San Francisco October 1. The call declares that "experience has shown that, notwithstanding plain provisions of Section 7A of the National Labor Relations Act, the rights of workers have been prevented from exercising the right to organize and to engage in collective bargaining. . . . Workers have been compelled to resort to the use of strike measures in order to force employers to concede the exercise of a right guaranteed by law."

Righto. This being true, why not a New Deal of workers, by workers and for workers? This might well start with a resolution recommending to the national unions that they abandon the two old and too old parties and concentrate the voting strength of the working masses into a party of their own. This would be a New Deal leading to the acquisition of power by the workers themselves.

RESOLUTION

Bentleyville, Pa., Aug. 14, 1934.—To the German Ambassador of the United States of America, Washington, D. C.

Dear Sir:—At our regular meeting of our Lodge 240, SNPJ, which took place on Sunday, August 5, 1934, at Bentleyville, Pennsylvania, we adopted a motion to send our protest against the imprisonment of the Leaders of the German working class, such as Thaelman and others.

We, as Liberty loving citizens of the United States of America, ask the unconditional release and freedom of all the Political Prisoners, regardless of their political belief, whether they are Communists, Socialists, Jews, Catholics or others, and to make out protest effective we further resolved:

To notify all other lodges of our organization and other organizations to send a similar protest and to refrain from buying German made goods until these barbarian conditions are abolished and Germany again be included in the rest of the civilized world.
