



Bod' moja, bod' moja...

Jože Grdina:

Ob 50-letnici ruske revolucije

(Nadaljevanje)

Lenina je bratova smrt zelo potrla. Sklenil je, da mu bo sledil, toda ne po poti terorizma, ampak po poti revolucije. Ker je bil zelo nadarjen in ukaze-ljen, se je odločil, da gre na vseučilišče v Kazano študirat pravo. Priporočilo za to mu je dal ravnatelj simbirske gimnazije F. Kerenski, oče poznejšega ministrskega predsednika začasne ruske vlade A. F. Kerenskega. V Kazani je stopil v revolucionarni krožek, se zvezal z nezadovoljnimi dijaki ter prišel zaradi tega navzkriž v vlado in s profesorji. 4. decembra 1887 je bil v vseučiliški dvorani sestanek dijakov, ki so zahtevali ukinitve reakcionarne vseučiliške ustave in še nekatere druge stvari. Najglasnejši med dijaki je bil Lenin, ki je bil na ukaz kazanskega gubernatorja potem aretiran. V ječi so potem on in njegovi tovariši snovali načrt, kaj bo kdo delal, ko bo prišel iz ječe. Tedaj je Lenin izjavil, da je pred njim le ena pot, pot revolucionarne borbe. Ker se profesorji niso marali več ukvarjati z upornim dijakom, so ga z vseučilišča izključili ter poslali v izgnanstvo v 40 verst (versta je 1 kilometer in 670 metrov) oddaljeno selo Kukuškin. S tem je prejel Lenin svoj revolucionarni krst ter odselej posvetil svoje življenje borbi proti samodržstvu in kapitalu.

Ker se ni mogel udeleževati rednega študija, so mu sorodniki dostavljali iz kazanske knjižnice knjige, časopise in drugo literaturo, iz katere je potemtudiral politiko, ekonomijo in statistiko ter tako nekako namo-drestil učenje na vseučilišču. Po odsluženju kazni v jeseni 1888 mu je bilo dovoljeno vrniti se v Kazano, pot na vseučilišče pa mu je ostala zaprta; niso ga hoteli več sprejeti. Tedaj je stopil v enega marksističnih krožkov, katerega je začel mlad revolucionar N. J. Fedosejev. Tu je dobival ilegalno literaturo in Marksov "Kapital" ter se seznanjal z deli K. Marksa in F. Engelsa. Iz Kazane je odšel v Samarsko gubernijo, se naselil v selu Alakajevki, nato pa v Samari.

Ker bi rad s študijem nadaljeval, je prošil za sprejem na vseučilišče; toda prošnjo so mu odklonili. Zaprozil je potem vseučilišče v Petrogradu, naj mu dovolijo kot izrednemu slušatelju napraviti izpit ter se je z velikim vnemo lotil učenja. Prošnja je bila odobrena in 1. 1891 je na pravni fakulteti petrograjskega vseučilišča napravil izpit, in sicer s tako odliko, da je redne slušatelje vseučilišča ne le dohitel, ampak jih celo prekosil; dobil je diplomu prvega reda, tako da se je marsikdo čudil. Po tem uspehu je dobil službo na okrajnem sodišču v Samari, kjer je kakor prej v Alakajevki prišel do mnogih dragocenih izkušenj iz življenja kmetov in meščanov, kar mu je pozneje zelo koristilo.

V Samari je Lenin prevedel iz nemščine na ruski jezik "Manifest komunistične partije", ki je potem v rokopisu šel iz rok v roke po samarskih krožkih in po drugih predelih gubernije in mestih na bregovih Volge. L. 1892 je Lenin ustanovil v Samari prvi marksistični krožek, v katerem je seznanjal Ruse z deli in teorijami Marksa in Engelsa in širil marksizem. Ker se mu je zdelo, da je polje za širjenje Marksovega komunizma v Samari premajhno, se je odločil za širše. Preko Nižnega Novgoroda in Moskve je 31. avgusta 1893 prišel v Petrograd, kjer se je srečal z nekaterimi delavskimi voditelji, med katerimi sta bila tudi I. V. Babuškin in V. A. Seljgunov, s katerima je bil v tesni zvezi še potem, ko je bil v inozemstvu. Tu se je predal delu za širjenje marksističnih idej, z besedo in peresom hujskal delavce ter jih podžigal k štrajkom. V Petrogradu je bilo ob Leninovem prihodu že več političnih krožkov, katere je ta posečal in prišel kmalu v ospredje proletarcev. Zaradi njegovega organizatoričnega nastopa je bil februarja 1895 na shodu socialdemokratov izvoljen, da gre v inozemstvo. Najprej se je napotil v Švico, kjer je bil tedaj Georgij Valentinovič Plehanov (1856-1918), filozof in prvi propagandist komunističnih idej v Rusiji, ki je decembra 1876 v demonstraciji na Kazanskem trgu v Petrogradu nastopil v govoru proti samodržstvu, za kar je bil izključen iz inštituta ter se umaknil v Švico, od koder je delal za revolucijo. Sprva je bil Leninu prijazen in naklonjen, proti koncu pa je postal Leninu in boljševikom odločno sovražnik, katero je potem skrito v

kovčku z dvojnimi dnom neopazeno vtihotapil preko meje v Rusijo, da mu je potem služila za nadaljevanje nelegalnega širjenja marksistične propagande. Po vrnitvi v Petrograd so se decembra 1895 pod njegovim vodstvom združili vsi marksistični krožki v Zvezo za osvoboditev delavskega razreda. Ko so zastavljali tkalci tovarne Tornton, je Lenin sestavil spis: "Kaj potrebujejo tkalci?" Ko je bil ustanovljen list "Delavsko pravo", ki je imel iziti 9. decembra 1895, ga je policija zaplenila, Lenina pa zaprla. V ječi pa se mu očitno ni godilo slabo; posebno so zanj skrbele mati in sestre, ki so mu prinašale vsega, kar je potreboval; tudi glede knjig policija ni bila preveč natančna. Iz ječe je pisaril s šifrirano pisavo in mlekom ter bil tako v pismeni zvezi s tovariši v ječi. Da ga ne bi zasačili v tej pisavi, je iz kruha naredil posodice za mleko in jih v slučaju nevarnosti takoj pobasal v usta.

Po 14 mesecih ječe so mu 13. februarja 1897 naznanili, da je obsojen na tri leta izgnanstva v Sibirijo; dovoljeno pa mu je bilo, da sme nekaj dni svobodno ostati v Petrogradu. Lenin je to uspešno izkoristil v svoje revolucionarne namene in se je sestal z raznimi socialdemokrati, materi pa je medtem uspelo, da je dosegla, da ni bilo treba iti sinu v Sibirijo z drugimi izgnanci, ampak prostovoljno sam. Na poti, katero je pričel 17. februarja, se je ustavil v Moskvi. Od tam je odšel v Enisejsko gubernijo, kjer je bil v selu Sušensk nastanjen kot izganec. Tu je nadaljeval z delom za revolucijo in zaključil svoje klasično delo "Razvitje kapitalizma v Rusiji", ki ga je pričel pisati že prej v ječi. Tudi tu ni bil v stiski za knjige. Pošljala mu jih je sestra Marija, ki mu je poslala tudi knjigo nemškega socialdemokrata E. Bernsteina "Problemi socializma". V izgnanstvu v Ufi je tedaj živela Nadežda K. Krup-ska, učiteljica iz Petrograda, ki jo je spoznal že v Petrogradu in in se potem v Sibiriji z njo poročil.

Začetku januarja 1900 je bil obveščen od policije, da se bliža njegovo izgnanstvo koncu, a da mu notranji minister po prestani kazni prepoveduje bivanje v prestolnicah, vseučiliščnih mestih in središčih delavstva. Da bo bliže Petrograda, se je odločil za Pskov. V jutru 29. januarja je zapustil Sušensk, se na poti ustavil v Ufi, kjer se je srečal z ondodnimi socialdemokrati ter jih seznanil z načrtom izdajanja revolucionarnega lista. Ne ozi-raje se na ministrovo prepoved je šel v Moskvo, od tam pa v Petrograd, kjer se je sešel z iz inozemstva došlo V. I. Zasljučev in se z njo razgovarjal o izdaji obče ruskega marksističnega časopisa in poučno političnega žurnala. Konec februarja je prišel v Pskov, kjer je tajno nanj pazila policija. Da se izog- ne neprijetnim posledicam, je dobil službo v statističnem uradu gubernijske uprave in hodil v mestno knjižnico. Tu se je srečaval in seznanjal s socialdemokrati, delal z njimi vezi, ter se z njimi razgovarjal o nameravanih listih "Iskra" in "Zarja", češ da je že čas, da ruski socialdemokratje stopijo na dan z odkrito besedo. Konec aprila je šel v Rigo, da se zveže z latviškimi socialdemokrati; potem pa se vrnil v Pskov, kjer je nadaljeval z delom za revolucijo, dokler se ni odločil za inozemstvo ter dobil potnega lista.

Pred odhodom je šel v maju naskrivaj v Petrograd, kjer se je sestal z ondodnimi socialdemokrati, ki naj bi po njegovem odhodu v inozemstvo nadaljevali z njegovim delom. Tu ga je aretirala policija in zaradi nepostavnega bivanja v mestu za deset dni zaprla. Od tu je šel v Podolsk, kjer je prebil teden dni in se razgovarjal s socialdemokrati ter se dogovoril z njimi o šifri in korespondenci name-

sovredniki lista so bili zbrani V. I. Lenin, G. V. Plehanov, J. O. Martov, P. B. Akseleod, A. N. Potresov in V. I. Zasljučeva. Sklenili so, da se list tiska v Nemčiji, akoravno sta Plehanov in Akseleod želela, da naj bi se tiskal v Švici. Lenin je namreč vztrajal, da naj se tiska izven središča ruske emigracije. Po teh dogovorih je šel Lenin v Nemčijo, kjer se je nastanil v Munchenu pod imenom Mayer. Pozneje je živel s potnim listom bolgarskega socialista pod imenom Jordan. V Munchenu je Lenin obiskal tedaj tamkaj bivajočo nemško socialistično agitatorko Rožo Luksemburg, zvano "rdeča Roza", ki so jo kasneje 15. januarja 1919 s K. Liebknechtom vred usmrtili.

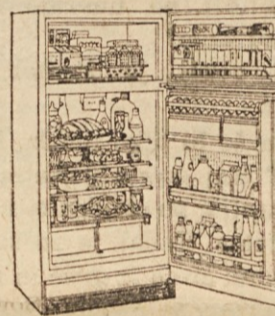

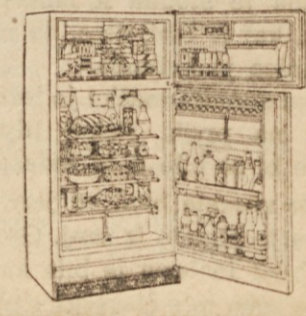

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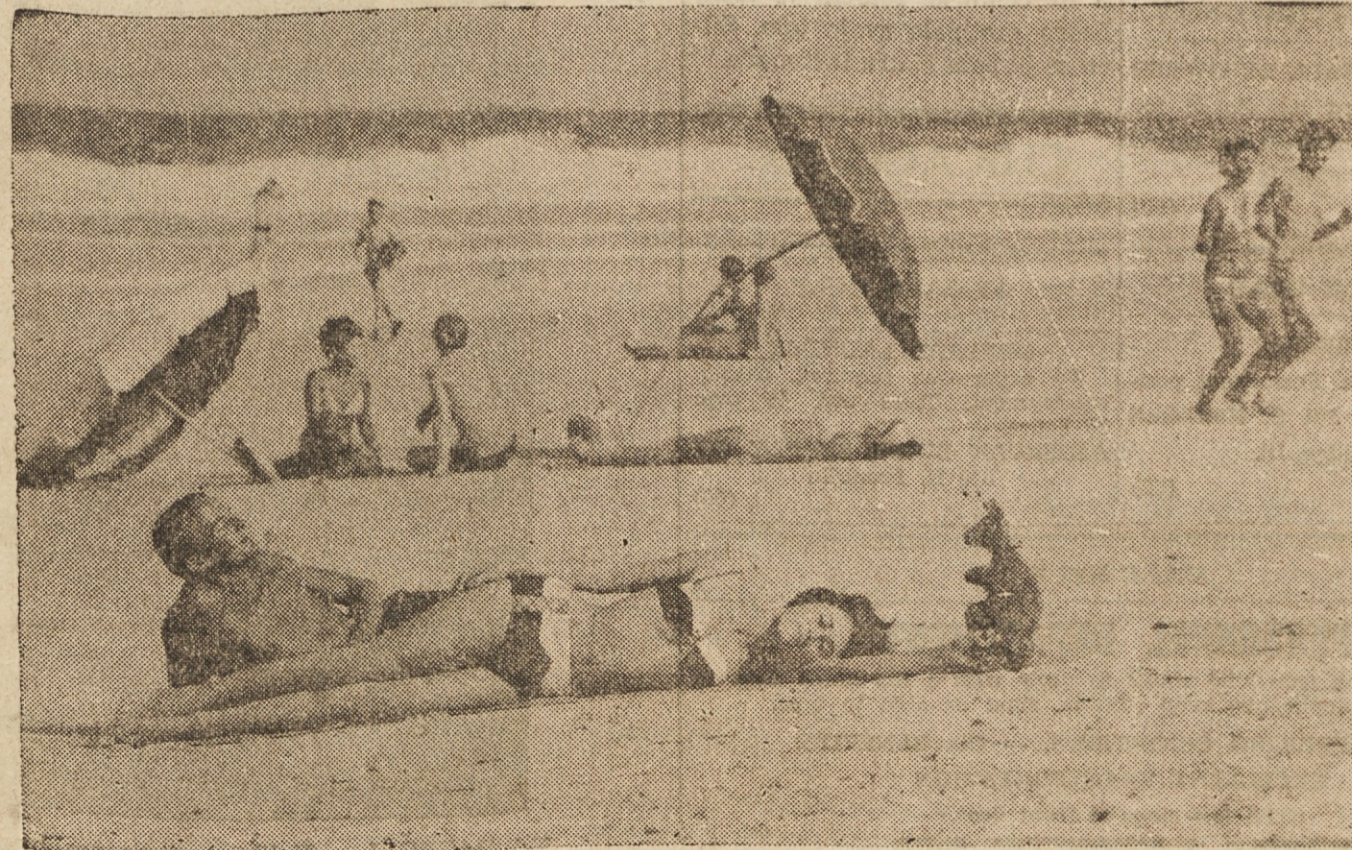

THE MARITIME CRISIS. The recent announcement that the nuclear-powered merchant ship, Savannah, will soon be taken out of service is another grim reminder that the United States faces a major crisis on the high seas.

Mearitime, the crisis worsens. Here are some of the disturbing facts: at the close of World War II we had a merchant marine fleet of more than 3,500 vessels.

The failure to come up with a sound, sensible maritime policy has led to this disgraceful result: less than eight percent of all U.S. merchant tonnage is being carried in American ships.

Despite the great advances in aviation, shipping continues to be a vital and important instrument in trade and defense.

Food Stamp Program

An upward revision of eligibility rules for low income families and individuals seeking to use the federal food stamp program was announced by County Commissioners William P. Day, Frank M. Gorman and Henry W. Speeth.

Previous rules limited the amount in savings to \$500. This meant that 35 out of 100 people applying for the food stamps were rejected because they had too much money.

"The group that will be most benefited by the change in rules will be the large number of elderly people living on Social Security Pensions," Mr. Burns explained.

The Federal Food Stamp Program, which is administered by the Cuyahoga County Welfare Department, is not a relief program.

This announcement is the third in a series of revisions of the rules which seek to widen use of food stamps by families not receiving public assistance.

Don Cossack Chorus and Dancers Here March 31



The Serge Jaroff Don Cossack Chorus and Dancers will appear in concert at the Music Hall on Friday, March 31st at 8:30 p.m.

The Chorus gave its first concert in Vienna in 1923. Since then, it has sung in virtually every country of the world except Red China and Soviet Russia.

The group, whose members, many of them new, are all naturalized American citizens, will be led by dynamic 4'10" Serge Jaroff in a program of Russian church music, and soldier and folk ditties.

The two dancers who regularly leap from the Chorus's bloused and booted ranks are responsible for the presence in the American idiom of the often-pronounced, seldom-spelled "kazatski".

The Cossacks, nomadic descendants of the Slavs and the early Tartar river pirates, traditionally supplied Czarist Russia with its most dashing cavalry divisions.

Living With Your Heart

Freon, a gas used by the refrigeration industry, may soon be helping doctors detect abnormal openings between the right and left sides of the heart.

Dr. Kurt Amplatz of the University of Minnesota has reported to Scientific Sessions of the American Heart Association that a Freon inhalation technique he has developed offers several advantages over methods now used to establish the presence of holes in the wall separating the two sides of the heart.

In Dr. Amplatz's procedure, a long, flexible tube (catheter) is passed into the heart's right side via the veins. The patient takes a quick, single breath of Freon. If a septal defect (as these holes in the heart walls are called) exists, a special detecting device connected to the catheter will register the presence of Freon very soon after inhalation.

This registration means that some of the Freon-carrying freshly oxygenated blood coming from the lungs to the left side of the heart, instead of being pumped into the circulation, is being shunted into the right side of the heart through the hole.

Advantages cited for Freon by Dr. Amplatz include: 1) the gas is nontoxic, extremely inert and non-explosive, making unnecessary certain precautions required when hydrogen is used instead; 2) catheter requirements are simplified; and 3) immediate answers are provided and blood samples do not need to be "cooled" (as with radio-active labeling techniques).

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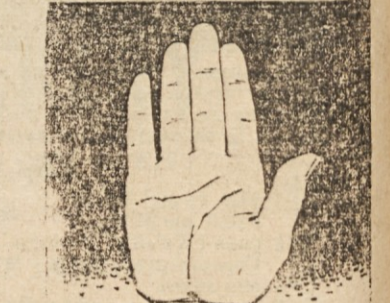
