

HOME TEAMS DROP TILTS AS MIDWEST BASEBALL LEAGUE LIFTS CURTAIN

St. Aloysius, Newcomers, Register Surprise; Baragites Stop Waukegan Threat; Stephens Fail To Halt St. Florian's

In the opening games played May 27 by the Midwest League teams, it seems that the home teams had a bad time of it. In each of the three games played, the locals had to take it on the chin.

What makes it more surprising is the fact that the Joliet Boosters suffered defeat at the hands of the new St. Aloysius Sports of Westside of Chicago. These newcomers emphatically served notice that they are out to win, as proven by the 7 to 2 trouncing they administered the Joliet Jays. Their prowess can not be minimized.

The man who swung the most potent stick in that tilt was Johnny Korenchan of the Chicago team. He garnered the 3 safeties which were instrumental in piling up the run advantage, held by his outfit. Dragovan of the Jolieters, showed the Jubilee fans in attendance how to hit a homer in the Prison City.

From the pitching angle, it seems that Louis Kovacic of the Sports had the best of the deal. He was only touched for 4 hits and struckout 10, meanwhile the Joliet hurlers, Vance and Kuzma, loosened up with 9 bingles, though they had 11 strikeouts in their total.

Baragas Win

At Waukegan another interesting KSKJ game was played between the Milwaukee Baragas and the local St. Joseph Sports. As in the above case, the visitors romped home with the bacon by virtue of a 5 to 1 victory.

The Beer City lads drew first blood in the opening stanza, when Sadkovich raced home with a run produced by timely bingles of Winkler and R. Janesich. The Joes tied things in the fourth when Joe Drobnick scored, but this situation was short lived, for the Baragites proceeded to pepper Frank Petrovic the pitcher for 4 more runs on the basis of 12 hits obtained during the nine inning affair.

On the mound for the Knights was F. Grahek, a newcomer to our circuit. He not only proved effective as a pitcher but he led his team with 3 important hits, one a double. His record shows that he allowed 5 hits, struckout 7 and passed 4. Petrovic, though he was touched for 12 hits, struckout 9 and was guilty of only 1 base on balls.

Florians Victors

Probably the most important game of the day took place at 26th St., and Damen in Chicago, where the champion St. Florian Boosters defeated the strong St. Stephen Sports 6 to 2. This tilt was important from several angles, but the chief one was to determine the comparative strength of the two teams which are expected to set the pace in the league this year.

In this tussle, it was proven that the Florians are as powerful as ever, and that the Stephens have a very strong team.

The game was a veritable pitching duel between Eddie Kucic of the Florians, and Brannigan, a new addition to the Stephen roster. In the early innings the game was even enough, then, in the fifth the Florian attack began to function with a result of six runs. Eddie Kucic

proved invincible by hurling airtight ball all the way. He was touched for six scattered hits, and struckout 16 opposing batters. The two St. Stephen runs were the result of home-run drives by Rabetz and George Banich. The South Chicago boys garnered 12 hits of the pitching of Brannigan, who sidetracked 8 of them by the strikeout route.

In games to be played this coming Sunday, June 10 we find the Milwaukee Baragas visiting the St. Aloysius Sports, who will play their first home game at 26th and Damen in Chicago. The South Chicago St. Florian's are booked to go to Waukegan where they will tangle with the St. Joseph Sports. The St. Stephen Sports of Chicago will travel to Joliet to resume league warfare with the Jovial Joliet Jays. All games are scheduled to start at 3: p. m.

RECOVERY HITS MILLION DOLLAR MARK

Four More Societies Go Over Quotas as KSKJ National Recovery Program Booms

Western and Eastern Sections Lead as National Drive Enjoys Greatest Week; Midwest Still Holding First

Gain of Over 60,000 Tons Enables Eastern and Western Sections to Close in Heavily on K. S. K. J. National Recovery Leaders

Joliet, Ill., June 5.—Enjoying the greatest week since its inauguration, the K. S. K. J. National Recovery Campaign today swept past the million-dollar mark, according to figures made public by the K. S. K. J. National Recovery Administration here.

The week was unprecedented in K. S. K. J. history as every major enterprise supporting the Recovery program turned in record reports to send the K. S. K. J. Market figures soaring to new highs.

West, East Gain

Highlighting the record-shattering performances was the showing of the Western and Eastern Sections, which reported their greatest gains of the Recovery Program to close in heavily on the leading Midwestern Section and throw the race for national leadership into a merry, free-for-all scramble.

The week's best record was that of the Western Section, which emerged from its lethargic slump with a report that showed a gain of over 65,000 tons.

Right on the heels of the Western Section cow hands came the industrialists of the Eastern Section who made themselves serious contenders for national honors with a 62,000-ton report.

The wheat growers of the Midwest Section, current leaders in the K. S. K. J. National Recovery Program, maintained the same steady pace which has characterized their work so far and reported over 26,000 tons of wheat in the graineries.

Lead Reduced

The week's activities reduced the lead held by the Midwestern Section over the Eastern Section from 57,000 tons to less than 22,000 tons. The Western Section, meanwhile, came up from a position 112,000 tons behind the leaders to one less than 74,000 tons.

Official KSKJ. Market Reports give the three competing Sections the following grand totals: Midwestern Section, 306,942 tons; Eastern Section, 285,101 tons; Western Section, 283,000 tons.

Hope To Set Record

Mr. Joseph Zalar, K. S. K. J. National Recovery Administrator, expressed himself highly pleased over the results so far and felt confident that if the work of last week can be maintained for the next two months, the drive will be one of the most successful in the organization's history.

KEYSTONE MINERS NOW LEADING IN EASTERN SECTION

Wyoming Takes Second in West; Illinois Gains in Midwest

Joliet, Ill., June 5.—Despite the record breaking efforts of the past week, but two changes were noted in the standings of the three sections.

One of them, however, was highly sensational. That occurred in the Eastern Section, where the Pennsylvania Mining Co., reporting a gain of 10,720 tons, swept aside the fairly large lead held by the Indiana Steel Corporation and moved into first place with a grand total of 35,659 tons. The Indiana total is 32,347 tons.

Wyoming Makes Debut

The other change was a most encouraging one, too. It saw the Wyoming Range make its debut in the fight for honors in the Western Section. A very impressive report was turned in by the Wyoming hands who are now credited with 8,999 tons and have taken second place in the sectional standings ahead of the Montana Rangers.

In the Midwestern Section, all five Farms maintained their positions. The Illinois Farm, however, succeeded in closing in on the leading Minnesota Farm, while the Wisconsin Farm once again sent up a serious challenge for the third place post held by the Missouri Farm.

The Minnesota Farm now has a grand total of 35,357 tons, while that of the Headquarter's state is 32,433. Less than 3,000 tons behind, the Illinois Farmers are now more than ever determined to take over the lead.

Illinois Closes In

Though unable to match the pace of the Pennsylvania Mining Co., the Ohio Steel Corporation did succeed in gaining on the former leaders and are less than 7,000 tons behind the Indiana steel rollers. The total for the Buckeye workers is 25,742 tons.

In the Western Section, the Colorado Rangers continued to be masters of all they surveyed. Picking up 8,567 tons during the week, they are almost 25,000 tons ahead of the second-place Wyoming Rangers, with a grand total of 33,633 tons.

This quartet is made up of Field No. 119 of the Illinois Farm, Field No. 103 of the Wisconsin Farm, Mine No. 81 of the Pennsylvania Mining Co., and Ranch No. 104 of the Colorado Ranch, all of whom went over the quotas assigned them by the K. S. K. J. National Recovery Administration.

Seven Over Quota

These four, added to the three who had previously attained quota—Field No. 139 of the Illinois Farm, Field No. 112 of the Minnesota Farm and Mine No. 241 of the Pennsylvania Mining Co.—makes it seven who have already done their share in this gigantic movement to better times.

As can be expected, the quartet had very much to say about the changed standings in their respective states.

Field No. 119 at Rockdale, under the management of Mary Kostelc, came up from fourth place in the standings of the Illinois Farm to take over first by storing 4,000 tons of wheat during the week. The Field's present total is 12,400 tons, which gives them a fairly comfortable margin over the former leader, Field No. 139, which has a grand total of 10,933 tons.

8,000-Ton Lead

Adding 3,225 tons to the grainery holdings, Field No. 103 of the Wisconsin Farm swept well by the quota mark and established itself firmly in first place. Official reports credit the Wisconsin leader with 11,175 tons. Its closest competitor has only 2,750 tons. Joseph Windisham, Field Manager, claims that his West Allis charges will double quota before they are through.

Perhaps the greatest gain of the week was that reported by Mine No. 81. Credited with only 4,400 tons of mined coal, the Pittsburgh miners appeared anything but formidable contenders for the Pennsylvania Mining Co. honors. But that was before Justine Lokar, No. 81 leader, decided to step out and make a race of it. Mining 6,750 tons during the week, the 81 crew jumped into second place with a total of 11,150 tons and are now only 2,150 tons behind the leading Mine No. 241.

Take First Place

The fourth division to go over the top was Ranch No. 104 of the Colorado Range. Evidently tired of sharing first place with Ranch No. 55, the cow hands under the supervision of Mary Kocman put on an extra bit of steam and rounded up 2,750 tons of cattle to raise their total to 10,125 tons and take a firm hold on the lead position.

With still two more months of the drive to go, the sponsors of the Recovery are confident that as many as twenty-five will reach quota before the end of the Program.
