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OBNOVA POGA-JANJ MED AMERIKO IN RUSIJO

Družni tajnik Marshall sprejel rusko sugestijo

VPRASHANJE KOREJE V OSPREDJU

Washington, D. C., 6. maja.—Družni tajnik George C. Marshall se je izrekel za obnovno pogajanje z Rusijo glede politične in ekonomske enotnosti v Koreji, toda s pridržkom, da sovjeti reviridirajo svoje stališče. To je, da le reprezentanti komunistom naklonjenih grup morajo postati člani začasne korejske vlade.

Marshallovo pismo je bilo dostavljeno ruskemu zunanjemu ministru Molotovu. Ameriški zunanjim tajnik je sprejel sugestijo ruskega ministra glede sklicanja se članov skupne ameriško-ruske komisije v Seolu, Koreja, 20. maja. Na tej naj bi se obnovila pogajanja, ki so bila pretrgana pred enim letom, glede ekonomske in politične enotnosti v Koreji.

Južna polovica Koreje je pod ameriško vojaško okupacijo, severna pa pod rusko okupacijo. Ustanovitev začasne vlade naj bi bila prvi korak v eventualno neodvisnost Koreje.

Marshall je razkril, da je korejsko vprašanje prišlo v ospredje na konferenci ministrov štirih velešin v Moskvi. Dejal je, da je vztrajal pri zahtevi, da mora Rusija sodelovati z Amerikom v prizadevanjih za ustanovitev demokratičnega režima v Koreji. Predlagal je razpis splošnih in svobodnih volitev. Vse politične stranke v Koreji naj bi imenovalo kandidate.

Ameriški državni tajnik je namignil, da bo podvzel akcijo na svojo roko, če se bo Rusija uprala kooperaciji z Amerikom pri izvajanjem programa ekonomske rehabilitacije Koreje, da se bo delalo postavila na trdne noge. Sedanja razdelitev Koreje na dve okupacijski coni povzroča komplikacije.

Marshall je razkril, da so bile kopije njegovega pisma dostavljene tudi britski, francoski in kitajski vladi.

Amerika hoče obdržati baze v Panami

Washington, D. C., 6. maja.—

Družni departement je predlagal Panami, naj sklene nov dogovor z Amerikom, da bo slednja lahko obdržala mornarične, vojaške in letalske baze v Panami, ki so bile zgrajene v vojnem času. Predlog je pred panamskim zunanjim ministrom Ricardom J. Alfarom. Panamska vlada je pred zahtevala, da mora Amerika zapustiti baze.

Podržavljenje transportacije v Angliji

London, 6. maja.—Laboritska večina v parlamentu je sprejela načrt, ki dolgača podržavljenje vseh sredstev transportacije.

Uključene so železnice in avtobusne linije. Načrt je bil sprejet, čeprav so konservativci začeli, da ga bodo razveljavili, tako bodo kdaj prišli na krmil.

Stavka mlekarskih delavcev končana

Chicago, 6. maja.—Stavka mlekarskih delavcev, ki je trajala 24 ur, je bila danes zjutraj končana. Sjedni je bil dosežen sporazum med reprezentantmi mlekarskih kompanij in dveh majhnih kompanij, da sta se stranki dali koncesije.

Izjava ruskega profesorja Korovina

Moskva, 6. maja.—Trumanova doktrina, Baruchov načrt glede kontrole atomske energije in drugi predlogi glede ustanovitve enotnosti v Evropi so v bistvu sistematični anglo-ameriški poskusi, katerih cilj je omajanje načela suverenitete držav. To izjavo je podal profesor Evgen Korovin v svojem govoru pred člani Sovjetske akademije socialnih znanosti.

On je tudi rekel, da so anglo-ameriški pojmi o večinskih odločitvah pri glasovanju, svobodni trgovini in enakih priložnostih zastareli. Držali so morda pred 50 ali 100 leti, ne drže pa v sedanji dobi. Zagovorniki teh pojmov so reakcionarji, ki hočeta ustaviti kolo časa.

Zadnje dni maja se bo v Clevelandu vrnila druga konvencija Slovenskega ameriškega narodnega sveta. Ker so politični dogodki po prvi svetovni vojni povsem negirali program JRZ, se je potem marsikdo kesal, če, zakaj sem se ubijal, zakaj trošil denár za JRZ. Dosti očitkov ali celo žaljivih besed je bilo izrečenih tudi na račun Eribina Kristana, očeta JRZ, kot 25 let pozneje tudi SANS-a. Ježili so se seveda le majhni ljudje, ki niso douneli veličine gibanja in bili brez zgodovinske perspektive, ki človeka varuje pred takimi razočaranji. Bili so tudi tarče strupa, ki so ga še leta potem stresali na JRZ in Kristana isti ljudje, isti krog, ki danes, sploh vse zadnja leta splošno svoj strup tudi napram novi Jugoslaviji. Kristana so kriminalno obrekovali, da je požiral kar cel milijon dolarjev, daso celotni dohodki JRZ znali le okrog \$65,000, od katerih je ostalo še nekaj tisočakov za SANS in za sklad otroške bolnišnice v starem kraju. Kot pred leti tako tudi danes ne izbirajo, v katerem so mojstri. Krščanska zapoved "ne laži" zanje ne velja, kajtor tudi ni vejlala še nikdar. V imenu vere in Boga je njim dovoljeno tudi lagati.

Kakor ni bila nobena krvida na naši strani, da po prvi svetovni vojni ni bil realiziran program JRZ — največje zasluge za to si je splošno lisjaški Pašč s svojo velesrbsko monarhistično kliko — prav tako tudi ni naša zasluga, da je bil ta program — in še več! — urešenec 25 let pozneje. Zasluga za ustanovitev Ljudske federativne republike Jugoslavije je predvsem herojskih partizanov, v drugi vrsti pa — Sovjetske Rusije, ki jim je stala ob strani od začetka, in njene junaške borce, iz katere so jugoslovenski ljudstva zajemala inspiracijo. V resnicima ima večje zasluge tudi Churchill, ki je med vojno po "spreobrnitvi" pel slavospev Titu in njegovim partizanom, ker so "držali več nemških divizij na Balkanu kot jih imamo mi in Američani v Italiji." Churchill je bil seveda navdušen za partizane le toliko časa, dokler niso anglo-ameriške čete prišle do Trsta (osvobodili so ga Jugoslovani!) in dokler ni bil Hitler poražen. Potem je zopet zapahal drugačen veter! Churchill je pač praktičen imperialist.

SNPJ LODGE CAMPAIGN YIELDS 569 MEMBERS IN APRIL

Pennsylvania Lodges, Strabane 138, Midway 89, Latrobe 725 Lead All Classes

The SNPJ Lodge Campaign, now entering its third and next to the last month, continues to roll successfully onward. Applications for new members are now pouring into the Main Office at an average rate of nearly thirty each working day. This is expected to reach about forty by the end of the month and, possibly, as high as fifty each day before the conclusion of the campaign on June 30. That is the optimistic outlook and prediction of the Campaign Director on the basis of the splendid results obtained up to the halfway mark of this great membership-building contest.

Although complete returns for the month of April are not yet available, for the reasons that a number of membership applications have been returned to lodge secretaries for correction, some are being held up pending receipt of further information, and a few additional late applications are almost certain to arrive as this report is being prepared and which will not be included, nevertheless the records, so far tabulated, show that a total of 1068 adult and juvenile members have been enrolled, 569 of whom were admitted in April and 499 in March, the opening month of the campaign. April's gains to date consist of 332 juveniles, 173 new adult members, and 64 transfers from the Juvenile to the Adult Department.

Big gains. Little gains, and those in between have brought rapid progress to the Lodge Campaign. There are now 54 lodges who have enrolled five or more new members, whereas, a month ago, there were only 18 of them. Also, at that time, there were only four lodges who had reached or surpassed their respective quotas, while at this date there are no less than 18 who have succeeded in attaining this goal. Approximately 40 percent of all the lodges are now on the active list of the campaign. By this is meant that each one of nearly 250 lodges have enrolled at least one new member since the beginning of the drive. A month ago there were only 161 participating. A big improvement has been witnessed.

Pennsylvania lodges. As will be seen from the standings below, are leading the way in all three classes with **Lodge 725**, Latrobe, Pa., well in front with a total of 62 new members to its credit, 40 of them having been enrolled in the early weeks of April for the most outstanding gain of the month. It is tops in Class "C," as well as the whole Society. In this same class, **Lodge 284**, Philadelphia, Pa., took a prominent part in recent weeks by adding 19 new members to its ranks, third best for the month, and in doing so moved ahead of **Lodge 716**, Imperial, Pa., for second place honors.

Lodge 89, Midway, Pa., continues to show the way in Class "B" by securing 15 more new members, equally divided between adults and juveniles, and now leads this division of lodges with a total of 37 to its credit. **Avella Lodge 292** came through with 8 more applications to retain its hold on the runner-up spot, while **Lodge 58**, De Pue, Ill., is close behind with 17, having improved its ranks by 11 new members.

We have a new leader in Class "A" this month. **Lodge 138**, Strabane, Pa., has taken over this prominent position in the past week or two on an enrollment of 34 new members—26 juveniles and 8 adults, giving it a total of 39 altogether. In its rapid climb, to the top of its class, **Lodge 138** overtakes local **Pioneer Lodge 589** and, at the same time, became the first in its group to reach its assigned quota. **Lodge 82** (**Triglav**), Johnstown, Pa., has moved into second place in Class "A" on its splendid gain of 11 new members in April, while **Lodge 589**, who held the lead briefly, dropped into third place despite its enrollment of 12 members during the month.

Although this is in part contrary to one provision of the rules, it is intended, nevertheless, to continue the policy of not mentioning names of individuals who are active in the campaign and of giving full credit to the lodges. But after the campaign is over, the names of all participants, who will have enrolled five or more new members, will appear in the HONOR ROLL, published in the Prosvelta, and each will receive a special certificate in recognition of outstanding achievement from the Headquarters of the SNPJ. Liberal cash prizes, which they will have earned through their hard work, will also be awarded to them after six months.

The climax of the Lodge Campaign promises to be very interesting, as well as surprising in many instances. Not until the end of the contest will it be made known who was most successful in securing new members in the three classes. Not until then will it be seen who made it possible for his lodge to win one of the special prizes and the one grand prize, including an attractive membership enrollment plaque, emblematic of the highest achievement—the most coveted award of all. The money, sooner or later, will be spent, but the plaque will remain as long as the winning lodge is in existence.

In conclusion, we have this to say—The Lodge Campaign will be the most successful ever conducted by the SNPJ, and we feel that every member, who has the spirit of SNPJ in his heart, will want to share in this success. So what do you say, members! Publicity or no publicity, name in the Prosvelta or no name in the Prosvelta, let's do our very best, each in his own lodge, to put this campaign far over the top! Enroll the quota of new members assigned to your lodge! BUILD YOUR LODGE! STRENGTHEN YOUR SOCIETY!

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JUVENILE BOWLING CHAMPIONSHIPS WON BY SHARON AND CHICAGO CIRCLES

Individual Titles Taken by Strabane, Detroit and Sharon Bowlers; Records Fall Under Avalanche of Good Scores

The third annual National Juvenile Bowling Tournament of the SNPJ came to a very successful conclusion on Sunday evening, April 20, after two exciting days of competition in which more than a hundred boys and girls of the SNPJ, ranging in ages from 8 to 18 years, participated for honor, glory and fun.

The tournament was staged in seven widely scattered localities—Milwaukee, Wis., Waukegan and Chicago, Ill., Detroit, Mich., Girard, Ohio, Sharon and Strabane, Pa., with a total of 20 teams, 31 doubles and 61 singles completing the schedule of entrants. We are proud to say that the records show there was not a single absentee among them, and every bowler completed the events in which he or she was entered, whether the scores were good, poor, or somewhere in between. With only one exception, complete reports of all local tournaments were in the hands of the Juvenile Director not later than the third day after the conclusion of this national bowling classic.

Many excellent games were rolled in this tournament. In fact, no less than six records, established in 1945 and 1946, were broken, two in the boys' and four in the girls' division. Some of the scores shot by our juveniles would have looked mighty good even in the final standings of the National Bowling Tournament held at Chicago a week later, especially in the boys' events, where many 500 series and 200 games were rolled.

New Champions were crowned in all but one event. The lone repeater among the defending champions was the Circle 21, boys' team of Sharon, Pa., who managed to squeeze out a very close and important victory over the Pioneer Jrs. Circle 27 of Strabane, Pa., by the narrow margin of 12 pins—847-842-2386 to 713-851-2337. The Sharon Circle, therefore, retains the team championship for the second consecutive year, and a Strabane team must again be satisfied with second (also third and fourth) place honors, although this year, for the first time, the Society is also awarding a small trophy to the runners-up team.

Edward Cimperman and Karol Dogn, representing Circle 21, Sharon, Pa., were the boys who set a new record in the doubles event, the former rolling 570 and the latter 540 for a combined total of 1110, only six pins higher than the runners-up, Fred Delost and Chester Kaminski of Circle 27, Strabane, who combined scores of 586 and 518, respectively. And it was Fred Delost, a youngster of only 14 years of age, who broke the all-events mark, formerly held by his doubles partner, with a brilliant nine-game total of 1685. He shot 513 in the team event, 586 in doubles, and came right back with a 586 in the singles event. The amazing fact about this Delost lad is that, last year, he finished twelfth in all-events standing with a total of 1253. In a year's time he improved his bowling by more than 400 pins, going up from an average of 150 to 187. The runner-up in all-events is Edward Cimperman who totaled 1651, another of our juvenile bowlers with a very promising future.

The girl bowlers showed even more improvement than did the boys. Here the records fell in the team, doubles, all-events, as well as high single game. Perfect Circle 26 of Chicago will be the most surprised group of juveniles in the Society when they learn that their girls' team not only won the championship but, in doing so, also established a new record on its score of 1706, which is 20 pins more than the second place Sharon Circle girls' team was able to total. What a match this probably would have been if these two teams could have been seen competing against each other on the same alleys! Comparative game scores show 610-541-555 for the Perfect Circle girls and 512-554-620 for the All-Around Circle girls, each to be rewarded with a team trophy by the SNPJ.

The highest honors in the doubles event of the girls' division were won by Dorothy Paulenich and Frances Bahor, who put together scores of 433 and 452 for a combined total of 884, a new record, as compared with 514-260-774 for Patricia Okorn and Rose Cimperman, both doubles representing Circle 21 of Sharon. It was Dorothy Paulenich who set the all-events record, getting 405 in the team event, 433 in doubles, and 351 in singles for an over-all total of 1189. Close behind her, with 1181 for nine games, was Geraldine Verzek of Circle 19, Strabane, Pa. The record high single game of 210 was rolled by Patricia Okorn in her magnificent series of 514.

When Ray Travnik, First Vice-President of the SNPJ, reported the results of the juvenile tournament in Detroit, he also enclosed a few lines which read in part as follows: "While our scores may not be the best, I am sure no other contestants tried harder than ours. We're proud of every one of them. Our Circle sends sincere congratulations to the winners, but 'look out next year!' Well, Ray Travnik, Ann Stromar and Dorothy Karun, the Juvenile Directors, and all the others who watched the Detroit youth roll in their first National SNPJ Bowling Tournament are, also, in for a pleasant surprise, for they, too, have a champion in their midst. Yes, Frances Napotnik, who bowled 417 in the singles event, will soon be the proud recipient of a trophy emblematic of the championship in this event, and a teammate of hers, Martha Werholtz, will also be rewarded with a very nice pin for her three-game total of 394 which was second best in the singles event. Velma Obed is another Detroit lass who will be among those who will receive a souvenir for good bowling. Although the boys here failed to win a medal or pin, the two Tonys, Tschitsch and Aebel, carried their Circle's colors high all the way with some very fine bowling. According to Ann Stromar, who was among the hundreds of visitors and bowlers who came to Chicago for the big SNPJ bowling tournament the last weekend in April, there has been talk of plans to organize a juvenile bowling league next season, which would be a dandy idea even if the juveniles met once every other week, instead of every week. There are a lot of teen-age SNPJs everywhere who could be gotten to take an interest in the Society's activities through just some sport such as this. Lodges could help by donating a few dollars towards bowling fees. Shirts, jerseys or blouses could be bought for them and could be worn for softball and playground play in the summer and bowling through the fall and winter months. It has great possibilities which should not be missed.

There were no outstanding juvenile bowlers in the Milwaukee tourney, but the four teams were in there just the same, "pitching" all the way, doing their best for the Jr. All-Star Circle. Their ages ran from eight to fifteen, beginners all of them, and so nothing spectacular was expected by their coaches, except that the experience might prove helpful for future tournaments and no doubt it did. They enjoyed the competition amongst themselves. They had a lot of fun even though they failed to place in the prize winners' column. Fun, after all, is what everyone wanted and got.

Mari Ermenc and Joseph Cvetan, who assisted her with this sport event, deserve to be complimented on their fine work. Likewise to the juveniles who saw the tournament through to a happy finish.

The Jolly Juveniles of Waukegan, Illinois, shot their doubles and singles events on their home alleys on Saturday, April 19, and then on the following day, accompanied by their Directors, Victor Beler and Dorothy Gabroski, and a few other adults who made up the cheering section, came to Chicago, some forty miles away, where they competed in the team event against four Windy City squads, three representing Perfect Circle and the fourth the Trailblazer Lodge on the far southside. All six teams gave a splendid account of themselves, with the Jolly Juvenile boys' victory in the boys' end of the tourney and the Perfect Circle girls' going all the way to the top to win the SNPJ championship. Winners of special individual awards are Frank Furlan Jr. of Waukegan, who tied for second place in the singles event with a 527 series, and Mildred Gregorin, Virginia Nagode and Blanche Meseec who will receive souvenir pins for good bowling.

When bowling was over in the Chicago tournament, everyone hurried to Gratzner's Hall, next door to the SNPJ Hall, where a real banquet awaited the hungry bowlers and their leaders. The table had been beautifully decorated. The food was excellently prepared and certainly did not lack variety. The program of singing and games which followed the banquet brought all, who were present, closer together as members of the same organization. A few movies were taken and these turned out excellently. One very important scene will be missed, however, because the film had run out while we were taking it. Ann Sennemann and her assistants, together with her fine group of young people, were wonderful hosts. I have used this for the ending, because what had transpired on that day, here in the city of Chicago, was a most fitting climax to an eventful weekend for our SNPJ juveniles. Congratulations, winners! Congratulations, all! And if you were one of many who failed to place among the winners, and you wanted to win very much, just keep Fred Delost in mind. Last year he shot 1253, this year, 1685. All you have to do is keep on trying. Don't give up, and you, too, will improve and win.

A committee of the Illinois legislature deprived an American citizen of the privilege to testify before them, because he was supposed to be a Communist. Committee for Constitutional Government had a full page ad in the Wall Street Journal of mis-facts. That all points to a sort of an American fascism. If this trend continues there is danger for all of us. All of you Americans must not sleep now. Let your representatives know that acts such as these are wrong.

It is pitiful when a committee of the State legislature abrogates free speech, when businessmen only see their point, when big business keeps on making bigger lies to bluff the common people. Help us stop this trend towards fascism in our own country.

POWER POLITICS BIG HANDICAP FOR UNIVERSAL PEACE

Two years after 50 nations met at San Francisco to insure world freedom from fear of war, the very fear that the United Nations was designed to banish forever has become a world psychosis dominating the foreign policies of the great powers.

On the second anniversary of the hopeful beginnings at San Francisco, nations are groaning under insufferable weights of tremendous armament budgets.

The shadow of the atomic bomb is coloring every fearful move of diplomats in the world capitals.

Power politics, which Cordell Hull consigned to historic oblivion three years ago, is the universal rule in relations between nations.

The United States, which two

years ago tomorrow aspired toward world security guaranteed through collective security, has found instead the "Truman Doctrine."

Instead of open frontiers secured by the United Nations, the United States has found its security frontiers pushed far from the New World to the Oder and Neisse rivers in mid-Germany, to the Macedonian mountains overlooking Salonic and to the 38th parallel in Korea where American and Russian troops are face to face in the Far East.

In the record of human aspirations for collective security and abolition of warfare, two years provide an inadequate yardstick for measuring the potential of the U. N. structure created at San Francisco.

That, at least, is the conclusion both at the White House and the Department of State where President Truman and Secretary of State Marshall weigh the elements that comprise the foreign policy of the United States.

Yet, since freedom from fear was the cardinal objective of the founders of the United Nations and that freedom still is an ephemeral dream, the first 24 months since the beginning at San Francisco can hardly be accounted a success.

That, at least, is the conclusion both at the White House and the Department of State where President Truman and Secretary of State Marshall weigh the elements that comprise the foreign policy of the United States.

Significantly—and perhaps tragically for the world—the thesis most heard in private this year at the State Department is that "the people of the United States were over-sold by the government on the potentialities of the United Nations."

This situation has created and is supporting a tragic, self-destructive circle. The U. N. can't work because the great powers can't agree. Because the U. N. can't work, the great powers cast their reliance upon self-armament and unilateral action. The armaments and nationalist action make agreement among the great powers that much more impossible.

As unity is replaced by deadlock,

the United States hoards its atomic bomb; Russia holds whole peoples on its periphery as political hostages against the future.

Because Russian-American deadlock has paralyzed the U. N. Security Council in measures for collective security, aspirations for world economic unity become empty frameworks without substance. Only two of the subsidiary working organs of the U. N. have been vitalized by joint U.S.-Russian participation.

Seven more important working arms are enervated by Russia abstention.

There was one notable effort in the last year to break out of this self-destructive circle. Rightly or wrongly, Henry A. Wallace last September attempted to force the administration to seek a new basis for agreement with the Soviet. His approach was rejected by Mr. Truman and the then Secretary of State James F. Byrnes as Russian "appeasement."

The White House chose instead to seek agreement with Russia based on a "firm" policy with the Soviet.

None of the costly complications

Mr. Wallace Sounds the Trumpet Call!

By speaking to the people of other lands on the common problems that confront every people, Henry A. Wallace has smashed the conspiracy of silence on the part of the commercial press and radio of our country.

Headlines today scream what was once conveniently buried on the market page—or thrown into the editor's waste paper basket.

Today a voice from the heart of America proclaims the truth that a "policy" in the interests of Wall Street is not a "policy" in the true interests of our country—of world peace, security and freedom.

What frantic fear insures the unprecedented campaign of hysteria directed at Mr. Wallace? Others have criticized the Truman doctrine to undermine with our blood and treasure reactionary regimes in every part of the world.

Why is he being smeared as a "foreign agent?"

Why the demand that he be tried for "treason?"

Why does the notorious House Un-American Activities announce it is planning to summon him for an inquisition?

Why is political debate reduced to the level of saying that Mr. Wallace speaks only for "Communist rabble"?

Surely it is not because Mr. Wallace is merely "against" the Truman doctrine. Even Congress blandly ignored the President's insistent demand that the Greco-Turkish military aid bill be enacted by March 21st. It is long past that time now.

Senator Vandenberg has amended the original Truman proposal. The feasibility of even the "amended" proposal is questioned by Senator Byrd, by Walter Lippman, by Ernest T. Weir, who speaks for an important section of Big Business.

Clearly it is not because Mr. Wallace is "against" the Truman doctrine.

Mr. Wallace is hated and feared because he is against the "objective" of the Truman proposal as well as the various means of carrying it out.

Mr. Wallace is hated and feared because he will not try to sugar-coat a poisonous pill—because he bluntly declares that the program upon which our country is embarked is one of "ruthless imperialism" that will bring disaster to our country and to the world.

For this they would crucify him.

How fearful and insincere the lackies of the trusts, the monopolists and Standard Oil must feel that they cannot tolerate even one voice raised against their brutal designs. How quickly they reach for the gag. How loudly they squeal for the police.

Now the American people can see why this "bi-partisan unity" behind the miserable Thomas-Rankin Committee, and why the reactionaries seek to set up such inquisitorial witchhunts in every state, why the unprecedented attack on labor unions—why President Truman has launched a "loyalty" inquest among federal employees and why, starting with the Communist party, it is proposed to create repressive machinery to outlaw, harass and hamper independent political organization of the people.

Under the hypocritical pretense of defending "democracy," those gentlemen of various partisan affiliations, who have a common paymaster, seek to end democracy and freedom right here at home. The American people must be enslaved before they can be driven into a war for the greater profits of Wall Street.

American imperialism fears 1948, when the people who endorsed the United Nations program in 1944 will have an opportunity to exercise their sovereign power to pass judgment on those who have laid violent hands on the temple of the people sought to erect under the leadership of FDR.

Thus civil rights, the free trade union movement—the right of free political choice, must be destroyed. Thus American citizens, starting with Mr. Wallace, are branded as "foreign agents" if they (1) criticize the Truman "doctrine" at home, (2) criticize the Truman doctrine abroad, (3) criticize the Truman "doctrine" period.

But the American people are not willing candidates for slavery. They do not yearn for a place in the goose-stepping ranks of a Wall Street imperialism.

They know that the fruits of victory in the war against the fascist axis can be nourished and harvested for the benefit of all mankind—not a few economic masters in every land.

They will and must defend their unions, their civil rights and build—
independently of the two old parties—an independent political movement such as is to be found in the Progressive Citizens of America.

For Whom the Bell?

The late Huey Long once said: "When America embraces Fascism, it will do so in the name of anti-Fascism." A week after the President's message to Congress, Spruille Braden, staunch anti-Fascist and Assistant Secretary of State embraced Hearst's doctrine of "Red Fascism" and asserted that "civilization" can resume its march "only when totalitarianism of every color has been exterminated." At the same banquet at the Waldorf, Virgil Jordan, head of the National Industrial Conference Board, urged the United States to impose disarmament on the world: "Let us make, improve and keep plenty of our best and biggest atomic bombs for that imperative purpose; let us suspend them in principle over every place in the world where we have any reason to suspect evasion or conspiracy against this purpose; and let us drop them in fact, promptly and without compunction, wherever it is defied."

These straws in the wind point the direction of storms to come. If the Congress and people of the United States of America support the "Truman Doctrine," they will embark upon a one-way voyage over uncharted seas toward a harbor dark with death. Early in the journey the trip is pleasant. But its course is marked with debris and derelicts. The journey's end can be clearly seen by those whose eyes have beheld the fate of others who have sailed these waters.

In the beginning is the lie. "The primitive simplicity of the minds of the masses," wrote the late A. Hitler, "renders them a more easy prey to a big lie than a small one, for they themselves often tell little lies, but would be ashamed to tell big ones. They would never credit to others the possibility of such great impudence as the complete reversal of facts."

Next comes the fabrication of hatred and fear to the tune of excursions, alarms and recurrent "crises." Thereafter, amid witch-hunting at home and devil chasing abroad, come demands, in the sacred name of freedom, for millions and billions to uphold the power of every tyrant, every decadent feudalism, every reactionary clique of corruption everywhere in the world, with no questions asked save whether those who take will join the crusade and obey the orders of those who pay.



WDL Acts To Halt Indonesian Witch Hunt

Stop Deportation of 10

In a move to halt the recent federal witch hunt of Indonesians, the Workers Defense League had introduced in the Senate two bills to halt their deportation to Indonesia, where they face possible imprisonment in Dutch concentration camps. Both bills were introduced by Senator William Langer of North Dakota.

One measure, S.602, a duplicate of the Farrington bill, which has been introduced in the House, provides that "the right to become a naturalized citizen . . . shall not be limited by race or national origin." It also stipulates that the bar against natives of certain Pacific islands be repealed, and that a quota system be established for them independent of the European power of which they may be a dependency.

The other bill, S.603, authorizes and directs the attorney general to cancel deportation orders against 10 Indonesians recently seized and provides that they "shall be considered as having been lawfully admitted for permanent residence as of the date of their last entry."

Five Others Whisked Away

After the second bill was introduced 5 more Indonesians were taken into custody. Before a special bill could be introduced to stop their deportation, the five were, without warning, whisked away. At 11:30 on the night of February 28, they were taken from Ellis Island and flown to San Francisco, for deportation aboard the Marine Adder along with 295 other Indonesians.

Expressing worry for the safety of these 300 men, two former members of the Indonesian Republican army, who appeared before the Senate Judiciary Committee at great personal risk testified that contingents of deportees sent from Holland under similar circumstances had never been heard from since.

Face Possible Death

"I know that all supporters of the Republic, including myself, are in grave danger for their very lives if they are forced to go back to Indonesia at this time," Ling Lee told the committee. "While I was in Holland where I had gone as a seaman, 300 of my friends were deported in December 1946 and about 400 more in January 1947. I received specific promises from a number of them in each group that they would send me reports of what happened to them. Although I received several letters from them enroute, I have received no word since they arrived."

Frans Lumowa told the committee: "I would be in a danger of my life today if I fell into the hands of Dutch authorities because I helped organize Pemuda and took part in the political independence movement in Bandaransain, Borneo, immediately after V-J Day. I made speeches and fought in the Republican army. We were defeated in battle in December 1945, with 100 of our men killed and 250 captured. I escaped to Balkipapan, became a seaman and have been traveling in fear of being seized by the Dutch military ever since."

The new course spells danger, but not doom, for the USSR. In bitterness and in triumph the Soviet leaders and people have many times faced this assault, sometimes directed by priests and dukes, sometimes by paper-hangers, once by the son of the Sun Goddess, and now, it may be, by haberdashers and brass-hats. The final result, whether on the chessboard of diplomacy or in the arena of battle, has always been the same. The men of Muscovy will not flinch from the test. Neither is the new course a menace to Communism in other lands. On the contrary, it bids fair to breed two or three Communists where one grew before.

Who then is to be the victor and who the vanquished? Not those named by small-minded muddled men who lack all foresight and have no grasp of the dynamics of the process they are eager to begin but can never end. The new course is a mortal threat only to America itself. It places in deadly peril civil rights,

free enterprise, democracy, and every element in the American dream to which the oppressed of other lands always looked with hope.

Real Problem Not Touched at Moscow Parley

LOGANSPORT, Ind.—With all due respect to Secretary Marshall I can't understand the new realism in American foreign policy.

That Marshall worked hard at Moscow cannot be denied. That he did his best and exercised great patience must be granted.

But it seems to me that the conference got nowhere because the foreign ministers, Marshall included, failed to grapple with the real problem.

The real problem is arranging a peace between Russia and the United States.

Yet the ministers argued themselves blue in the face over the German problem and Marshall was very much disappointed because he couldn't get the Russians to agree to a 40-year pact for the dismemberment of Germany.

A year or so ago such an approach would have made sense, but under present conditions it is beside the point.

The great problem is arranging a disarmament between Russia and the United States. Until that is done no agreement will be worth the paper it is written on.

Of course the thing can be done by stages. If we can agree on other problems it will help to lessen the distrust.

But the United States, at the outset of the conference, deliberately served notice on Russia that she was the menace we feared and a great crusade was launched against her.

We couldn't trust Russia for five minutes, let alone 40 years. The danger was so great that we had no time to consult the United Nations.

In order to save Greece and Turkey we had to rush arms and ammunition by the first boat, with a promise of similar assistance to all other threatened nations.

It was thought that this would "strengthen Marshall's hand" in Moscow, that Molotov might wilt under the knowledge that we could send warships through the Dardanelles.

In other words, it was hoped that Russia would give in to superior force when her bluff was called. So far it hasn't worked out that way.

It may be that Russia thinks we are bluffing, and that in case of trouble she could take the Dardanelles in 48 hours. She may doubt that we are prepared to take the field in Europe against her and have a go at Stalingrad.

In any event, we can't complain against Russia on logical grounds if she finds our declared animosity to be insufficient basis for an agreement.

We can't expect Russia to deal with us on the theory that Germany is the common enemy, when we inform her in advance that we regard her as the enemy.

Such laws were not written to install a "labor dictatorship," as some industrialists and their paid publicists insist. Paid congressmen? Yes! Many men who sit in Congress today writing anti-labor laws are there because huge corporations like DuPont, Sun Oil and Standard Oil put thousands of dollars for their election campaigns. These facts are a matter of public record.

Manufacturers who hated and feared labor once had the legal weapons of anti-labor laws which they themselves were instrumental in drafting. It is a matter of historical record that many American courts seriously hampered labor's rights by the flagrant use of injunctions.

One of the great contributions of Franklin D. Roosevelt's administration was that it replaced these laws with others designed to protect American working people.

But, in the absence of security effectively safeguarded by the U. N. the United States is committing itself daily more deeply into a world order which now is resembling a "Pax Americana"—peace enforced by American might and designed on American concepts of order and economics.

That is the explanation of the Truman doctrine that makes a commitment for \$400,000,000 in Greece and Turkey and for which another \$600,000,000 will be asked to hold the line against Russia at the 38th parallel in Korea.

That is the explanation for the \$11,000,000,000 budget for the American armed services in 1948 and \$500,000,000 in contracts and authorizations for atomic development.

That is why the war and state departments still advocate the inter-American defense bill to arm the Western Hemisphere and standardize the war equipment of the 20 Latin republics on U. S. master weapons.

They have two ways of getting what they want. One is by raising prices, not in terms of fair profit, but to gouge as much as they can get away with. You know how this works—especially you housewives who find that despite all promises to the contrary, food, clothing and other necessities are distorted in price beyond the normal reach of your pocketbook. Take a look at the profits American business has compiled.

Their second method is to keep wages down. The average American worker today makes about \$46.50 a week—which means that millions are making much less. It's not enough. Many of you "average workers" need more. The facts are there. Big business makes more than ever, while its employees make less and less.

But the industrialist, who likes big profits and hates to part with even a tiny portion of them, says he won't pay that little extra that many of us need to feed and clothe our families.

Labor with its organized unions, is fighting to get that little extra for American workers. They can do so within the framework of the law—which allows them to bargain, to arbitrate, to appeal, to carry out educational work among their members—as a last resort—to strike. No one likes to strike. Workers have families to support, children to feed.

Yet when stubborn employers reject demands for a living wage—what other course of action is open? Should workers' children suffer because of the selfishness of some employers?

Labor is not an abstract term. Labor is many millions of American

Anti-Labor Bill Is Everybody's Fight

It's an old big-city joke that anyone can attract a crowd by staring up at the sky and pointing. There may not be anything there at all, but people will stop and look anyhow.

It's a clever psychological principle. It's so clever that many of our congressmen make use of it time and time again.

They point at something which they call "dictatorial labor unions." And the fact that it's a phoney mirage doesn't prevent people from looking for it.

In a sense it's a big joke to make people stare at nothing. But it really isn't funny when the trick is used to fool the American people into destroying a movement which has been built through the sacrifices and struggles of millions of working people, and which has done so much for the people of this nation.

Yet that is what many of our congressmen are trying to do. In Congress today are bills which would weaken labor so much that unions would no longer be able to function. All of them contain either mild or strong doses of a poison which would render labor helpless.

Practically all labor legislation we now accept as commonplace—such as the Wagner Act—was written to correct abuses by employers which had existed for many years.

This law represents a steady uphill advance from the days when to form a union was held to be a "conspiracy." Many people do not realize this because their newspapers have not done much to inform them of it.

Yet it is true that such laws were the first nation-wide attempt by our government to halt a virtual reign of terror by some of our most powerful industrial corporations—a reign of terror which included the use of tear gas, guns, corporation thugs and labor spies. A Senate investigation found that many industrialists used these un-American devices to thwart the organization of their employees into unions. While these activities, strangely enough, were not given much publicity in the press, thousands of pages of checked evidence are recorded in hearings of these congressional investigating committees.

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
