Enroll 2185 in Women's Rights Drive MIDWEST CAGE MEET GOES TO WAUKEGAN

ANNUAL CLASSIC SLATED TO GO OVER WITH BANG

Association Moves to Make Tourney National,
Open to All KSKJ teams

TO BE STAGED FEB. 19-20

Entry Deadline Set for Midnight Feb. 9

Waukegan, Ill.—The annual meeting of the KSKJ Midwest Basketball Association was well attended. Representatives from all of last year's teams were all on hand with the exception of St. Michaels of South Chicago. Frank Banich of the Supreme Board acted in his capacity as athletic commissioner. J. Englehart represented the official referees.

The question of locating the tourney for 1938 was settled quickly with the unanimous decision of the representatives that Waukegan should again be the tournament locale. At the same time Chicago offered to accept the tourney for 1939 and this, too, met with universal approval. So the question of the tournament city will not come up again until 1940.

The dates of the tourney are Feb. 19 and 20. The entry fee per team has been reduced to \$1. The KSKJ will furnish the trophies as well as meeting the expenses of the official referees. The basketball association will provide the winners in each division with a tourney basketball. The entry deadline has been set for midnight of Feb. 9. The tourney drawings will take place in Chicago at the home of Frank Banich on Feb. 10 at 7:30 p. m.

The lightweight limit remains at 143 pounds. Spaulding's basketball guide will be the official rule book of the tourney, the only exception being that our tourney omits the three-second rule. The eligibility rule was not even discussed because the rule is well known by this time, that a player, to compete, must be a member of the KSKJ for at least six months prior to the date of the tourney. A motion was passed that besides the Midwest teams any other teams desiring to enter the tourney are most welcome, so Cleveland, Brooklyn, Minne-

sota and others, we shall be glad to have you with us if you can arrange to compete with the cream of the Midwest.

The same staff of officers was re-elected for the coming year, the Rev. M. J. Butala as president and treasurer, assisted by Miss Marie Grom, secretary.

The board of trustees consists of one delegate from each of the lodges or booster clubs competing.

The enthusiasm shown at the meeting indicates that the 1938 tourney will go over with a "bang." It is to be hoped that St. Michaels of South Chicago will also join the parade which will present the newest version of KSKJ athletics and fraternalism.

KSKJ Women Enlist 523 in Closing Month

Hocevar's Section Noses Out to Win Top Honors
in Campaign

PRESTO LODGE GAINS MOST

Nine-Month Drive had Co-operation of 167 Active Societies

Bringing the Women's Equal Rights membership campaign to a successful close, the drive workers, under the guidance of the three women supreme officers, set up a new record by enlisting 523 members in the closing month of the drive.

The enlistment in the month of December brought the total enrollment during the past nine months of the campaign to 2,185 members; 1,200 in the adult department, 985 in the juvenile branch.

Sister Hocevar's section, with 203 members enrolled in the final month, put that section on top for the period, and was large enough to give the unit an eight-member lead for campaign honors. Sister Likovich's section, with 161 new members in December, won second place in the final ratings, and Sister Gorishke's workers tallied 159 in the last month and took third place honors. The final results, a credit to the women of the organization, show Sister Hocevar's section recruited 797, Sister Likovich's 789, Sister Gorishke's 599.

Outstanding in the campaign was St. Joseph's Society, No. 21, of Presto, Pa., with an enrollment of 47 new members during the drive. SS. Cyril and Methodius' Society, No. 8, and St. Joseph's Society, No. 148, of Bridgeport, Conn., followed closely with 42 new members each. Queen of May Society, No. 157, and SS. Cyril and Methodius' Society, No. 59, Eveleth, Minn., placed third and fourth with 40 and 39 new members, respectively.

The report, published on Page 1, shows that 167 of the 186 societies in the Union contributed new members in the drive.
