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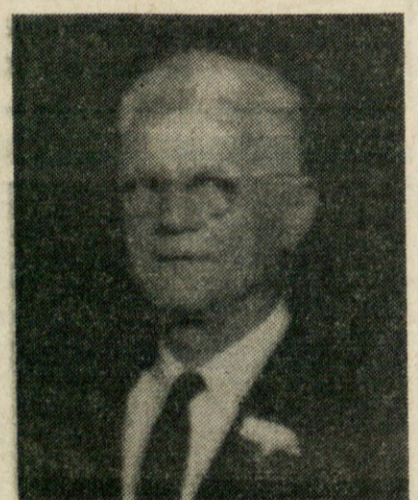
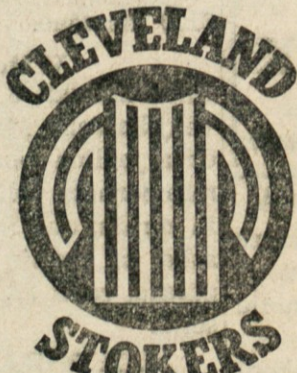

Reporting from Washington

CONGRESSIONAL REVIEW OF VIETNAM POLICY. Along with more than 140 of my colleagues I have joined in sponsoring a House Concurrent Resolution relative to the situation in Vietnam. The resolution (H. Con. Res. 704) provides: "That upon the adoption of this concurrent resolution, the appropriate committees of the Congress shall immediately consider and report to their respective bodies their determination as to whether further Congressional action is desirable, in respect to policies in Southeast Asia."

The debate we are calling for is not for divisive reasons, but to resolve the doubts in our own minds and in the public's mind, so that we can pursue our national objectives with a more common purpose. I have no quick, cheap and easy solution to this most critical problem of our time. There is too much at stake—in terms of American blood and American security—to speak rashly, or without sufficient evidence, on a problem which so deeply concerns our people. Moreover, I believe that those Americans who, based on the insufficient evidence available to them, claim they do have a solution—such self-appointed "experts" are simply compounding rather than helping to solve this problem.

Secretary Rusk has acknowledged that our policy is under review "from A to Z" by the Administration. The Congress should likewise undertake such a review, and should contribute its independent assessment of our direction in Vietnam. Our fighting men in Vietnam and our people at home are entitled to the most effective policy we can devise. We hope that the response to this resolution will help to restore the rightful role of the Congress—the body of government closest to the people—and will lead the way to a clarification of our national objectives in Vietnam.

ACTION AGAINST OBSCENE ADVERTISEMENTS. On April 15, Title III of Public Law 90-206 (Postal Revenue and Federal Salary Act) will go into effect. This will allow the householder to decide for himself whether or not he wishes to receive advertisements from smut peddlers through the mail. If it is decided that the material received

is undesirable, here are the steps which may be taken:

1. If you receive an advertisement which you judge to be obscene, write a letter to the Postmaster General in Washington, D.C., or to your local Postal Inspector. Demand that he send an order to the mailer directing him to remove your name and address immediately from all of his mailing lists. You may also request that the Postmaster General's order include the names of any minor children and other family members at your address.
2. If you continue to receive questionable mail in violation of the order, you may then request the Attorney General to seek a court order against the smut mail advertiser.
3. If you then get a court order and still receive the smut mail, the sender will be subject to contempt of court citations and a possible jail sentence. The cooperation of everyone is needed to rid our mails of pornography.

THE GOLD CRISIS. The Republican Coordinating Committee has pointed out that the necessity of revising our international gold system came about entirely from mismanagement of our domestic financial and economic affairs by the Johnson Administration. The Committee stated: "If the new two-price structure for gold is to become the means of transition to a durable international monetary system, the President must proceed at once to restore credibility and confidence in the fiscal practices of our government. People around the world... must again be persuaded that it is better to hold dollars than gold."

The Committee went on to say: "The Administration must put into effect at once the sizeable cuts in spending for which the Congress and the Republican Party have been calling. It is urgently necessary for the President to come forth with meaningful specific proposals for major reductions in non-essential government spending. Until he does, there can be no expectation that the Congress and the American people will accept a tax increase. The budget must be brought close to balance and the deficit in our international payments must be sharply reduced if we are to restore faith in the dollar and avoid another crisis."

THE TEN MOST COSTLY INCOME TAX ERRORS



NEW YORK, N.Y. (ED) — If nothing is sure but death and taxes, it's almost as certain that far too many taxpayers cut their own throats when making out their own income tax returns.

The annual bout with the Internal Revenue Service is mined with potential traps for unwary taxpayers — particularly unsophisticated citizens, who attempt to do battle with complex tax forms on the kitchen table, without a clue, as to loopholes to look for.

Corporations rely on professionals to take advantage of every benefit built into the tax structure. Individuals can get the same break on their own income taxes — if they know what to look for, and when and where to turn to expert advice.

According to H & R Block — the largest of the nation's fast-growing income tax preparation services — everyday errors in the battle of the budget begin as early as the choice of form, with most people having their biggest problems with the complex language that's an Internal Revenue Service specialty.

"Actually," says President Henry W. Bloch, founder with his brother, Richard, of the firm that bears their name (changed to end with the letter "k" because "that's how most people would spell it, anyway"), "eighty per cent of all tax problems aren't complex at all. It's just that the individual taxpayer, who tackles the job only once a year, isn't familiar with the forms involved."

When Mr. Bloch talks percentages he's talking big numbers. At least half of the nation's 67 million individual taxpayers get help in tackling Form 1040, with Block alone

preparing returns on a combined gross income of well over \$10 billion — a rarified level of tax involvement otherwise occupied only by such giant corporate income-producers as General Motors and AT & T.

When it comes to personal tax-paying, however, it isn't the income level as much as know-how that makes the difference. Complications stay so much the same, whatever the dollars, that three out of four taxpayers who fill out their own forms make mistakes — usually the same ones. 3. Failure to list all contributions; everybody knows that donations to organized charities can be deducted, but many don't count the current market value of gifts of furniture, clothing or merchandise.
4. Failure to claim — or substantiate — dependents other than members of the immediate family.
5. Failure, on the part of senior citizens, to claim all tax benefits

available, especially on retirement income.

6. Failure to claim expenses relating to medical expenses; overlooked, but legitimate, deductions often include auto mileage at five cents a mile for visits to the doctor's office or hospital, parking fees, taxicab costs and ambulance charges.

7. Use of the wrong tax table, or tax rates; there are three different tables, each with three sets of rates, and it's easy for an individual to miss the one that will give him the best break on dollars.

8. Failure to claim sick pay and child care deductions.

9. Over-reporting, or improper reporting, of income; many people have fully or partially tax-exempt income, but report it in their returns in full.

10. Failure to properly set up a basis of depreciation for business property and equipment; many taxpayers particularly overlook the legal opportunities in depreciating rental property for tax purposes.

It all adds up — to millions of dollars every year for all taxpayers combined, and substantial sums for individual taxpayers. Food to feed the farm animals is available at the milkmaid's counter built into the base of the farm's old-fashioned windmill.

Bottles of milk and cones of grain may be purchased there for 10 cents each.

The Children's Farm was donated to the Zoo by the Rotary Club of Cleveland. In recent years additional Rotary Club gifts to enhance the Farm have included a fruit orchard and the windmill.

Cleveland Zoo and Children's Farm hours are 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., daily; Sundays and holidays from April to mid-October, weather permitting, hours are 10 a.m. to 7 p.m.
