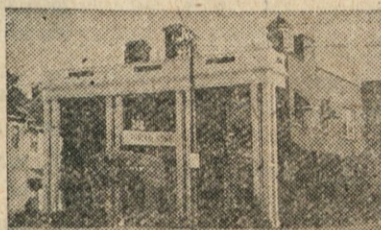

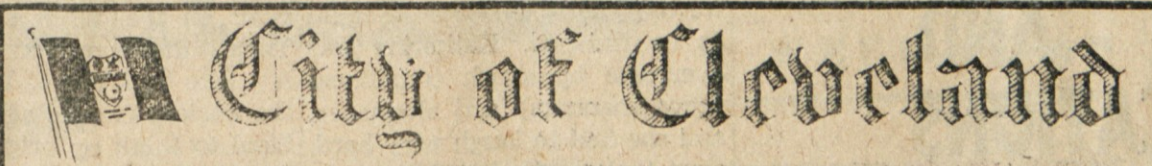

The Housing and Community Development Act of 1974 provided us with an opportunity to undertake housing and community development activities in a coordinated manner. With your help we designed a comprehensive program for neighborhood preservation.

We have received HUD approval of our first second and third year programs of sixteen million dollars each and are now well into implementation.

It is now time for us to prepare our plan for the fourth year of the Community Development Block Grant. Again, we are asking for your assistance and cooperation in the development of the plan. Our emphasis for Year IV will be on-program options which will preserve and expand our housing stock, stabilize our neighborhoods, and revitalize our community.

The Department of Community Development welcomes your suggestions which would assist the City in meeting the objectives of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, particularly that of neighborhood preservation. Suggestions will be taken into consideration for possible inclusion in the list of program options fundable under the Community Development Block Grant.

The first of a series of Public listenings will be held on the above dates so that you may participate in the development of Cleveland's plan. At these meetings members of the Department of Community Development will summarize and discuss the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, program requirements, goals and strategies for Cleveland and suggested program options.

PHILADELPHIA - AND VIRGINIA VACATIONS

CONTINUED

We saw Jamestown, where the first settlement in America took place about 370 years ago. Had the pleasure of seeing some glass blowers performing their art. This is put on by the "Dept. of Interior." After 4 they go to their homes. Nobody lives in Jamestown. The whole vast area is open country. All that remains of Jamestown is the foundations of the homes which are there by the James River.

Richmond, smaller in population than Akron, had no "one way" streets when I was there, as a soldier, 35 years ago. Now, there's quite a few. I liked Richmond better before, not as busy. In Public Square is a small park where G.I.'s and I spent time. Now, my wife and I went thru there and sat on the benches.

West of the park, across the street, is the "Cathedral of The Sacred Heart." It makes a Catholic proud to see it.

Twenty-five miles south of Richmond, is Petersburg. We went to Mass at the same church I used to go to, St. Joseph's. Just around the corner was St. Paul's Episcopal Church. There is history behind it. On the 3rd pew from the altar was a nameplate reading "Gen. Robert E. Lee, 1864-1865". It's where he sat when he attended services.

Petersburg hasn't changed, it seems that time has stood still, except for a Holiday Inn three miles east of Petersburg, is where I trained, and it was called Camp Lee. Now it's Fort Lee.

It was Sunday when we were there. Everyone was in civilian clothes. Soldiers don't have to wear uniforms on Sunday. They still have a Post Exchange store "that's like an Uncle Bill's discount store" for army personnel. And inside was a restaurant where female soldiers and male soldiers were sitting around at the same tables. A good arrangement.

Showed Bronita around the Fort. It once was like a field camp, dirt drives and barracks built right in amongst the pine trees. Now asphalt and there are large administration buildings of brick and it looks more like an industrial park now. Many World War II barracks from the 7th to 36th streets are torn down. From the 1st to the 6th, they are still up but they looked weatherbeaten and old.

We saw one of the new barracks, was surprised, indoors it looks like a motel, with a hallway and individual rooms on each side, two soldiers to a room. When I was there there were 20 of us in one large room, 10 on each side. I liked it that way, think it's the better way. You get a chance to talk to, and know more fellows. We gathered around in the evenings and sang songs. Some Southerners had guitars and sang "Beautiful, Beautiful Brown Eyes, We'll Never Love Blue Eyes Again," and we all joined in.

In Petersburg, we met Mrs. Irene Graves, 82 years of age. She asked about us and we told her we were from Euclid, Ohio. Irene smiled with friendliness. "You are Catholics and we are Episcopalians but we pray to the same God. We like people from the north, you have such good manners. I want to tell you a story about a Yankee, Capt. Haskill (the story has been handed down to us). He and his men overran this area in 1865. The Captain was seizing all our horses. On one farm, my great grandmother, Katherine Graves, then 17, a dark haired beauty came charging up to the Captain. How dare you steal our horses, it has been said — that you boasted your are gentle-

men? You are savages.' The Captain was more stunned by her beauty than her accusation. He bowed and answered, 'My dear young lady, we do not want your horses, our horses from the north are of the aristocracy, thoroughbreds, and are better than yours but since we are short of them at the moment, military necessity requires that

we use yours,' and bowed again as he finished. Katherine was overcome by such courtliness (good manners) and eloquence, and she had to laugh very hard, even though she was losing her horses."

Interesting lady, Mrs. Irene Graves. Hope we meet again.

One evening in Williamsburg, we went to see the play "Common Glory". It was at the open air "Lake Matoaka Amphitheater". Behind the stage, boats were going back and forth. It created the illusion of being part of the stage, which was built

right on the edge of the lake. Then it dawned on you that there is a lake back there. I read that the ancient Greeks and Romans liked to think up original ideas. The ancient amphitheaters I saw in Italy were not by any kind of river or lake. They would prob-

ably praise this American outdoor idea.

The play was about the events that took place in "Old Williamsburg" the highlight of the show was when Washington, Jefferson, Madison, Franklin and Patrick Henry took part in

a lively, rollicking song.

Our goal in 1976 was — to see where a lot of American history was made. We like to see the United States. There is so much to see in this country. These trips were only 2,500

miles in all, but we're thankful that we had no accidents and got home safe. What a magnificent place that is — home.

During World War II the Communists, under the guise of a liberation front, began their revolution. The Slovenian people rejected Communism but by the use of force and terrorism the Communist revolutionaries, supported by Stalin, came to power in May, 1945.

Thousands fled to Austria to escape treachery. In Austria, the British delivered all the Domabrance and Chetniks back into the hands of Tito. In all, 12,000 were murdered, the greatest tragedy in Slovenian history.

To all Slovenians who lost their lives whether in the woods of Kočevski Rog, the battlefields of Korea or in Vietnam, we de-

cate this day.
On Sunday, May 29, 1977 the Veterans of War in the old country (organized in Društvo SPB), in Cleveland will celebrate a Mass at St. Mary of Lourdes Shrine on Chardon Rd. at 11:00 a.m.

At 2:00 p.m. the Litany will be sung, after which there will be a gathering at All Souls Cemetery to pray for those of ours who rest there.

Among them are Joey Intihar, and Sylvester Sekne, who lost their lives in Vietnam.

The DSPB invites all to attend their memorial service. We would greatly appreciate it if those who own a national costume to wear them this day.

On this day, let us express our pride for those who fought so bravely, our gratitude to those who so loved freedom and our prayers to those who died so that others would be free.

DOCTORATE AWARDED TO FATHER PROSEN



Muncie, Ind. — On May 20, Ball State University here is conferring the Doctor of Philosophy degree on Father Anthony J. Prosen, a priest of the diocese of Lafayette in Indiana.

Father Prosen grew up in St. Lawrence parish, Newburgh, where he also celebrated his first Mass on May 23, 1971.

The Rev. Dr. Prosen specialized in social science education, American history, educational administration and sociology in the Ball State University College of Science and Humanities. Under the direction of one of Indiana's foremost State historians, Dr. Richard H. Caldemeyer, his dissertation covers "The History of the Catholic Church in the Lafayette Diocese in Indiana, 1677-1977."

Among the many professional memberships he holds, the Rev. Dr. Prosen is on the State board of directors of Indiana Citizens for Educational Freedom. Last year, Pope Paul VI promoted him from papal knighthood to commander of the Equestrian Order of the Holy Sepulcher of Jerusalem in the northern lieutenantancy of the United States in ceremonies at Cleveland Cathedral of St. John the Evangelist.

Father Prosen's most recent writings include the 1975 publication, "Early History of the Catholic Church in Lafayette Diocese in Indiana, An Essay." The April 1976 issue of Gazette of the American Friends of Lafayette published his article, "American Ecclesiastical Use of Lafayette's Coat of Arms," and

the September-October 1976 issues of The Social Justice Review carried his study, "Joseph Andrew Stephan: Indiana's Fighting Priest." This latter two-part study is being reproduced in pamphlet form by the Central Bureau Press of St. Louis, Mo.

For the 1976 bicentennial, the Rev. Dr. Prosen co-authored with Mr. Luke J. Sherer of Huntington, Ind., the pamphlet, "Missionary Priests, Commandants, Chiefs and Inhabitants of Fort Ouiatanon, Lafayette, Indiana."

Father Prosen received his Bachelor of Arts degree from the University of Detroit, 1963; Master of Arts, from Loyola University of Chicago, 1968; Bachelor, 1970, and Licentiate, 1971, of Sacred Theology from the Catholic University of America, Washington, D.C., where he was ordained a priest for Lafayette diocese on May 13, 1971, in the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception. His writings have also appeared in the American Ecclesiastical Review, Sociological Analysis, Emmanuel, The Classical Outlook, The Classical Bulletin, and Scholastic Teacher, among others.

The Rev. Dr. Prosen is a member of the Catholic Theological Society of America.

In priestly assignments, Father Prosen serves as the diocesan archivist of the Lafayette chancery. A chaplain to the Third Order of St. Francis in Muncie, Father Prosen also assists in St. Mary Church there.

Other assignments have been at St. Paul Church, Marion, Ind., and at St. Paul's Bennett and Lafayette Central Catholic High schools where he has been principal and teacher.

The Rev. Dr. Prosen's sister, Professor Rose Mary Prosen, teaches English at Cuyahoga Community College, Cleveland, and is known to American Home readers for her poetry and ethnic studies. Frequent editorial contributor, John Prosen, is Father's uncle.

AN OUCH OF MEDICINE

Before you are literally squeezed to death by everlasting rate hikes in your health insurance coverage, you are entitled to at least voicing one "ouch" objection.

Just recently Medical Mutual (Blue Shield) requested a rate increase for 96,000 non group subscribers. The rates would go up 64 cents to \$5.96 on three policies purchased by individuals. The policies are medicare fill, UCR comprehensive policies and UCR high-level benefit contracts. The State of Ohio, Department of Insurance, Harry V. Jump, Director held a public hearing in the Garden Room of the Cleveland Plaza this past Tuesday, May 10, 1977 from 9 a.m. till 5 p.m.

About 95,985 non group subscribers must be in accord with the requested rate increase of their policies. I personally know of only eight people who voiced their objection to the proposed increase — by sending mailgrams to the director — Mr. Bubhrouda whose letter (to the editor) (Blue Cross picking on non-group members?) appeared in the Cleveland Press Monday, May 9 and by 7 p.m. only had brought him one call of thanks and encouragement.

And then we have the "only one" consumer who took time out to appear at the public hearing — Cleveland Press Wednesday, May 11, 1977, plus State Representative Dennis E. Eckart who was on our side as were

Cleveland Council President George Forbes, Councilman Basil Russo who jointly introduced an emergency resolution opposing the requested increase. Res. No. 1208-77 April 27, 1977 — supporting news media the American Home newspaper, and Perry News, the St. Clair Business Association also strongly objected to the requested rate increase via direct mailgram to Director Jump and editorials.

We won't know until the end of this month whether we (non-group) subscribers will be paying a higher rate — according to Daniel Kelso of the Ohio Department of Insurance, Cleveland Press, Wed., May 11, 1977.

Who knows, maybe Cleveland Press (home edition) front page headline Wed., May 11, "Blue Shield President Is Subpoenaed" in Probe" may just loosen the rate increase grip around our necks and it won't be necessary to holler ouch — at least for the time being.

As a postscript, I would like to say that if you are unwilling to give of your time and efforts for the betterment of things — afraid to openly express your opinions — hesitate to get involved because it may inconvenience you or just plain scared — never personally contact your elected or appointed officials to tell them what you expect of them and about how you feel brainwashed to the point of "What's the Use?", then maybe, just maybe, you are living in the wrong country.

WHITE CHIFFON PIE or WHITE CHRISTMAS PIE

1 tablespoon plain gelatin
¼ cup cold water
½ cup sugar
¾ cup flour
½ teaspoon salt
1½ cups milk
1 teaspoon vanilla
¼ cup creme de cocoa
1 tablespoon light rum
½ cup heavy cream whipped
1 cup freshly grated or packaged flaked coconut
Candied flowers, or other trim to suit the occasion

Meringue:

3 egg whites
¼ teaspoon cream of tartar
½ cup sugar

Meringue shell:

4 egg whites
¼ teaspoon cream of tartar
1 cup sugar

Soften gelatin in cold water, mix sugar, flour and salt in saucepan. Gradually stir in milk. Bring to a boil and cook 1 minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat and stir in gelatin. Cool. Add vanilla, liquor and rum. Fold in whipped cream most of the coconut and the meringue. Pour into shell, sprinkle with remaining coconut and garnish, if you wish. Make meringue for filling as any other you usually make.

To make meringue shell:
Preheat oven to 275 degrees.

Beat egg whites until foamy, sprinkle with cream of tartar, and beat until peaks form. Gradually add sugar, beating until stiff. Spread in well buttered pie pan and bake 20 minutes. Raise temperature to 30 degrees. Bake 40 minutes more. Cool on rack.

Regular baked pie shell may be used.

Chill 2 hours before serving.
