## Editorial Comments

### CAMPAIGN ECHOES

Our Membership Campaign which terminated April 1 netted the Society a considerable increase in membership, especially among the English Speaking Lodges. There are some outstanding individual members who share first place honors, besides several lodges that entered the campaign collectively. In last week's Prosveseta we published the 'photo' of a young member who brought in the most members during the campaign. He is Bro. Louis Simoncic, member of Lodge Strugglers 614 of Cleveland, O. To him goes the honor of getting 22 new adult and 10 juvenile members for his lodge. And what is even more singularly cheering is the fact that all of the members he brought in are, at the moment, in good standing. Young Simoncic not only captured all City Honors but is also a runner-up for the National Honors, which fact makes him eligible for the first prize. And he is our member 1½ year and is at the same time organizer and director of the "SNPJ Strugglers Harmony Aces," an orchestra of the above mentioned lodge.

### ERRARE HUMANUM EST

Last week the Prosveseta stated that "the Slovene National Benefit Society was the first to accept the term "Slovene" as an adjective and a noun." This statement is correct as far as it goes, but the following phrase "twenty-seven years ago" would have been more correct without the word "twenty." This is in way of correcting a typographical error which changed the intended meaning considerably. As a matter of fact our Society has officially adopted the word "Slovene" at its 8th convention by changing and amending section 1 of article 1 of the by-laws. Prior to that the term "Slovenic" was officially used, which was then substituted for the more modern, present form.

### CONVINCING OPPONENTS

In trying to convince our opponents, those that hold a different view from ours on any subject, we will always succeed best by stating our arguments clearly and in a gentleman-like way. While, on the other hand, resorting to insinuating remarks we undervalue our own arguments, and our listeners, the readers, form at once a biased opinion and are pronto lost to our convictions. A frank presentation of our viewpoints and arguments is the right and the strongest convincing way of "putting over" our ideas. You may 'season' your statements with appropriate adjectives and phrases, provided you know how, and you may also be satirical and even mildly sarcastic. But that's an art in itself, and only a few succeed in the attempt without offending the parties concerned and impairing their own stand. Therefore, be precise and frank and tactful and, above all, be brief; for brevity is the soul of wit.

### PIONEER SLOVENE SCHOOL

The Pioneer Juvenile Slovene School, organized some six months ago by Lodge 559, SNPJ, has successfully concluded its first school term with an interesting program at the SNPJ Auditorium last Sunday. The attempt to conduct a Slovene school for our Juveniles proved fruitful in many ways. At the beginning, more than forty pupils enrolled and attended. Toward the end, gradually, this number diminished and at the end there remained 19 loyal students. Considering all the many difficulties and obstacles that the school board had to face, due largely to the fact that most of our people in that vicinity live scattered over a large area, the Lodge, its school board and the teacher, Sis. Katka Zupanec, are indeed pleased with the results accomplished, and are grateful to everyone who offered advice and support in this important enterprise—the Pioneer Juvenile Slovene School in Chicago.

### Special Assessment For Sick Benefit Fund

Unusually heavy payments of sick benefit during the early part of this year have reduced the reserve of the sick benefit fund to an extent below the level as is required by the By-Laws of the Society. Consequently, in accordance with Section 5, Article XXIII, of the By-Laws, the Administrative Board, at their meeting held on May 7, decided to levy a special assessment on all members insured for sick benefit; this to be paid in the month of July, 1931. Only members admitted into the Society in the month of July, are exempt from payment of this assessment.

Special Assessment to be levied is as follows:

Members insured for \$1 sick benefit, shall pay 70¢; members insured for \$2, shall pay \$1.50; members insured for \$3, shall pay \$2.85, and members insured for \$2+2, shall pay \$3.25 Special Assessment.

As specified above, EVERY MEMBER insured for sick benefit is required to pay this special assessment in the month of July. If a member refuses to pay special assessment, his regular assessment will not be accepted.

### Five Noble Judges

This means control over and capacity to run the Machine in order to satisfy our lives' requirements. However, you cannot control the Machine unless it is yours, unless you own it; and you cannot run it unless you know how. That one learns by studying and doing goes, naturally, without saying, and of the two this is of secondary importance. The important thing is to lasso the steed and hold him.

Now the "great minds" (and some not so great, indeed most circumscribed) own the present industrial machine, but they don't know how to run it. This they said so themselves only a few days ago at the convention of the International Chamber of Commerce (to and behold: "International"). Of course they cannot, in spite and contrary notwithstanding our laboring friend, Becek, who is more positive of the soundness of capitalism than Owen D. Young of the General Electric.

Finally, if anybody is inconsistent it is the defenders and would-be defenders of capitalism as "the best system human mind can conceive." In view of its rapid breakdown it is tragic that there is a single person outside of the master class who can still have a single word in its favor. And it must break down. This is its logic. For the machine has created capitalism and the Machine will destroy it. It is inevitable because the Machine is a social creation, of many many minds and hands, and it cannot serve two opposite social purposes.

Either the people must own it or it will devour them together with its private owners, and if the latter occurs the pain will be most severe and devastating. They must own it through government which is neither bad nor good. If it is socially minded, it is good; if opposite, it is bad. And in a capitalist society government is not socially minded, for it is the servant of the private interests of the rich. Accordingly it is anti-social and therefore bad from the point of view of the interests of the great mass of the people. Who is not blind can see this fact, for the evidences surrounding him are meteoric. But I shall carry this discussion further next week.

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point but its logic is sound-proof. No argument is needed to demonstrate the fact that in modern industrial society the well-being of every single individual is dependent on industry, on the work of other men. Man is no longer self sufficient as of old when he made his own shoes and clothes and raised his own food. Under modern system of production the labor of thousands of men is necessary to administer to the needs of every one of us. The machine and the factory mode of production have caused this and, accordingly, are either our bread givers or withholders. And those who own the machine and the factories are our arbiters.

As the essence of capitalism is profit for the few and the form is private ownership of the factories and machines, through stocks and bonds, these, however, operate only when it is profitable. When it is not the mine and the mill, the bank and the store will close down. Workers find themselves jobless; depositors of savings accounts lose their savings; homes and farms bought on the instalment plan or mortgaged are sold, often sold for any money; owners of a defunct factory or store go either bankrupt or amalgamate with stronger concerns. Never has this been more true than now. Why?

The serious student of political economy, social organization and human history will answer, if he is open-minded and not glued materially and ideologically to the present system, that the Industrial Machine has become too complicated, operated too haphazardly upon the outworn principle of private profit and greed—or "initiative"—which can no longer serve the best interests of society.

Because the industry, as well as the nations, being so interdependent, the well-being of an overwhelming majority, and in the final analysis of the last citizen, is entirely at the mercy of the Machine which should be run on a new and more adequate basis in order to guarantee the livelihood and security and happiness to everyone.

In the pastoral stage primitive communism prevailed and the chief of the tribe was the master and king. When man began to settle down private ownership of property developed and the struggle for its possession. The strongest, the most cunning and sometimes the wisest, or the combination of all three, arose to power. They formed the government. In the struggle for existence and power the strongest, the cunningest became kings, potentates and the owners of subjugated people and private property.

Second, throughout the history, at whatever stage, we see the government as the servant of the strongest, the owners of private property: of the slave holders, the feudal barons, the merchants and now the industrial barons and the moneyed plutocrats.

Since the government is the servant of the economic interests, under modern capitalism of the owners of industry. Socialists maintain, however, the industry should be owned and operated by the whole people through the State for the well-being of every individual willing and able to work. As the result the government would then become of, for and by the people. There is no inconsistency in this view.

## Facts vs. Fiction

Give the average worker five thousand dollars a year and all the labor troubles will disappear; but when you get the worker down where he can't get a job and nothing to eat, the lamb turns into a roaring lion. The only thing I can say in favor of the capitalists is that they are forcing the workers to unite. Of course Andrew Carnegie put up libraries and different public institutions and both rich and poor share them alike, but that doesn't mean much. It's a secondary matter. A worker's first thought is a steady job that he can depend on, and wages that can support his family in a decent way. Reading and such come after the family is safe from hunger—and not before.

The next problem is, does the modern machinery throw the workers out? He says yes, but these people can be put back to work by selling and repairing these machines. At Ford's in Detroit there are at least ten thousand men out of job due to modern machinery, and I just wonder if these men are selling and repairing these machines? Think it over. But when Socialism comes in power, we will have modern machinery and better conditions, and when we take a man off one job we will have another one ready for him and not let him walk the streets half starved looking for work.

I heartily believe that Bro. Becek could learn plenty by reading the articles that are written by Bro. Kutch. According to Bro. Becek, socially minded, wealth is a crime. Wealth
