Po večini je tako; tisti, ki so ostali zvesti veri, so ohranili tudi narodno zavednost in znajo tudi otroci slovensko. Kdor pa je zapustil vero, je zgubil tudi narodno zavednost.

Naša dekleta lahko dobe službe, ker je povpraševanje po Slovincih zelo veliko in na dnevnem redu. Mnoge službe so dobri in se dekleta kar dobro počutijo, druge pa zopet manj. Razumljivo je, da je v teh službah težko, ker naši ljudje niso navajeni argentinskih razmer in načina življenja. Če bi obvladale jezik, bi prišle tudi do uradniških mest, dasi ta mesta niso lahka, ker res mnogo zahtevajo od uradnic.

Slovenski begunec poromal v Fatimo

V prvem tednu meseca avgusta letošnjega leta je obiskal znananito božjo pot v Fatimi na Portugalskem slovenski salezijanski duhovnik, nam begunec dobro znani g. Miško Brunec, ki se sedaj nahaja v Estorilu pri Lisboni na Portugalskem.

Iz Estorila je odpotoval 2. avgusta

Spremljal ga je tja Lucijin nečak Jožef Valinho (Valinjo) salezijanec, ki študira filozofijo v Turinu v Italiji. Je sin Lucijine najstarejše sestre Marije.

Oglasila sta se najprej v hiši Lucijinih sorodnikov, kjer sta pustila tudi svojo prtljago. Odsli sta v "Cova da Iria," kjer se je Marija prikazovala trem pastirčkom. Obiskala sta kapelico, ki stoji na kraju prikazovanja. Na kraju, kjer je stal hrastiček nad katerim se je prikazovala Marija, stoji sedaj steber. Hrastiček so romarji popolnoma polomili in odnesli. Na hribčku nad kotlino stoji velika in visoka bazilika s še višjim stolpom. V notranjosti je gotov le glavni oltar. Zvonov bo 17, že zdaj je več zvonov, ki vsako uro zvonijo fatimsko himno.

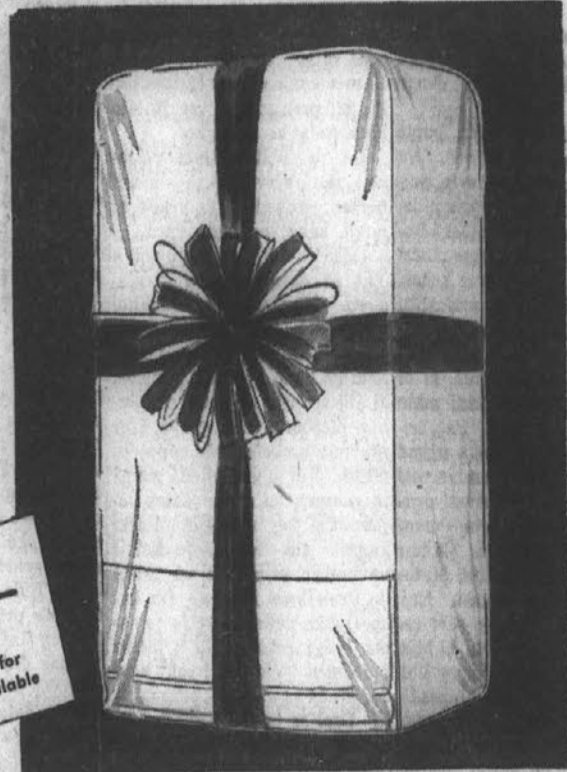
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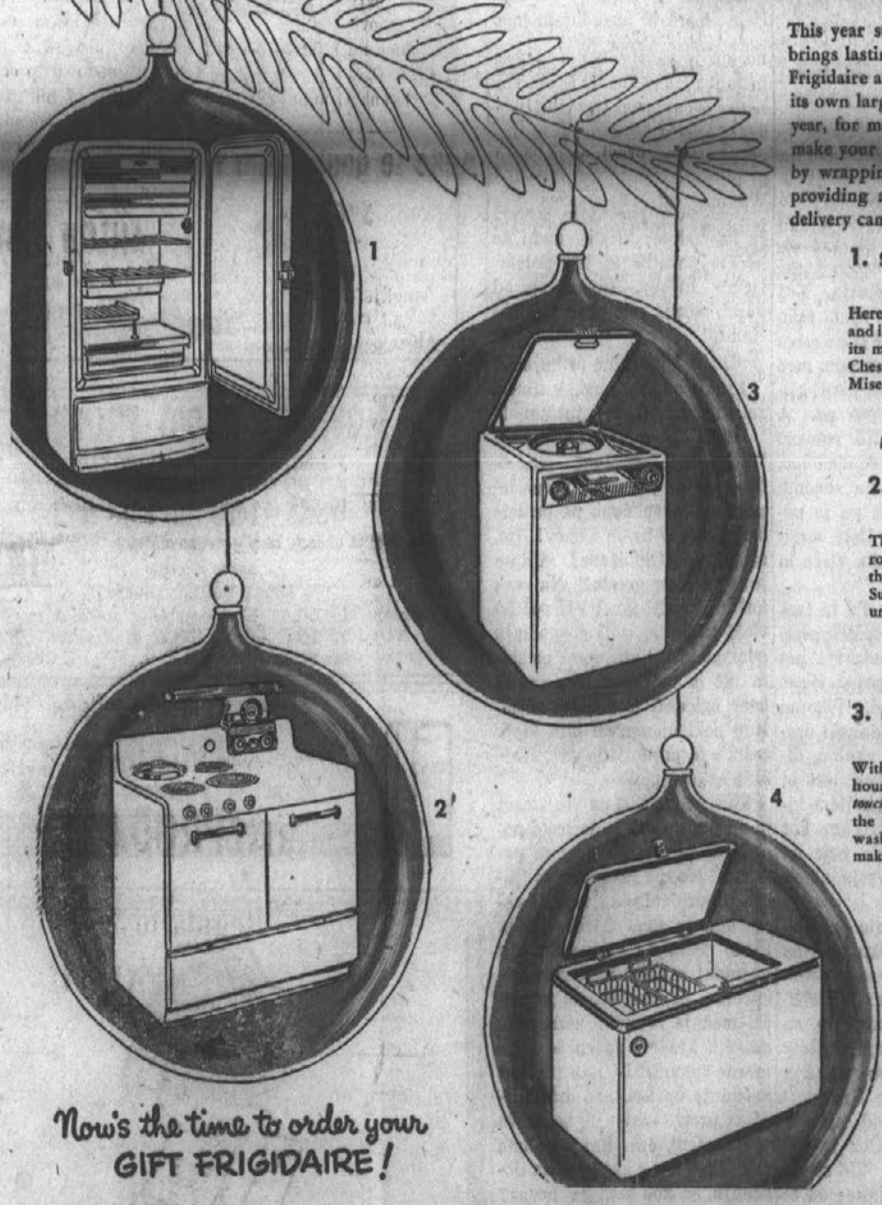

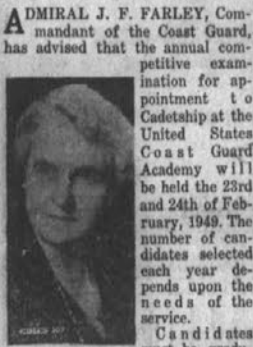

FACTS OF LIFE

A good many people seem to believe that next year something resembling the old OPA will be brought back from the dead, and prices will immediately drop.

This is one of those illusions that should be scotched as soon as possible. For, regardless of what the law may or may not attempt to do, there are certain economic principles involved which are as inevitable as the movement of the planets.

First of all, no one will produce anything at a loss. We could pass a law, for instance, saying that a dozen eggs shall be sold for twenty-five cents, and a good suit of clothes for twenty dollars. But no farmer would produce those eggs and no manufacturer would make the suit — for the simple reason that bankruptcy would follow.

Secondly, we cannot make any merchant handle goods at a loss. Today, for instance, typical retail stores, including both the big chain systems and many independent stores, earn a smaller profit on each dollar of sales than they did under OPA. That profit, generally, runs from one or two percent to about six cents on volume of trade, depending on the kind of goods handled. There certainly is no room in this field to make any dent in the prices paid by the consumer.

Thirdly, price fixing by fiat is the best friend the black market has. It makes for scarcity in the legitimate, law-abiding channels of trade. And it makes for abundance undercover dealings, where the price charged is all the traffic will bear — right down to the last penny. The racketeer and his customers get the goods — the responsible merchant and the masses of people go without.

Today's prices are the result of record wages, enormous government spending, full employment, high taxes, and other such forces. Competition keeps them as low as possible. Government meddling would be the worst possible way to attack the issue.

Postal Zone Number Is A "Must" for Xmas Mail

On Christmas morning last year, many undistributed, first-class greeting cards for local delivery remained on hand at the main post office because the mailers failed to include the postal zone number as part of the address. This resulted in many disappointments when delivery was made after Christmas. Mail so addressed can only be distributed by highly trained employees, and the limited number of experienced clerks available were unable to cope with the situation. Had the postal zone number been indicated in the address, distribution could have been made by inexperienced temporary employees, as it is a simple matter to separate mail according to numbers.

The Post Office Department is anxious to deliver every greeting card in time to be enjoyed on the day for which it is intended, but this cannot be accomplished without the full cooperation of the mailing public. The best way the public can assist the post office is by indicating the postal zone number when addressing gifts and greeting cards, so that full advantage may be taken of the temporary employees hired during the Christmas period.
