MILAKOVICH ELECTED ACTING COUNCILMAN

An exceptionally large turnout of Democrats of the 23rd Ward met last Friday night at Slovenian National Home on St. Clair Ave. Purpose of the meeting was to name a successor to Councilman Robert A. Novak, who had asked to be relieved of his duties as representative of Ward 23. When the election was opened, Novak nominated John Milakovich as acting Councilman. Since there were no other nominations from the assembled Democrats, Milakovich was unanimously elected as acting councilman. Date for the official swearing in ceremonies has not yet been determined, but according to all indications, John Milakovich will formally be installed as councilman of Ward 23 before Sept. 1.

Paul P. Oyaski, 25, a recent honor graduate of Ohio State University College of Law will seek the Euclid Ward Three council seat. Oyaski, a Democrat and a lifelong resident of the ward, said he intends to provide the residents with active, innovative, and decisive representation. "Homeowners are the city's greatest resource," he remarked. "Their needs and interests deserve maximum attention." He believes that many of the needs can best be fulfilled by fostering a closer relationship with the city administration. "A result of the better working relationship will be an immediate and continued improvement in the services provided," he noted. Mayor Tony J. Sustersic already endorsed Oyaski's candidacy. In addition, he received the endorsement of the Coalition party.

"Paul is a hardworking and intelligent young man," remarked Sustersic. "I believe Paul possesses all of the necessary qualities to make a fine addition to council." In reference to Euclid Homes, which is situated in Ward Three Oyaski states that it is time for the city to "fish or cut bait." "During the present councilman's term of office," said Oyaski, "the conditions at Euclid Homes have steadily deteriorated. And he failed to provide the necessary leadership to abate the situation." Oyaski, a 1970 graduate of Euclid High, graduated magna cum laude from Cleveland State University in 1974. He studied political science. During the last two summers he worked in the city's law department. Oyaski resides at 22351 Beckford Avenue.

82 YOUNGSTERS ENJOY FUN-FILLED WEEK AT PRISTAVA

Camp Pristava is a week-long summer camp held on the Slovenska Pristava in Harpersfield, Ohio for children who attend the Saturday morning Slovenian schools at St. Marys and St. Vitus. This year it began on Sunday, July 31 and ended on Sunday, August 7. A staff of 30 volunteer counselors guided 82 energetic campers through a fun-filled and busy, but energy-absorbing week of activities. Fortunately — for the counselors, that is, the kitchen was staffed by the best cooks on this side of Ljubljana. The campers were divided into eight squads. Each of these selected a name. The names were Triglav, Gorenjeci, Močni, Zlatorogi, Skupna Luč, Mladi Sportniki, Indijanci, and Ta Prvi. Each day began with a flag-raising and morning prayers followed by breakfast. Then the campers would clean up their living quarters and the facilities that they used daily. Inspection followed. Most of the morning was spent working on the arts and crafts projects kozolce, wooden lamps, vases, cloth flowers, yarn animals, and painted rocks. Swimming lessons were before lunch. The afternoons were spent in various ways. On Monday, Tuesday, and Thursday, the groups competed in sports — softball, tennis, basketball, soccer, balinca and volleyball. They also canoed and fished in the Grand River. On Wednesday the campers walked from Thompson Ledges to Pristava, which is about 10 miles. On Friday, there was a swim meet, and on Saturday there were track events. The afternoons ended with a free swim followed by a cleanup and inspection before supper. The evenings were also varied. On Monday, there was a treasure hunt in which Močni found the treasure. A campfire followed. On Tuesday the campers put on skits. The recurring themes were a counselor making campers do pushups and the inspection of sleeping areas. On Wednesday the counselors put on a talent show headlined by Tiny, Tiny Theresa. On Thursday the campers hunted for the counselors. On Friday two films were shown: Laurel and Hardy and "Follow Me, Boys". On Saturday there was an awards assembly, Mass, and a bonfire. The camp ended on Sunday with a Mass where campers, counselors, parents, and friends joined in the celebration of the Eucharist. I would like to thank all of you who made camp a success. RICE MEAT BALLS

- 1 cup Minute Rice
- 1 pound ground beef
- 1 egg, slightly beaten
- 2 teaspoons grated onion
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 1/2 teaspoon marjoram (optional)
- Dash pepper
- 2 1/2 cups tomato juice (or use two 8-ounce cans tomato sauce

mixed with 1/2 cup of water

1/2 teaspoon sugar
Combine Minute Rice (right from box) with beef, egg, onion, salt, marjoram, pepper, and 1/2 cup of tomato juice. Mix lightly. Shape mixture into 18 balls and place in skillet. Add sugar to remaining 2 cups tomato juice. Pour juice over meat balls in skillet. Bring mixture to a boil.

Reduce heat and simmer, covered, 15 minutes, basting occasionally. Makes 6 servings, 3 meat balls each.
