LIGA NARODOV ZAVRGLA PRVO- TNI NAČRT

Sedaj ima nov predlog za končanje sovražnosti v Mandžuriji

Pariz, 8. dec. — Možnost javne seje Sveta Lige narodov, ki naj bi zaključila tridesetne brezpične debaté o mandžurski situaciji, je bila včeraj večja kot kdaj prej.

Napredek v tej smeri je bil napravljen, ko je komitej dvanajstorice, katerega tvorijo zastopniki velešil brez kitajskih in japonskih delegatov, zavrgel svoj prvotni načrt glede kreiranja neutralne cone med japonsko in kitajsko armado v distriktu Činčow. Namesto tega bo Svet Lige narodov predlagal, koso reprezentante velešil v Tokiju, naj japonska vlada pristane na status quo v Mandžuriji.

To pomeni, da obe armadi obdržita svoji sedanjih pozicij in ohranita neutralno cono, ki že eksistira. Ta cona ne bi imela dočasnih mej in Japonci ne bi potrebovali formalnega pooblastila za kampanje proti banditskim topom.

Kitajci se baje strinjajo s tem predlogom, Japonci pa so bili si o tem obveščeni.

Zvezna pomoč za brez- poselne

Stevilo brezposelnih je večje kot se splošno priznava, je dejal senator Costigan

New York. — (FP) — Predlog, ki predviduje direktne federalne apropiacije, da se "ublaži trpljenje brezposelnih in prepreči morebitna nasilja," bo predložil kongresu zvezni senator Edward P. Costigan iz drave Colorado. To je nasnani na konferenci Natl. Consumers League, ki je zborovala v New Yorku. Delegati so sprejeli tudi več resolucij, v katerih so podprli stališče senatorja Wagnerja, ki urgira ustanovitev delavskih zbornic in prisiljeno zavarovanje proti brezposelnosti.

Costigan je dejal, da bi moral biti upravljanje federalnih skladov v rokah obstoječih kraljevnih odpomognih agencij, toda pod nadzorstvom federalne vlade.

"Statistike o številu brezposelnih so nezanesljive," je rekel Costigan, "in beda je večja kot se splošno domneva. Te statistike so povečinoma nanašajo na večja industrijska mesta, toda mi nimamo natančnih podatkov po podeželskih mest in krajev."

Costigan je kritiziral načrt, ki je pred par tedni objavil magnat Swope in kateri predviduje zavarovanje delavcev proti brezposelnosti. Ta načrt ne vsebuje nikakih provizij za ogromno delavsko maso, ki ni del določene industrije.

Proces proti češkim sanitarnim uradnikom

Chicago. — V pondeljek se je pričela sodniška obravnavna proti devetim uradnikom sanitarnega distrikta, med katerimi je tudi bivši predsednik sanitarnega odbora, Timothy J. Crowe. Otočeni so korupcije.

Najeli so celo armado nameščenje, ki niso niti delali, samo manjše plače so vleki in jo delili z otočenci. Na ta način je bilo v treh letih, od 1926 do 1929, zavrnjenih šest milijonov javnih denarja.

Garnor izvoljen za predsednika spodnje zbornice

Po dvanajstih letih so demokrati prišli na krmilo. Insurgentni v Wisconsins se pridružili demokratom

Washington, D. C., 8. dec. — Včeraj se je z običajnimi ceremonijami otvorilo zasedanje 72. kongresa. John Nance Garner, demokrat iz Texasa, je bil izvoljen za predsednika spodnje kongresne zbornice, prvi demokrat, ki se je povpel na to pozicijo v zadnjih dvanajstih letih.

Obe zbornici sta potem izvolili komitej, ki je obvestil predsednika, da je Kongres pričel s svojim delom in da je pripravljen razpravljati o priporočilih, ki jih namerava predložiti. Predsednik je informiral komitej, da bo predložil svojo letno poslanico danes.

Demokrati, ki so se povzpeli na krmilo v spodnji zbornici, so takoj podvzeli korake za formiranje programa, s katerim si bodo skušali pridobiti ugled med volilci v predsedniški kampanji v prihodnjem letu. Demokratični voditelji obeh zbornic so se po zaključku kongresne seje zbrali in izvolili komitej dvajsetih članov, katerih naloga bo, očrati smernice, katerih se bo stranka držala v kongresu.

Stirje insurgentni republikanci iz Wisconsina so se pridružili demokratom pri glasovanju za predsednika zbornice. Rekli so, da so to storili radi tega, ker ne bi mogli izvojevati svojih legišativnih ukrepov pod načelnikom Bertrandom Snellom, ki je bil kanidat regularnih republikancev proti Garnerju. Pri glasovanju je Snell prejel 207 glasov, Garner 218, pet glasov pa je dobil George Schneider, radikalni republikanc iz Wisconsina.

Washington, D. C., 8. dec. — Meddržavna trgovinska komisija je včeraj podala svoj odlok,

ki se nanaša na zvišanje voznih cen na tovornih vlakih za vse blago, izveni poljediske pri-

delke in živilo.

Dohodki železnic se bodo v smislu tega odloka povečali za sto milijonov dolari letno, ki se bodo porabili za posojila in finančno pomoč šibkejšim železnicam, ki so najbolj prizadete valed depresije. Odlok bo stopil v veljavno kakor hitro bodo železnike kompanije predložile formalno peticijo za revizijo prevoznih cen.

Železnice so prvočno zahtevali zvišanje cen za 15% na vse blago, kar pa je komisija odločila in potem sestavila svojo lestvico, ki bo v veljavni do 1. marca 1933, ako je ne bo komisija prej suspendirala, če se bo to videlo potreben.

Mukden, 8. dec. — Dve japonski ekspediciji, ki sta v nedeljo zapustili cono južnomandžurske železnice znamenom, da razprše banditske toipe v distriktil Caantu in Hsinmin, sta se včeraj vrnila v Mukden in poročali, da sta izvršili svojo misijo brez vashkih izgub.

Ekspedicija, ki je odšla v Cantu, se je vrnila z veliko zalogo vloženega in munitiona, ki je zamenil banditih. Porodilo se glasi, da so Japonci razorolili 5,500 banditov.

Glavni stan japonske armade poroča, da so kitajski banditi na vložili na japonski premogovnik v Nyuheitsland in napravili veliko škodo. Ujeli so nekoga japonskega uradnika ter njegovo društvo, ki so morali biti pred japonskim vojaštvom.

Detroit, Mich. — Marsikov niz je na jasnom, kaj je in kaj znači zakon za registriranje tujezemcev v Michiganu (Alien Registration Bill). V sledetem bom podal nekaj zgodovine o njegovem sprejetju in o akciji, ki ima namen zakon razveljaviti.

Organizacija prefriganih kapitalističnih politikov v Detroitu, znan Union League Club, je se stavila predlogo, naperjeno proti tujerodecem, za zaprtimi vrati in tako tajno je agitirala zanj med zanesljivimi poslanici. V času posljuji je ni opozoril, da bi z njo opozorila protivne javnosti ter izvajala boja proti predlogu.

Meseca aprila 1931 je bila predložena nižji zbornici michiganove zakonodaje v Lansingu in blizu takoj sprejeta. Pet tednov pozneje, ravno pred zaključkom zasedanja, je bila predložena še sečnata in po kratki debati sprejeti s tremi glasovi večine.

Javnost je tedaj že vedela, o tem gre, in tujerodeci so bili opozorjeni na nevarnost. Predloga sta odobrili že obve zbornic in taka je le že governarjeva podpisala, predno bi mogla postati zakon. Governerju so prideli razne organizacije in posamezni poslanci proteste proti postavi ter ga uigrali, naj ji odreže podpis.

The Mooney Case Today

Since I am leaving on a somewhat extensive speaking trip I am obliged to write this now. Specifically I am obliged to write it before hearing what sort of an argument Mayor Walker may make before Governor Ralph in favor of Tom Mooney. One thing I do want to say and say emphatically is this: Much of the newspaper criticism of the Mayor is maliciously unfair. There is no huge fund for the defense of Mooney out of which the Mayor or any other lawyer can get rich. The Mayor of New York in his capacity as an American citizen and as a lawyer has every right if he so desires to interest himself in a case as vitally important as the crime of holding Mooney and Billings in prison.

What does warrant some doubt about the Mayor's motive is the fact that his interest in Mooney was so belated and was not reflected in the attitude of his police to some early Mooney demonstrations that I can remember. Moreover as a champion of labor the Mayor has much to explain. For instance, his failure to settle the question of paying the prevailing rate of wages which is by law required of contractors who do city work; his failure to take any action for the protection of subway and bus workers who have the seven-day week; his stand on the organization of subway workers which in the long run proved favorable to the companies rather than to the men; and the action of his Police Department and some of the magistrates whom he appoints in labor cases when the workers are not protected by any sort of political pull.

But whatever the Mayor's motives on the Mayor's record, we wish him and his fellow lawyers success in freeing Mooney. It is not primarily the Mayor's fault that labor and other forces for justice in America have proved so weak that in the end we may owe to shrewd politicians and political juggling a terribly belated act of justice, which was long contemptuously denied to the friends of justice who stuck by Mooney and Billings from the beginning.

If this was all that a certain brother learned at the Fraternal Congress Convention in Canada and which he could have learned at the last SNPJ Convention, I say that the money spent by our Society to pay the expenses for his trip was well spent.

I was much surprised to read in Prosveta, in issue of November 18, 1931, an article in the Voice of the Members column by a certain brother who pleads guilty to the facts in my article "Changing World," that he opposed at the last SNPJ Convention an English-edited organ and a Lodge Conference composed from delegates of English-conducted lodges. Not only that by this brother in his article misrepresents by saying the Pioneer and Sunglare Lodges are in the same field when the facts are that the Pioneer Lodge is chartered to do business in Chicago, while the Sunglare Lodge is chartered to do business only in the suburbs of Chicago. In my opinion, if the Sunglare Lodge would ask the Supreme Board for permission to move to the SNPJ Hall so that it would be in the same field with the Pioneer Lodge, this party would be the first person in the world to object to the granting of this permission to the Sunglare Lodge, just as he appeared several years ago, before the Supreme officers, and objected to the issuance of a charter to the Integrity Lodge.

According to my analysis, the large Pioneer membership is primarily due to the following facts:
