Foreclosures Face Owners

Says E. C. Greenfield in Radio Talk Delivered Over WJAY

(Continued from last week)

The Home Loans and the letting up of eviction, all had a quieting influence on the activities of the organization. The result was that many members became inactive. They settled back among their dreams thinking that now Uncle Sam is their mortgage holder, he will save them in the future. They are now being rudely awakened from their dreams and see behind the smiling visage of Uncle Sam, the stern cruel features of their former banker. The government has withdrawn all further home loans and is insisting upon principal and interest on the threat of foreclosure. The government is letting the home owners know that it is not a charitable institution, but a cold blooded ally of the banker. Twenty out of every one hundred home loan borrowers are behind in their payments and are now facing foreclosure from the government.

The folding up of the Home Owners Loan Corporation, was a signal for every banker and real estate speculator to turn thumbs down on further liberal measures. The bankers are now foreclosing as rapidly as the courts can do the job.

Foreclosure increased 100% in 1935 over 1934. From 2,187 foreclosures in 1934, we jumped to 4,837 in 1935. The first three months of 1936 shows over 5,000 new cases of foreclosures filed in "Common Pleas" court, indicating a still greater increase for this year.

Foreclosure is not the only problem facing the small home owner, but it is the most pressing one for immediate attention. Only if the small home owner is alert to the situation, can we stop this attack from Wall St. The government must come forward with cheap loans on the basis of Home Loan bonds to take care of those who are now facing foreclosure at the hands of the bank. The bankers must make mortgage reductions to meet this critical situation.

People who are working and able to pay smaller sums are even being denied a chance to keep the home they have invested in, at inflated pre-depression prices.

One of central Europe's celebrated "harmony brotherhoods," the Belgrade University quartet of Belgrade, Yugoslavia, will be heard in Cleveland, Wednesday, September 23 under the auspices of the Yugoslav University Club of Cleveland.

The group will present its complete assortment of international songs at 8:30 p. m. in the Slovene Auditorium, St. Clair avenue and East 65 street.

The vocalists who have appeared in most of the European capitals and also in Turkey, Assyria and Asia, are accompanied by Sveti Popovich, special correspondent of the Belgrade Vreme (Times), who is assisting in the management of

the quartet's first American tour.

Popovich's primary mission is to "cover" the American presidential campaign for his newspaper.

The Belgrade quartet will deal generously from its wealthly repertoire of more than 450 songs embodying 15 languages to present a varied program for its Cleveland hearers.

Its concert will be offered in three sections, starting with popular Yugoslav (Slovene, Croat and Serb) folk songs and classical numbers, and ending with Roumanian, Hungarian, German, Turkish, Italian, Hindu and Russian numbers.

The quartet is composed of

four brothers, Jovan, Ivan, Branislav and Milan Maksimovich, ranging in age from 21 to 29.

Popovich formerly was editor of the Times in Belgrade, and for several years also served this journal as a special correspondent in Berlin and Paris.

As an added attraction the Yugoslav Slovene Club girls are enthusiastically co-operating with the University Club in an effort to make the concert a huge success. They plan to take charge of the annex and provide refreshments in the environment of a "Slovenska gostilna." They are planning to wear national costumes and create an altogether charming atmosphere.

Orels, Pioneers, Old Rivals, Tangle At Gordon's To Decide Eighth I-L Crown

Another Inter-Lodge ball season has been concluded and again the fans are being treated to a real Kentucky mountain feud between the Orels and the Pioneers who meet to settle that oft played argument: will the Orels or Pioneers bear the title of champion of the Inter-Lodge for the season of 1936? The first game of the championship series will be played Sunday afternoon at 2 p. m. on diamond 4, Gordon park.

The Orels know their business. The team has been together for years and has the championship spirit which should go a long way in causing trouble for the CFU men.

The pitchers will be Mike Funicic for the Pioneers and Tony Orzem, speed baller, for the Orels. They will have many dynamiters to face formidable among them men as Bajac, Zupancic, Brajic of the Pioneers and Ernie Zupancic, Marinko, Kurent, Intihar and Orzem of the Orels all of whom have been high in the league batting records.

It all seems to be a hot and interesting fight that in years past proved to be worth while for upwards to 3,000 fans to turn out.

The opening of the championship series will be marked by the free distribution to all fans of a souvenir scorebook, designed and printed in two colors, easily one of the most elaborate and distinctive score

books ever handed out at ball games. Names of players, interesting sidelights on the Inter-Lodge year and excerpts from I-L history should make the book an attractive keepsake. Over 5,000 copies are being printed for distribution at the games.
