TRUMAN APELI- RAL NA ARAB- SKE VODITELJE

Komisija za Palestino
predlagala ustanovitev
mednarodne armade

ZADEVA PRED VAR- NOSTNIM SVETOM

Washington, D. C., 17. feb.—Predsednik Truman je osebno posegel v palestinsko vprašanje z apelom na arabske vodite, naj preprečijo širjenje nasilja v Palestini, dočim je komisija Združenih narodov za Palestino predlagala ustanovitev mednarodne armade, ki naj bi izvedla načrt gledje razdelitve dežele na dve državi—židovsko in arabsko.

Trumanovo intervencijo je nznani njegov tajnik Charles G. Ross. "Da preprečita razširjenje izgredov in nemirov na Srednjem vzhodu," je rekel Ross, "sta Truman in ameriška vlada apelirala na zainteresirane vlade za podvzetje korakov v svrhu izboljšanja situacije v Palestini."

Apeli so bili naslovjeni voditeljem Arabske lige, katero tvorijo reprezentanti sedmih arabskih dežel. Te so Saudi Arabija, Egipt, Irak, Sirija, Lebanon, Transjordanija in Jemen. Vse vodijo opozicijo proti razdelitvi Palestine na dve državi. Zadevni načrt je bil sprejet na zborovanju generalne skupščine Združenih narodov 29. novembra.

Člani vlade Iraka so razkrili, da so prejeli Trumano poslanico z apelom, naj ta država uporablja svoj vpliv v prilog ublažitvi situacije v Palestini, kjer divijo bitke med židi in Arabci. Na apel so odgovorili s sugestijo, naj Amerika zavzame realno neutralno stališče v konfliktu med židi in Arabci v Palestini. Prosveiti minister Mohamed Ridha al Shabib je dejal, da odgovorni ameriški voditelji podpirajo žide v Palestini.

Člani komisije za Palestino so informirali varnostni svet, da zaključek glede razdelitve dežele ne bo izveden, ako ne bo formirana mednarodna armada. Nagnili so, da je bodočost organizacije Združenih narodov v nevarnosti.

Rusija izrekla na- daljnje obdolžitve

Amerika in Anglija
sta skušali skleniti
mir s Hitlerjem

Moskva, 17. feb.—Sovjetska unija je sinoči obdolžila Ameriko in Veliko Britanijo, da sta skušali skleniti mir z diktatorjem Hitlerjem, ko je bila vojna v razmahu. Tipali sta pri Hitlerju za hrbotom Sovjetske unije. Velika Britanija in Francija sta nameravali napasti Rusijo leta 1940, namesto da bi se borili proti nacistični Nemčiji.

Obdolžitev so v četrti seriji nacističnih dokumentov, katere je zasegla rdeča armada v Nemčiji. Odgovor so ameriškemu državnemu departmantu, ki je 21. januarju objavil dokumente o odnosih med Rusijo in Nemčijo pred izbruhom druge svetovne vojne.

"Zasezeni dokumenti dokazujojo," pravi ruska izjava, "da so se vršile pogajanja med reprezentanti Amerike, Velike Britanije in Nemčije v jeseni 1. 1941, 1. 1942 in 1. 1943 v Lizboni in Švicri glede sklenitve miru s Hitlerjem.

Reprezentant Amerike je bil Allan Dulles, brat Johna F. Dulles, republikanca in sedanega glavnega svetovalca državnega tajnika Marshalla. Allan je vodil pogajanja pod pseudonimom "Bull" v smislu navodil iz Bele hiše.

Reprezentant Nemčije je bil princ Max Hohenlohe, ki je imel tesne zveze z vladnimi krogmi nacistične Nemčije. On je bil predstavnik Hitlerja pod imenom "Pauls." Dne 13. septembra se je Aitken, sin britanskega lorda Beaverbrooka, sestal z Madžarom G. von Koeberjem, reprezentantom nemškega ministra za zunanjost zadeve. Aitken je v tekstu pogajanj direktno vprašal Koeberja: "Ali ne bi lahko za kušljami razpravljali o možnosti sklenitve miru?"

Sovjeti so tudi obdolžili Ameriko in Veliko Britanijo, da sta namenoma odlazili z odprtjem druge fronte v Evropi. Njun namen je bil uničenje rdečih armad v borbi s Hitlerjevo vojno mašino, da se ne bi Sovjetska unija ugnivala kot mogočna sila po zaključenju vojne.

New York. — (FP) — Kuksklanovci imajo novo geslo za boj proti unijam, zamorcem, židom, katoličanom in tujezemcem. "Borimo se naprej" je njihova nova parola. Okutani klanovci so se zagnali v novo kampanjo.

Namen klanovcev je, da razširijo svoje gibanje na vse države. Dobro polje za razvoj te bigitiske organizacije je zlasti v južnih državah. V nekaterih krajih imajo že močno postojanje in nove ustanavljajo.

Glavni vodja klanovcev Green je pred kratkim izjavil, da prejema pismo iz vseh krajev Združenih držav, v kateri želijo izvesti podatke o ustanavljanju novih kuksklarskih gnez. V ta namen bo postal večje število organizatorjev, ki bodo pomagali ustanavljati nove celice.

Novo klanovsko gnezdo se je pretekel mesec organiziralo v Chattanogi, Tenn., kjer imajo klanovci že par svojih postojank. Poročilo pravi, da je imela nova podružnica 298 članov ob ustanovitvji, dva tedna pozneje pa se je število že podvojilo.

Maglich je valed zapislosti, podal pismeno resignacijo kot podpredsednik družega okrožja. Na njegovo mesto bo glavni odbor pismeno izvolil novega distriktnega podpredsednika izmed kandidatov, ki jih bodo nominirala društva druga druga distrikta.

Vlada ustanovljena

v severni Koreji

Seoul, Koreja, 17. februar—Radikalno naznano iz severne Koreje, ki je pod rusko okupacijo, pravi, da je bila ustanovljena vlada, organizirana močna armada in razglašena demokratična ljudska republika. Neki soški ameriški uradnik je dejal, da sta vlada in republika lutka Rusije. Ustanovitev je odprta sankcionirala potrošnjo \$400,000 za ekonomsko in vojaško podprtje Grčiji in Turčiji, da se bosta lahko borili proti komunizmu.

Poročilo pravi, da je bila vsoča \$280,000,000 potrošena v prvih petih mesecih po spremjetju programu v Kongresu. Truman je priznal, da namen ni bil dosezen. "Grčija," je dejal, "je še vedno pod močnim pritiskom komunistične manjnine, ki hoče z orojjem vsliti svojo voljo ljudstvu. Ekonomsko okrevanje bo moralo čakati na ustanovitev notranje zaščite. Vojaška situacija v Grčiji se ni izboljšala."

Državni departmament je zadnji teden naznani, da bo Truman pozval kongres, naj dovoli dodatno vsočo za ekonomsko in vojaško podprtje Grčiji in Turčiji.

POROČILO O DRUŠTVENIH AKTIVNOSTIH

Oglešby, III.—To pot želim nekoliko poročati o naših aktivnostih in neaktivnostih. Pri nas je pač tako, kot povsod drugod, namreč da včasih pride na sejo le toliko članov, da lahko odpremo sejo, dasiravno naše društvo steje 158 članov v odraslem oddelek. Nekaj članov pa je, ki bi se radi udeleževali sej, a stanujejo izven mesta, dočim se bližnjem ne ljubi, ali pa se sploh ne zanimajo za društvo.

Tajnik je poročal lanskoto leto, da je v društvu polovico turojenih sinov in hčera slovenskih staršev. Kje pa so? Zakaj ne pridejo na sejo? Čudno se mi vidi, zakaj jih starši ne navorjavajo, da bi prestopili v društvo 750, ki posluje v angleščini, da bi se tam udejstvovali. Scosama bi se privadili in bolj razumeli pomen društva in jenote. Društvo 750 ima samo 32 članov. Vsako leto priredi božično, tako jo je tudi minuli božič, članice pa so pripravile okusno večerjo. Ševeda, tudi brez "ječmenovca" ni bilo. Med seboj so si tudi izmenjali darila. Imeli so tudi božično drevesce in člani mladiškega oddeleta so dobili bombončke in takto se je majhna skupina članov skupno z nekaj gosti prav fino zabavala. Oh, yes! Tudi plesali smo, in sicer po zvoki Jankovičevih plošč.

Od naše družine jih je osem pri društvu 750 SNPJ. Ti so: štiri hčere, dva zeta in dva enoletna člana v mladiškem oddelek. Torej sem imela posla s kampanjo kar doma. Sedaj skribim, da bodo ostali zvesti člani naši jednoti tudi potem, ko ne več ne bo. Zgodilo se je že večkrat, da so otroci pustili društvo, kakor hitro so umrli starši. Čestokrat nam tu rojen Slovenc ali Slovenka zabrusi v obraz: "I don't care to be a member of this organization, since I have enough insurance."

Tu imamo tri društva SNPJ. Pri vseh treh so moški in ženske. Društvo št. 155 bi imelo žensko društvo, a imajo nekatere matere svoje sinove pri sebi. Ali ne bi bilo bolje, da bi jih nagovorile, da bi včeli prestopne liste k angleško poslujočemu društvu št. 750? Nem, da bi bili tam bolj zadovoljni. Dajte jim priložnost. Vzpodbujajte jih, da se bodo zainteresirali za našo jednoto in skupno napredovali z našo organizacijo. SNPJ jim nudi športne aktivnosti in pri vsakem društvu imajo člani priložnost organizirati kegljaške skupine. Kegljaci društva 95 in 750 kegljajo pri raznih mestnih skupinah. Ali nam ne bi bilo v ponos in agitacijsko korist, ako bi videli na hrbitih kegljajev napis z velikimi črkami SNPJ? To je mogoče, le voditelja potrebujejo načelnički vred pa so ji načelovali in potiskali cene kvísku.

V preokretu cen iz inflacije so farmerji prvi, ki občutijo padec cen. To je neizbežno v vsakem gospodarskem sistemu, kjer cene niso stalne. In cene niso stalne nikjer, kjer so odvisne zgolj od zaloge in povpraševanja, ali od tako zvanega "svobodnega" trga. Cene je mogoče stabilizirati le pod efektivno vladno kontrolo, toda tudi to le pod dvema pogoja. Prvi pogoj je, da produkcija zadošča vsaj minimalnim potrebam vsega prebivalstva za vzdrževanje višjega ali nižjega življenjskega standarda. Kjer produkcija ni dovolj velika, je tudi vsaka vladna kontrola brez moči, pa bilo to pod kapitalizmom, socializmom ali komunizmom. Zadnja leta to pravilo potrjujejo vse kapitalistične države, kakor tudi Sovjetska Rusija. Vsled nezadostne proizvodnje za minimalne življenjske potrebe se je zadnja leta tudi v Rusiji razpasa velika inflacija, kateri je zadnjic napravil konec—vsaj začasno—z drastično notranjo valutno reformo.

Druži pogoj za stabiliziranje cen pa so—vladne subvencije, iz katerih država krije deficit onih industrij ali podjetij, ki svojih produktov ne morejo prodajati po določenih cenah in bi bila brez subvencij prisiljena zapreti vrata. To ekonomsko načelo je novo—iznajdba pokojnega angleškega ekonoma Maynarda Keynesa. Pod OPA se je subvencij posluževala tudi ameriška vlada, kakor se jih poslužuje Anglija še danes. Anglija je na primer edina vojna dejela izmed vseh, kjer se inflacija ni razobilnila. Cene na domačem trgu so le okrog 10% višje nego so bile pred vojno, plače pa blizu 25% višje. Višji so seveda tudi davki, toda revni sloji danes v Angliji bolje žive nego so živeli kdaj prej. Ta politika najbolj tepe imovite sloje, ki ne morejo izkoristiti takoj razkošno kakor so živeli pred vojno. Ampak Anglija je v gospodarskih škripeh kljub temu, da ne pozna inflacije. In sicer je v škripach zato, ker je za surovine in za okrog 40% živelnih potreb odvisna od tujine.

Kot rečeno, bodo farmerji najprej občutili padanje cen, kakor so poleg špekulantov tudi najprej želi njih diviganje. Cene poljskim pridelkom so na splošno čez 100% višje nego so bile leta 1939. Pšenica se je dvignila čez tri dollarje buselj. Skoraj tri dolarje je dosegla tudi koruza. Fantastične so bile tudi cene prvovrstne klavne živine—tudi čez 40c funt, kvalitetne svinje pa do 38c funt žive vase. Sorazmerno tudi skoraj vsi drugi pridelki.

Farmerjem človek prvoči dobre cene, kajti zaslužijo vsak cent. Toda te cene so tudi po mnemu mnogih razloženjih in manj sebičnih farmerjev previso in mora prej ali slej priti do padca. Previso cene namreč ubijajo tudi trg. Po mnemu poljedelskih ekonomov bi bile cene poljskih pridelkov še vedno dobre, odnosno primerne s sedanjimi plačami po industrijah, ako bi se znizale povprečno za okrog 25%—nekaterim pridelkom več, drugim manj. Mnogim farmerjem to seveda ne bo všeč. Toda slanina pa 75c funt, mleko čez 80c funt (povprečno), funt masla 85c ali še več, funt kruha 16 ali 18c—take cene so tudi previso. Če bi čital napredne liste mesto A. D. se bi bolje razumeli.

Kot običajno, tako smo tudi na zadnjem letnem seji sklenili, da darujemo \$10 bratu F. Kuharu, ki ne bo morda več sposoben za delo. Br. Kuhar je bil tako nesrečno poškodovan na delu pred mnogimi leti. Rad-čita napredne časopise in se zanimal za svetovne dogodke. Na bolniški listi so tudi sledne:

Europi, v Rusiji in na Balkanu, kakor tudi v Italiji. Tudi posvetki so precej večji nego lani.

Ta vest je na borzijane toliko vplivala, da so začeli potiskati cene navzdol. Kar se mesa in masla tiče, pa so velike zaloge, ker so bile gospodinje zadnje tedne "na stavki" vseled visokih cen in marsikje tudi vsled—izčrpjanju prihrankov. S tem v zvezi je zanimivo to, da je senator Taft otočil Trumanovo administracijo, da se boji padca cen . . .

SNPJ Supreme Board Reports and Decisions

Membership and Financial Progress of SNPJ in 1947; Total Membership 70,132, Total Assets \$13,470,886.48; Will Launch New Membership Campaign

The year 1947 was very successful for the SNPJ. At the end of the year the total membership was 70,123—50,490 adult and 19,642 juvenile members—or an increase of 1,883; total assets were \$13,407,886.48.

These figures were submitted at the annual meeting of the supreme board held last Thursday and Friday at the Society's headquarters. Present were all board members except Ray Travnik, 1st vice president, Frank Polsak of Roundup, Mont., and James Maglich of Oakdale, Pa., all of whom were unable to attend because of work. Bro. Maglich sent in his resignation because of duties in connection with his occupation and the board will elect a new vice president from candidates named by lodges in the 2nd district.

The meeting was harmonious and discussions concerned mainly the new membership campaign to be launched in celebration of the 35th anniversary of the juvenile department and the 10th anniversary of the juvenile units, as well as athletics and Prosveseta.

Juvenile Director Vrhovnik in the name of the executive committee, recommended that the drive be held during the last four months of this year; however, the board was of the opinion that a longer period would be better. The campaign will start in April and close in November, details to be worked out by the executive committee.

In connection with these two anniversaries the board urges all lodges and federations to sponsor celebrations. This year's SNPJ Day in Milwaukee on Labor Day will be dedicated to these anniversaries; also, the July issue of *The Voice of Youth* will be devoted to these jubilees.

Discussion on athletics centered largely on bowling as the most popular sport in the Society. Recommendation of the athletic board for larger sports appropriations was approved.

Elected to the new athletic board were: James J. Trofino (749), 1st district, Johnstown, Pa.; Harry Manges (6), 2nd district, Sygan, Pa.; Stanley Zupan (590), 3rd district, Cleveland; Joseph Golia (564), 4th district, Detroit; Frank Mihevc (105), 5th district, Indianapolis; Frank Groser (559), 6th district, Chicago; Marco Shapack (584), 7th district, Milwaukee.

A lengthy discussion on Prosveseta concerning three issues. First, editor's recommendation to print all commercial ads in the daily to allow more space for Slovene material in the weekly; recommendation was not approved because the daily has a deficit and needs funds; manager's report shows that last year's deficit was more than \$11,000 and it is estimated that this year's deficit will be about \$18,000. Due to this fact plus increasing costs, the board decided that negotiations with Enakopravnost for merger of both papers or to move Prosveseta to Cleveland be continued in order to preserve at least one progressive Slovene daily paper.

Discussion on Prosveseta political policy concerning the new political movement and the presidential candidacy of Henry A. Wallace. After pro and con discussion it was decided by all present with one dissenting vote to approve the present policy in principle, instructing the editorial department to follow the resolution adopted by the last convention concerning the need

PROGRAM FOR A NEW PARTY

(Concluded)

AGRICULTURE

In this period of allegedly great farm prosperity the average farm family and the average agricultural worker are still far below a decent American standard of living. For the protection of millions of small farmers and agricultural workers, we urge the following program:

- 1) Support of the family type farm by providing adequate, federally supported credit and financing for purchase and/or operational expense; expand rural programs of housing, education and health services.

2) Increased federal appropriations for rural electrification, soil conservation, and reclamation.

3) Defense of genuine farmer producer and consumer cooperatives from monopoly attack in Congress. The cooperative movement is a staunchly democratic element of American life which must be protected.

4) Development of river valley authorities—on the eminently successful TVA pattern—including the Missouri Valley Authority, the Columbia and California Central Valley projects, the St. Lawrence Seaway, and others; for extension of public power programs.

5) Extension of federal guarantees of rights of collective bargaining, minimum wages, social security and all other social legislation to agricultural workers; federal assistance for housing, health services and community services for agricultural workers.

6) Support of a comprehensive reforestation program, ensuring a substantial yield and preventing the continued erosion of our soil.

7) Full utilization of domestic farm labor supply be made before public or private importation of foreign workers for agricultural purposes be permitted.

8) Enact Federal legislation granting subsidies to tenant farmers and sharecroppers for purchase of land.

9) Finally, American participation in a world-wide effort to fight hunger through an ever normal granary under which agricultural producers and consumers would be guaranteed parity prices and foods shipped from surplus to deficit areas. The United States should end its sabotage of U.N. efforts to provide the F.A.O. with the necessary authority to carry out such a program.

SOCIAL WELFARE

There is a vital need for an enlarged program, financed by the Federal Government, to meet the health, the education, the general security and the culture requirements of the American people. We ask the government to encourage scientific research and training which has no ties to the military. We must warn of the dangers in several specious proposals now before Congress which would completely prevent the realization of the people's needs because they practice false economy, or because they surrender control to vested interests.

1) We support a nation-wide health insurance program and we

condemn the Taft charity bill. We urge especially the extension of the school health program, and an increase in the number of doctors, nurses and hospitals in rural areas.

2) We recommend a full revival of the school hot lunch program which will utilize the facilities of the Department of Agriculture, and provide funds for the expansion of existing school lunchroom facilities and service personnel. Such a program cannot be effected if the states are asked to carry the economic burdens as provided for by the present legislation.

3) We urge an integrated Federal system of social insurance, providing unemployment insurance at an adequate level with dependent benefits, old age benefits providing primary benefits of \$100 a month without a means test, and full medical care. We further urge that the present contributory system be abolished and the entire social security program be financed out of the general revenue.

4) We urge the extension of social security to include domestic and farm workers and self-employed persons.

5) We support the creation of a National Science Foundation for the encouragement of scientific research and training. The national legislature must divert existing scientific subsidies from military to productive use. In particular we urge the extension of the atomic energy program for peace time use in medicine and industry.

6) We recommend a Federal child labor law establishing the age of 16 as a minimum working age.

7) We recommend the establishment of an executive Department of Social Welfare.

8) We recommend Federal aid to the arts, including grants for the establishment of a national theater, and scholarships to students in the fine arts.

9) We urge Federal legislation for the establishment and support of child care centers and nursery schools for the benefit of all children, the reenactment of a government subsidized maternity act similar to the wartime emergency maternity act, and the extension of federal aid to dependent children to include allowances for all children in low income families.

Such is our program. It stems, not from factional interest, not from privileged greed, not from the lust of one group to exercise its power over another—but from the very heart of the people's needs. The people have a voice, and those who know the people, understand them and move among them cannot fail to hear that voice. It is a voice that asks for peace, for hope, for the future, so that our children may grow to healthy and secure manhood and womanhood, and in turn bear children of their own. Ours is a program for a free and prosperous and happy land, a land that will make the American dream of our fathers and their fathers come to fulfillment.

And the \$64 question now is: "Where do you fit into the profit picture?"

Speaking of General Electric, there's an aspect of its conduct that it's not taking any full-page ads to do any boasting about. On Jan. 14 GE, Westinghouse and eight other electrical equipment manufacturing firms were indicted by a federal grand jury in Los Angeles on charges of engaging in a price-fixing conspiracy.

The news has received little notice from newspapers, which earlier gave king-sized front-page headlines to a GE announcement that it had cut its prices—a move which this column previously exposed as little more than a smart publicity stunt.

Philippine Opinion Shifts as UN Parley Ends

MANILA—(ALN)—The recent conference of the United Nations Economic Commission for Asia and the Far East caused some significant shifts in Philippine opinion.

Before the conference, the Philippine press carried a welter of stories predicting its downfall because of Soviet obstruction. During the conference, however, Russia emerged as the only major power supporting the demands of the colonial countries for independence and industrialization. As a result, the conservative Manila Times said:

"It is easy to blame the Russians for their obstructive tactics. But a study of the obstructionism of the Soviet delegate reveals that, among other things, he obstructed unsuccessfully an effort to unseat a delegation representing some 50 million people; that he unsuccessfully obstructed an attempt to permit a single colonial power to retain within its hands full control of food distribution for Asia and the Far East."

"So Australia and the Netherlands who fought (successfully) against the Philippine resolution on food, and Australia, the Netherlands and the U.S., among others, who fought successfully against the seating of the Indonesians, could be called obstructive."
