Skoro tisoč tovarn zaprilo vrata zaradi ruske blokade

VAZNI RAZGOVORI V WASHINGTONU

Berlin, 20. jul. — Ekonomsko paraliza se širi v Berlinu, odkar so ruski oblasti odredile blokado. Večšči ameriške vojaške vlade so izjavili, da je skoro tisoč tovarn zaprilo vrata in da bo število brezposebnih delavcev poskočilo na 200,000 v tem tednu. Samo v ameriškem predelu Berlinu je 409 tovarn ustavilo obrat.

Ameriška in britska letala dovažajo premog v zapadni Berlin, doda oblasti priznavajo, da ne bo krije potreb industriji. Pred oklicem ruske blokade so vkljucili vozili premog v Berlin. Zaradi pomanjkanja premoga so zapadne države odredile znižanje potrabe električne sile. Neki ameriški uradnik je dejal, da je problem resen.

Nemška administracija Berlina je določila potrošnjo 75,000 mark (okrog \$22,500,000) za gradnjo javnih del. Brezposejni delavci bodo podirali stene razdejanih poslopij in lepšali parke.

Denarne reforme, katere so uveljavile zapadne države, povzročajo glavlob upraviteljem tovarn. Rusi nočejo pošiljati živil in drugih potrebcin v zapadni Berlin. Ameriška radio-poraba, da so Rusi razdelili želesnički prog med Berlinom in zapadno Nemčijo.

Dvanajst ruskih letal se je pojavilo v zračnem koridorju med Berlinom in zapadno Nemčijo. Maršal Vasilij Sokolovski je prej obvestil zapadne države, da bodo imeli ruski letali manevre v koridoru.

Washington, D. C., 20. jul. — Predsednik Truman je sklical konferenco članov generalnega štaba, ker se je kriza v Berlinu zaradi ruske blokade poostrial.

Naznanil je, da se bosta konference udeležili tudi John Foster Dulles, svetovalec newyorskega governerja Deweyja, predsednik škega kandidata republikanske stranke, in britski poslanik Oliver Franks. Dulles je imel razgovor z državnim tajnikom Marshallom pred sklicanjem konference.

Možnost je, da bodo Amerika, Velika Britanija in Francija naslovila nove note Moskvi za zahtevno, naj sovjetti prekličejo blokado zapadnega Berlina. Prejšnje proteste je sovjetska vlada zavrnila. V odgovoru je obdol-

žila zapadne države kršenja dogovorov in zaključkov, sprejetih v Jalti in Potsdamu.

SODNIK PREPOVEDAL RASNE IN VERSKE DISKRIMINACIJE

Charleston, S. C., 20. jul. — Federalni distriktni sodnik Julius W. Waring je izdal odredbo, ki prepoveduje rasne in verske diskriminacije in daje neomejeno pravico zamorcem do udeležitve primarnih volitev. Odredbo je izdal po viharni debati pred sodiščem. Sodnik je dejal, da bo vsak, ki bi kršil odredbo, obsojen v zapor.

Alan Johnstone, odvetnik in kandidat za zveznega senatorja, je bil odveden iz sodne dvorane, ko je protestiral proti odredbi. Waring je naznal, da bo v smislu odredbe izdal injunkcijo s prepovedjo rasnih in verskih diskriminacij.

"Registracijske knjige bodo odprte vsem strankam, je rekel sodnik. "Zamori in vsi drugi, ki so žrtve diskriminacij, se bodo lahko registrirali za primarne volitve 10. avgusta."

Pogajanja med unijo in kompanijo

Prizadevanja za odvrnitev stavke

Detroit, Mich., 20. jul. — Walter P. Reuther, predsednik unije združenih avtovih delavcev CIO, je direktno apeliral na Henryja Forda, naj podpre prizadevanja za odvrnitev stavke proti Ford Motor Co. Ford se je odzval apelu in se izrekel za obnovno pogajanji z unijo, ki so bila pretrgana 4. julija. V tovarnah kompanije v Detroitu in drugih mestih je uposlenih okrog 116,000 delavcev, članov unije.

Unija in kompanija sta nazznili, da se bodo pogajanja v svrhu sklenitve sporazuma z podgovni obnovili danes. Reuther je naslovil apel Fordu potem, ko je eksekutivni odbor unije soglasno odobril oklic stavke proti Ford Motor Co. V apelu je Reuther poudaril resnost situacije.

"Ako Ford Motor Co. gleda na situacijo v isti luč kot unija, je obnova pogajanji potrebna," je rekel Reuther. Ford je odgovoril, da so reprezentanti kompanije pripravljeni za pogajanja z unijo.

Akcija eksekutivnega odbora unije je odstranila zadnjo oviro za oklic stavke. Bila bi druga velika stavka v tem letu. Unija je pred nekaj meseci oklicala stavko proti Chrysler Motor Co., katera je trajala 17 dni. Končana je bila, ko je kompanija pristala na zahtevo za zvišanje plače.

Ford Motor Co. je ponudila avtovim delavcem zvišanje plače za 13 centov na uro in druge koncesije. Unija zahteva zvišanje plače za 14 centov na uro in uključevanje klavzul o socialni zaščiti delavcev v pogodbo. Pri glasovanju zadnjini teden se je ogromna večina delavcev izrekla za oklic stavke proti Ford Motor Co. Pričakuje se, da bo prišlo do sporazuma med unijo in kompanijo in da bo stavka odvrnjena.

Poleg škufo je obtoženih pet nun in trije duhovniki, ki pomagači Čulića.

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"Razbijanje" trustov

Ko je bil lani pred kongresom Taft-Hartleyjev osnutek, je do nela tale pesem: "Velebitnis je bil reformiran in je pod vladno kontrolo. Zdaj je čas, da vlada reformira in regulira tudi delavske unije." S pomočjo tega argumenta, katerega privlečejo na dan sploh pri vsaki antidelavski zakonodaji, smo dobili tudi T-H zakon, s katerim zdaj že spridno davijo unije. Ampak to je še začetek, kajti po predpisanim procesu bo šlo to davljene počasi, toda sigurno. Zakon je sestavljen tako premeten, da bo to davljene zaobrnile proti unijam tudi marsikakšnega "rank and filerja".

Oglejmo si nekoliko, kako je velebitnis "reformiran" in koliko je vredna ta vladna "kontrola". Najprvo nekaj o jeklarskem trstu.

Ta trust "razbijajo" in "regulirajo" domalega že 40 let, odnosno odkar je bil sprejet zvezni antitrustni zakon proti koncu zadnjega stoletja. Ta trust je "razbil" zvezha vlada okrog leta 1910. Nasiteljica tega trusta je bila U. S. Steel korporacija, kakor je tudi še danes. Na odlok vrhovnega sodišča je Wall Street moral ustavoviti več "neodvisnih" korporacij. Toda v antitrustnem zakonu je neka velika luknja, skozi katero lahko uide vsak trust. In zgodilo se je, da je U. S. Steel Corp. večino "neodvisnih" jeklarskih korporacij zopet povezala v svojo mrežo kot "neodvisne" filialke.

Pričačna sila tega monopola je bil tako zvani "Pittsburgh Plus Plan". Na podlagi tega načrta so vse jeklarske družbe prodajale jeklo in železo po enotnih, ki je monopolističnih cenah. Baza za te enotne cene je bil Pittsburgh.

Federalna obrtna komisija, v področje katere spada "reguliranje" velebitnisa — izven železnice, katere "regulira" zvezna meddržavna trgovinska komisija — ta obrtna komisija je odredila, da mora biti "Pittsburgh Plus" plan konec. Wall Street, ki poleg drugih industrijskih kontrolira jeklarski trust, ni bil dolgo v zadregi. Mastno plačani korporacijski odvetniki so kmalu potem iznašli "Multiple Basing Point" plan, ki je v bistvu enak kakor "Pittsburgh Plus". Po tem načrtu določajo monopolistične cene že z nekoliko drugačnimi, bolj premetenimi triki, katerim "razbijalcem" pridejo težje do živega.

Ob prelomu zadnjega stoletja je bilo v deželi veliko krika tudi proti Rockefellerjevemu olinemu trstu. Vlada je tudi ta trust "razbil" in "reformiral" na sličen način kakor v jeklarski industriji. Iz prvotne Standard Oil je nastala veriga "neodvisnih" družb — Standard Oil of New Jersey, Standard Oil of Ohio, Standard Oil of Indiana, Standard Oil of California in še par drugih. Glavni gazda teh "neodvisnih" in "reformiranih" kompanij, ki so se razvile v prave velikane, so še vedno ostali Rockefellerjevi interesi, ki imajo v New Yorku tudi multimiliardsko banko — National City Bank. "Zainteresirani" so seveda še v marsikakšno družbo in velekorporanco.

Kakšna je "konkurenca" v tej industriji, je znano vsakemu, ki kupuje kurivno ali strojno olje ali gasolin. In to kljub temu, da tem polju "konkurirajo" z Rockefellerjevimi Standard Oil družbami tudi Mellonovi, angleški in holandski, Sinclairjevi in še nekateri drugi interesi.

Vse skupaj je velika farsa, kar se tiče "reforme" in "kontrole". In sicer ne samo v jeklarski in oljni industriji, marveč tudi v vseh drugih monopolističnih industrijah, ki so hrbitenca in največja značilnost ameriškega kapitalizma. Zvezna obrtna komisija je izdala že nič koliko odlokov pod znamko "cease and desist (prenehajte in končajte)", toda monopolisti se za te ukaze le malo ali nič zmenijo. Samo nekaj primerov:

Deset kompanij, ki monopolizirajo solni trg, je že pred šestimi leti prejelo "ukaz" od zvezne obrtne komisije, da morajo prenehati z "zarotniškim" določanjem monopolističnih cen, toda solni trust se ne zmeni. Prav tako se ne zmenijo za tožbo, katero je justični department naperil proti njim že pred desetimi leti. Ta tožba je seveda na mrtvi točki kakor stotin sličnih "antitrustnih" tožb.

Slično je justični department že pred 20 leti naperil proti osmim steklarskim drugbam, ki tudi z "zarotami" monopolizirajo trg za steklo. Tudi ta tožba je na mrtvi točki.

Enako je tudi z mlekom, ki je vsakdanja potreba slehernega otroka in tudi odraslega. Prav za prav je tukaj še slabše, kajti na eni strani ima poljedelski department nalog od Kongresa, da pomaga ustvarjanju mlekarške truste za velemesta. Justični department pa, da jih "razbijajo". Tako je zvezna oblast na eni strani dela roko v roki z mogočnimi mlekarškimi družbami, ki so povezane v National Dairy Co., pri ustvarjanju monopolističnih "milk sheds" ali mlekarških okrožij, ki zlagajo velemesta, seveda po enotnih ali monopolističnih cenah. Na drugi strani je po federalna obrtna komisija izdala ukaz "cease and desist" proti Sheffield Farm Co., ki je ena največjih razpečevalcev mleka v deželi. Ukaz se je glasil, da mora "končati in prenehati s kontroliranjem in dominiranjem farmskih zvez," ki se pečajo z mlekom. Resnica je, da mlekarški trust, poljedelski department in farmsarske zveze, ki zlagajo velemesta, povsed delajo roko v roki. Ta trust na eni strani molze farmarje, na drugi pa odjemalce. Oboji, to je mlekarški farmarji in mlekarški trust, so pa solidarni v zahtevi po čim večjem obdavčenju rastlinskoga masla (oleomargarina), ki je prav tako redilno in zdravo in vsebuje iste kemične snovi kakor pravo maslo. Edina razlika je v tem, da je veliko cene. Zato hočejo ta konkurenčni produkt ubiti z visokimi zveznimi in državnimi davki.

Lahko bi našeli še nebroj primerov, kako je vlada "reformirala" velebitnisa in kako ga "kontrolira". Kot receno, so vse te "reforme" in "regulacije" največja farsa — pesek v oči ljudstvu, da ga z blufarijo drže v tem. Te blufarije so potrebne, ker bi drugače jutrost zahtevalo — podprtanjeno ali socializiranje vseh monopolističnih industrijskih in korporacij. Tega se pa wallstreetarji in njihih intelektualni valpeti najbolj boje.

JUVENILE CIRCLES IN THE NEWS

One of the goals set for 1948 was to organize ten new Juvenile Circles, one for each of the ten years they have been in existence. We started out well enough in the earlier months by organizing three new Circles, one in Anaconda, Montana and two at St. Louis, Missouri, and also by reorganizing two others which had been dormant for a number of years, one at Warren, Ohio and another at Cleveland. Then followed a period of two whole months in which not one Circle was added to the roster, although easily a dozen lodges requested and received instructions on how to organize their juveniles. It is disappointing to note that a great many lodges, having upwards of a hundred juvenile members and located in prosperous growing communities, do not have a Circle and, furthermore, do not appear interested in promoting activities intended to draw the young people closer to the SNPJ. This, we believe, is a serious mistake, one that every active lodge should remedy as soon as possible, especially this year when we are celebrating two important juvenile anniversaries.

Now comes good news from Fontana, California informing us that a new Juvenile Circle was organized there on Saturday, June 19. Sister Lorene (Brezovec) Richter, a former Chicago girl who moved there a few years ago, is the Director. She reports that despite an epidemic of measles which had broken out a short time before, the attendance of the opening meeting was good, officers were elected for the ensuing months, activities were discussed and apparently everyone was very happy to be present at the birth of a new Circle. The west coast is now represented by two Juvenile Circles, the first having been organized about a year ago at Los Angeles, some seventy miles from Fontana. WHAT A NEW WORLD WAR WOULD MEAN

And How Slavic Americans Can Help Prevent It

By GEORGE PIRINSKY, Executive Secretary of the ASC

As the crucial November elections draw nearer, the central issue of peace or war becomes more apparent to the people. This in spite of the efforts of the bi-partisans and the press to confuse and befuddle the issue in a maze of high-sounding phrases for freedom and democracy.

It is around this all-important question of peace or war that all other problems of our economic and political life revolve today. It is this issue that most concerns Slavic Americans, as it does all other Americans and all other nations.

Alert Slavic Americans realize that a new war, as now planned by our militarists and bi-partisan politicians, will primarily but not exclusively, be a war against the Slavic countries of Eastern Europe—a war against those who fought so gallantly and suffered so much for our common victory over Nazi Germany.

An American of Macedonian descent, I have already experienced the very painful feeling of seeing American bullets and bombs killing my Macedonian people in the northern part of Greece in an undeclared war. There are about 150,000 Macedonian Slavs in Aegean Macedonia and Salonika as the main center. These Macedonian Slavs are taking an active part in General Marko's Democratic Army of Greece and are among the best and most courageous fighters against Greek fascism. Right now the United States, in the name of the Truman doctrine, is encouraging the killing and extermination of these anti-fascist fighters in Greece. We are upholding a decadent monarchy there which has sold Greece to American oil interests and which acts as an obedient servant of our Wall Street "economic royalists."

Recently our American newspapers carried pictures of Greek royalists soldiers, by mistake to be sure, riding American mules and proudly carrying their trophies of war—severed heads of Partisans. As I looked at these pictures, I felt the only thing missing was the caption: "The Truman doctrine in action."

To us Americans of Macedonian descent and to Greek Americans, as to the people in the old country who are fighting in the mountains, the Truman doctrine is not different from the doctrine of Adolf Hitler. Even the arguments of their authors are the same. Like Truman, Hitler contended in his day that his aim was to stop Communism. It was in the name of this Nazi "crusade" against Communism that the German army of occupation and the "Security Battalions" of Greek quislings committed outrageous crimes against the Greek people. Today it is in the name of the same "crusade" against Communism that American officers are leading Greek monarch-fascists to even greater terror and atrocities as the dislodged heads of Partisans show.

Czechoslovakia not another Greece
One can understand the bitterness of our policymakers toward the new government of Czechoslovakia, which robbed them of the opportunity of doing in Czechoslovakia what they have been doing in Greece for twelve months. Secretary Marshall reached the height of hypocrisy when he declared that a "reign of terror" grips Czechoslovakia while supporting the "reign of democracy" in royalist Greece where strikers are being shot and Partisan heads are chopped off.

What has been taking place in Greece shows what might take place tomorrow in other Slavic countries and in other parts of the world if our American monopolists and militarists are allowed to throw the world into a new war.

In such a war, we Slavic Americans will be asked to bear arms against our Slavic brothers and sisters; in such a war we will be asked to join with Greek royalists, Turkish fascists and Hitlerites of Western Germany in killing the people of our lands.

Polish Americans, for instance, will be forced to join with the German Nazis under American command in the complete destruction of Poland and the extermination of the Polish people. If U.S. militarists and "economic royalists" have their way, Polish Americans, the descendants of Kosciuszko and Pulaski, will be forced to help achieve what Hitler could not achieve—the extermination of the Polish nation.

The same will be true of Americans of Czech, Slovak, Yugoslav and Russian descent.

Slavic American steel and auto workers of Pittsburgh, Detroit, Gary and other industrial centers of America will be forced to produce guns, tanks, planes and bullets for the murder of their kinsmen in the Slavic lands, already ruined by the Nazis in the last war.

Another ugly aspect of such a war for Slavic Americans is the fact that they would be pronounced "traitors" to America. It would not matter much whether one would actively oppose the war or silently approve of it. Having a Slavic name would be cause enough for suspicion and persecution.

This, in practical terms, is what a new war will mean to Slavic Americans, in addition to other aspects of such a war such as the

pressed the feeling of the vast majority of our people at the time of Michael's visit to the White House when he wrote:

"Surely the shades of past generations of republican-loving Americans must write at the thought that the democracy they created is now smiling benignly on kings and ex-kings as the champions of freedom against tyranny."

These "exiles" and the reactionary leaders of several Slavic American organizations are the chief agents through whose efforts and propaganda our American instigators of a new war hope to gain the support of Slavic Americans for an attack on the Slavic countries. Charles Rozmarek and Judge Blair Gunther work hand in hand with Miklosayczyk in carrying out the instructions of their bipartisan masters in Washington. They are poisoning the minds of conservative Polish Americans, making them an easy prey of the current war hysteria. The same is true of the role which people like Joseph Martinek and the Papanek-Slavik alliance are playing among Czech and Slovak Americans. These people remind one of the role of the Ukrainian nationalists, the Bulgarian fascists and the followers of Tiso, Pavelich and Nedich in the service of Hitler during the war.

The recent and provocative act of these "exiles" was their brazen request to the chairman of the Security Council for an investigation of "Soviet Aggression" in Bulgaria, Hungary, Yugoslavia, Rumania, Poland and Albania. This is another attempt to strain still further relations between the United States and the Slavic and other Eastern European countries. Here is another indication that Miklosayczyk, Dimitroff and Nagy of the so-called International Peasant Union, with headquarters in Washington, are openly calling for war against their native countries. It is the only means by which they can hope to regain their former positions as disrupters of national unity and to restore the old anti-people's regimes.

Is This The American Way of Life?
Is it not a sad commentary on our democracy, on our American way of life, that the leaders of the United Mine Workers of America and the union itself, in whose ranks there are so many Slavic American workers, have been sentenced by a Federal Court to pay a fine of \$1,400,000, for the alleged crime of having dared fight for an old age pension of \$100 a month for every miner over 62 years of age? One can imagine the impression this news created, let us say, in the countries of Eastern Europe where our policymakers and our press tell us, there is no democracy. It happens that in those countries workers were granted old age pensions by their governments in appreciation of their service to the nation. One can almost hear those workers telling us to keep our kind of democracy for ourselves.

Then the case of the strike of the New York Stock Exchange employees. Newspapers and newsmen recently showed policemen clubbing the strikers mercilessly. Their Gestapo-like sadism even extended to women. The sight of workers being dragged on the sidewalks with blood streaming from their pain-twisted faces is unspeakable. Most of these workers are former G. I.'s. They are the people who fought for the destruction of fascism, only to find it now in their own country, striking out against them right at their places of work! One can imagine what goes on in the minds and hearts of these former G. I.'s when they are dragged to jail like so many criminals. When one looks at these pictures and then reads in the next column pious phrases about how this country respects and defends the dignity of the individual, and how we stand ready to lend a helping hand to the "poor creatures" in those "barbaric" countries of Eastern Europe, one is sickened by this brazen hypocrisy.

Such is the meaning of the activities of these Eastern European agents of American imperialism, and such are the implications of the pro-war program of our policymakers in Washington.

There is no question that a new world war would be a war of special horrors for Slavic Americans. Is it then difficult to understand that the fight for peace is the central issue, the crucial task before all people's organizations, such as our American Slavic Congress, and before all Americans who remain true to the democratic traditions of our country?—*(The Slavic American)*

World Oil Trust Robs Americans, O'Mahoney Insists

U. S. and Foreign Price-Fixing Combine Is Pocketing Millions Of Europe-Aid Dollars

The "World-Wide Oil Trust" is robbing the American people of millions of the hard-earned dollars they are contributing to rebuild Europe under the "Marshall plan." That is the meaning of a telegram sent by Senator Joseph C. O'Mahoney (Dem., Wyo.) to the presidents of two gigantic American oil companies and to a "subsidiary" in the Middle East.

The telegram is of extraordinary importance, for three reasons. First, it makes serious charges. O'Mahoney is one of the Senate's most conspicuous leaders and is an authority on the petroleum industry. Third, because of the size and international connections of the companies concerned.

The wire went to Eugene Holman, head of Standard Oil of New Jersey; B. B. Jennings, president of Socony-Vacuum, another Standard company, and Terry Duce, who heads "Aramco," a subsidiary of Standard of California and the Texaco Company.

U. S., British, Dutch, French

Aramco has vast oil concessions in Saudi Arabia, Standard of New Jersey and Socony—with British, Dutch and French interests—share concessions in Iraq, another Arab country in the Middle East.

O'Mahoney asked the three presidents their "opinion as to the possibility of abolishing the world system" which fixes the prices of petroleum.

This system, the senator declared, "compels the Economic Cooperation Administration" or "E. C. A." as the Marshall plan is now called, "to pay for Middle East Oil" as though it were produced in the United States, purchased at Texas Gulf ports, and transported by tanker to the shores of the Mediterranean Sea," near the Middle East.

"Aburdly" High Prices

"This payment of phantom freight from Texas on oil produced in the Middle East adds about 100 per cent to the price which the American people must pay for the oil which is being bought by the E. C. A. O'Mahoney declared.

Right now, he pointed out the E. C. A. is using "more than \$50 million" of the American people's

money to buy Middle East oil. The world-wide system which fixes "aburdly" high prices for this oil is, therefore, "of vital concern" to our people.

This oil price fixing is done by methods similar to the cement industry's "basing point system," recently ruled by the Supreme Court to be in violation of the anti-trust laws, O'Mahoney explained.

No Competition

"Under the present world pricing system for petroleum there is no competition among any of the companies—either American or foreign—which produce oil in the Middle East."
