More News from the 12th SNPJ Convention

The Twelfth Regular Convention of the Slovene National Benefit Society in session now in Pittsburgh at the Fort Pitt hotel was constituted at its fourth meeting after all the convention committees were duly elected.

Some of the main decisions—particulars are being published daily in Prosveta and also in the weekly—include the following:

Eveleth, Minnesota, was selected as the next convention city; the 13th convention will take place there in 1945. It was a close race at first between Detroit and Eveleth and the run-off election resulted in 201 votes for Eveleth and 119 for Detroit.

At the Friday session several important resolutions were approved.

The first of these concerns the publications of the SNPJ (published elsewhere in this issue).

The second resolution gives support to the Yugoslav Relief Committee, Slovene Section, and authorizes the Executive Committee to donate \$5000 from the Special Benefit fund for this purpose.

The third resolution establishes an old age fund, places \$10,000 from the Special Benefit fund into the old age fund and increases assessment five cents.

The fourth resolution condemns dictatorships and vigorously supports democracy, approves Roosevelt's foreign policy and trusts that the United States will stand on the side of England and Russia in their struggle to crush Nazi Germany.

At the seventh session on September 17, the assembly sent the following message of greetings and pledges to Franklin Delano Roosevelt, President of the United States, Washington, D. C.:

The twelfth regular convention of the Slovene National Benefit Society representing more than sixty thousand members throughout United States send you its cordial greetings and pledges the undivided support of its membership for the progressive and humane policies of your administration at home and abroad. We stand firmly behind your program of defense for American democracy by aiding those who are fighting the scourge of Hitlerism and applaud your great efforts for a world of freedom and justice for all nations, great and small.

Another important resolution states that the SNPJ will support the political movement to liberate all Slovenes in Primorje (Coastland), Carniola, Styria, Carinthia and Hungary and strive to unite them into one state, either in a European or Danubian Federation or in a new Jugoslavia, which shall be a federated and democratic republic.

The SNPJ is in accord with the present action of the Yugoslav government in London, which rose against Hitler and continues its struggle on the side of the democracies.

At the same time, the SNPJ condemns any separatism among Jugoslavs.

The Prosveta is to write in this spirit, and the Supreme Board to cooperate with all organizations which agree with this program.

This resolution was accepted unanimously.

Still another resolution authorizes the Executive Committee and the Supreme Board as a whole to support athletics in our lodges, our cultural institutions and the Common Council for American Unity.

Two more important resolutions were unanimously approved at the Monday (September 21) session, both of which will, no doubt, be accepted by the membership enthusiastically.

The first of these resolutions concerns the Juvenile Circles. An annual appropriation of \$5000 was voted for the promotion of Juvenile Circles.

The second resolution gives the soldier-members various special privileges while they are in the U. S. Army, Navy and Air Corps.

The convention approved the by-laws committee recommendation for seven additional supreme board members—namely, two new district vice-president posts; an assistant supreme secretary; a juvenile and athletic director; two additional supervisory committee members, and a supreme medical examiner.

Incomplete election returns of the new Supreme Board members show the following results:

- Vincent Cankar, Supreme President of SNPJ (re-elected).
- Mike Kumer, First Vice President of SNPJ (first term).
- C. Zarnick, Second Vice President of SNPJ (first term).
- F. A. Vider, Supreme Secretary of SNPJ (re-elected).
- Wm. Rus, Assistant Secretary of SNPJ (new post).
- Lawrence Gradisek, Secretary of Sick Benefit Dept. (re-elected).
- Mirko Kuhel, Supreme Treasurer (first term).
- Mike Vrhovnik, Director of Juvenile Circles and Athletics (new post).
- Philip Godina, Manager of SNPJ publications (re-elected).
- Ivan Molek, Editor of SNPJ publications (re-elected).

By the time this issue of Prosveta reaches our readers, the Twelfth Regular Convention of the Slovene National Benefit Society will be adjourned. More convention news will appear here next week.

A Resolution Relating to the Publications of the SNPJ

(Adopted at the 12th convention)

In order to widen its sphere of action, to educate and to inform its membership, the Slovene National Benefit Society publishes regularly two publications, which are the Prosveta daily, and the Mladinski List, a monthly for juveniles.

The Prosveta is published daily except on Saturdays, legal holidays and the First Day of May. If the legal day or the First of May happens to coincide with the date otherwise regular issue of the paper, the Mladinski List is published regularly every month.

The Prosveta shall serve primarily as a propaganda for the SNPJ, and in addition to that, it shall promote popular education and cultural aspirations in terms consonant with liberal, economic and social democracy and free thought. Prosveta shall support bona fide labor unions and cooperate with the policy of the Prosveta in regard to politics shall be determined by the Supreme Board in accordance with need and conditions.

The Supreme Board of the SNPJ is herewith authorized to give the Daily Prosveta financial assistance from the Administrative Fund of the Society in case the existence of the paper should be threatened. Furthermore, the Supreme Board of SNPJ shall have the right to interpret and to render decisions to which controversial matters (polemics) are injurious to Prosveta and the Society and are for that reason unpermissible. The Supreme Board shall also have the right to allow the printing of special publications if the interests of the Society justify such action.

The Executive Committee of the SNPJ is herewith authorized to make, in cooperation with the Editor and the Manager, Publications, any and all changes which may become necessary on account of need and circumstances, in regard to subscription advertising prices, the size, number of pages and other similar matters relating to Prosveta and Mladinski List. The subscription under which the Daily Prosveta may be taken in exchange up to five weekly issues within one family may be maintained in the future.

The Mladinski List, which is intended for the membership of the Juvenile Department of the SNPJ, shall be edited in the Slovene and English languages, in popular style, and in harmony with democratic and free thought ideals.

My Week

At this writing, Pittsburgh, our convention city, is still humming with various activities as the SNPJ quadrennial assembly is drawing to a close. Thousands of Slovenes throughout the city are following with great interest the daily reports in Prosveta.

Several noteworthy decisions and resolutions were adopted by the convention last week. Foremost of these, it seems, is the decision that the name of the SNPJ even after the merger ratification shall remain intact. Thus it will continue to serve its useful purpose for many years to come, as it has during the past 20 years.

A very important resolution, adopted almost unanimously by the convention, is the one supporting President Roosevelt's foreign policy. At such critical times it is necessary that we declare ourselves openly and strongly against our common enemy and give the President our full support.

Another important resolution is one taking a strong political stand in regard to our people across the sea. The resolution demands that action be taken to bring about the complete unification of all Slovenes in Carniola, Primorje, Carinthia, Styria, and in Hungary, into one state.

In accordance with this, the convention authorized the Executive Committee to contribute \$5000 in the name of the Society for the Jubilee Relief Committee fund. Both coming at this crucial period, are worthy of the delegates and as our representatives at the current convention of the largest and strongest Slovene organization.

Our trip over the last week-end to Paw Paw, Michigan, was full of pleasures and pleasant surprises. Paw Paw, a distance of about 140 miles from Chicago, is situated in the heart of the wine growing region of the famous fruit belt in Michigan's Lower Peninsula. There were more than a score of Slovene and Croatian farms in its immediate vicinity, and most of the families are members of SNPJ lodge 539, Slovene Farmer, in Paw Paw.

We enjoyed the friendly hospitality of the Turk and Vichich families, with whom we attended the annual grape festival in Paw Paw and witnessed the rare spectacle of the water parade on Maple Lake. We visited the grape exposition at the Concord, Delaware and saw grapes produced in the surrounding vineyards were displayed. We also captured two first prizes and a second prize with their grapes.

Minutes of Twelfth Regular Convention of Slovene National Benefit Society

Held at Fort Pitt Hotel, Pittsburgh, Pa.
Opening Session, September 13, 1941

(Merger Agreement—Continued)

I. ASSUMPTION OF ASSETS AND LIABILITIES.

The SLOVENE NATIONAL BENEFIT SOCIETY will take over the receipts and assets of SLOVENE PROGRESSIVE BENEFIT SOCIETY, assume all the liabilities, as hereinafter provided, and conduct its business as tho the members thereof had originally made application for membership in the SLOVENE NATIONAL BENEFIT SOCIETY.

II. ASSUMPTION OF BENEFIT CERTIFICATES.

The SLOVENE NATIONAL BENEFIT SOCIETY shall and does hereby assume and reinsure as of the effective date of this Agreement, the benefits provided by the SLOVENE PROGRESSIVE BENEFIT SOCIETY under all benefit certificates or contracts, including sick benefits, operation benefits, disability benefits, including waiver of premiums, double indemnity, supplementary contracts, including any trust fund agreements arising out of the issuance of a certificate of insurance, issued or assumed by the SLOVENE PROGRESSIVE BENEFIT SOCIETY, and outstanding and in force on the books and records of the society on the effective date of this Agreement, subject however to any and all defenses against claims and actions upon said benefit certificates or contracts which would have been available to the SLOVENE PROGRESSIVE BENEFIT SOCIETY had this Agreement not have been made and entered into.

III. CURRENT LIABILITIES.

The SLOVENE NATIONAL BENEFIT SOCIETY assumes and agrees to pay in full all lawful current bills and pending obligations including lawful claims for matured endowments, if any, and for deaths occurring prior to the effective date of this Agreement, together with any and all legitimate claims for sick, disability, or other benefits heretofore provided by the SLOVENE PROGRESSIVE BENEFIT SOCIETY.

IV. MEMBERSHIP.

The membership (adult and juvenile) of the SLOVENE PROGRESSIVE BENEFIT SOCIETY hereby transferred shall be subject to and shall be governed by the laws of the SLOVENE NATIONAL BENEFIT SOCIETY in force at the effective date hereof and as hereafter amended, and the benefit certificates of the SLOVENE PROGRESSIVE BENEFIT SOCIETY hereby reinsured shall be governed by the laws of the SLOVENE PROGRESSIVE BENEFIT SOCIETY as the same are in force at the effective date hereof, except as hereinafter modified, and such laws, of the SLOVENE NATIONAL BENEFIT SOCIETY as are not in conflict with the laws of the SLOVENE PROGRESSIVE BENEFIT SOCIETY. Provided, however, that the membership and the benefit certificates shall at all times be subject to and be governed by amendments to the constitution and laws hereafter adopted or enacted by the SLOVENE NATIONAL BENEFIT SOCIETY. The officers of the SLOVENE NATIONAL BENEFIT SOCIETY shall have the same power to enforce and administer the laws of the SLOVENE PROGRESSIVE BENEFIT SOCIETY as would the officers of the SLOVENE PROGRESSIVE BENEFIT SOCIETY have had had this contract not been entered into.

V. REINSTATEMENT.

The SLOVENE NATIONAL BENEFIT SOCIETY shall give to each and every member of the SLOVENE PROGRESSIVE BENEFIT SOCIETY now under suspension the privilege of reinstating his or her benefit certificate or certificates subject to the provisions of this Agreement and compliance with the Constitution and Laws of the SLOVENE NATIONAL BENEFIT SOCIETY pertaining thereto. Upon reinstatement the lapsed certificate shall be treated as if it were in force on the effective date of this Agreement.

VI. TRANSFER PRIVILEGES.

Members of the SLOVENE PROGRESSIVE BENEFIT SOCIETY shall have the privilege of surrendering their benefit certificates and receiving in exchange therefor new certificates without charge for issuance thereof, in equal or lesser amounts of any plan then used by the SLOVENE NATIONAL BENEFIT SOCIETY with rates not less than ordinary life.

VII. ASSUMPTION CERTIFICATES.

The SLOVENE NATIONAL BENEFIT SOCIETY agrees to issue and mail an assumption certificate to every member of the SLOVENE PROGRESSIVE BENEFIT SOCIETY in good standing, and to those who hereafter become qualified, acknowledging membership in the SLOVENE NATIONAL BENEFIT SOCIETY, together with all rights and privileges thereof, and all certificate benefits to which such member or his lawful beneficiary is entitled, as herein provided.

VIII. THE SUBORDINATE LODGES.

All local or subordinate lodges of SLOVENE PROGRESSIVE BENEFIT SOCIETY may continue as subordinate units, known as lodges, of the SLOVENE NATIONAL BENEFIT SOCIETY, except where the membership of a lodge falls below the minimum number prescribed by the by-laws of the SLOVENE NATIONAL BENEFIT SOCIETY, and all present officers of such subordinate lodges of the SLOVENE PROGRESSIVE BENEFIT SOCIETY shall continue as officers until their successors shall have been duly elected and qualified, and any subordinate lodge of the SLOVENE PROGRESSIVE BENEFIT SOCIETY which shall by affirmative action so elect, may continue to use the form of ritualistic work now prescribed for local lodges of the SLOVENE PROGRESSIVE BENEFIT SOCIETY for a period of two years from the effective date of this Agreement. No member can hold membership in more than one lodge, but must elect a lodge within 90 days from the effective date of this Agreement or he shall be assigned to a lodge by the Supreme Secretary after the expiration of that period.

Your Dollar

By Consumers Union
Stocking Substitutes

Wholesale and retail stocking sellers who upped prices during the recent buying spurge have harmed themselves and the industry. Rather than pay profiteering prices, women are turning away from the stocking counters, are seeking substitutes and ways to keep on using the supplies they have on hand.

Consumers Union has tested some widely sold stocking substitutes and stocking savers, and reports on them in its September issue. Although they call for extra work, some of these offer real economy.

For those who want to go stock- ingless, there are three types of leg camouflage: liquid powder such as Miner's Makeup, oil-base cream such as Ardena Velva Beauty Film, and leg stain such as Liquid Bronze-Glo.

The liquid powder tends to streak, and is not waterproof. The stain is transparent—it colors the legs but does not look like stockings. The cream is waterproof and produces the illusion of sheer stockings. But it takes 5-10 minutes to apply properly, is apt to come off on your clothes and must be washed off every night. On the other hand, it does not rip, run, or bag at the ankles.

CU found no low priced leg creams on the market. The better buy of the two tested was Ardena Velva Beauty Film, which costs \$1 and lasts for 50-100 applications. Stocking patches are too high priced for the service you are apt to get. Celluloid or plastic shoe inserts which cut down friction at the heel are probably the most effective way to save on wear. And to stop runs, try clear nail polish. It works as well as any special preparation you can buy.

Cigarettes

Results of new CU cigarette tests were used as testimony for the government in an Anti-Trust case against five leading cigarette manufacturers. The government charged that the "Big Five" conspired to keep up prices consumers pay for cigarettes, keep down prices paid to farmers for tobacco. Part of the argument was that there is very little difference among the leading brands.

CU's witness stated, on the basis of 341 tests, that most smokers can't tell the popular brands apart. The persons tested were steady smokers, people who used an average of 17 cigarettes a day. Most of them thought they could identify brand names. But with the trade-marks inked out, they had no better success guessing cigarette brands than they would have had calling the next roll on a pair of dice.

Union-Made Cigarettes

The following cigarettes are union-made, under contract with the Tobacco Workers International Union (AFL): Avalon, Clouen, Carmen, Kool, Raleigh, Spud, Twenty Grand, Viceroy, Wings, Yankee Girl. Under new, energetic leadership, the union is organizing to gain decent conditions for all workers in the industry.

Shaving Cream

Men with tough whiskers would have less trouble shaving if they would spend a little more time getting ready, advises CU in its September issue. Beards are naturally tough and oily. It takes a good shaving cream to cut the oil, then at least two minutes for hot water to soak through and do a thorough job of softening the beard. If you will take enough time over this process, you'll gain speed and comfort in the actual shaving job.

In general, lathering creams are better than brushless creams because they have a soap base which removes the oil around the hair. Brushless creams are oil-in-water emulsions which don't mix readily with the facial oil and don't help you do a quick job of beard-softening.

Consumers Union tested 96 brands of shaving preparations, including lathering creams, brushless creams and shaving soaps. Products were tested for impurities, consistency, suitability of container and net weight of dry soap after moisture had been removed. In general, CU found cakes of shaving soap offered most for the money. Best buys in this type were Williams Mug Soap (5c); Colgate Cup Soap (5c) and Palmolive Shaving-Soap (5c).
