Last week, following the story on Indianapolis' Bertha Urbancic and her perfect game we included the names of two other KSKJ members who are in the 300-bowling class. The report was not complete, for we have been informed belatedly from Joliet, Ill. that William Kunstek, rolling with the Ruberoid team Nov. 21 on Jahneke Alleys bowled a perfect game. The team tallied 3015, of which 753 was contributed by Bill. While Bill was ringing up his perfect count, Eddie Kostelz,

teammate and also a member of the KSKJ had a 606 series. Kunstek, member of SS. Cyril and Methodius Society, bowled in the past Midwest KSKJ tourney and had nine strikes in a row in one of his games to give him a 279, and the high-game in any event prize. In addition to the ABC award, a ring, Bill will receive an award from the Midwest K. S. K. J. Bowling Association, and has chosen a wrist watch for his prize.

JOLIET KEGLERS OVER HOLIDAY REST, NOW READY TO BLAST PINS

Joliet, Ill. — After a two-week lay-off, due to the holidays, the Joliet KSKJ keglers will once again settle down to the serious business of bowling. The schedule for the first session of the new year, Jan. 8th, brings together The Eagle and the Jay-Ay-Zeez on alleys 1 and 2; Schusters vs. White Fronts on 3 and 4; Tezak Florists vs. Avsec Printers on 5 and 6; and Slovenic Coals vs. Peerless Prints on 7 and 8.

Here is a belated report on the results of Dec. 18th, 1941: **Peerless Prints in Lead** The first place tie between Peerless and Schusters was broken, as the Peerless five whipped the Schusters in 2 out of 3 games. Peerless had a series of 2577, including high team game, 922. The Schusters had to be content with 2404.

Frank Ramuta of Peerless was high among these two fives, having a 563 series, including one game of 212. Rudy Ramuta was high for the Schusters with 539, including a 204. Incidentally, anchorman Rudy "turkeyed" in the last frame of his second game, giving his team the victory by two pins. Joe Kosmerl with 526, including a 209, was runner-up on the Peerless team, while Louis Fabian had 501 for second high on Schusters. Louis Zeleznikar of Peerless had a 201.

Tezak's Conquer JAZ's The Tezak Florists won two games from the Jay-Ay-Zeez and are thereby tied with them for fourth spot in the standings. Richard Tezak was high for the victors with a series of 522, followed by Bob Kosmerl who had 515. Paul Laurich, bowling for holiday prizes only, had the best series of any JAZ bowler with games of 172, 149 and 190 for 511, the best se-

ries he's rolled so far this season. Dr. Zalar was high for the JAZ team proper with 498. There were no 200 games on this pair of alleys. **Slovenics Win Again** The Slovenic Coals continued their winning ways as they swamped the White Fronts in two out of three games. Slovenics totaled 2403 to 2372 for the White Fronts. Willard Kuhar broke the high individual season record with a 246 in his second game. His other games were 153 and 181 or a 580 series. John Bluth of the White Fronts had 166, 200 and 186 for 552 to take his team's honors. Rev. Butala broke 500 for the second consecutive week, having games of 176, 147 and 218 for 541. John Culik, bowling for prizes only, had 504, while "Chick" Kuzma had a 212 game.

Avsec's Lose Again The Eagles flew high as they took the Avsec Prints into camp for two games. The Eagle had high team series of the night, 2583, on games of 920, 848 and 815, while the Avsecs were gathering 2393 pins. Ed Carpenter of the Avsecs had the best series of the evening, 581, on games of 209, 221 and 151. Charlie Gregory was high for the high-flying Eagles with 570, including a game of 215. Geo. Gasperich was runner-up on the Eagles with 547, including a 203, while Matt Siana was second high on the Avsec team with 542.

Strikes 'n' Spires Speaking of strikes, Willie Kuhar started his second game with two spares, then poured in seven consecutive strikes, "blew" the final frame to garner his record-breaking 246... Dick Tezak for the third con-

CHILDREN TO HAVE OPPORTUNITY TO BUY DEFENSE SAVINGS STAMPS

Washington, D. C. — America's 25,000,000 school children will be given an unprecedented opportunity to play a vital part in the defeat of Axis aggression through the Defense Savings Program, under plans announced by the Treasury Department. The school program of the Defense Savings Staff will place particular emphasis upon the educational opportunities which Defense Savings afford. Through the operation of Defense Savings Stamp Booths by school children, the formation of student "information squads" to explain the aims of national defense, and through the cooperation of Parent-Teachers Associations, this Program will enable parents, teachers and children to translate materials of the school room into tangible activity in behalf of a great cause. A detailed outline setting forth various ways by which children can cooperate is con-

tained in a new bulletin, "Sharing America," now being distributed to all educational institutions. Prepared by the Treasury Department in consultation with the United States Office of Education, the bulletin already is receiving enthusiastic comment from educators. The basic theme of the educational program is to teach children why they are being asked to buy Defense Savings Stamps Savings Stamps thru incorporating Defense Savings philosophy into classroom instruction. The bulletin, "Sharing America," is intended to help teachers and others to introduce the subject in a truly educational manner. "Sharing America," said D. John W. Studebaker, U. S. Commissioner of Education, "is certain to find favor with school officials and teachers who are eager to do everything they can to help America win the war. The program as outlined in this publication, is educationally sound, and offers to every child in the United States an opportunity to participate in an important way in the defense of his country."
