## Strike Against Profiteers!

OPA is dead. The debate will be over who killed it—the President, with his veto, or Congress with its emasculated bill.

Price control, by the government, was weak and dying (except for rent control) for months before OPA was formally buried. But price control can be more than the OPA. The people can enforce their own price control.

As consumers, we need not accept the inevitable inflation Congress and Truman have wished on us. We can, if we will, hold our own line on prices by refusing to buy anything but the bare necessities if prices are higher than they should be. Consumers can strike, too. We can strike directly.

A buyers' strike aimed at any attempts at price increases will be necessary even if Congress does get around to passing a new compromise bill and Truman signs it. For the new bill, over which Senators have battled for days, is no improvement over the bill which he vetoed.

The fact of the matter is that it takes more than a bill, even a good bill, to hold the line on prices in a profit economy. It takes money to enforce the bill. It takes a willingness to battle the large vested interests, which OPA has shown little ability or desire to do, especially in recent months.

It takes above all, the courage and foresight to throw overboard the outmoded, illogical institutions of private profits, for they cannot really be "regulated" without changing the system itself.

To be logical, price control demands that we pass and use such proposals as the Full Production Authority Act, sponsored by the Committee for Full Employment, for price control must be based on sources of production and distribution which are not run for private profit. The logic of private profit enterprise is constantly higher profits—if possible. The logic of price control is production not chained by profits.

A large part of the chaos resulting from Truman's veto of the bill which would have legalized inflation will come from the end of subsidies. Subsidies became an essential part of the government campaign to keep up production without high prices. But this subsidy program was a program of subsidizing the inefficiency, the short-sightedness and the profit seeking of private-profit producers.

The vast profits of the large milk (and milk by-product) companies, and the inefficiency of their duplicating routes and processes, have been subsidized . . . because without that subsidy they would not produce. They, and so many of the other manufacturers, would strike.

The sit-down strike of many manufacturers, especially in refusing to deliver to retailers the things that had been produced, is a well known fact. But consumers have an equally effective weapon of their own.

We too can strike. We can refuse to buy anything except the essentials. We can join with the UAW and other unions in their demonstrations for more effective price control.

We can organize neighborhood committees to keep the local sellers in line. But above all, we must recognize that the job of controlling prices is our job. No one else can do it for us, although a good OPA would be of some help.

The seriousness of this job is illustrated by the jump in prices following the end of price control. Despite the pious statements and odds of the business houses, prices are already jumped over 200%, and will continue to move up. Such statements are good public relations, and they know it. We must make them realize that we can't eat public statements . . . that it is by their actions, not by their speeches, that we shall judge them.

The necessity of sending food to starving peoples abroad also makes imperative our consumer action. Already the government has cancelled its set-aside orders, which made certain that some foods were made available for shipment abroad.

In addition, the government has announced that it will not pay over-OPA ceilings for any of these food-stuffs, which means that it won't be getting much.

We need much more effective government price control than we had, and more than the vetoed bill provided for. To get even that we must make ourselves heard as consumers.

But even as we do get that, real price control for most of the basic living costs will depend on our activity as consumers. A Buyers' strike now is only the beginning.

# Sports Activities In SNPJ

## Midwest Balina and Golf Tournaments

### Juvenile Field Day—Sept. 1 at Waukegan, Ill.

The SNPJ Midwest Balina and Golf Tournaments and Juvenile Field Day will be staged at Waukegan, Ill., on Sunday, September 1, 1946. These sports events and the social affair which will be held in conjunction with them are being sponsored jointly by the three local lodges—Sloga 14, Enakopravnost 118 and Little Fort 568. This will mark the first time since 1942 that large scale outdoor sectional events have been attempted in the midwest area. All preparations are being speeded up by the local committees to insure a large attendance and maximum success.

Below are rules and regulations covering the essential details of the balina and golf tournaments. Entry blanks also appear in this issue of the Prosvesna. We urge all balina and golf players to read the rules carefully and become familiar with them. You will note that a balina team consists of three players and that there is separate division for men and women. The entry fee is only \$1.50 per team, the entire amount of which will be used for prizes. The rules provide that golf teams consist of four players each with the entry fee set at \$1.75 per individual member. This pays for the green fee and leaves a substantial amount for the prize fund. Here, as in balina, financial support from the national athletic fund is expected to swell the size of prize for each winner.

The golf tournament is a two in one event in that the players, who form teams representing their respective lodges, compete for both team and individual prizes in one and the same round of golf. If you possibly can, organize a team in your lodge. If this cannot be done, then enter as many golfers in the individual event as possible to compete for individual honors and prizes. The Peoria Handicap System gives the poor and mediocre players a good chance to win against the better golfers.

Entry blanks must be properly filled out with the names and certificate numbers of the members who desire to participate before forwarding them, along with entry fees, to the tournament secretaries, Andrew Mosek for balina and Frank Jereb for golf. Both men are capable and have a thorough knowledge of the sport under their respective secretarial jurisdictions. The same can be said for the members of the committees who will assist them, and so we look forward with optimistic anticipation to none but the best results. The DEADLINE for all entries is AUGUST 25.

The rules for our first Midwest Juvenile Field Day and the entry blank will appear in next week's issue of the Prosvesna. This event will provide for two separate classes (A and B) for boys and girls, competing in their own age groups; the girls against girls and boys against boys. A trophy will be awarded to the champions in each class and there will be numerous other prizes for individual winners. Read all about it in next week's sports column.

On behalf of the local tournament committees, we ask you to do everything possible to support this outstanding sectional sports and social affair. Plan to spend the day before Labor Day, September 1, at Waukegan. Whether you attend as a participant or spectator, a grand time is assured to one and all.

## MIDWEST BALINA TOURNEY RULES

1) This tournament shall be conducted as a team event in two separate divisions, one for men and the other for women contestants. Each team shall be composed of three (3) players.

2) All players must be members in good standing of the lodges they represent and shall have joined the SNPJ at least sixty (60) days prior to the tournament. There is no limit to the number of teams a lodge may enter.

3) The entry fee is \$1.50 per team. No fees, once received and filed by the tournament secretary shall be refunded.

4) Entry blanks must be signed by the financial secretary of the respective local lodges and also bear the lodge seal. Each player's certificate number shall accompany his name.

5) All entries and fees must be sent to Andrew Mosek, Tournament Secretary, 929 Lenox Avenue, Waukegan, Illinois. The DEADLINE is August 25, 1946.

6) Team captains shall be notified in sufficient time by the tournament secretary when and with whom their teams are scheduled to play. Each captain shall be responsible for his player's appearance at the alley and required to report the line-up to the secretary at least fifteen (15) minutes before game time.

7) Cash prizes shall be awarded to winners in each division. The number and amount of prizes shall

depend on the number of entries and the amount of donation received from the Society's athletic fund.

8) In addition to cash prizes, trophies shall be awarded to the men's and women's championship teams.

9) Any team using an ineligible player shall be expelled from the tournament and shall forfeit scores and prizes.

10) All players are required to wear the Society's athletic emblem or the letters "S.N.P.J." No other advertisement, except that pertaining to the Society and lodge, is allowed to be worn.

11) Questions arising in the tournament, for which no specific provisions are made in these rules, will come under the jurisdiction of the local tournament committee.

12) A complete record of entries and fees shall be kept by the secretary of the local tournament committee, a copy of which shall be forwarded to the Juvenile Director of SNPJ when entries are closed. The secretary shall also furnish him with a report of all income and disbursements in connection with the balina tournament not later than thirty (30) days after the tournament.

### PLAYING RULES

1) A game shall consist of 21 points, scored as follows: The total number of balls of one team closest to the balina (small ball) is the number of points the team will receive for the frame, except that when all three balls of one team are closest, the score for the frame shall be SIX (6).

2) When two opposing teams are unable to agree which ball is closest to balina, the referee, chosen by the local tournament committee, shall be called upon to make the final decision. When the closest balls of two opposing players are the same distance from the balina, there is no score for either side.

3) Each team shall play one game with its opponent, except in the final when two games out of three must be won to decide the champion.

4) The losing team in each round are eliminated from further play and the winners move into the next round of games. This method of elimination is used until the champions of the tournament are finally determined.

5) Each player is limited to one ball in a frame. He shall be allowed to take ONE STEP when "closing in" on the balina and THREE STEPS when he attempts to knock the balina or an opponent's ball. When making a play, the player's both feet must remain inside the alley.

6) The privilege of bowling first in a game between two teams goes to the team winning the toss-up. Thereafter, the team winning each frame has first bowl for the next frame.

7) When a player's ball rolls or bounds out of the alley, it is a dead ball and cannot count. If the balina is knocked out of the alley, the play of that frame is void and must be replayed.

8) When a ball, rolled or thrown at the balina, strikes a player on the alley, it automatically becomes a dead ball and does not count in the scoring.

9) When two opposing balls "kiss" the balina, the next play shall be made by a player of the second team whose ball "kissed" the balina. If, after this play, the position of the balls remains unchanged, a player of the team whose ball first "kissed" the balina shall take his turn.

10) No substitutions shall be made after entry blanks have been filed without satisfactory reason to, and approval of, the local committee. When a substitution is made during a game, the player removed cannot return to the line-up in the same game.

11) A team's bowling order may be changed at any time, depending on the position of the opponent's ball(s) and the type of play required.

12) If all players of a team fail to make their appearance within 15 minutes after game time, the team automatically forfeits the game to the opposing team.

**MIDWEST GOLF TOURNAMENT RULES**

1) The SNPJ Midwest Golf Tournaments shall be conducted as a team and individual event combined, with play limited to a single round of eighteen (18) holes.

2) The tournament shall be governed by rules of the United States Golf Association (USGA) and the round regulations of the course over which play is conducted, except as otherwise provided in these rules.

3) Winter rules shall be observed in the tournament, and the Peoria Handicap System shall be used as a basis for determining winners of cash prizes.

4) All players must be members in good standing of the lodge they represent and shall have joined the SNPJ at least sixty (60) days prior to the tournament. According to Mayor Padar there are big plans under way for his district. "Bericie" Naprudnik made a plane trip to Cleveland to attend the Loyalties picnic on the 4th and

individuals a lodge may enter. Professional golfers, however, are barred from participation in this tournament.

6) The entry fee is \$1.75 per player, \$1.00 of which amount shall be used for prizes and 75 cents for the green fee.

7) Entry blanks must be signed by the financial secretary of the respective local lodges and also bear the lodge seal. Each player's certificate number must appear opposite his name.

8) All entries and fees must be in the hands of the Tournament Secretary, Frank Jereb, 1113 Jackson Street, Waukegan, Illinois on or before August 25, 1946.

9) No substitutions shall be allowed after entry blanks have been filed without satisfactory reason to, and approval of, the local committee.

10) Team captains shall be notified in sufficient time by the tournament secretary when they are scheduled to begin play. Each captain shall be responsible for his players' appearance at the golf course and required to report the line-up to the secretary at least fifteen (15) minutes before "tee-off" time. This also applies to the individual entrants.

11) Cash prizes shall be awarded to winners in each event. The number and amount of prizes shall depend on the number of entries and donation received from the Society's athletic fund.

12) In addition to cash prizes, trophies shall be awarded to the champions in each event on the basis of ACTUAL scores shot. The team with the lowest aggregate score and the individual with the lowest score shall be declared the champions.

13) In case of a tie score for the championship, the teams or individuals so tied shall play nine (9) additional holes to decide the winner.

14) Anyone participating in an event under an assumed name, or is otherwise ineligible, shall be expelled from the tournament and scores forfeited. If it is a team event, other members shall forfeit prizes in said event.

15) All entrants are required to furnish their average score, in order that players of near equal ability can be paired together.

16) Members of the Juvenile Department are eligible to participate in the tournament, either as representatives of the Circle to which they belong or the lodge.

17) All players shall wear the Society's athletic emblem or the letters "S.N.P.J." No other advertisement, except that pertaining to the Society and lodge, is allowed.

18) A complete record of entries and fees shall be kept by the secretary of the local tournament committee, a copy of which shall be forwarded to the Juvenile Director of SNPJ when entries are closed.
