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SWU HERITAGE MUSEUM A REALTY!

It is surprising to realize that the S.W.U. still has a large number of immigrant members over the age of 80. In order that we might take advantage of first-hand accounts from these very hearty Slovenian women so that we could preserve their experiences for posterity, I was determined to make every effort to obtain as much information as possible. Therefore, this summer my husband and I started out for the Mid-West, with video tape equipment, calling on approximately 22 individuals whom we had previously contacted, for detailed interviews. It was gratifying to be received so warmly; the cooperation and hospitality extended by these wonderful people was truly "Slovenian hospitality" as we all know it. Our interviews included five cities in the states of Illinois and Ohio. and each interview required at least one hour, and in some cases longer.

One of my interviews was with Mrs. Dorothy Chepuran, Joliet, Illinois, member of Branch No. 20, who at the young age of 101 still works in her garden, does her own cooking, crochets, and occasionally shops for groceries with her daughter. She recalled many vivid details of her early years. One could only be astounded by the strength and endurance this woman possesses.

Other ladies interviewed in Joliet were Mrs. Frances Ukovich, 98, who, after being widowed twice, raised her family under very difficult circumstances; Mrs. Mary Vicich, who bore 19 children. 14 of them still remain devoted to their loving mother; Mrs. Helen Strojin, 87, who recalled early life in Rockdale, Illinois, and amazed us with her lovely voice and large reportoire of Slovenian melodies; also my mother, Mrs. Emma Planinsek, 80, President of Branch No. 20, Whose remarkable memory for details, dates, and incidents made stories of Slovenia and America almost a reality. Although they were not immigrants, Mr. Frank Gospodaric, influential and successful business man, and his sister Mary, a well-known teacher of immigrants in Joliet, recalled their lives with immigrant parents. We were informed of early and political business life as well as the methods educators used to assist foreigners in adjusting to a new and difficult culture. We visited in these

ladies' homes, met their families, and were impressed by their good health, keen memories, and warm hospitality.

In Chicago, Illinois, Corinne Leskovar and Mary Muller arranged interviews to be held at the home of Mr. & Mrs. Joseph Gregorich. The Gregorich's received us warmly and all interviews were held at their home. Mrs. Gregorich along with Mrs. M. Krapenc recalled early employment in the hat factories where many Slovenian women were employed. Mrs. Frances Zibert spoke of her voyage to America & Mr. Gregorich was a wealth of historical information about Chicago in early times.

Mrs. Frances Sietz provided the hospitality of

her apartment for seven interviews, and contacted immigrants who were knowledgeable about life in Cleveland at the turn of the century. We are appreciative to the following individuals who gave so generously of their time and astounded us with historical data which was extremely interesting. Mrs. Mary Stusek, who recently celebrated her 90th birthday; Mrs. Frances Stariha; Mrs. Josephine Alic; Mrs. Margaret Tomazin; Mrs. Nettie Kalish; and Mr. & Mrs. Louis Oswald. We enjoyed the social atmosphere provided by our hostess, Mrs. Sietz, our immigrants and their relatives who accompanied them to the interviews. We spent eight rewarding hours in their company.

The interviews were completed with visits in southern Illinois with Mrs. Milka Yuvan, of Auburn; Joe & Julia Ranchof, Staunton; and our only Tyrolean immigrant, Mr. Leo Odorizzi. Tapes of 22 interviews will be available in the Slovenian Heritage Museum located at the Home Office in Joliet, Illinois, when the necessary TV equipment has been purchased to replay these interviews.

Much of the Slovenian-American heritage is not known by the general public; therefore, as Heritage Director I am always attempting to locate methods of preserving this information. My objective is to establish a Slovenian Museum, which will preserve the relics and other memorablia of our immigrants; this will now become a reality and will be located in Joliet, Illinois. Items, of course, will be selected and evaluated according to the historical value and interest they will generate. Go through your dresser drawers, look in your attic. pull out the old trunks. Are there garments, books, records, mementos, etc., that should be preserved for posterity's sake? If so, they should be placed in our Slovenian Heritage Museum. If anyone would like to contribute something to the cause, let me know.

Some of the donations accepted thus far have been: a jacket to a suit worn by Mrs. Mary Ausich on her voyage to this country, a pair of shoes worn at her wedding, and a large framed certificate of her husband, Anton, Installing members to the SNPJ. Also included in the donations have been one pair of handmade lace gloves; and a Slovenian National costume presented by Mrs. Caroline Gregory. She passed away last year at the age of 97. Mrs. Gregory, in her earlier years, was a vital member of Branch No. 20, making many Slovenian costumes for the junior dancing groups.

You have just read a brief resume of our heritage activities of the summer and our plans for the future. Join with us in making your heritage a living reality. We need your support and cooperation, your interest and your donations. Heritage is everyone's responsibility, make it yours.

PEANUT BUT TERBALLS

1 cup powdered sugar, sifted

1 cup peanut butter

2 tablespoons melted butter or oleo

3 cups Rice Krispies Thin powdered sugar frosting

Grated coconut.

Sift the powdered sugar then mix with the peanut butter and melted butter or oleo. With fingers thoroughly mix in the Rice Krispies. Chill. Shape into balls. Dip into thin powdered sugar frosting. Roll in grated coconut.

(The ingredients were not given for the frosting. I used the following):

THIN POWDERED SUGAR FROSTING:

1 1/2 cups powdered sugar

3 tablespoons milk (or water)

1/2 teaspoon vanilla

Mix until smooth.

Place balls on rack to set frosting. Makes about 48.

After the June meeting of Branch No. 1 the members hosted my mother with a lovely surprise birthday party including flowers and candles. (I am so happy to have attended that party meeting). Beautiful food covered the serving

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table and Janet Maurin, vicepresident, livened the party with her accordian. Ruth Sheck, the president, brought two of her favorite recipes: LEMON FREEZE TORTE and FRUIT PUNCH. Both are excellent and ideal for holiday entertaining.

LEMON FREEZE TORTE

7 cups Rice Krispies crushed with a

rolling pin to make 3 cups

2/3 cup melted butter

1/3 cup sugar

1 14-ounce can sweetened condensed milk

1/2 cup lemon juice

1 large box (4 1/2 ounces) lemon jello filling

1 17-ounce can fruit cocktail, drained

9 ounce Cool Whip

Mix the crushed Rice Krispies, the melted butter and sugar. Reserve 1/2 cup for topping. Pat remainder in the buttered 9 x 13 pan. Bake 10 minutes at 300 degrees.

Mix the sweetened condensed milk with the lemon juice until smooth. Stir in the lemon jello filling. Add the fruit cocktail, drained. Fold in the Cool Whip. When the baked crust is completely cooled cover with filling. Sprinkle reserved crust mixture over all. Freeze about 4 hours or overnight or refrigerate over night. If frozen take out about 20 minutes before serving. Will serve 12 to 15.

PUNCH

First, make a ring mold of cherry soda and freeze.

2 6-ounce cans frozen orange juice concentrate, thawed

2 6-ounce cans frozen lemonade concentrate, thawed

2 6-ounce cans frozen pineapple juice concentrate, thawed

2 quarts 7 Up, chilled

1 pint vanilla ice cream

In a large punch bowl combine the fruit juices. Stir in the 7 Up. Spoon ice cream into bowl. When ready to serve unmold the cherry soda and float in punch for color and to help keep punch cold. Makes about 25 servings of about 1/2 cup each.

The DANISH PASTRY PUFF WITH CREAM CHEESE FROSTING was served by the Christian Mothers during the excellent luncheon following the funeral service. This is Millie Mueller's recipe, also a member of Branch No. 1, which she prepared. Many complimentary remarks prompted this recipe.

DANISH PASTRY PUFF

1/2 cup oleo (1 stick)

1 cup flour

2 tablespoons water

1/2 cup oleo 1 cup water

i cup water

1 teaspoon almond extract or vanilla extract

1 cup flour

3 eggs

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Cut 1/2 cup oleo into 1 cup flour. Sprinkle with 2 tablespoons water. Mix with fork. Round dough into a ball and divide in half. On ungreased baking sheet or jelly roll pan press dough into 2 stripes 12 x 3 inches about 3 inches apart. Heat 1/2 cup oleo and 1 cup water in a medium saucepan and bring to a boil. Add the almond or vanilla extract. Remove from heat. Immediately stir in 1 cup flour all at once. Mix well until smooth and thick. Add the 3 eggs one at a time beating until smooth after each addition. Spread 1/2 mixture on each strip of pastry. Bake at 350 degrees until crisp about one hour. When cool spread with frosting.

CREAM CHEESE FROSTING

1 package (3 ounces) cream cheese, room temperature

2 tablespoons oleo, room temperature

2 tablespoons milk

1 3/4 cups powdered sugar

Blend cheese, oleo and milk. Stir in sugar until smooth and of specafing consistency. Frost the cooled putts; top with generous amount of sliced almonds.

THE IMMIGRANT

FRANCEL FROM JELIČNI VRH

Part I

"For as long as I can remember, Dad, you've been telling me stories about your life as a youngster, in Slovenia, and how you arrived at your decision to come to America. Well, I regret that I've never written any of these stories for further reference because now my children are beginning to ask some questions — they want to know about their "roots." Let's sit down and talk about your early days once again so that I can tape record your story for our family to listen to now, and in years to come. This will enable them to appreciate what you endured in the old country, and how you adjusted to life in America. Your grandchildren and greatgrandchildren will then realize how fortunate they all were to be born Americans."

"Well, Rudy, I thought by now you'd be tired of hearing all those old stories, but if you don't mind listening again, I don't mind repeating them."

"Okay, Dad. Let's start from the beginning . . ."

"I don't know if I can remember that far back — to 1892! That's a long time ago! I'll be celebrating a birthday again on November 30th, which will bring me pretty close to the ninety year mark."

"I can still remember my birthplace of Jelični Vrh as vividly as if I had just left it only a few days ago. What a beautiful hilly area it was, close to the town of Idrija. When I was born, and until 1914, that area was ruled by Austria's Franz Joseph. After World War I the Italians gained control of Slovenia, and by the end of World War II, the Yugoslavian government was in power. Despite changes in government for hundred of years, the people retained the Slovenian language and continued the customs handed down from generation to generation.

"At the tender age of four, our family was saddened by the death of my father. Even though Mother married, things at home were never the same. At the age of eight, I was sent to live on the farm with my Stric Matevž (Uncle Matthew) earning my keep as a "pastir" (shepherd), and caring for the cows in the fields and woods, which left little or no time for play during my childhood. The only memories I have are of working — the kinds of jobs that a child can do. You know I never attended school, but, since I always wanted to be able to read newspapers and books, I learned how to read, not only in Slovenian, but also in English.

"When I reached my twelfth birthday, Stric Jaka (Uncle Jacob) returned to Slovenia after working in the coal mines of Scranton, Pennsylvania. That was in 1904. He had earned and saved enough money in four years to return to Slovenia and purchase a farm and grist mill. There was need for many workers, so I was sent to live with Stric Jaka and his family; my new job was grinding grain into flour and working on the farm. This is where I earned my keep until the age of sixteen when I moved on and was able to secure work for a small salary at the biggest farm in that area. My position as a "hlapec" (farmhand or hired man) included taking care of the barns, horses, and cows. Not only did I work on the

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farm, but also ate my meals there and slept on the straw bed in the barn loft. Notches on the doorway showed that my height had increased to 5' 8" and the cracked mirror on the wall reflected a red handlebar moustache and corresponding wavy hair. I had managed to grow to the proportions of a young man despite my lack of a happy family life. I often wondered how different my life would have been had my father lived and our family had remained together. I coud have slept in my own warm bed in the house, gone to school, wore nice clothes and, most of all, had the love of my parents.

"My Uncle Matevz was so impressed by Jaka's success that he also sailed for America to earn his fortune. The two eldest of his six sons planned to join their father after his arrival in the States. Before leaving Slovenia, my cousins came to visit and say goodbye. How I yearned to accompany them to America but, of course, I didn't have enough money for passage. I was determined to secure better employment with a larger salary, save my money, and eventually leave Slovenia for America.

"As a lumberjack near Villach and Mallestig, north of Jesinice in the Koroško area, my strength and muscles were tested for a year and a half. Then, unexpectedly, a letter arrived for me, '. . . Uncle Jaka returned to America for the second time . . . Two more of Uncle Matez's sons went with him . . . You are needed to work at the mill and on the farm. Return quickly.' In November of 1911, after celebrating my eighteenth birthay, I made plans to return to the mill and arrived just in time for "Božič" (Christmas). Incidentally, another reason for my return to the village was a regulation imposed upon young males, aged 18-20, to register for the Austrian Army. When I returned in Jelični Vrh, the biggest surprise of my life awaited me. My Uncle had sent me a paid ticket for passage to America! It was a dream come true! Now I would have an opportunity to begin a new life and earn a decent living. It took a couple of months hassle with army authorities, but after promising them to return and serve my military time, they released me and I began my eventual trip to America. Deep in my heart, I knew that I would never return, and my last gaze on that lush green valley has lasted a lifetime.

"Our ship arrived in New York Harbor on Easter Sunday, 1912. We didn't proceed through the required examination on Ellis Island until Monday. After passing inspection and receiving a clean bill of health, I began my three-day train ride to Rock Springs, Wyoming, gazing out of the train window in wonder at the vastness and beauty of the new land which I would now call 'home.'

No one was waiting for me at the train station in Rock Springs. What a big disappointment after having been so excited about my arrival there. Grabbing my suitcase, I walked quickly down the street until I came to the first beer tavern. Fortunately, the owner, Paul Kos, was Slovenian and knew my Uncle and cousins. We were all soon reunited over some draft beer and they began to show me around the town and introduced me to their friends. Two days later, we went to Superior, Wyoming, about thirty-five miles northwest. There I began working in the coal mines, but the job required only two to three days of work per week. Still, it was paying me much more money than I had ever earned before. After six months, I was able to purchase my first horse and saddle. That was one of the happiest days of my life. Never before had I owned anything so valuable.

"In the fall of the year, I hunted often and was familiar with the wooded area around Superior for a thirty-mile radius. Superior was located in the Rocky Mountains on the western slope of the Continental Divide. You know the Divide separates the rivers which flow west to the Pacific Ocean, and those which flow **east** toward the Atlantic Ocean. That always seemed a little unusual to me.

"This was such a beautiful region, so quiet and peaceful. It seemed strange that it was so thinly populated. Why didn't more Americans want to live out in the west? Looking eastward, I never tired gazing at the snow-capped mountains and the dry fields of the Divide Basin. Not a day passed by that I didn't thank the Lord for my life in America, which was such an improvement over my struggles for a more existence in Slovenia. I didn't miss my native land, and I knew that I would never return there again. Even though I didn't make a large amount of money, there was plenty of food and beer both were cheap. Open space was in abundance, and riding my horse and hunting became my only pleasurable experiences.

MINUTES OF THE SPECIAL MEETING S.W.U. NATIONAL BOARD OF DIRECTORS, HOME OFFICE, JOLIET, ILL. JULY 21. 1979.

Meeting was called to order by the past president. Mary Bostian, at 9:30 a.m. The Recording Secretary, Corinne Leskovar, read the Minutes of the last day of the National Convention, May 23, 1979 in Duluth, Minnesota which were approved as read. The Minutes will be published in their entirety in the official publication ZARJA - THE DAWN. The Board members were very happy to see Mrs. Prisland and to learn from her knowledge and emulate her dedication to the welfare of the membership.

Mr. Ronald Erjavec. of Joliet Union National Bank & Trust Company reviewed the investments of our organization and projected the future outlook for earnings. A thorough discussion was held with all members of the Board and Mrs Erjavec.

Other guests at the meeting were former national officers, Marie Floryan of West Allis, Wisconsin, Mrs. Emma Planinsek and Mrs Josephine Erjavec of Joliet.

The President opened discusion on the increase in assessment that was decided at the National Convention. The actuary's presentation and subsequent increase of 25¢ per member per month and 20¢ monthly increase for juvenile assessment agreed by the delegation was reviewed as given in the Minutes. Correspondence was read by the Secretary, Mrs. Ancel. Letters were received from the following branches and officers: Frances Sietz, Cleveland, Ohio, Mary Macek, Br. 55, Girard, Ohio, Stella Ciccone, Br. 70, W. Aliquppa, Pa., Pauline Plesko, Br. 43, Milwaukee, Wis., Members of Br. 43, Milwaukee, Wis. and Members of Br. 71, Strabane, Pa. The Board took all the comments under advisement. It was noted that the by-law directing schedule of conventions is in accordance with the State of Illinois Dept. of Insurance ordering national meetings for buria) associations once every three years. Altho it would be a saving, the S.W.U. is not allowed to extend the time over three year intervals.

After continued discussion, the Board voted unanimously to delay the collection of increased dues until January, 1980. It was their decision based on members' requests and to facilitate the secretaries' work. All Directors finally agreed that it was the best for all concerned that the dues payments be delayed until everyone would become more familiar with it. Treasurer Mary Marolt stated that it is the duty of the Board to listen to the heart and opinion of the membership and to realize it has the responsibility both to the members and to the convetion rulings.

The Board was grateful to the many branches who have supported the dues increases and members having written to say they consider it a reasonable increase in the light of present day economy. The Board recommended futher that branches and their officers take a positive approach to any problems arising from the new dues schedule and that they help by financially supporting those elderly, long-standing members who may find it difficult to pay the new assessment. Projecting a better future financial standing for the Union, the Board hoped that the increase in funds will eliminate extra collections and money-making projects in the years between now and the next convention. It is their hope that the branches will help by enrolling new members and keeping the membership ranks full even though many members are lost through death each month.

The Board was visited at this point by the pastor of St. Joseph's church, Rev. Thaddeus Trpin, OFM, who offered prayers and blessings with the assembled group. In tribute to the past Spiritual Advisor, Rev. Claude Okorn, Father Trpin led special memorial prayers.

A review of the convention of May, 1979, was given by Mrs Dicke, the Convention Parliamentarian. In her resume, she related the many fine experiences of the delegation as well as the points of business that were approved. The Board concurred with her review, stating that there were fine hotel accommodations and a wellbalanced convention program. Recommended improvements were that the duties of the convetion committees be more definitely described for future conventions and that, as to the physical aspects of the convention, a better convention hall seating plan for delegates and guests be suggested for the next convention. The Board commended the fine work and planning of the hostess committee of Br. 33, Duluth, Minn. chaired by Delores Heski, president and the luncheon committee of Br. 38, Chisholm, headed by Veda Ponikvar, publisher of the Chisholm Free Press. One of the best memories of the convention of 1979 will be the fine spirit of all the delegates and the cheerful atmosphere within the convention hall. The Board thanked all the members for their diligence and friendliness, with special thanks to Youth Director Frances Sietz of Cleveland whose pleasant personality lent a lighter touch to the proceedings when it was most needed.

The list of Scholarship contributions from the convention was given by Mrs Dicke. Final tally was \$ 2,139.25, from donations and proceeds from the handwork sale donated by branches and individual members. Deepest thanks to all was extended by the Board.

At the conclusion of old business, Mrs, Bostian rose to transfer her office to the new president, Mary Muller. As she extended the president's gavel to her, Mrs. Bostian expressed her warmest welcome to the Board meetings. Mrs Muller responded by promising her full cooperation with the Board members and entire membership. Mrs. Prisland rose to thank Mrs. Bostian for her many years of devoted service, and enumerated some of the many accomplishments Mrs. Bostian had for Zveza, including the organizing of the Dawn Choral Gorup in Cleveland and the junior Baton Twirlers. Mrs. Bostian's friendly disposition to all members has been a real asset to the organization. To Mrs. Muller, she expressed the hope that Zveza will grow and prosper under her leadership.

Mrs. Prisland also thanked the outgoing Auditor, Anne Kompare who will assume new duties as the SWU Vice-President. She greeted new Auditor, Irene Jagodnik with warm words of welcome and praise for her good work as secretary-treasurer of Br. 50, Cleveland, one of the largest and most active branches.

Mourn Fr. Claude

The passing of Father Claude was a sad occasion for the Board and members of SWU. His funeral was attended by the National President, Secretary and Treasurer, also many members from Chicago, Joliet and Milwaukee. He rests at the Slovenian Franciscan Fathers Cemetery in Lemont, Ill where Chicago members can often visit his grave and that of his predecessor, Rev. Alexander Urankar. Fr. Claude was dedicated to Zveza as he showed throughout his term from 1958 until his death. He attended the last convention in Duluth and said he injoyed it very much, with many fine thoughts expressed to the convention delegation. He was a very positive and optimistic person and a wonderful spiritual leader for Zveza as shown in his monthly column written in both Slovenian and English in ZARJA. The Home Office will accept donations in his memory for Holy Masses to the Slovenian Franciscan Custody in Lemont, Ill., to the Baraga Association in Marquette, Mich. which Cause he supported as a fellow missionary priest himself, or to the SWU Scholarship Fund. Branches and individuals wishing to donate are asked to stipulate which fund. The Board approved a donation of \$100 to the Scholarship Fund in memory of Father Claude.

The 50th Anniversary of Br. 33, Duluth, Minn. will be celebrated in conjunction with the Minnesota State Convention of Sept. 9th and in answer to a request for an official representative, the President appointed Ann Hodnik, Youth Director of Aurora, Minn. to attend. The Wisconsin State Convention to be held Sept. 16th at Wilard, Wis. will be attended by Marion Marolt of West Allis as the official guest. Illinois-Indiana State Convention in Oglesby-DePue, Ill. will be attended by all local National Officers with no single official guest listed.

NOTE: The designation of **official guest** entitles a National Officer to travel and per diem comensation. In many cases, officers travel within their states or neighboring states without compensation to attend membership functions such as state convention, anniversaries, etc.

At the State Conventions coming this fall and in the spring of 1980, new regional presidents are to be elected, according to the by-laws. It was hoped that all these meetings will be successful in reviewing the spirit and idealism of our pioneers, thereby increasing activities and membership in our states.

The President and Vice-President planned to attend National Baraga Day in Cleveland on their own expenses and in October, the President will visit our members in San Francisco and Fontana, California while on vacation. The Board commended the fine officers and members of Br. 33, Duluth, for their energetic and responsible acceptance of three major functions in 1979, the National Convention, their 50th Anniversary celebration and the State Convention for Minnesota. Cleveland Combined Branches are also undertaking a big event this fall when their Ohio Bazaar will take place on Sept. 16th.

A new Scholarship Committee was named for the next three year period by the Scholarship Fund Committee Chairman, Mrs. Dicke, as follows: Marie Prisland, Mary Bostian, Mary Muller, Olga Ancel, Irene Odorizzi, Ann Hodnik and Rose Kraemer. That this committee be approved as recommended by the chairman was moved by A. Kompare and seconded by B. Rosandich. Carried.

The new SWU cookbook proposed at the last convention will be edited by Mrs. Dicke who is the columnist for Pots and Pans, featuring the kitchen-tested recipes of our members and other contributors. She has already begun the task of assembling the best recipes that were printed in ZARJA and estimates that it will be next year before the book is ready for the market. The format and contents were further discussed by all the Board members. Special section of traditional Slovenian recipes will be included.

The Silver Anniversary of Fr. Frank Perkovich of Eveleth, Minn. in May was remembered with a telegram from the Union, on behalf of the members.

Correspondance received by the Secretary was reviewed. In response to questions and remarks sent in by members since the convention ruling on dues increases, Mrs. Ancel has issued many official letters. The Board was grateful to her for her excellent thoughtful personal answers to each and every correspondant.

1982 Convention

Discussion on the next convention, to be held in 1982 in Chisholm, Minn. occupied the Board for the next hour. Named to a committee to decide on an appropriate memorial to the Slovenian immigrant miners and their families, to be placed at the site of the great mining center on the Mesabi Iron Range, were Olga Ancel and Mary Marolt. Such a memorial would be dedicated at the 1982 convention on behalf of the members of the SWU. Other organizations will be asked to join in this project, so that is possible, it will be a joint effort of the major Slovenian organizations who have members in Minnesota. The suggestion for this memorial or monument was made at the time of our visit to Chisholm during the last convention, by Rev. David Stalzer, spiritual advisor of Br. 20, Joliet. The movement for this memorial project will begin soon and Minnesota members will be asked for their ideas and suggestion as to an appropriate site and kind of memorial. The Board felt that this activity is directly in line with the Union's efforts to focus on the immigrant contribution to America thru its many Slovenian settlers.

The Board unanimously approved sponsoring a new membership campaign, to begin retro-actively from the conclusing of the Pre-Convention Campaign ("Heritage in Action"), until March 31, 1980. It will be named in honor of our three officers, Honorary President, Marie Prisland, Past President, Mary Bostian and President, Mary (Mayme) Muller - and their three first names will be carried in the title, **THREE M'S CAMPAIGN**. Bila je mati treh otrok: sina Theodora in hčerk Margaret in Hermine. Zapustila 11 vnukov, 16 pravnukov.


Leta 1926 je ustanovila Slovensko žensko zvezo in bila njena predsednica 20 let.
