Ze 5 leto teče, odkar smo morali zapustiti svoje domovino, in nekateri izmed nas so že celo 7 do 8 let v begunstvu, prisiljeno izseljeni od Nemcev za časa okupacije naše domovine. Do danes še ni prodrla do nas niti mravica pomoči od nikoder, niti s te niti z one strani oceana. Ves čas vojne smo se borili za pravično stvar, za svobodo in demokracijo, za krščanska načela proti fašistom, nacistom in komunistom. Ko se je vojna končala, je bila naša ljubljena domovina, po zaslugi in obilni pomoči naših zahodnih zaveznikov, izročena na milost in nemilost rdečim rabljem — brezbožnemu komunizmu. Mi borci za svobodo in krščansko moralno nismo hoteli sprejeti rdečega gospodarja in izgubiti svobodo, in smo zato morali zapustiti svoj dom, svoje najdražje — žene in otroke — svojo ljubljeno domovino in iskati zavetja v mrzli tujini. Od tedaj je preteklo že več kot štiri leta. Težka so bila leta trpljenja po raznih taboriščih, strdnja, brez primerne in potrebne obleke in obutve, zaničevani od Nemcev in "prijateljev." Nekateri naši sotrpini so se s pomočjo sorodnikov ali prijateljev v Ameriki že rešili tega trpljenja in danes živijo v svobodni Ameriki. Drugi so zopet šli v Anglijo, Kanado, Australijo, Argentino, Brazilijo itd. Mi pa, kolikor nas je še ostalo tukaj, ki nimamo nikogar, na kogar bi se obrnili, smo pač prisiljeni še nadalje ostati tukaj in še naprej prenašati kruto usodo taboriščnega življenja.

Naši južni bratje Srbi so mnogo na boljšem od nas Slovencev. Zanje skrbijo razne

njihove organizacije in posamezniki po vseh celinah sveta. Samo naša mala revna slovenska skupina ne sprejme od nikogar nič. V Ameriški Domovini vedno čitamo, da naši rojaki zbirajo prispevke za slovenske begunske reveže po nemških in drugih taboriščih, ali na žalost do nas ne prispe niti najmanjša drobtinica teh daril. Mi ne krivimo za to nikogar, mogoče da svet sploh ne ve, da smo mi tukaj v zahodni Nemčiji. Mi v svoji skromnosti nismo do danes še nikogar nadlegovali s svojimi prošnjami. Smatrali smo, da pripravimo slovenski begunski skupnosti in da kot taki imamo iste pravice kot ostali begunci. Na žalost pa moramo ugotoviti, da smo bili popolnoma pozabljeni in da do nas ni dospela niti nobena tolažilna beseda, ki bi nam dala novih moči, da v trpljenju vztrajamo. Časa našega trpljenja je polna. Zopet je zima pred durmi. Mi smo pa tukaj brez vseh sredstev. Nekateri bolni, matere z malimi otroki. V tem skrajnem obupu smo se odločili, s temi našimi skromnimi vrtcami potrkati na usmiljena srca ameriških Slovencev z nujno prošnjo za skromno pomoč. 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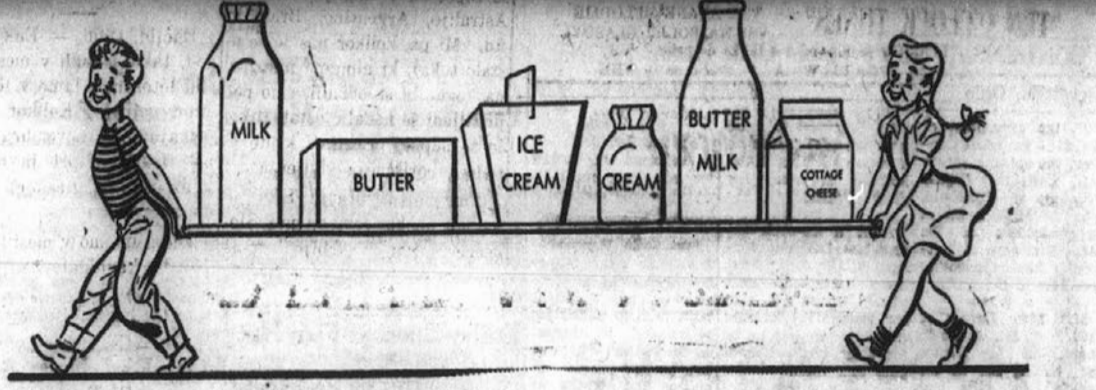

RUINOUS "WELFARE" SCHEMES

The suicidal drive for more and more so-called "social security", regardless of the cost or what it does to the economy, came to a head in California last November.

Now, on November 8th next, the voters of California, at a special election, will be given the chance to repeal the year-old measure, and put assistance to the aged, the blind, and the needy on a basis that will adequately serve the deserving, and save the state from financial ruin.

Social Security Administration figures for June of this year show how critical the situation is. California had 258,516 people on pensions, while Pennsylvania, with about the same population, had 88,202, and New York, with nearly half again as much population, had 116,743.

It is a significant fact that the campaign to repeal the amendment is being led by the California Council for the Blind which says, "In many important respects the blind and the aged are worse off now than they were prior to its adoption."

California's vote will be of national importance, at a time when misguided "welfare" schemes threaten to undermine the financial stability of the whole country.

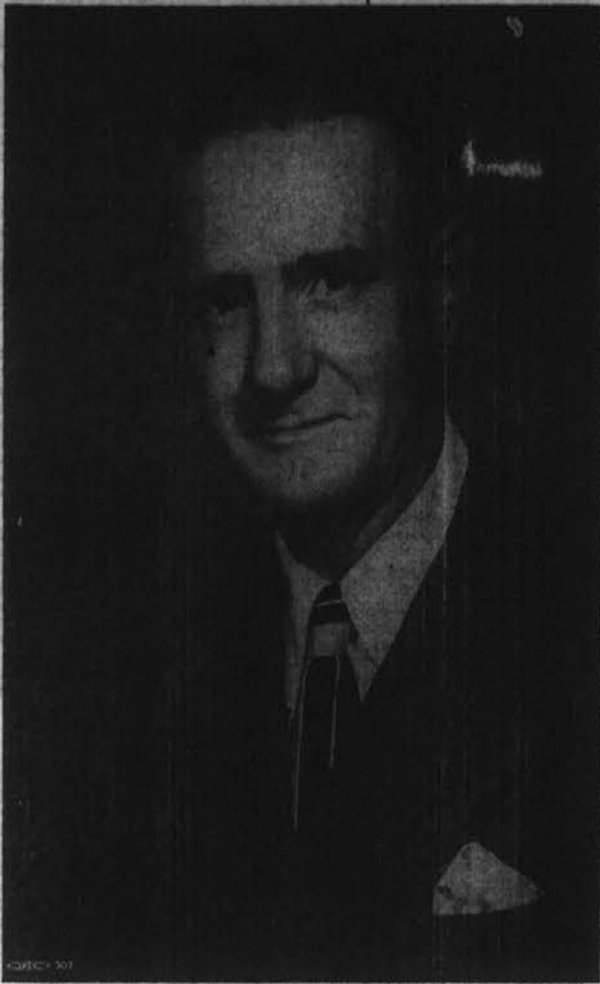

Glasbena Matica To Mark Preseren Centennial With Concert

Down through the centuries, a world-recognized outstanding talent has immortalized many of his fellow-men. In the field of literature, sharing the niche of honor with such gifted men as England's Shakespeare, Germany's Goethe, Greece's Homer and others, we find Slovenia's contribution — its great poet, France Preseren.

Marking the 100th anniversary of the death of this famous Slovene, GLASBENA MATICA, Slovene choral group, is devoting a portion of its coming Fall Concert, Sunday, Nov. 6th, to compositions containing the lyric poems written by France Preseren.

To properly appreciate the significance of this concert dedication, it is well to know something of Preseren's literary importance, and in this connection, the following quotation from Ivan Zorman's book, Slovene poetry, containing selections of Slovene lyric poetry with English translations, gives us a vivid portrayal.

France Preseren, the greatest Slovene poet, was born in the village of Vrha, near beautiful Lake Bled, Dec. 3, 1800. He died, an advocate, in Kranj, Feb. 8, 1849. It is remarkable how Preseren, the consummate poet, stepped before the Slovene people unheralded, and scarcely a precursor to prepare the way in poetry. It was necessary for Preseren to evolve from the undeveloped Slovene language a medium of artistic poetic expression. He succeeded in giving the Slovene a language at once full of melody, flexibility and force, thus laying the foundation for Slovene belle-lettres. Preseren is not confined to his immediate Slovene surroundings. Like all great poets, he learned much from the Roman and Greek classics, and from the Italian, German, and English poets. He knew the works of Byron well. The prime source of his inspiration was the Slovene national individuality. He was master of all forms of poetry, from the simple lyric, to the grandiose epic. His poems reveal a lofty spirit, a deep emotionalism, a noble style of expression and a forceful diction.

The Preseren lyric poems to be sung by the chorus will be "Laina Sile" (The Moon is Shining), and "Mornar" (The Sailor), while the male chorus will offer "Zdravica" (A Toast). Soloist Ann Safred will interpret "Nezakonska mati" (The Unwed Mother) and "Strunam" (To Strings).

The balance of the concert repertoire will include selections from grand opera, symphonic poems, ballads, and folk songs.

In addition to Mrs. Safred, the following will be heard in solo, duet, or quartet arrangements: Josephine Milavec-Levstek, Carolyn Budan, Dorothy Svigel-Evana, Emily Mahne, Josephine Petrovic, Louis Belle, John Nossan, Frank Bradach, Anthony Follonik. The charming and talented, Vera Milavec-Slijka, well known in musical circles, will be the piano accompanist.

Much time and effort has been expended by this talented choral group, under the able direction of Ivan Zorman, to present a concert of real worth. It would be indeed gratifying to see a "full house" on Sun., Nov. 6th at 4:00 p. m. curtain time—in the Slovenian National Home auditorium at E. 65 St. and St. Clair Ave. . . a plan that you, too, share a deep regard for the genuine beauty of Slovene lyrics and music.

Tickets, priced at \$1.00, are now available at the Orazem Delicatessen in the auditorium building, and from choristers, and will also be available at the ticket window on November 6th.

STRAIGHT FROM WASHINGTON

Washington.—President Truman says people do not like peace-time secrets. British and Canadian officials and also some high Army and Navy officers urged him to withhold information of the Soviet possession of atom bomb secrets and know-how. They might as well have argued with a Missouri mule. The President waited only three days after intelligence groups verified first news of the Russian atomic explosion before announcing to our people the facts of that explosion.

Until then there had been no earlier evidence whatever that the Soviet Union had the a-bomb.

PRICE SUPPORT FARM PROGRAM It is certain that before the House and Senate adjourn for the present session, a new farm bill will be debated and voted upon, probably passed and sent to the White House for approval or disapproval. The Hope-Alken Law, authored by Republicans Alken and Hope, passed in the 80th Congress, lacks present support by Republican members who enacted this into law in the last hours of the 80th Congress despite President Truman's protests. No definite agreement on the form of the new farm support bill has been reached. Administration leaders generally agree that the huge outlay for potato price support must be stopped. Some phases of the plan promulgated by Secretary of Agriculture Brannan are likely to be proposed for a trial run. Potatoes and other perishables would be given some support but probably not as much as at present. In addition, the proposal would provide for sale of perishables in the open market at whatever prices they would bring. Producers would then be paid the difference between that price and the support price. Housewives would benefit by lower prices. Taxpayers would not be benefited by a lesser government outlay for support than at the present time.

HE LOST HIS PANTS Representative Richards, (D), South Carolina, lost his pants while on a Congressional junket in Spain. He and a fellow "fact-finder," Congressman Keogh (D), New York, upon retiring in the pullman, hung their trousers close to the open window. Unfortunately for the measure-bent Congressman, the train stopped at a little village and when it steamed away, two pairs of Congressional trousers, containing passports and all their money, were no longer in the compartment. Congressman Keogh boasted a more extensive wardrobe but the So. Carolina Congressman lost his only pair of trousers.

This just couldn't have happened to any former G.I. who had served in North Africa, or with the Fifth Army in Naples, and who had matched wits with the world's most deft thieves. Of course, in those days G.I.'s slept in their clothes and all their money and personal property was in a money belt or closely guarded pocketbook. Congressman Richards borrowed a pair of trousers from Congressman Gregory, (D), Kentucky. The latter should enjoy the remaining weeks of his trip because he had placed his pocketbook and watch under his pillow.

SPECULATION

Although the 1952 Presidential election is three years distant, three candidates are warming up for the Republican nomination. Dwight Eisenhower, former General, present university president, has decided he is a Republican and is communicating to talk about "statism." Then Senator Taft, campaigning for re-election in 1950, believes if he wins next year he will have the entire conservative wing of the GOP behind him for the Presidency. Of course, Thomas E. Dewey, New York's Governor, believes in himself as the only logical GOP standard-bearer.

There you have it! Who will lead the Democratic Party in the coming Presidential campaign? Well, start with Harry S. Truman. Probably you need no go further. Who is that warming up? Quite a ball-player at that, a statesman and a fine American, Fred Vinson, of Kentucky, presently Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of the United States. His friends and admirers believe he is likely to be elected President of the United States come 1952 or 1956. Also, as time goes on you may hear more and more of Governors Adlai Stevenson, of Illinois, and Frank Lausche, of Ohio. Then, too, Illinois has a very outstanding Senator in Paul Douglas, World War II veteran, recently voted by Washington newspaper correspondents the most outstanding freshman Senator. Don't overlook Roosevelt, Jr. yields to the wishes of New York leaders, runs for Governor in 1950, beats Tom Dewey and, then goes on to make a fine record as Governor of the Empire State. It might be the White House for him in a few years — say 1956.

This and That from Washington

AFTER nine and a half months of sporadic action, the Speaker's gavel fell but a few moments ago, as I write this, thereby adjourning the first session of the 81st Congress. A new spending record was established! Appropriations reached an all-time peacetime high, and the nation's taxpayers face another year of deficit spending.

There is a great deal of fear felt in Washington with respect to the nation-wide coal, steel and other strikes. The paralyzing effect of these shutdowns of basic industries will shortly affect the incomes of hundreds of thousands of workers in other industries—causing the loss of untold millions to those only remotely concerned. I have good reason personally to feel that a settlement, fair and equitable, both to labor and management will be reached with respect to the pension and insurance plans now under dispute.

According to the National Committee for the Improvement of Nursing Services the School of Nursing of the Tuskegee Institute is rated among the top 25% of the schools of this nation.

The Tuskegee School deserves special mention because its high rating is due to a complete reorganization in 1944 to bring its course offerings up to standard. This fall the school enrolled its first four-year class with academic standards equal to requirements in other college courses leading to the B.S. degree. It so becomes the first collegiate nursing school in the state of Alabama. Likewise, we in Cleveland can be very proud that the Cleveland City Hospital School of Nursing is also rated among the top 25% of the schools of this nation.

There are all kinds of methods by which the story of America is being told around the world. In one of its letters to USDA Film Users, the U. S. Department of Agriculture tells of a jeep that has been designed to carry the "Voice of America" to remote areas. It contains a sound-movie projector, film strip projector, two speed record player, public address system, wire recorder and a two-way radio. It has a 3,000 watt generator operating off the motor to provide power for its movie and radio apparatus. Such a jeep would make it possible for us to take into highways and byways a form of interesting recreation the people have never known which would by its very friendliness sow seeds of better understanding.

The Motion Picture Yearbook, which has now reached me here in Washington, presents some interesting facts. According to estimated figures: 41% attendance at motion picture theaters is from those between 15 and 24 years of age; 66-2/3 from below 35 years with the dominant group 19 years old. Regular attendance starts at about 12 years and falls off at 19 years. These figures would seem to point out the possibilities of the effect upon character and living during these impressionable years — either for good or ill.

THIRTEEN states have laws enforcing equal pay to women for equal work. Alaska, California, Connecticut and Maine passed such laws in 1949. Both California and Connecticut set strict time limits within which a legal action may be brought against the employer—6 months in California, one year in Connecticut.

College Grads Interested U. S. Air Force Service To Be Interviewed

College men and women in the Cleveland area interested in a career in aviation as an officer in the United States Air Force will have an opportunity to be interviewed when an Air Force officer team arrives 25 October 1949.

The team members will have headquarters at Case Institute of Technology on 26, 27, and 28 October; and at Western Reserve University on 24, 25, 26 and 27 October 1949. They will explain career opportunities, assist those interested in filling out application forms, and give qualifying examinations to those seeking Aviation Cadet or navigator training.

Those who have completed their college work will have an opportunity to apply for an early training class, explained Major Donald W. Steele, here to make advance arrangements. Others who meet the qualifications will be examined so they can enter Air Force training after they finish college.

Three types of training are open to qualified young men — the Aviation Cadet Pilot Training Program, the Aviation Cadet Navigator Training Program, and the Officer Candidate Program. The latter program, which prepares officers for non-flying junior executive duties in administrative and technical fields, also is open to qualified young women.

The two Aviation Cadet Programs, either for pilot or navigator training, are similar in requirements and methods of instruction. To be eligible, male citizens must be single, between the ages of 20 and 26½, with at least 2 years of college, and meet high physical and moral qualifications.

After completing the 1-year course, graduates of pilot training receive flying assignments as rated pilots on active duty with the Air Force. Graduates of the 1-year navigator training, who as students spend 184 hours in the air in "flying classrooms," are assigned as rated navigators on long-range bombers and air transports. Graduates of either program receive commissions as second lieutenants in the Air Force. Outstanding graduates receive Regular commissions. The others, who receive Reserve commissions, have opportunity to compete for Regular commissions during their 3-year tour of active duty.

Men and women applying for Air Force Officer Candidate School must be between the ages of 20½ and 26½, either married or single, with at least 2 years of college, in good physical condition, and meet high moral and personal qualifications. Graduates, who receive Reserve commissions as second lieutenants, are assigned to 3 years of active duty with the Air Force, where they have opportunity to compete for Regular commissions.

In any training program, the Air Force officer said, students who for any reason fail to complete the work are returned to civilian life. Appointments for interviews may be obtained now at Room 107, Federal Bldg., Cleveland, Ohio.
