JOLIET MEN PASS HALF-WAY MARK, SCORES LOW, AS NEW WOOD RESISTS

Joliet, Ill. — The Joliet Kay Jay leglers passed the half-way mark in this season's schedule last Thursday, but the scores were not up to par for mid-season bowling. New wood was put up by the management of the alleys the night before, which partly, if not wholly, accounted for the meagre scores by the teams and individual bowlers.

In a major upset of the season, the Tezak Florists subdued the league-leading Peerless team in all three games. This brought the Tezak team to within a game of first place, right behind the Peerless Prints and Schusters, who are tied with 23 wins and 16 losses each. The Schuster combination lost a great opportunity to regain sole possession of first place, as they lost two out of three in their match with the Jay-Ay-Zeez.

In the other matches, The Eagle won two from the White Fronts, thereby dropping the Fronts a notch in the standings, while the Slovenic Coals continued their winning ways by taking two out of three from the hapless Avsec Printers. Incidentally, the Avsecs are being strengthened by the addition of a regular bowler to take the place of Charlie Petan, who was recalled by Uncle Sam for service in the Army.

The Eagle team had both the high team game and high team series, with a game of 906 and a series of 2524. These are the lowest scores that ever won the high honors of the evening. Tezak Florists had second high team game with 876, while the White Fronts were second high in the total division with a series of 2454.

Individually there was but one star bowler last Thursday, John A. Bluth. John left the alleys a half dollar richer by virtue of his high single game, 221. His other games were 178 and 175 for a total of 574, which also was high for the night. Frank Ramuta came closest to John, having a series of 544, including one game of 219. CHILDREN VANISH IN LARGE SLOVENIAN DEPORTATIONS

London. — Mass deportations in Slovenia, accompanied by rumors of deported children being massacred, were reported in Yugoslav quarters recently.

Deportations in the districts of Ptuj and Brezice in Slovenia reached such dimensions that these regions were becoming virtually depopulated, the reports indicated.

All children under the age of ten were rounded up in the Ptuj district and sent to an unknown destination, with Nazi officials refusing to divulge their whereabouts despite the entreaties of parents, it was said.

Bitter fighting in Yugoslavia, carried on by the Chetniks and various guerrilla groups, was known to have infuriated Berlin, resulting in the previously reported threats to wipe Beograd off the map. No explanation of the deportations was offered.

New deportations numbering about 7,500 were reported from the Celje district in the last few weeks, deportees being transported to the Eastern front under what were described as "appalling" conditions.

At Vienna, the Slovenes were reportedly separated into groups of women, young girls, children and men, and each group sent to a different destination, without any being told where they were going.
