THE POOR GET POORER

As government gets bigger in proportion to the growth of the population and the productive capacity of the people, the rising cost of supporting it must be spread over the backs of more and more people. The old saw about soaking the rich is an empty phrase. There aren't enough of them. The poor also pay taxes, and if inflation and the cost of government continues to rise, the ranks of the poor will increase. This is as certain as night following day. The wealth of the rich is like the proverbial fly speck on a barn door compared to current government spending and borrowing. Payment for multibillion dollar federal programs must be drawn mainly from the limited resources of the majority of citizens — including those in the lower income brackets.

U.S. News & World Report recently published figures showing that taxes take 34 per cent of annual family incomes under \$3,000, because of rising income taxes, social security levies, state and local sales and property taxes. Tax experts, economists and other authorities are now trying to figure out a way to relieve the poor of part of their tax burden. In the meantime, taxes continue to go up as the cost of government continues to grow. Anyone who doubts this has merely to look at the jump in his social security tax that heralded the new year. There is only one way to relieve the tax burden for the poor, as for everyone else. And that is to trim back on government spending and debt.

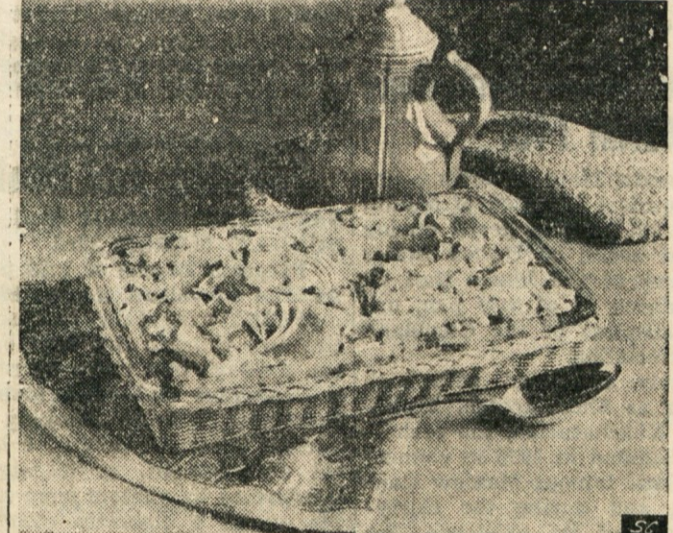

| 1/2 teaspoon paprika | 3 tablespoons flour |
| 1/2 cup sliced onions | 1 teaspoon salt |
| 1 green pepper, sliced | Dash pepper |
| 1/4 cup water | |
- Soak chicken for 30 minutes in ice water; rinse and dry with absorbent paper. Arrange skin side down in a 3-quart (13-1/2 x 8-1/2 x 2-inch) baking dish. Brush with melted butter; sprinkle with salt and paprika. Place sliced onions and green pepper on top of chicken. Bake in a moderate (350° F.) oven 30 minutes. Turn the chicken pieces skin side up; bake 30 minutes. In a medium-size saucepan, bring 1/4 cup water to a boil; add frozen vegetables. Return to a boil; cook at 15 minutes or until vegetables are tender. In a small bowl, mix the 1-1/2 cups water, Sprinkle nonfat dry milk, flour, salt and pepper over surface of water. Beat with rotary beater just until blended. Add to cooked vegetables. Place over low heat; stir constantly until mixture has thickened. Pour over chicken in baking dish. Return to oven for about 3-5 minutes or until thoroughly heated.



Frank Yankovic On Welk TV Show

America's Polka King Frankie Yankovic of Cleveland, will appear on the Lawrence Welk show (WEWS, Channel 5) this Saturday, March 15th.

On Welk's 8:30 to 9:30 p.m. program, the famed polka band monarch will be presented a plaque proclaiming him the first man named to the International Polka Association's recently established Hall of Fame. The coveted honor was given to Yankovic by a vote of leading disc jockeys and record company representatives throughout the nation. Some 30 prominent band leaders were contending for the honor.

YANKOVIC'S appearance on the Lawrence Welk Show will be his fifth in recent years. On Sunday, March 16, the popular proprietor of Yankovic's Steak House, 17027 Euclid Ave., will be installed as the Federation of Slovenian Homes "Man of the Year" at the Slovenian National Home, 6417 St. Clair Avenue. Following the program, Richard Vadnal and his orchestra will entertain. Tickets are available for the dance. But tickets for the banquet honoring Yankovic and the other representatives of all the Slovenian Homes in Cleveland, are sold out.

Frank Yankovic, often called America's "Slovenian Goodwill Ambassador" arose from humble beginnings in the Collinwood area, to become the most publicized Slovenian entertainer in the world. He won his title as "America's Polka King" in Milwaukee in 1950.

Ferdinand J. Chesarek New 4-Star General

On February 21, 1969, President Richard M. Nixon recommended for promotion, Ferdinand J. Chesarek to the rank of a full Four Star General. Thus, he became the first Slovenian to attain this rare and distinguished position in the United States Army. He is surpassed in rank only by two living Five Star Generals, Dwight D. Eisenhower and Omar Bradley.

The General's father, Joseph Chesarek, who lives in Pittsburgh, Pa., was born at Ribnica, Dolensko, Slovenia, Yugoslavia. He is a well-known publicist and fraternalist in Slovenian circles. General Chesarek's brilliant military career began in 1938 when he was graduated from West Point. In World War II, he saw action in the European Theatre of Operations and soon after the end of the war he attained the enviable rank of Colonel. In the post-war period, during the Korean War, and the Vietnam conflict, General Chesarek assumed even more responsible tasks.

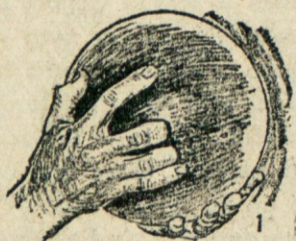

Perfect Shot Requires Perfect Grip

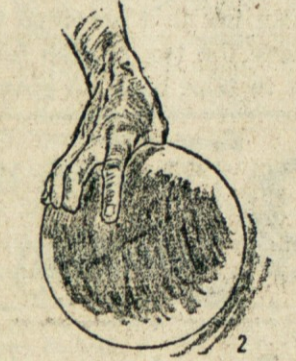
Johnny Guenther, 1968 Miller High Life Open champion and the only active professional to shoot a 300 game on national television, explains the proper grip in bowling:

While all phases of delivery are important, an incorrect grip can ruin what would otherwise be a perfect shot...



You'd be surprised how many beginners and "amateurs" do not have the proper grip. It's the fingers that impart the proper roll...

The grip should be comfortable, but you should not strain on your fingers from overreaching. The finger holes should fit snugly with the thumb hole slightly larger...

YANK ERA ENDS

Ft. Lauderdale, Fla. — Mickey Mantle pulled down the curtain on one of baseball's greatest careers with a one-line statement...

When he said, simply and succinctly, "I'm not going to play any more baseball" to a hurriedly called press conference on March 1, Mickey did more than announce his retirement...

He also pulled down the curtain on what has to be the most exciting, glamorous and legendary era ever enjoyed by an athletic team...

Now, with Mantle following Babe Ruth, Lou Gehrig and Joe DiMaggio into history, the Yankees are bereft of a super-star for the first time in almost a half century...

RESULTS OF STUDY OF BASEBALL'S DEAD SPOTS Baltimore, Md. — With no fanfare whatsoever, a study that is believed to be unprecedented in baseball was made last season...

made public. The recommendations, too, have been made, and it is now up to the American League to enforce them.

The purpose of the study: To pinpoint and time the periods of inactivity during a baseball game.

The initiators of the study: The Orioles; specifically, Executive Vice-President Frank Cashen.

The method: A time and motion study by a Baltimore engineer, Jim Brandenburg.

The results: More than 50 percent of the dead time falls into the category of "time between pitches."

Oriole Player Personnel Director Harry Dalton carried the results to the general managers' meeting last fall. Out of that meeting and the subsequent meetings in San Francisco came these recommendations:

1. Enforce the 20-second rule, stating that a pitcher, when the bases are empty, must deliver the ball to the batter within 20 seconds.

2. That the umpire not be required to inspect the ball at a hitter's request. He is to use his own discretion.

3. Pinch-hitters and pinch-runners must be on the bench, with the exception of a catcher, who may be summoned from the bullpen.

Positive Steps Taken To Prevent Power Failure

A renewed determination to prevent widespread blackouts was pledged by a group of 26 interconnected electric utilities...

In observing the second anniversary of the East Central Area Reliability Coordination group, Karl H. Rudolph, president of the Illuminating Company...

ECAR members serve all or parts of Michigan, Indiana, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Kentucky, West Virginia, Virginia and Maryland.

When ECAR was formed two yrs. ago, its members had a total of more than 37-million kilowatts of electric generating capacity and 24,000 miles of high-voltage transmission lines.

The Avon Lake and Eastlake Power Plants are adding 625,000-kilowatt generators to the system. Near Warren, Pa., the Seneca Power Plant nearing completion is the first pumped storage hydro-electric plant on the system...

One of the most important achievements of ECAR, according to Hudson Milner, president of Louisville Gas and Electric Company...

"The objective of these criteria," Milner said, "is to avoid cascading power interruptions even under the most adverse credible conditions that would be anticipated."

He noted that simulated tests were being constantly made to assure that any outages involving one or more major power plants...

Milner also pointed out that ECAR now has a permanent staff of engineers and technicians, and a headquarters located in Canton, O., near the geographical heart of the 26-utility organization.

ECAR helps its members to "assess the future," Milner explained. "Each day it gathers information on the operational status of all its members' power plants and lines..."

He noted that ECAR's engineers also correlate the construction requirements of its members, allowing the utilities to plan on an area-wide basis.

"In this way," Milner said, "ECAR members can arrive at sizes and timing for power plants and transmission lines that will do the most to strengthen not only the utility constructing the facility, but all of the members of ECAR as a whole."
