

Anglija je zagrozila, da bo pomagala Abesiniji

Mussolinijev agent namignil, da bo Italija izstopila iz Lige narodov

IZREDNA SEJA BRITSKEGA KABINETA

Pariz, 20. avg. — Angleško-italijanski spor zaradi Abesinije se je postrl po polomu angleško-francosko-italijanske konference v Parizu. Z britske strani je večer prišla odprta grožnja, da bo Italija izstopila iz Lige narodov. Italijanski predstavnik, ki je prvič odkar je izbruhnila italijansko-abesinska kriza, poudaril možnost izstopa iz Lige narodov.

Alais je celo dejal, da navzoči predstavniki Italije na tej veta Lige narodov, ki se oboje 4. septembra v Ženevi, zavržejo odločitev, ki se bodo razloži v prihodnjih dveh tednih. Njegova izjava se tu smatra za gotovitev mnenja, da je Mussolinijev agent končno besedo in da bo Italija kmalu napovedala svojo Abesinijo.

Britski krogi, ki so bili nenačrtni zgovorni v zadnjih dneh, so močje o vprašanju pošiljanja orožja in vojnega materiala Abesiniji, toda iz zanesljivih virov je prišlo poročilo, da bo Anglija preklicala embargo za izvoz orožja v Abesinijo.

Grožnja glede oborožitve Abesinije, da se bo slednja lahko uveljavila Italijanom, je prvi odgovor Anglije Mussoliniju, ki je zahteval angleško-francoski mirovni našt in s tem povzročil polom pariske konference.

Dasi je koncentracija italijanske vojske v Eritreji zmanjšala možnost, da bi Abesinija ohranila svojo neodvisnost, je še vedno upanje, da bo afriška država igrala gldolilno vlogo, ako pravčasno dobi dovolj orožja in municije, zlasti če bo cesar Selassie izvajal strategijo, ki bi bila po mnenju evropskih militarističnih ekspertov najbolj učinkovita v kampanji proti Italijanom. Italijanski armadi naj bi dovolj vorkanje v Abesinijo, kakor naj bi njegovi bojovniki vodili guerilsko vojno proti sovražniku. V tem slučaju, pravijo strokovnjaki, je možnost, da se končuje vojno.

Baron Aloisi je včeraj očitno priznal, da so Italijani vzemirali zaradi britske kampanje, kar je cilj je mobiliziranje javnega mnenja proti Italiji pred obratno sejo sveta Lige narodov. Možnost je, da bodo člani Lige na tej seji odobrile ekonomske in druge sankcije proti Italiji. Aloisi je včeraj prvič, odkar se je pričeli razgovori o italijansko-abesinski krizi, osebno sprejel časopisne poročevalce, katerim je pojasnjeval, da sploh ni spora med Italijo in Anglijo.

Britska grožnja, da bo Anglija oborožila Abesinijo, je spraznila v zagato tudi Lavala, francoskega premijera. On bi rad postrl spor in preprečil vsako kampanjo v Ženevi, ki bi lahko pomagala Italiji v nemški tabor. O. Frajezja in Anglija, pa se bo izjavila javnega mnenja doma kakor tudi pritiska s strani marnarodov odobri ekonomske sankcije proti Italiji. Te sankcije bi vključevale tudi zatvoritev Sueškega prekopla italijanskim bojovnikom.

Kongres gre na počitnice ta teden

Zadnja zakone meljejo z vsjo naglico

Washington, D. C. — Vsa znamenja kažejo, da bo kongres zaključil svoje letošnje zasedanje morda še ta teden. Datum zaključka še ni bil oficijelno naznanjen,endar: obe zbornici hitita na vso moč in lista Rooseveltovih zakonskih načrtov, ki morajo biti sprejeti v tem zasedanju, gre h koncu. V ponedeljek je bila v spodnji zbornici sprejeta "mala NRA" za premogovno industrijo ali Guffeyjev načrt, ki ima po izjavah voditeljev rudarske unije UMWA preprečiti stavko rudarjev. Istočasno je bil v senatu sprejet drugi in popravljeni Crosser-Wagnerjev pokojninski zakon za železničarje in predložen predsedniku v podpis; dalje je senat sprejel predelani Frazier-Lemkejev načrt za moratorij na farmah. Obe zbornici sta odobrili po konferenčnem odsku predloženi novi zakon za reguliranje bank. Zakon za odpravo "holding" kompanij je še v rokah konferenčnega odseka.

NOVI STAVKOVNI NEMIRI IN SPOPADI V MINNEAPOLISU

Spopadi med piketi in policijo pred tovarno

MNOGO RANJENIH V BITKI

Minneapolis, Minn., 20. avg. — Včeraj je prišlo do spopada med policijo in piketi, ko so slednji skušali preprečiti obnovo obrata v tovarni Strutwear Knitting Co. Tovarna je morala zapreti vrata zadnji teden zaradi delavskih nemirov.

Neki policaj je ustrelil v zrak in temu je sledila bitka, v kateri je bilo več oseb lahko ranjenih. Piketi so se pričeli zbirati v bližini tovarne že zgodaj zjutraj, ko je policija spremljala stavkokaže v tovarno. Ko so piketi skušali prevrniti poljedilski voz, ki je vozil pred stavkokaže, je sledila praska.

Tovarna je zaprla vrata zadnji petek, ko so jo piketi obkolili in preprečili vstop stavkokažom. Uprava kompanije je zatrjevala, da delavci niso razglasili stavke, a je vseeno apelirala na šupana Latimera za policijsko protekcijo.

Unija zahteva priznanje in popovno uposlitev osmih delavcev, katere je družba vrgla na cesto zaradi unijkim aktivnosti. Unijski uradniki pravijo, da so bili ti delavci odpušteni kmalu po odloku zveznega vrhovnega sodišča, ko je razveljavilo zakon obnove.

Danville, Ill., 20. avg. — Prebivalci tega mesta so bili sinoči brez električne razsvetljave, ker je dinamična bomba razdejala stolp z žicami, ki so dovajale električni tok mestu. Iz tega dogodka sodijo, da bodo uslužbenci Illinois Power & Light Co. obnovili stavko. Zadnja stavka, ki je izbruhnila pred nekaj meseci in je bila nedavno poravnana, je bila zajela vse javne naprave v južnem Illinoisu.

East St. Louis, Ill., 20. avg. — Petsto delavcev je včeraj zastavkalo in s tem ustavilo obrat v podjetju Obear-Nester Glass Co. Izmed teh je 425 organiziranih v uniji Glass Bottle Blowers, ostalih 75, ki so člani druge unije steklarskih delavcev, pa se je pridružil stavki iz simpatije. Stavkarji pravijo, da je kompanija odklonila njih zahtevo glede zvišanja mezde deset odstotkov.

Kontrola nogavičarske industrije

Vladna kontrola bi prinesla mir

Philadelphia, Pa. — (FP) — Voditelji Ameriške federacije nogavičarskih delavcev so se izrekli za vladno kontrolo nogavičarske industrije. Emil Rieve, predsednik federacije, in ostali člani eksekutive, so dobili nalogo, naj delajo na to, da bo predlagani zakonski osnutek glede vladne kontrole tekstilne industrije ukičujeval tudi nogavičarsko.

Eksekutiva je že instruirala uradnike krajevnih unij, naj takoj prične s intenzivno vzgojno in agitatorično kampanjo, da dobe podporo javnosti in z njeno pomočjo vplivajo na kongres in ga prepričajo o potrebi sprejetja predložene zakonodaje.

Na podlagi načrta vladne kontrole tekstilne industrije se mora uveljaviti delovni teden 36 ur v vsaj industriji, minimalne plače po unijski lestvici in pravica kolektivnega pogajanja mora biti garantirana.

Po izjavi Williama Smitha, tajnika blagajnika federacije, bi morala biti arbitražna mašinerija, ki je sedaj v veljavi za organizirano sekcijo industrije, vzorec za poravnavo vseh sporov. Ta sekcija reprezentira okrog 60 odstotkov nogavičarjev. Ako bo osnutek uveljavljen, bo postal instrument in garancija miru ter stabilnosti v industriji. Posebna vladna komisija naj bi enforširala provizije predložene zakonodaje.

Mogočnost amer. filmske industrije

Vsota investicij je nad dve milijardi dolarjev

Hollywood, Cal. — (FP) — Zveza proizvajalcev filmskih slik je pravkar objavila številke, ki točno in popolno kažejo obseg ameriške filmske industrije: Industrija uposljuje 30,000 ljudi, katerih letna plača je \$75,000,000. Ti ljudje izdelajo 75 odstotkov vseh filmov na svetu. Samo letošnja produkcija filmov bo stala \$120,000,000 poleg investicij v vsoti \$266,000,000.

Letna produkcija hollywoodskih slik znaša šest milijonov čevljev filmov, za katere se poleg drugega materiala porabi štiri tisoč ton bombaža. Filmske družbe potrošijo za drugi material, ki se rabi pri produkciji filmov — les, cement itd. — nadaljnjih \$45,000,000 letno. Pri izdelovanju filmov je uposlenih 275 različnih strok, profesij in obrti.

Gradnja kinogledališč je lanske leto stala \$13,000,000, po pravila pa \$22,500,000 v isti dobi. V Ameriki je danes 18,263 kinogledališč, ki uposljujejo 234,000 ljudi, dočim jih je pri distribuciji filmov uposlenih nadaljnjih osem tisoč, skupno 270,000 v ameriški filmski industriji.

Letni davek te industrije je \$100,000,000, za oglaševanje potroši \$70,000,000, za zavarovalnino pa \$30,000,000.

Skupne investice v ameriški filmski industriji so nad dve milijardi dolarjev, poleg nadaljnje pol milijarde, ki predstavlja investicije ameriških filmskih družb v podružnicah zunaj Združenih držav.

DELAVSTVO V NEW YORKU PONOVO GROZI S STAVKO

Unije obljubile podporo relifnim delavcem

UNIJSKE PLAČE ZA VSE

New York. — (FP) — Tukaj je bila ponovno izrečena grožnja, da bo oklicana splošna stavka, ako bo predsednik Roosevelt ignoriral novo zahtevo organiziranega delavstva, da morajo izurjenih delavci pri relifnih projektih prejemati unijsko plačo.

Thomas Murray, načelnik stavkovnega komiteja, je izrekel to grožnjo po konferenci z voditelji newyorških gradbenih unij. Dalje je Murray rekel, da je organizirano delavstvo v drugih mestih obljubilo popolno kooperacijo stavkarjem. On bo najprej apeliral na Roosevelta, Hopkinsa, generala Johnsona in gubernorja Lehmana, naj revidirajo svoje stališče glede "zaščitne mezde" v prilog unijkemu delavstvu, ki zahteva običajne mezde pri relifnih projektih.

"Z ozirom na dejstvo, da relifna administracija nudi zaslužek samo neorganiziranim delavcem, mora delavstvo pokazati svojo moč, če ne bodo avtoritete revidirale svoje taktike", je dejal Murray.

Organizacije brezposelnih in pisarniških delavcev so obljubile Murrayju vso podporo v tem boju. V preiskovanem slučaju je David Lasser, vodja organizacije brezposelnih, pomagal nekemu sidarju-stavkarju, da je bil spet deležen relifa, čeprav sta Roosevelt in Hopkins, načelnik administracije relifnih del, naznanila, da ne bo nihče, ki zastavka pri relifnih projektih, deležen podpore iz relifnega sklada.

Sovjeti izgnali poljskega poročevalca

Moskva, 20. avg. — Sovjetska vlada je včeraj odredila izgon Jana Otmarja Bersona, poročevalca oficijelne Gazete Poljske v Varšavi, zaradi lažnjivega poročanja. Berson je pred kratkim poročal svojemu listu, da se v nekem sovjetskem zavodu vrše eksperimenti s "križanjem ljudi in opic v svrhu izboljšanja bodoče generacije sovjetskega prebivalstva." Razen tega se je tudi v svojih poročilih norčeval iz ruske komunistične mladine.

Japonska ofenziva proti kitajskim komunistom

Sanghaj, 20. avg. — General Hajao Tada, vrhovni poveljnik japonskih čet v severni Kitajski, je te dni pozval kitajske oblasti na sodelovanje za likvidacijo komunističnega gibanja na Kitajskem, posebno v vseh provincinah, ki meje na notranjo Mongolijo. To pomeni, da se japonski militaristi pripravljajo na vojaško ofenzivo proti kitajskim rdečim armadam, ki so danes najbolj aktivne v provinci Szečvan.

Šest mrtvih pri rumunskih izgredivih

London, 20. avg. — Iz Bukarešte poročajo, da je bilo večeraj šest oseb ubitih in 12 ranjenih pri izgredivih med policijo in kmeti v Besarabiji. Vzrok izgrediv je "koledarska vojna", ki je v teku v Rumuniji, odkar je vlada uvedla gregorijanski koledar namesto starega julijanskega, ki je 13 dni kasnejši.

Petnajst mrtvih med neurjem v Rusiji

Moskva, 20. avg. — Petnajst oseb je izgubilo življenje v teku silne nevihte in viharja v Rostovu na Donu v noč 18. avgusta.

Why Not Go After the Big Crooks?

On the first page of the morning paper appears the following headline: Cummings Pledges Clean-Up of Bar; Attorney General Tells Police Chiefs Federal Men Are Seeking to Jail All in League With Underworld.

An excellent idea! Of course, the le crooks who shield kidnapers, bank robbers and others of that ilk should be confined to "hoosegow".

But how about the members of the bar who are in league with the criminals of the underworld—bankers, utility magnates and others who persistently flout the law but are kept out of the penitentiary by smart lawyers?

Mr. Cummings has been in office more than two years. He has delivered more speeches denouncing crime and criminals than any other attorney general, but the big law-breakers are still doing business at the old stand. —Labor.

New Deal Contradictions

Behind every move at Washington dealing with the depression is the idea of not disturbing the holy institution of capitalistic property. Human beings outside the range of the view are dealt with as animals to be kept until the owners can use them in industry.

The latest move is the WPA program reducing wages in the building trades one-half and extending the hours of labor. This is intended to shift workers from relief rolls payrolls of the government. Only a little of a hundred thousand have thus far been shifted from idle relief to employment relief. In the Middle West some states have cut off relief to force those receiving it to work in harvest fields.

Of the WPA program another situation developing. There are those who are jobless but who have some resources not yet exhausted. Not until they become bankrupt will they be eligible for idle relief, but they also cannot get WPA jobs as these jobs go to those receiving relief. The job preference of the idle thus coming to be called the "aristocracy of the idle." Later the jobless man whose resources are finally exhausted will have the glorious privilege of being a member of the "aristocracy."

Meantime, the WPA program will exert fearful downward pressure on wages throughout the country, thus reducing purchasing power and increasing the number of the idle. These contradictions and absurdities are a direct outcome of policies that seek the preservation of production for the profit gains of the capitalist class. Misery without end is the price of all this unless the masses have the intelligence to end the capitalist system out of which this torture and uncertainty issue. —New Leader.

The Answer to Machine Production

The ingenuity of man has made it not only possible, but necessary—for private plantation owners to cast aside an entire section, involving millions, of the working class. We refer to the Rust cotton-picking machine.

The mechanical cotton picker will do a job better and quicker than human hands possibly could. The share-cropper and the farm laborer will therefore be added to the relief rolls.

It matters not that machines don't wear out and will therefore not become customers for their product. It is useless to point to the plight of the workers who will be ruthlessly scrapped. The plantation owner simply must use the machine or be beaten out in the game by competitors who do use it.

So what . . . ? What is the answer to machinery under a system of competitive production for private profit? Do we want to smash the intricate tools of production and return to the hand labor era? Impossible! Do we want to perpetuate displaced millions to starve to death? Unthinkable; who, then, would wear the cotton?

There is but one answer. It is the social ownership of the means of production and distribution and the operation of industry for use instead of for profit. When society takes that answer machinery will become a servant, instead of the competitor of people. Plenty and leisure will take the place of poverty and unemployment.

Think it over. Have you any other solution? —B. L. A.
