

Velebizniška reakcija slavi zmago nad delavstvom

Predstavniki velekapitala čestitajo kongresu nad porazom veta.—Velika poparjenost med unijskimi voditelji.—Zahteva za generalno protestno stavko

Washington, 24. jun.—Velebizniška reakcija slavi svojo veliko zmago in čestita kongresu, ker je sprejel Taft-Hartleyev, drakonski antidelavski zakon preko predsednikovega veta. Vse se, ker je s tem zakonom dobil bič, s katerim bo lahko razbijala unije in organizirano delavstvo posadila ob steno.

Eden prvih, ki je čestital se način nad porazom predsednikovega veta, je bil Earl Bunting, predstavnik Narodne podjetniške zveze. Pridružil se mu je takoj Earl O'Shreve, predstavnik Ameriške trgovske zbornice, in kongratuliral kongresu vsed njegovega "pogumnega modrega dela."

Enaki glasovi velikega zadovoljstva prihajajo iz vseh velebizniških krogov. James L. Donnelly, podpredstavnik Illinoiske podjetniške zveze je vrzel javnost nekaj peska v oči z izjavo, da "sprejetje te postave pomeni mačilno zmago za veliko večino ameriških državljanov v vseh slojih," torej tudi za delavce, po katerih bo padal bič.

Podobnih izjav iz krogov velebizniških drugih reakcij, ki ima kongres in tudi državne zbornice v popolnem zakupu, bi lahko citirali na stotine. V resnici že dolga leta ni bilo med gospodarji dežele in njih valjeti toliko veselja nad sprejetjem kakšnega zakona kakor ga kažejo danes nad sprejetjem te anti-delavskih postav.

Veliko veselje je seveda tudi v republikanskih krogih kongresa, ki se imajo za svojo zmago zahvaliti demokratični večini, ki prav tako tudi proti organiziranemu delavstvu in jutri glasovala za sprejetje tega zakona. Grki pošiljajo živež Ameriki!

Za "lačne" ameriške Grke je prispolo 40,000 paketov

New York. — Odkar je New York Times objavil senzacijo, da iz Grčije prihaja v Ameriko veliko število živežnih paketov, tudi takih, v katerih je prekajeno meso, je marsikomu postalno vroče. Posebno pa predstavnikom ameriške vlade, zagovornikom "Trumanove doktrine" in načelnikom raznih grških relifnih akcij.

Kot poročajo carinske oblasti, je prišlo v Ameriko iz Grčije okrog 40,000 živilskih paketov v skupni teži okrog 180,000 funkov. Ko so na carinarnic te pakete odprli, so našli v njih tudi prekajeno meso in klobase. V koliko paketih so našli meso, je postalno sporno vprašanje. Prva poročila so se glasila, da so ga našli v več tisoč paketih. James A. Booras, predstavnik Ameriško-grške trgovske zbornice, pa to zanika in pravi, da je bilo le 40–60 takih paketov.

Da je stvar prišla na dan, je vzrok v tem, ker je uvoz mesa kakor tudi mnogih drugih stvari podvržen carini.

Vprašanje je tudi nastalo, kako si naj kdo tolmači ta čuden dogodek, to veliko grško darežljivost v starem kraju. Do zdaj so vsa poročila govorila, da je naše dežele v Evropi, kjer bi bilo tako pomanjkanje kot v Grčiji in da je povsem odvisna od ameriškega relifa. Prej omenjeni Booras zdaj pravi, da je to znak hvaljenosti grškega naroda za veliko ameriško pomoč. Vsekakor pa so morali tudi v Grčiji slišati, da je tudi v Ameriki veliko pomanjkanje živeža

in zato so tisoči začeli pošiljati živežne pakete svojcem v tej deželi.

Vladna kontrola nad izvozom olja

Akcija je naperjena proti Rusiji

Washington. — Zvezna vlada je zopet vzpostavila kontrolo nad izvozom gasolina in vseh petrolejskih produktov v tujino. To moč ji daje vojni zakon, ki poteka 30. junija, toda administracija pritiska na kongres, da ga podaljša. Ta kontrola je bila predlagana lani, zato pa je zopet vzpostavljena.

Vladi je to storila, da potolaže reakcijo, ki je pričela grmeti proti izvažanju ameriškega gasolina in drugih petrolejskih izdelkov v Sovjetski uniji. Zadnje čase je prišlo v zapadna pristanišča več ruskih oljnih parnikov po kalifornijsko olje. Ta akcija ne pomeni, da bo ta izvoz ustavljen, marveč le, da bo pod vladno kontrolo, kar pomeni, da voda lahko tudi ustavi izvoz v katerokoli deželi.

Cejlon dobi status dominiona?

Posvetovanja pred odločitvijo naznanjena

London, 24. jun.—Otok Cejlona v Bengalskem zalivu, ki je igral važno vlogo v teku druge svetovne vojne, bo morda dobil status dominiona v okviru britskega imperija. Otok obsegava 25,332 kvadratnih milij in ima 3,500,000 prebivalcev.

Stavke domaćinov na otoku vznemirjajo britsko vlado. Povezane so s kampanjo za samovladje in odcepitev od britskega imperija. Cejlona je pod kontrolo Velike Britanije od 1. 1796.

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Komunistične zmagane na Kitajskem

Vladne čete odstranjujejo stroje iz premogovnikov.

Peiping, Kitajska, 24. jun.—Nacionalistične čete vlade diktatorja Čiangja Kaišeka so začele odstranjevati stroje iz premogovnikov v bližini Mukdena, največjega mesta v Mandžuriji, iz bojazni pred komunističnimi silami.

Akcija je značilna, ker potrjuje uspehe in zmage komunističnih sil v Mandžuriji in severni Kitajski. Poročilo pravi, da so bili stroji že odstranjeni iz premogovnikov v distriktu Fušunu. V tem distriktu so največji premogovniki.

List Ta Kung, glasilo Kaiševe vlade, je priznal zmage komunističnih sil. Omenil je nevarnost komunistične zasege premogovnikov v Mandžuriji. Ljutite bitke divljajo med vladnimi četami in komunisti v bližini Penšija, industrijskega središča v Mandžuriji. Poročilo pravi, da sta obe strani utrpljeli velike izgube.

Nova komunikačijska iznajdba

Washington. — Niles Trammell, predstavnik National Broadcasting Co., je naznani novo radijsko komunikacijsko iznajdbo, s katero bo mogoče oddajati milijon besed na minuto. Dejal je, da bo ta iznajdba odprla možnost radijskim časopisom. Skrivnost te iznajdbe je v tem, da se po radiu lahko posluje cela stran besed, ki so na prejmem koncu hipno reproducirane v celoti. Na ta način bo mogoče tiskanje radijskih časopisov tudi doma.

Ogrska "bela knjiga" dolži vladu Amerike in Anglije, da sta pomagali ogrskim zarotnikom

Budimpešta, Ogrska.—Ogrska vlada je obdolžila Ameriko, da je obljubila direktno finančno pomoč ogrskim zarotnikom in da je angleška vlada rabila zarotnike v šponaži proti ogrski vladi. Te obdolžitve so navedene v "beli knjigi," ki jo je izdala ogrska vlada.

Dokument ogrske vlade citira zarotnika Ference Kovacs, ki je razkril detajle zarote po aretaciji. V dokumentu je rečeno, da je Lazslo Ecker-Racz, ameriški trgovinski svetovalec v Budimpešti, obljubil finančno pomoč bivšemu premirju Ferencu Nagyu, ki je resigniral in se sedaj nahaja v Zdrženih državah. Nagy je pogbenil v Švicarji in tam v Ameriku.

Ference Kovacs, ki je bil osebni tajnik premirja Nagya, je izpovedal, da mu je Nagy načrt, naj izkaže posebno nakljenjenost Ecker-Racziju zato, ker je obljubil, da bo Nagy podprt z denarjem pri prihodnjih volitvah, da se bo vzdrljala na krmilu ogrske vlade strank malih posestnikov. Ecker-Racz je bil prideljen ameriškemu policijskemu partizanu v Budimpešti.

Kovacsovo izjavo o zaroti je podprt njegov osebni policijski stražnik Miloš Jarmaj, ki je tudi bil aretiran. Dejal je, da je bil v službi britskih častnikov, katerim je dajal informacije o policijski organizaciji v Budimpešti in v provincah. Člani policije so bili zapleteni v politično zaroto, ki je delovala, da vzpostavi fašistično vlado na Ogrskem.

Bela knjiga ogrske vlade zavzema 150 strani dokumentirane evidence. Pogajanja med britsko tajno agencijo in ogrskimi zarotniki za vzpostavitev habsburške dinastije v Avstriji in na Ogrskem so se vršili v septembra 1945, sedem mesecov po okupaciji Budimpešti po sovjetskih četah. Vladni dokumenti izpričujejo, da je bivši premier Nagy hotel napraviti iz Ogrske "ekonomsko in politično

Anglija išče živila v Jugoslaviji

Zboljšanje odnosa med državama

London, 24. jun.—Znamenja so, da se bodo odnosi med Veliko Britanijo in Jugoslavijo zboljšali v bližnji bodočnosti. Naznailo pravi, da hoče Velika Britanija kupiti vsa previšna živila od Jugoslavije v prihodnjih petih ali desetih letih.

Zadnja pogajanja so se vršila v Belgradu, ko se je tam mudil britski letalski minister Philip Noel-Baker. Uradno je slednji dospel v jugoslovansko prestolnico z namenom, da odpre razstavo britskih knjig tamkaj. To je bila le preteza in poteka za važnejšo misijo.

Noel-Baker je imel razgovore z maršalom Titom in drugimi člani jugoslovenske vlade. Predlagal je sklenitev trgovinskega dogovora, na čigar podlagi naj bi Jugoslavija izvajala v Veliko Britanijo previšno meso, pšenico in druge živila. Tito je orsal pogoje glede sklenitve dogovora. Glavna pogoja sta:

Zadovoljiva izravnava glede odškodnine, katero zahteva Velika Britanija za svojo lastnino v Jugoslaviji, ki je bila podržljena. Ta uključuje rudnike cinka, svinca in bakra v Jugoslaviji.

Tito je zahteval od Velike Britanije izročitev jugoslovenskih zločincev, ki so v Italiji in britskih okupacijskih conah v Nemčiji in Avstriji. Ako bo Velika Britanija sprejela pogoje, bo trgovinski dogovor podpisani med državama.

Eisenhowerju ponujajo novo službo

New York. — General Eisenhower, načelnik generalnega štaba je od Kolumbijske univerze prejel ponudbo, naj preveri predsedništvo tega vsečiličnika. Znamenje, da je militarni poveljnik dvigati glavo tudi po univerzah.

Amerika dobila oblast v Grčiji

Zadevni dogovor podpisan v Atenah

Washington, D. C., 24. jun.—Grčija je dala Ameriki vso oblast v nadziranju potrošilcev \$300,000,000, vsote, katero je dobila od Amerike. Denar bo šel za ojačanje grške armade in ublažitev bede v Grčiji. V sočasju je s Trumanovim doktrino, ki določa ustavitev prodirjanja komunizma povsed in širjenja vpliva sovjetske Rusije.

Garančija, da bo imela Amerika proste roke v Grčiji, je v dogovoru, ki je bil prvakar podpisan v Atenah. V imenu Amerike je dogovor podpisal poslanik Lincoln MacVeagh, v imenu Grčije pa zunanji minister Konstantin Caldaris.

Grška monarhistična vlada se je z dogovorom obvezala, da bo izvajala program finančnih, industrijskih in ekonomskih reform pod ameriškim nadzorstvom. To pomeni, da je Grčija pod ameriško ekonomsko dominacijo.

Dogovor vsebuje tudi klavzulo, da Amerika lahko takoj ustanovi pomoč Grčiji, ako ne bo atenska vlada delala po navodilih ameriških avtoritetov. Detajli dogovora, ki je bil podpisan v Atenah, so bili orisani v notah, ki so bile izmenjane med ameriško in grško vlado zadnjo sredo.

Konferenca o ameriški pomoči v Parizu

Predstavniki Anglije, Francije in Rusije se sestanejo v petek.—Nova trenja na vidiku

London, 24. jun.—Anglija in Francija sta sprejeli rusko sugestijo, da se prične konferenca zunanjih ministrov teh treh držav 27. junija v Parizu. Ta konferenca je sklicana na pobudo Bevina v Bidaultu, zunanjih ministrov Anglike in Francije, da se s predstavniki Rusije pogovore o načrtu za ameriško finančno pomoč za rekonstrukcijo Evrope v smislu sugestije državnega tajnika Marshalla, katerega je podal v svojem govoru 5. jun. na Harvardski univerzi.

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Sanje, ki so izhlapele

Ko je Hitler pričel s svojim krvavim karnevalom in vrgel narode v drugi svetovni požar, v katerem je bila neizbežno potegnena tudi Amerika, smo v tisti veliki debati pred "lend-leasom" in Pearl Harborjem veliko slišali, da mora tudi ta dežela prispevati svoj delež—seveda "short of war"—za zdrobitev nemškega in pozneje japonskega militarizma.

Takrat je bilo mnogo naglašanja, da je militarizem največje zlo človeštva, slehernega naroda in civilizacije, kajti militarizem je glavni netilec vojne. In dokler militarizem ne bo str, toliko časa bo tudi obstajala vojna nevarnost. Zato se mora tudi Amerika oborožiti do zob in pomagati zadaviti to veliko zlo in ga spraviti s sveta. Argument je tudi bil, ako Amerika v takne svojo glavo v pesez in dovoli zmago Hitlerju, tedaj bo tudi ona prisiljena postati "velika oborožena kempa". S porazom nacijske Nemčije in enako militaristične Japanske se bo ta dežela z vsem ostalim svetom lahko oddahnila in spremeni orožje v pluge. S tem se bo obvarovala pred ogromnim oboroževalnim stroški, ki bi jih morala nositi v primeri Hitlerjeve in sploh osišče zmage. Z drugo besedo, vojna ni bila samo proti fašizmu, marveč enako tudi proti militarizmu, kajti oba sta si dvojčka.

Proti tem argumentom ni mogel nihče nastopiti, kajti njih logika je bila na dlani. Jasno je bilo lahko vsakemu, da bi se v primeri nacijske zmage morala tudi ta dežela oborožiti do zob in se oprijeti militarizmu, kajti Hitlerjev imperialistični pohlep po svetovni nadvladi z oboroženo silo ni bil v realnu praznih sanj, marveč je bil bistvo nacizma. Z ene strani hitlerizem, z druge strani japonski oboroženi imperializem. Svet bi jačal pod želesno peto, kakršne ne poznava noben zgodbivinar.

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Ko bo Hitler s svojim osiščem vred poražen, se bo odvalil od srca velik kamen slehernemu človekoljubu, svobodoljubu, pravicoljubu in miroljubu. Vsaj tako smo med vojno pričakovali in sanjali. Prav tako smo tudi sanjali, da bo po vojni militarizma konec širok sveta, kajti sovražnik bo tako uničen, da počaže dežele sploh ne bodo more več sanjati o militarizmu. Bili smo sigurni, da jim zmagovalci tega ne bodo dovolili za dolgo dobo, in sicer v svojem lastnem interesu ter interesu svetovnega miru. Narodi se bodo povezali v novi svetovni organizaci, krepkejši in trdnjejši od zatonjene Lige narodov, osnovali sistem kolektivne zaščite svetovnega miru in spremeniili orožje v pluge.

Tako je marsikdo sanjal in po svojih močeh deloval za zmago nad kletim sovražnikom, ki v barbarstvu in sadizmu ni poznal meje. To je bilo takrat, ko so v tej deželi in širu zavezniškega sveta valovale Willkiejeve ideje o "enotnem svetu" in ko so se tudi največji konservativci in kapitalisti divili hrabri rdeči armadi, občudovili ruske narode in Titove herojske partizane ter delovali, kako bi jim čim hitreje in izdatnejše olajšali neizmerno Golgoto. Tako je tudi izgledalo, dokler nam je tekla voda v grlo... Po zmagi bo militarizmu konec enkrat za vselej in svet se bo končno lahko oddahnil pred možnostmi nove vojne... Zaživel bo svobodno v bratskem sožitju narodov... Svoje spore bo reševal okrog konferenčnih miz, v skrajni potrebi tudi pred mednarodnim sodiščem—nič več z orojem, kajti moderno orožje danes lahko pomeni pogin civilizacije... Zavladal bo zakon, ki bo napravil konec džungelskemu barbarizmu... Človek se bo končno civiliziral in zavrgel militarizem, kajti slednji mu prinaša le suženjstvo in pogin...

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Tako je sanjal Willkie, tako so sanjali milijoni. Žal pa niso bili med temi sanjači oni, ki vladajo:—visoki politiki in diplomati, mogočne osebnosti iz Wall streeta, visoki oficirji in drugi militaristi, razni Luceji in Hooverji in Vandenbergi in Dullesi. Pa tudi v Londonu in Moskvi se niso ukvarjali s temi sanjam, marveč kako bi ohranili angleški imperij, kako raztegnili sovjetsko sfero ter se zavarovali pred kakšnim novim "sanitarnim kordonom". Z drugo besedo, vsi ti krogi so tudi ves čas gigantskega boja zasedovali "praktično" ali "realistično" politiko. Čim bolj se je krava borba bližala svojemu koncu, čim bolj je bil siguren poraz osišča, toliko bolj so se vladajoči krogi in generalni štabi igrali "realistično" politiko, znano tudi kot "power politics".

Kakor smo čitali, so v našem generalnem štabu že med vojno delali na načrtih za—novo svetovno vojno! Enako so gotovo delali tudi v Londonu, kajti oba generalna štaba sta bila povezana kot siamska dvojčka, kakor sta v precejšnji meri še danes. S tako možnostjo so po vseh videzih računali tudi v Moskvi in tudi tam kovali podobne načrte. Tako kaže vsaj vsa sovjetska zunanjša politika. V njen zagovor je možno reči le to, da je sovjetska "realpolitika" predvsem defenzivna, prav tako angleška, medtem ko je "naša" zunanjša politika bolj in bolj ofenzivna, bazirana na konceptih "obrambne agresije"—zdaj "Trumanova doktrina"—kot je bilo to v preteklosti svojstvo vseh militaristično-agresivnih držav. Razlika je v tem, da je ta koncept "obrambne agresije" podprt tudi z—atomsko bombo...

Z drugo besedo: oni, ki so pred Pearl Harborjem argumentirali in bili iskreno prepričani, da mora Amerika na vsej črti sodelovati za poraz nacifašističnega osišča zato, da se bo po vojni lahko obvarovala pred lastnim militarizmom, so se gredo varali. Kar se je zgodilo in kar se danes dogaja, je vse nekaj drugega kot so sanjali oni ali kdorkoli. Kar se je zgodilo, je to, da je Amerika izšla iz vojne ne samo kot najmogočnejša industrijska država, marveč tudi največja militaristična sila. Faktično se je s to svojo močjo in militarizmom toliko upijanjila, da hoče danes v vsem posneti in še nadkritiči pruski in japonski imperializem. V ta namen hočejo vladajoče sile z generalnim štabom načelu tudi osrediti deželo s tračno obvezno vojaščino. Za doseg

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ALL THE TRAFFIC WILL BEAR

Family Pocketbooks Are Being Dusted At a Rate That Spells Depression

Business plucked the American pocketbook for excessive profits in 1946 at a rate that bids well to lay the goose on the taxidermist's work bench. Despite work stoppages in the first quarter of 1946 and the difficulties of reconversion from a war to a peacetime economy, manufacturers, wholesalers and retailers priced products on a profit basis that garnered an all-time record of net profits—all in the face of higher income taxes—bigger than at any previous period in our peace-time economy.

The combined net profits of 942 companies representing 79 industries was \$3,656,933,912 for 1946, 34 percent over the \$2,738,686,374 earnings reported by the same companies in 1945.

The pluck-pocket profit margins are still being maintained by big business in 1947 as attested by the fact that companies represented by 51 percent of the common stocks listed on the New York Stock Exchange paid dividends in the first quarter of 1947, 22.9 percent above those paid for the same quarter of 1946. As an example of how the gravy train of profits rolled in dividend dollars:

20 amusement companies increased dividends	53.5 percent
25 building companies	46.2 percent
72 chemical companies	36.3 percent
64 food processing companies	26.2 percent
garment makers	48.6 percent
11 leather and shoe manufacturers	41.0 percent
91 machinery and metal products companies	27.6 percent
mining	29.1 percent
30 paper and publishing companies	96.1 percent
40 petroleum companies	32.0 percent
70 retail merchandising companies	85.0 percent
10 rubber manufacturers	114.9 percent
6 ship operating companies	67.9 percent
39 steel, iron and coke companies	19.7 percent
32 textile companies	147.5 percent

These gouge-'em-all profit statistics clearly show why the average family has had to economize on food, clothing and all else.

If corporations persist in continuing to break all profit records quarter after quarter and year after year until the public is milked dry of its savings and in hock to all the small loan sharks, the American people will wake up to find themselves facing unemployment, bread lines, made work and beset by all the attendant evils of depression periods.

An examination of the earnings of individual companies on a broad scale would disclose startling profiteering. The Journal has neither the space nor the staff to make a comprehensive study of individual companies, but as an example we are taking one chain operating approximately 100 retail apparel stores and branches, namely, Allied Stores.

Going back to the prewar period 1931 to January 1941, the financial record of Allied Stores shows that the highest annual earnings reported by this chain were \$3,996,129, the equivalent of \$1.57 per common share. In four of the years, the company had deficits ranging from 19 cents to \$3.79 a common share. Beginning with the war years, the company earned: \$2.27 in 1941—\$2.50 in 1942—\$3.17 in 1943—\$3.42 in 1944—and \$4.05 in 1945.

With all price controls lifted and businessmen making a mockery of free enterprise in the game of taking toll of all the traffic will bear, Allied Stores earned a net profit in 1946 of \$18,378,752 on 2,062,722 common shares after taxes and all charges, equal to \$8.52 a share; as against \$8,370,405 on 1,804,822 common shares for the previous year.

The book value of Allied Stores common stock, as reported in 1945, is \$23.05. Thus the year's profit for 1946 was the equivalent of more than one-third of the book value of the stock.

It does not require the trained eye and skill of a public accountant to see how Allied Stores took its consumers.

Allied Stores is just one of the many that pursued the gouging game of plucking the public pocketbook in 1946.

The business gouge that prevailed during the war period and has been operated on a larger scale since price controls were lifted tells the story of why people are doing without more and more things, resorting to cheaper bulk foods, seeing fewer movies, buying less ice cream and in general having a difficult time making ends meet.—(The U.M.W. Journal)

Of all diseases tuberculosis is perhaps the most clearly affected by social conditions. Today in Europe, for example, the most serious health problem is the enormous increase in tuberculosis which has resulted from the war.

While the so-called white plague can and does affect all classes of society, it causes its greatest devastation among working people. This is not due to any hereditary defect peculiar to industrial workers. On the contrary, it is caused by the very same factors responsible for the wartime increase of tuberculosis in Europe, that is by social conditions.

In the U.S. the death rate from tuberculosis is very low among professional men, officials and businessmen. On the other hand, the rate for semiskilled workers is four times as great for professional men, while the tuberculosis death rate among unskilled workers is seven times as great.

During the last depression, in 1936, it was found that families on relief suffered nine times as much disability from tuberculosis as those with incomes of \$3,000 or more a year. We know that workers' incomes are much lower than those of business and professional men, so the lack of money is clearly an important factor in the high tuberculosis rate among workers as compared to these other groups.

To conquer tuberculosis, the workers' plague, we must not only improve our medical facilities, but even more important, we must improve the American standard of living. Higher wages, shorter hours, less speedup and a lot more housing projects—these are the "miracle drugs" that will wipe out tuberculosis.

Nation Swept Clean Of All Major Strikes

End of the long telephone strike left the industrial front without a single nationwide stoppage, the Department of Labor pointed out last week.

At the most, there are only six or seven strikes involving over 1,000 workers each, the Department said. All others are small local disputes.

Meanwhile, the Department released a strike roundup for April which showed a sharp rise during that month of man-days lost due to work stoppage. But of the total toll—7,750,000 man-days—three-fourths was due to the telephone dispute, precipitated by the hard-boiled American Telephone & Telegraph Company.

For some industrial workers silicosis is responsible for the high tuberculosis death rate. Hard coal miners, foundry workers, and other workers who must inhale silica dust are likely to develop silicosis. This

DOLLARS VS. COMMUNISM

With the President's signature attached to the Greek-Turkish aid bill, the new American foreign policy is now legally in effect. Hundreds of millions have been appropriated to carry the gospel to the heathen, with billions to follow. What remains is to select the missionaries and their leaders, arm them with dollars for gifts and credits, with guns and food, and with the sacred American "know how" which, above all benefactions, is considered a sovereign defense against communism and other disorders of ailing systems.

There are those who say the policy will fail or justify itself according to the men our government selects to administer it, and certainly any creed takes on some of the character of its prophets. But it would be foolish to bank too much on this popular notion, for the reverse is even more generally the case. Men very soon take on the character of the creed they are hired to expound, be it free enterprise or communism or Catholicism or the preeminent superiority of the Fuller brush.

Some liberal supporters of Mr. Truman's doctrine argue that opposition to communism only incidentally involves support of reactionaries: that it need not do so. They believe quite sincerely that we can and should, and even perhaps will, convert the Greek government to the democratic precepts applied in some advanced parts of the United States; or otherwise that firm American intervention will force the regime to adopt a sober and moderate course. They cite as hopeful evidence the apparent willingness of the Maximov government to accept U.N. supervision of the carrying out of an amnesty. What such people ignore is the essential meaning of the Greek struggle; with all the talk about Russian penetration and border violations they forget that a revolution is going on in Greece. The issues may be confused, but they will not be solved even by an internationally supervised amnesty. The peasants and guerrilla fighters in the mountains are not going to come out, I imagine, or give up their arms, until they know that the men responsible for the acts of the Nazi-trained security police and the armed gangs and the military repressions have been ousted from power. Otherwise their lives would be safe only as long as the amnesty observers remained on the spot. And their cause would be lost.

Physicians have come to learn also, that it is not enough to cure a worker with tuberculosis and then send him back to hard physical labor, for he will soon break down again. They have learned that it is much better to try to change his occupation to something less strenuous by teaching him clerical work, for example, while he is getting better in the hospital. Also, in some communities, "sheltered workshops" have been established, where the worker can carry on under medical supervision and still work on his trade.

In 1918 and 1919 the countries of Eastern Europe were mostly run by Socialists. There was a Socialist government in Vienna, a left-liberal government in Budapest; Social Democrats were dominant in the new Czechoslovak state. In Germany the moderate Socialists in control of the new Republican regime were threatened with left-wing revolts all over the country; Bavaria was briefly ruled by a left-Socialist soviet. The workers in Italy were seizing the factories. Further east, the Balkans and Hungary and Rumania were in the throes of an agrarian revolution—the "green" rising. Observers said then, as they say today: the Continent is heading into socialism; the old order is finished.

It headed into fascism instead. The process of change was checked or deflected, partly by the suicidal fight among the parties of the left, partly by the rise of counter-revolutionary forces encouraged by the big powers and financed by big business, partly by American loans which helped to patch together the frail economy of Europe. Until, at the end of the turbulent decade, the great depression knocked out the underpinnings and the whole structure crumbled into fascism and war.

It could happen again, I suppose. Only this time the destruction of values is so much more thorough, the middle class so much weaker, the need of fundamental change so much more obvious, that even a temporary renaissance of the pre-war capitalist society is hard to imagine. Perhaps the Truman Doctrine can do it. But it will take more dollars and guns than last time, both because the job is bigger and because people are reluctant to start the old cycle over again. They've "had enough"—and more. They want a change. And they will not thank the government that spends billions to prevent it.

Since it is difficult to imagine our

present Administration and, still more, our present Congress financing revolution in even its mildest and most legal forms, the chance of reviving democracy through the Truman Doctrine seems remote. And so the best administrators will be driven to a futile course of poulticing deep infections. I do not envy the man Mr. Truman finally induced to head his Greek mission.

Opponents of the new doctrine frequently insist that it will drive disgruntled and despairing democrats into communism. And so it will, no doubt. It will tend to polarize political sentiment and weaken the center. But it is risky to assume that this will mean victory for the extreme left. It may have exactly the opposite effect, as was the case after World War I.

The situation in Europe then mildly paralleled the situation today. The fresh revolutionary impulse of the Soviets was spreading through the dreary wasteland left by the war. The economic system was in general collapse; populations were starving; governments were almost helpless. The central desire of the great powers was to stem revolution and restore some sort of stability.

\$10.90 to \$23.05

A Week

Suppose you lose your job—just how much and how long will you be entitled to an unemployment compensation?

The answer, according to the U.S. Social Security Administration figures, is shockingly little.

Actual payments made in March to unemployed workers were \$17.72 a week. This is the average for the whole nation.

In two-thirds of the states, payments are lower than the average. The lowest is Kentucky, which paid an average of \$10.90 a week.

The length of time varies from state to state—from 12 to 22 weeks.

The highest average payment was in Utah, with \$23.05 a week. Even this sum is entirely inadequate to support the average family of four.
