

This and That from Washington

A DEPARTMENT of State release dated September 16th gives us word of the rapid increase of Communist activity in southeast Asia this year.



Attention is called to a stratagem employed that is discussed rather fully in SUPPLEMENT III OF THE COUNTRY STUDIES just being released by Sub Committee No. 5 of the Committee on Foreign Affairs of which I have the honor of being chairman under the general report on "The Strategy and Tactics of World Communism." This stratagem consists of pretending to champion the cause of local nationalists, attempting to identify Communism with nationalism in the minds of the people of the area.

CONTRARY to the actions of some of the labor unions here in the United States relative to their Communist leadership, Communist forces in the British labor movement were completely routed at the recent annual meeting of the British Trade Union Congress. Landslide majorities defeated every issue they pressed to a vote. The only communist winning a place in the 33-member General Council did so for lack of an opponent.

WE ARE TOLD so constantly that all we do for other nations has had little thanks and few repayments if any that it is a very pleasant opportunity for me to advise you that Czechoslovakia has signed an agreement in Prague to pay to the United States \$172,961.00 (\$648,072 crowns) in settlement of lease-lease agreements. The amount is based upon the procurement cost of the items. It may seem small, but it is at least something.

THE ST. LAWRENCE hydro-electric power is to have much attention in the near future from state authorities as well as from private enterprise. The Public Power and Water Corporation of Trenton, New Jersey, has filed an application with the Federal Power Commission to develop St. Lawrence Hydro and seaway features. At the same time the New York State's Power Authority and the Hydro-electric Power Commission of Ontario, Canada, are joint sponsors of a 2.2 million horsepower hydro project for which the New York Authority has filed application with the Federal Power Commission.

New Battery Breathes Air

New York — A new dry cell battery which breathes air through "lungs" and works three times longer has been developed by the National Carbon Co., Inc.

First use of the battery is for hearing aids, although other uses are foreseen.

Dr. Lauchlin M. Currie, vice-president, in charge of research, said one small battery will give 81 hours of service.
