Improvements at Euclid Shore High School

Euclid Shore High School has started to use the upper floor of the new ten room addition. When the whole building is completed within a few weeks, the school will have some rooms that will be the first of their kind in Euclid educational institutions.

Shore School will have the first band room planned for that purpose. It is a beautiful studio with sound treatment on ceilings and walls, just like in the radio broadcasting studios. The band students will sit on risers at different levels so that all can see the director plainly. Up until now, the Shore band and orchestra had to play on the auditorium stage which has kept the auditorium from being put to other use much of the time.

Also included in the addition are the 3-room science department which already is in use, and the speech and dramatic department which has a small stage. The other new rooms are class rooms and a large study hall.

For the last several years Shore School, although accepting more pupils than the capacity of the building, has been unable to handle all of the residents of the original district and many have been sent to other schools. At the present time, the pupil enrollment at Shore is over 1700.

Before the new addition was constructed, the building capacity was 1200 pupils. The total enrollment in Euclid public schools this year is 5892, in the year 1940 the total enrollment was 3167.

Vadnal Orchestra Will Play For Sleighbell Dance

Adria Choral and Dramatic Club, undaunted by the invasion of "Old Man Winter," will sponsor its Sleighbell Dance, Saturday, December 13, 1947. With decorations in keeping with the holiday season, this dance is expected to highlight the pre-Christmas social activities. So, whether the prevailing mode of travel is snowshoes or roller skates, be present at the Slovenian Society Home on Recher Avenue in Euclid, Ohio for this prominent event of the year. Come early and stay late. Music by the ever-popular Vadnal orchestra will begin at eight o'clock.

Christmas Mail Early

Postmaster Guy R. Lucas requests public cooperation in handling the heavy Christmas mailing load. He asked that people begin mailing their Christmas cards and packages at once, and that they space out their mailings over several days so that mail will arrive at the post office in a steady stream, instead of in huge bunches.

During normal periods, cancellations at the post office average 900,000 pieces of mail per day, and during the peak of the Christmas season they reach 4,500,000 per day.

"Many people have their Christmas lists almost complete, but are delaying until they can fill in just a few missing addresses," the Postmaster said. "It would help us a great deal if next week these people would mail all the cards and gifts they have ready or can get ready."

Full and correct addresses are essential, and use of zone numbers helps greatly in sorting the mail for delivery, he said. Packages must be wrapped securely with strong paper and heavy twine, and it's a good idea to repeat the address inside the outer wrappings. Christmas cards should be tied in bundles, with all envelopes facing the same way and the stamps in the same corner.

The Postmaster asked that all Christmas cards and packages for out-of-State delivery be in the mails by December 10, and that local cards be mailed by December 15 to ensure delivery before Christmas.
