Konvenčne, oziroma predkonvenčne razprave so se pričele, kot vidno iz glasila od par tednov nazaj. To je prav. Z medsebojnimi javnimi pogovori se da uresnik nesporazum pojasniti in zavrnati, da ni treba o njem razpravljati na konvenciji.

Opustitev plačevanja dividend bi jaz ne priporočal. Mislim, če bo kedaj veliki preostanek v skladu, naj se ga deli med članstvo. To je ravno privlačna sita za dobiti nove člane, tu rojene, ki se za take stvari zanimajo. Ali ni naprimer uspešno za agitacijo, če lahko rečemo, da nam ni treba plačati 12 asesmentov v letu, ampak samo 11, ali celo 10?

Končno, ali ste prepričani, da je certifikat organizacije pri kateri ste ga že spremenili iste vrednosti kot je SSPZ? Da, pročeljne vrednosti je isti, ni pa v kreditu. Naprimer, kot ste omenili, nima pravice biti deležen preostanka ali dividend in ne vsebuje določbe, da ima član pravico zahtevati plačan do smrtni ali plačan začasni certifikat. Tudi posojilo je omejeno le na smrtninski asesment.

Vse to je večjega pomena za vsakega povprečnega člena, kot par centov več plačevanja, ali bi moral biti. Primer, kaj po-maga posojilo za smrtninski asesment, ako ne morem biti zavarovan za bolniško in drugo podporo, ako bi rad bil, pa ne morem za nje plačati iz svojega žepa, posojila pa ne dobim?

Plačan certifikat ene ali druge vrste, je istotako pomemben. Recimo, eden je izčrpan, ve da ne bo mogel nikdar več asesmenta plačevati, je pa že član organizacije dolga leta in ima certifikat star, recimo 10 let, star ob pristopu je bil 40 let in zavarovan je za \$1,000 posmrtnine, po navadnom posmrtnem zavarovanju. Tak član bi na zahtevu dobil od SSPZ plačan certifikat za \$290.00, katera svota se plača po njegovi smrti, kriptnikom. V tem slučaju pomeni, da je član zapustil gotovo ali sigurno \$290.00 svojih prihrankov zaostalim, brez vsakega rizika, ker mu za to zavarovalnino ni treba plačevati prispevkov. Nasprotno, drugi certifikat tega ne določa. Pravi le, če ne moreš plačevati si avtomatično naprej zavarovan za posmrtnino, dokler rezerva ne bo izčrpana. Ked je pa porok, da bo tak član prej umrl, predno bo rezerva izčrpana, da bo s svojo smrtno obvaroval posmrtnino, ali del posmrtnine svojim koristnikom? Ako prej ne umre, predno je rezerva izčrpal, je vsa zavarovalnina za njega, oziroma na njegove koristnike izgubljena. — Sicer pa ima certifikat S. P. Z. istotako določbo, če se



WHY WE HAVE WARS

Many people who lived through the WAR of 1914-1918 learned to refer to it rather boastfully as THE World War. Boosters for an age of mechanical wonders—the automobile, the aeroplane, the submarine, the radio—they proudly added to the list of modern marvels—The World War.

Historians adopted the idea. In writing on the subject they used the term World War. A generation which could have the biggest and best of everything could surely have the biggest and best of wars!

Granted that the WAR of 1914 was the biggest war, it was very far from being the only WORLD WAR. It is true that more soldiers were engaged in the WAR of 1914-1918 than in any previous four years of war; that more wealth was destroyed; that more lives were snuffed out. Still, the WAR of 1914-1918 was a world war—not THE WORLD WAR.

ANCIENT WARS FOUGHT FOR POWER

A "world war" is one fought not locally, but in various parts of the known world by the principal world powers. Using the term in this sense, the War of 1914-1918 had many predecessors. Egyptians, Assyrians, Babylonians, Persians, Greeks, and Romans fought what they called "world wars" or "general wars." Such wars were limited in scope of the territory lying near the Mediterranean Sea—North Africa, Southern and Eastern Europe, and Western Asia. However, this territory comprised the "world" of ancient times.

The Italian cities were the chief centers of European economic power in the fifteenth century. Portugal and Spain forged to the front, however, and were all for dividing the world between themselves. This division was actually made on paper by the Pope, but Holland, France, and Britain demanded shares. The conflict between the rival European empires for the control of Asiatic trade, and for the colonizing of the Americas and Australia led to a series of terrible wars, fought through four centuries and all over the world. Although Europe was the battle ground of this war, the principal contestants had their eyes on trade and territory outside the European boundaries.

TRADE, COMMERCE BROADENS CONFLICT

The World War of 1914-1918 was one of series extending across four centuries. To be sure, in 1914, the world was more thoroughly and more intimately involved than it had been in former wars, because improved transport and communication had spread civilization to more remote parts of the planet. The Far East (Japan, China) had not participated in previous world wars. Like its predecessors the war of 1914-1918 was fought for a world stake by the world's principal empires.

World war thus appears, not as an isolated phenomenon, confined to the year 1914-1918; on the contrary, wherever there has been world civilization, there have been world wars. As civilization broadened to a world scale of today, the field of war making was correspondingly extended.

ECONOMIC PROBLEM IMPORTANT FACTOR

Economically, the ruling class in civilized states has aimed at the making of profit. Land owners, shop owners, factory owners, mine owners, bankers, and other profiteers have sought for profit-making opportunities in all parts of the earth. When the home market would no longer absorb the surplus of marketable goods and capital in the hands of the ruling class, foreign markets were found, foreign resources tapped, foreign opportunities developed. This foreign exploitation necessarily involved some form of conquest. Conquest and exploitation, in territories lying beyond the boundaries of the homeland, are one means of added profit. But to conquer, to exploit, and to drive out rivals who seek the same opportunities for conquest and exploitation, civilized nations must fight.

WORTHY QUOTATIONS

Delaisi wrote of the world economic solidarity built up during the past few years—"Henceforth, war between great states can only be conceived as world wide." Blanchon said, "A war is no longer simply a local accident, a restricted evil; it becomes a crisis that involves the whole humanity."

The character of the civil state, the history of civilization and our present turmoil between Italy and Ethiopia all point conclusively to another world war. The rapid and general extension of civilization is laying the foundation for the most widespread and general WAR in history.

"Like historic causes produce like historic effects."

With most of the leaders of the Million Dollar Membership Drive presumably in a somewhat somnolent mood after their summer activity of soliciting new members, planning and carrying out social affairs (local and national in scope), it is small wonder that September's total new insurance struck a new low mark of \$22,500. The result is, to say the least, disappointing and rather discouraging considering that the end of the campaign is less than three months away. That we should expect the same lodges to contribute large gains month after month is absolutely out of the question, for common sense tells us that, sooner or later, a lodge is bound to reach a saturation point in its own community. Therefore, it is logical to understand that some of the burden that comes of acquiring new members must be shouldered by those lodges which have done little or nothing during the current drive. We have harped on this matter a number of times in the past and we repeat, again . . . If each lodge, not yet active in the present campaign, would get at least two new members between now and the end of the year, the \$1,000,000 mark would be brought within striking distance. So, let's all become imbued with the spirit of the campaign once more, and

make the final three months the most productive of any since the inauguration of the Million Dollar Campaign.
