Carinthia (Koroška) and the Investiture of the Carinthian Dukes

The beautiful and ancient Slovene province of Carinthia (Koroška) is known as the cradle of Slovenedom. It is in Carinthia, close by the old Krnskigrad on the sunny Gospa Sveta Polje (Holy Lady Plain) with its most historic old church—the Gospa Sveta (Holy Lady), that we find the seat of the most ancient tradition of Slovene freedom. It is here that the symbolic investiture of the Carinthian Dukes took place. This investiture, a political symbolism, is a unique ceremony in its entirety. Other countries throughout western and southern Europe had special investiture ceremonies, dozens of them, yet none can be compared with that of the Slovenes. All other ceremonies had a religious aspect about them, and as such the language used was always Latin, according to the rituals of the Church. The Slovenes, although a devout and deeply religious nation, however installed their chiefs, the Carinthian Dukes, outside the church, without the active participation of their clergy, and in their native tongue.

The ancient and singular ceremony took place close by the Krnskigrad and on the Gospa Sveta Polje. It was a dual ceremony, the first being the installation upon the ducal stone near Krnskigrad, and the second being the homage before the ducal chair of the fertile Gospa Sveta Polje.

Close by Krnskigrad was a free farm, whose owner a man of old Slovene descent, had the functional right to introduce the Duke, and as a master of

ceremony he actually represented the entire Slovene population of the state.

On the day of the investiture, this Slovene freeman sat in what appeared an indifferent manner, cross-legged upon the "Stone of the Princess" (the stone was a segment of a stone pillar from the ruins of a nearby ancient village). He was dressed in a gray coat typical of the Carinthian Slovene peasant and wearing a gray hat with a gray band, home made

sandals, gray shirt and trousers and a red belt.

As he lolled lazily upon the stone the people of the country gathered around him to await the prince or duke and his retinue.

The procession drew near; crossbearers, bishops, priests, men-at-arms, noblemen, pages, courtesans, and at the head of all this royal array came the duke, who had set aside his ermine and ducal purple and had donned the simple gray attire of the Slovene peasant.

The duke held a wooden rod in his left hand, and in his right he led a scraggly striped mare and old saggy striped bull. As the duke approached, the peasant on the stone would ask, "Who is he who approaches?" The Count of Goritz, as the duke's vassal chieftain and his highest official, would answer, "It is the Prince of the land." The peasant then asked, "Is he a good and honest judge? Does he have the welfare of the country at heart? Is he a free man? Is he a guardian of the true Faith?" To all these questions he re-
