Spor med Jugoslavijo in  
Avstrijo

Jugoslavija prepovedala uvoz  
blaga iz Avstrije

Belgrad, 29. maja. — Nova tr-  
govinska vojna je izbruhnila  
med Jugoslavijo in Avstrijo, ki  
ima vse znake spora med Srbijo in  
Avstrijo 1. 1910 in kateri je delno ustvaril podlago za krvavi konflikt, ki je prišel štiri leta pozneje.

Avstrija je namreč prepovedala  
uvoz prašičev iz Jugoslavije za en mesec, slednja pa je na te  
represalije odgovorila z zatvirovijo meje vsem avstrijskim produkтом.

Fašistična zmaga v Gdanskem

Gdansko, 29. maja. — Hitlerjevi fašisti so dobili večino sedežev v zbornici-svobodnega mesta Gdansko pri včerajnjih volitvah. Volitev se je udeležilo 215.135 volilcev in fašistični kandidat je prejel 109.296 glasov, ostale pa kandidati drugih političnih strank. Za predsednika satnate zbornice so fašisti izbrali Hermanna Rauschinga, ki bo nasledil dr. Ernesta Ziehma. Prejšnja zbornica je bila pod kontrolo socialistov. Veliko število socialističnih in komunističnih kandidatov je bilo poraženih. Velike izgube je utrpela tudi stranka narodne fronte.

da obiskovalka dobro znana, ker jih je spremilala na potovanju po Jugoslaviji. Takrat se je odločila, da pride na obisk v Ameriko in zadnjih šestnajst mesecov se je učila angleščine za ameriški poset. Pauči ostane v Ameriki za nedoločen čas.

### Convention Comments

The work of the tenth regular convention goes systematically on as new measures, rules and provisions are being enacted into the new by-laws and a new history is being made for the Slovene National Benefit Society and its entire membership. For the past few days the convention body has been working on the new by-laws, an important and difficult task before the delegates.

\* \* \*

The severity of the present critical conditions is a deciding factor in determining the course of the protective functions of the Slovene National Benefit Society for the future. To safeguard our organization's institutions the delegates to the tenth convention must work unitedly for the best results which will benefit all the members and the Society.

\* \* \*

The Society's progressive principles will remain intact; its labor character will continue as in the past twenty-nine years; its freethinking spirit will go on as of yore; its enlightenment will be given a new impetus by enlarging the scope of activities in lodges; and the organization will maintain its identity as a bona fide labor fraternal body whose principal purpose of protection and enlightenment is expressed in the second article of the by-laws.

\* \* \*

The delegates and executives number 209. There are 26 delegates representing the younger generation, the future of the Slovene National Benefit Society. Their number more than doubled since the 9th regular convention four years ago, at which there were 11 English speaking delegates. So we see that the new generation is gradually stepping in and taking over the reins of the Slovene Nat'l Benefit Society, the largest and most influential Slovene fraternal organization in the United States. We sincerely hope that these twenty-six youthful delegates will earnestly strive to uphold and preserve the principles and labor ideals of our organization for which our pioneers have fought, so that our progressive organization will continue to function in the future as it did in the past. Its past record is an outstanding achievement of noble deeds, humanitarianism and enlightenment. Our senior members look forward to our youthful representatives and members in whom they put their hope for a truly constructive work of mutual benefit.

\* \* \*

The new supreme board will number six members less than the present. Five district representatives have been eliminated from the executive board and the medical adviser will not be on the supreme board. There are now twenty-five supreme board members, henceforth there will be only nineteen, that is after the new by-laws go into effect, July 1.

\* \* \*

Means on members' properties will be discontinued and only first class federal, state and municipal bonds shall be considered for investing the Society's moneys. Nationality restrictions for admittance to membership remain unchanged. A contrary motion for the "open door" policy to admit all Caucasian races was defeated by a roll call vote 110 against 92.

\* \* \*

Salaries of the supreme board members have been reduced 15% and the per diem for the delegates set at \$6.50. Vacation provisions for the main office personnel remain as before. No new lodges can be formed in Canada. A new office has been created for the lodges, that of an agent for the Society's official organ.

\* \* \*

The next convention—eleventh regular convention—of the Slovene National Benefit Society will be held in Cleveland, Ohio, in May, 1937. The ninth and tenth conventions were held in Chicago at the organization's headquarters.

### Federal Thirty-Hour Week Unlimited

The 1932 convention of the American Federation of Labor declared that the purpose of the American Labor Movement to secure the nation-wide adoption of the 30-hour day and five-day week and the full use of Labor's economic and political forces to that end.

When on April 6 the United States Senate passed the bill introduced by Senator Black of Alabama barring from the channels of interstate commerce goods manufactured by labor employed more than six hours per day or 30 days per week, the achievement of Labor's paramount purpose received a decided impetus.

In a statement on the Senate's action, William Green, president of the American Federation of Labor, said:

"The Senate of the United States did a very fine thing when it rejected a proposal to change the Black shorter work week bill from a 30-hour to a 36-hour work week measure."

"It did a finer thing when by a decisive majority it passed the Black Bill which provides for a five-day work week, six-hour work day, which applies to those employers of labor whose manufactured goods are shipped in interstate commerce."

With over 13,000,000 unemployed workers pounding the pavements throughout the United States, a large portion of them and their families eking out a precarious existence on charity relief, it is expected that the House of Representatives will give prompt consideration to the thirty-hour week bill and enact it into law without nullifying amendments disguised under the deceptive term "elasticity."

It should be remembered that the main purpose of the bill as passed by the Senate is not to cater to the convenience of employers, but to provide jobs for around 6,000,000 unemployed workers and a decent living for their dependents. In the language of Senator Black, "makes employment of the unemployed the major objective."

The crisis in unemployment demands the Federal 30-hour week unlimited. Congressional statesmanship should not do less than meet this demand.—The Minnesota Union Advocate

### Those Shirt Bargains

At Allentown and Northampton, Pennsylvania, hundreds of little children, workers in the pajama and shirt factories of these cities are on a strike. Daily they parade before the barnlike structures where they once toiled in poorly ventilated, poorly lighted rooms to produce some of those wonderful shirt and pajama bargains being offered in the great department stores of America.

Investigations have revealed the startling fact that many of these children were paid as low as 15 cents a week to produce some of those marvellous shirt and pajama bargains flaunted in the advertising columns of the daily press.

Now they are on a strike, protesting against the slave wages and the wretched working conditions of the Allentown and Northampton sweatshops.

The next time you feel the urge to invest in a shirt bearing a price tag "now 89 cents, regular \$1.55 value" just think of those little toilers in Pennsylvania. Their lives have gone into the making of that 89-cent price.—L.

### Relief by Public Works

President Roosevelt's appeal for peace is more satisfactory than his plan for the control of industry plus public works for the unemployed. I write necessarily on the basis of the plan but of newspaper forecasts of it. So far as public works go, \$3,300,000,000 to be spent in two years is not enough for the dramatic and effective proclamation of war on unemployment. The amount should be raised to six billion to be spent, if plans can be rushed in one year. Six billion is the difference between construction now and its level in "prosperous" 1928. Moreover public works must include housing, not through loans to limited dividend companies which have not met and cannot meet the need, but through public housing authorities.—N. Thomas.

### Art for Art's Sake

Who says art can be for art's sake irrespective of social opinion and class interests? Certainly not the Rockefellers who doom a whole work of modern art for the sake of keeping out of Radio City—that monument of folly—one picture of Lenin! Once admit the conflict and its influence in art and one can understand this Rockefeller-Rivera conflict and wonder mostly why the Rockefellers thought they wanted Rivera's murals. No thought from any other standpoint the Rockefellers' view looks like a crass Philistine censorship of dollars over the ideas of a creator.—N. L.

### Tells Own Story of Rockefever

By Diego Rivera

Editor's Note: Diego Rivera is only an outstanding proletarian but he has been a leader in Mexican labor and revolutionary movements and was a Federated correspondent during some of the most exciting days of the labor struggle there. He has written his of the controversy with the Federated Press, New York.—Those who gave me work at Radio City knew very well my artistic tendencies and my social and political opinions, and did much urging to persuade me to accept the work, which I did only on condition that they give me full liberty.

Interpretation of the theme my sketches for the painting discussed and approved.

Diego Rivera is the man they assigned was: Man Crossroads. My interpretation, portrayed the crossroads with the road to the left as socialist world, that to the right, world of capitalism.

The center is the skilled worker in the midst of a connected system of machines which give him wings of the various aspects of

the sides, arranged in horizontal rows, were, at the left, an image demonstration in Moscow, an image by television, and below, the workers of a factory gathered during the lunch hour to listen to a right, in the upper part, an attack of infantry equipped tanks and flame throwers, supported by tanks and airplanes. Be-

low that, a demonstration of unemployed workers in Wall Street, with the mounted police just in the act of attacking and dispersing the demonstration.

Two great ellipses cross the picture in scissors fashion representing the revelations of microscope and telescope related to the scenes of war, unemployment, night club life, etc., represented in the picture.

In the left sector between the giant scissors is represented the union of the worker, the peasant and the soldier, with the industrial worker as leader.

Since from my personal standpoint and as a historical truth, the outstanding leader of the proletariat is Lenin, I could not conceive or represent the figure of the worker-leader as any other than that of Lenin.

After the Rockefellers had repeatedly expressed their enthusiasm for the work as it developed on the wall, the pretext was advanced by Nelson Rockefeller that the head of Lenin was unacceptable, despite the fact that it was in my sketch, and on the wall in outline for over a month.

While correspondence on this subject was being exchanged a whole plan of attack was being worked out, and one night, after getting rid of spectators, an incongruously large force of guards and attendants covered the picture while the contractors were expressing their objections to me in the construction shack.

Their objections were not merely to the face of Lenin, but to the whole painting—its color, its ideology, and its spirit. At 7:10 p. m. I left the scaffold; but a phone call from one

of the workers to the New Workers School brought a united front demonstration down to Rockefeller Center by nine the same evening, with improvised banners and mimeographed leaflets, which demonstration was brutally attacked by the police. Since then there has been a growing movement among the workers' organization, and among artists, critics and intellectuals, demanding that we be given the opportunity to complete the work according to our plans, and that it be exhibited and reproduced.

As the best answer to the financial dictatorship of the Rockefellers my co-workers and I have decided to make the revolutionary painting accessible to the New York workers which the Rockefellers tried to shut off from them. Therefore, we have decided to use the money that the Rockefellers paid in order to paint without charge in workers' schools of New York (the Workers' School, the Int'l. Workers' School and the Rand School). Thus the Rockefellers have been stripped of their assumed mask of liberalism as part patrons and yet are paying for revolutionary art in the workers' headquarters much against their will. 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## Child Labor in U.S. on Increase

Claim of Decrease in Child Labor Stoutly Denied by Group in New York

NEW YORK.—The National Child Labor Committee disputes the assertion that there has been a great decrease in child labor in South Carolina, as asserted recently by W. T. Jacobs, secretary of the South Carolina Cotton Manufacturers' association. Since the Federal child labor law was held unconstitutional in 1920, child labor has been increasing rather than decreasing in South Carolina, the committee says.

"The 1930 Census showed 3,449 children, an increase of 23 per cent, so employed, of whom 60 were under 13 years, and these children constituted 5.4 per cent of all cotton mill operatives and laborers in the South Carolina mills.

### Claim Unsubstantiated

"There may naturally have been some decrease since April, 1930, when the census was taken, but there is nothing to corroborate Mr. Jacob's statement that only 778 children are now employed, which would constitute an 80 per cent reduction.

"The committee does not believe that a child labor survey made by a South Carolina cotton manufacturers' association and one which counts as 'employed' only children of 14 and 15 years who have parents' affidavits on file, i. e., those known to be legally employed, has any statistical value as compared with a house-to-house canvass by United States Census officers, for the South Carolina law, unlike that of practically every other state, does not require proof of age for work permits and without this illegal employment is bound to be prevalent."

## What the Decay of Capitalism Means

What is it that is collapsing in the United States? When we say that it is capitalism we do not mean the physical wealth in plants, machinery, raw materials, homes, etc. These economic assets of society are as sound as ever. They have not disappeared.

"If we could paint this vast structure as a huge monument covered by a veil we would have a vivid illustration of what is happening. Paint on thin covering certain symbols of capitalism, such as stocks, bonds, securities, mortgages, profits, rents, wages, etc., and think of this veil rotting away, slowly falling from the monument. We have in this simple illustration what is happening today.

## Pennsylvania Sweatshops

Sweatshops are bad in many states—in Connecticut, in New Jersey, for instance—but they are worst in Pennsylvania. Nowhere has the profit motive produced so low a specimen as the typical sweatshop employer who literally crushes youth for his profit.

In town after town sweatshops are paying from \$2 to \$6 a week, sometimes to children whose parents have had to lie about their ages to get them into the factories.

Some of these factories are alleged to be recruiting grounds for the white slave traffic, still for the profit of the boss. That's why the campaign that it was in my sketch, and on the wall in outline for over a month.

Johnstown, Pa.—The Continental Congress for Economic Reconstruction, which was held at Washington, D. C., on May 6 and 7, in the huge Washington Auditorium, which seats over ten thousand people, was very successful. The caller of the Congress was Emil Rieve, President of the American Federation of Full-Fashioned Hosiery Workers. 4200 credentials were accepted by the credentials committee.

Johnstown was well represented at this Congress with ten delegates. Comrade Podbey made the trip with his car, and with him were Comrade Joseph Snyo, who represented the JSF, and this writer. We left town in the morning of Friday, and returned Monday evening. After riding thru the Capital for an hour or so, we finally located the Auditorium; many new and old faces were met, and Comrade Zorko from Cleveland, the committee says,

"The United States Census of 1920, taken when the Federal law was in operation," the committee declares, "showed 2,800 children, 10 to 15 years inclusive, employed as laborers and operatives in cotton mills of South Carolina, of whom 99 were under 13 years.

"The 1930 Census showed 3,449 children, an increase of 23 per cent, so employed, of whom 60 were under 13 years, and these children constituted 5.4 per cent of all cotton mill operatives and laborers in the South Carolina mills.
