seje Jugoslovanskega pomožnega odbora, slovenskega skcija, katere se je vršila dne 8. avgusta, 1942 v konferenčni sobi SNPJ v Chicagu, Ill.

Glavni predsednik JPO, SS odpre sejo ob pol deseti uri dopoldne. V svojem nagovoru pove, da je sklical to sejo radi pomožne akcije, kakor tudi radi nepravilnega poslovanja ožjega odbora za politično akcijo, ki je bil izvoljen dne 7. junija, 1942 v Clevelandu, O. Opiše, zakaj je sklical konferenco v Clevelandu in kaj so bili zaključki iste.

Nadalje poroča, da je prejel kot predsednik širšega odbora politične akcije dve resignaciji od članov ožjega odbora, to je od brata Etbina Kristana in od brata Ivana Moleka, urednika Prosvete. Ker je nujno, da se ponovno uredi poslovanje političnega udejstvovanja, je sklical današnjo sejo.

Na seji so navzoči: Vincent Cainkar, zastopnik Slovenske narodne podporne jednote; Josip Zalar, zastopnik Kranjsko-slovenske katoliške jednote; Janko N. Rogelj, zastopnik Ameriške bratske zveze; Marie Prislund in Josephine Erjavec, zastopnici Slovenske ženske zveze, in Leo Jurjovec, zastopnik Zapadne slovanske zveze.

John Gornik, zastopnik Slovenske dobrodelne zveze, je pisal pismo, da se ne more udeležiti seje, ker s vrši v njegovem uradu pregledovanje polletnih računov. Josephine Zakrajšek, zastopnica Progresivnih Slovencev, je poslala pismo, da se ne more udeležiti seje, ker je zadržana zaradi političnega udejstvovanja pri primarnih volitvah v Clevelandu. Frank J. Wedic, zastopnik Družbe sv. Družine, se je opravičil pri tajniku Joseph Zalarju, da mu je nemogoče, ker je prezaposlen pri svojem delu. Jugoslovanska podporna zveza Sloga in Slovenska moška zveza nista poslali zastopnikov ter tudi ne moreta poslati.

Predsednik Cainkar nadalje poroča o delovanju ožjega odbora, ki je začel s tira pri svojem delovanju. Prvi pogrešek, katerega je napravil ta odbor, je ime, ki ni v soglasju s sugestijami, ki so bile podane na seji 7. junija v Clevelandu. Na

dalje ta odbor ni poslal nobenega zapisnika članom širšega odbora ter ni povabil zunanjih dveh članov svojega odseka na sejo, niti ni ju obveščal o svojih zaključkih.

Tudi Kristanova resolucija, ki je bila sprejeta na seji, ni bila takoj razposlana na določena mesta, kakor je bilo sklenjeno, ampak je vzelo skoro mesec dni, da so jo dobile prizadete stranke. Njegovo mnenje je, da smo prehitro izvolili te odbornike in da nekateri izmed njih sploh niso imeli nobenih mandatov in niti niso bili povabljeni na sestanek v Clevelandu. Zato je treba, pravi predsednik, da se o tem temeljito pogovorimo in popravimo, kar smo zagrešili ali zamudili.

Potem poroča, da na današnjo sejo ni povabil nobenega zastopnika zamejne jugoslovanske vlade v Ameriki, ker mu je bilo tako naročeno. Takisto je odgovoril telefonično dr. Čoku, ki ga je vprašal, ako bi se mogel udeležiti današnje seje, ne more prisostvovati.

Mnenje navzočih je, da najprvo preidemo na zadeve, ki se tičejo naše pomožne akcije. Sledi poročilo glavnega tajnika Joseph Zalarja, ki se glasi:

Do sedaj imamo skupaj 31 postojank. Pred par dnevi sem prejel tudi pismo brata C, Grmeka, South Chicago, Ill., mi poroča, da bodo tudi v South Chicago organizirali odbor naše akcije.

Pripomniti moram, da sem imel zadnje čase precej veliko dela in korespondence, toda nič zato, vse je bilo z veseljem storjeno, in to še posebno, ker vidim, da zanimanje za našo

pomožno akcijo od dne do dne narašča.

Da je postalo zanimanje med našim narodom bolj živahno, gre v prvi vrsti zahvala in pohvala direktorju publicitete, bratu Rogelju. Za svoje vzpodbudne članke zasluži priznanje in pohvalo. Brat Rogelj, le tako naprej.

Prav lepa hvala a clevelandskemu županu, Franku J. Lauschetu, za njegovo pismo in priporočilo. Istotako tudi prav prisrčna hvala Ivanu Zormanu in Louisu Adamiču, kakor tudi vsem ostalim, ki so z vzpodbudnimi dopisi in članki o naši akciji pisali in jo priporočali.

Brat Rogelj mi je poslal nekaj "V" plakatov. Ti plakati so bili odposlani tajnikom postojank, da jih po raznih prostorih in lokalih razobesijo.

Zelo razveseljivo novico sem prejel od brata Josip Zorca, tajnika postojanke št. 9, Waukegan, Ill. Brat Zorc mi poroča, da se bo pri prihodnji kampanji Waukegan-North Chicago Community War Chest vključilo \$1,500 tudi za našo pomožno akcijo. To ni samo razveseljivo, pač pa tudi častno. Brat Zorc in ostali člani postojanke št. 9 zaslužijo vse priznanje in pohvalo.

Waukegan-North Chicago, Ill., je znana napredna slovenska naselbina. Da v tej naselbini živijo zavedni Slovenci in Slovenke, je bilo že nešteto dokazano. In kot se je to pokazalo in izkazalo ob raznih drugih slučajih, kadar je šlo za narodno stvar, tako so te zavodne in narodne slovanske koronine pokazale tudi pri naši pomožni akciji. Ta postojanka je že poslala našemu blaginjaku lepo vsoto denarja. Poleg tega se bo pa vršila 23. avgusta velika prireditve, katere čisti skupiček je namenjen našemu narodu v starem kraju. Čast, komur čast!

Mesečna poročila državnemu tajništvu, Washington, D. C., so bila redno vsaki mesec poslana, zakar imam na rokah potrjena, da so bila poročila sprejeta.

Ker so mi pošle kuverte in pisalni papir, naročil sem pri tiskovni družbi Avsec Brothers, Joliet, Ill., 1,000 pisalnih papirjev in 1,000 kuvert. Cena teh potrebščin znaša \$15.25, toda predsednik družbe, brat

Joseph Avsec mi je sporočil, naj se smatra ta račun za plačan, ali bolje rečeno, tiskovna družba je kuverte in pisalni papir brezplačno napravila. Bratom Avsec se s tem v svojem imenu in v imenu odbora prav iskreno zahvalim.

To je moje poročilo za sedaj. O gotovih zadevah bom pozneje poročal.

Josip Zalar, tajnik JPO, SS. Poročilo je bilo sprejeto.

Ustmeno poroča, da si je nabavil pisemski papir, katerega je naročil pri Avsec Bros. v Jolietu. Tiskarna je to delo napravila brezplačno, zakar naj ji bo izrečena zahvala na tej seji.

Glavni blaginjak Leo Jurjovec poroča, da je sedaj v blaginjni pomožne akcije \$23,466.24. Omenj tudi, da je bil v državi Colorado, kjer se je udeležil dobro oglaševane prireditve JPO, SS, ter tam govoril o pomenu našega pomožnega dela. Nadalje naznani, da so njegove račune pregledali zaprišeženi javni pregledovalci kot to zahteva državni department v Washingtonu. Poročilo teh pregledovalcev je poslal v Washington. Omeni tudi, da je sprejel od lokalnega odbora v Chicagu vsoto \$740, to je del tiščodolarskega čistega dobička skupne prireditve.

Poročilo se sprejme.

Mnenje navzočih je, naj vsi lokalni odbori pošiljajo redno svoje nabrane denarne prispevke—mesečno v glavno blaginjo JPO, SS, ker glavni odborniki so vladi in narodu odgovorni za nabrani denar, katerega nabirajo lokalni odbori. Zadrževanje denarja v blaginjah lokalnih odborov ni v soglasju sprotetih sklepov in uradnega dovoljenja iz Washingtona.

Blaginjak tudi sugestira, da bi ta odbor sklenil, naj bi vsaka organizacija, ki je včlanjena pri JPO, SS, poslala na svoje članke pisma priloženimi kovertami, da naj prispevajo v blaginjo pomožne akcije. O tem se razvije razprava, ki pa pokaže ovire, ki bi se težko premostile. Zato se o tem ne sklene nič definitivnega.

Nato poda obširno poročilo direktor publicitete, zakaj smatra delovanje pomožne akcije za počasno. Vzrok temu je tudi akcija slov. župnij, katero propagira slovenski duhovnik Rev. Ambrožič. To nam kaže, da mi Slovenci v Ameriki nimamo enotne pomožne akcije, kar je menda glavni vzrok, da naša slovenska sekcija JPO ne kaže pričakovanega uspeha. Njegovo mnenje je, če se bo to še nadaljevalo, potem ne bomo mogli pokazati uspehov v bodoče. Z dvema pomožnima akcijama je naš slovenski narod v Ameriki razdeljen na dva tabora, zakar imajo ljudje dober vzrok, da ne prispevajo tako kot bi mogli.

Poročilo se sprejme.

Zastopnica Marie Prislund poroča o zanimanju Slovenske ženske zveze, ki se po svojih podružnicah udejstvuje pri posameznih lokalnih odborih, a poleg tega še aktivna glavna tajnica Josephine Erjavec vedno apelira v mesečniku Zarji za denarne prispevke. Poroča, da so ti prispevki dosegli že vsoto \$1,000. Na zadnji seji glavnega odbora pa so odobrile še nadaljnjih \$200 v pomoč nesrečnih in gladnih rojakov v stari domovini. Glavnemu blaginjaku izroči ček za \$1,200, kar navzoči vzamejo z veseljem in odobravanjem na znanje.

Glavni tajnik čita pismo mesečnika Collier's, od Carnegie Endowment for International Peace in od državnega tajništva v Washingtonu. Glavni predsednik omenja, da je dobil odgovor iz Washingtona na telegram, s katerim smo na priporočilo Adamiča ponovno posredovali v prid primorskih Slovencev. Vsi odgovori so povoljni.

Predsednik čita resignacijo

Etbina Kristana in Ivana Moleka, ki navajata vzroke, zakaj podajata resignaciji. Odbor je razmotril o podanih resignacijah ter prišel do zaključka, da ne sprejme istih, ampak jih bo predložil na seji širšega in ožjega odbora, kjer bo podano poročilo političnega udejstvovanja JPO, SS.

Zastopnica Marie Prislund prečita sledeče:

Iz zapisnika seje glavnega odbora Slovenske ženske zveze dne 30. julija, 1942.

"Glavna predsednica poroča o sestanku JPO, SS, katerih se je udeležila in kjer se je razpravljalo tudi o politični akciji v prid naše rodne domovine Slovenije.

"Po širsi razpravi je bilo sklenjeno, da se iz razloga, ker je politična akcija skoro popolnoma v zastopu, apelira na JPO, SS, da še to leto skliče slovenski narodni kongres, ki bi zedinil vse stranke v eno močno narodno skupino, razjasnil pojme in določil smernice za res učinkovito akcijo ameriških Slovencev v prilogi združenosti Sloveniji po vojni. Obenem naj bi kongres z ogorčnim protestom obvestil ameriško, angleško in rusko vlado o razsajanju podivjanih Nemcev in Italijanov po slovenski zemlji."

Sklep glavnega odbora SZZ se vzame na znanja ter se ga zanese na skupno sejo širšega in ožjega odbora, ki naj določi datum in pripravi vse potrebno za Slovenski narodni kongres v Ameriki.

V informacijo odbora prečita predsednik poročilo v angleški sekciji Zajedničarja, ki opisuje situacijo v Washingtonu pri zamejni jugoslovanski vladi. Istotako se prečita poročilo iz uradnega glasila Srbskega narodnega saveza, ki opisuje sorazmerje Srbov napram Slovincem in Hrvatom. Obe poročili se vzameta na znanje.

Prečitano je pismo ministra Snoja, ki apelira na pomožni odbor, da bi nakazal nekaj denarja v pomoč rojakom v domovini, katerega prejema skupina Slovencev v Ljubljani pod imenom "Narodno vodstvo."

Po njegovem poročilu ljudstvo v Ljubljani strada. Odbor vzame pismo v razmotranje ter si stavi vprašanje, kdo so ti Slovenci, ki tvorijo "narodno vodstvo" v Ljubljani, kajti v Sloveniji obstaja tudi osvobodilna fronta, ki vodi prave boje za osvoboditev Slovencev. Pomožnemu odboru tudi ni bilo pojasnjeno, kako se more poslati denar v Slovenijo, ampak se v pismu samo trdi, da bo denar prišel v domovino. Zato tudi odbor ne more skleniti ničesar, za kar bi mogel podati jasno sliko vsem tistim, ki so darovali v sklad pomožne akcije. Vpraša se pa ministra Snoja, naj piše ministru Kreku, ki dobiva poročila iz domovine, da naj nam pojasni vso situacijo v detajlih. Sprejeto.

Sklene se, da se seja širšega in ožjega odbora politične akcije JPO, SS vrši dne 12. septembra, 1942 v Chicagu, Ill. Po poročilu, katerega je dal odbor glavnemu predsedniku, on skliče ta sestanek in določi prostor.

Stavljen, podpiran in sprejet predlog, potem ko je bil prečitan dopis rojaka Andreja Špolarja, da se apelira na vse glavne odbore organizacij, ki so včlanjene pri JPJO, SS, da na svojih sejah sprejmejo resolucije, v katerih naj apelirajo na društvene tajnike, da bi pričeli pobirati prostovoljne mesečne prispevke v sklad JPO, SS.

Končno se zopet govori o možnem pošiljanju denarja v domovino. Izraženo je mnenje, da bi se lahko spremenil naš sklep, ako bi se moglo poslati denar slovenskim četnikom ali osvobodilni fronti, ki bi poslani denar rabili sami ali pa z denarjem pomagali našim ljudem. (Dalje na 6 strani)

**Minutes of the Rules and  
By-Laws Committee**

Bro. John Pezdirtz, Chairman of the By-Law Committee reports as follows:

Page 20, Section 6 (c) — fourth line to be changed to read as follows:

"Men's societies shall be permitted to merge with women's societies in their local vicinity when electing a delegate to the General Convention. Provided, however, that societies affiliated with the Central Sick Benefit Department of the Union shall not be merged with societies not affiliated therewith."

Page 29, Section 11 should read: "Supreme Medical Examiner to receive 50c for the examination of each application."

Page 30, Section 11 — Omit — I Vice President Bond, since I Vice President is not a member of the Finance Committee. Further it should read "remaining 4 members instead of 5."

Page 43, Section 15 — (f) is null and void. (16) should read: "any person of either sex of the Caucasian race, etc."

Page 53, Section 19 (a): In case of a member's suspension the Supreme executive committee has the right to deduct from the cash value of certificate any debts incurred by the member at his or her subordinate society.

Page 54, paragraph (b) line 9: the word "should" to read "shall."

Page 55, Section 21 (5): That the sum of \$250 be paid for the amputation of one foot above the ankle.

Page 57, No. 7 "Operations" — For the amputation of diseased breast an amount of \$100 to be paid for each operation. The word "female" to be omitted.

Page 57, paragraph 15 should read as follows (an addition to the existing): "15. Ligation of saphenous veins (Trendelenburg operation) one or both sides. No operation benefit shall be paid for treatment by injection alone or other non-surgical means."

Page 58, paragraph 22-A. The following operations are to be inserted:

KSKJ to pay benefit in the sum of \$50 for certain operations on the bones of the spine. Example Laminectomy.

Also for certain types of operations on the knee joint, \$50. This includes excision of the semi-lunar cartilage and other operations on the bones of the knee-joint where such operations serve to correct prolonged or permanent disability of the joint.

Benefit to be paid in the sum of \$50 for the removal of the coccyx (tail-bone) under the term of Coccygectomy.

Benefit to be paid in the sum of \$100 for the removal of prostate gland, whether transversely, perineally or by transurethral resection.

No benefit shall be paid for any operation not performed in a recognized hospital.

Page 58, paragraph 25. The above to be effective only when the operation was repeated within two years from the date of a similar operation for which benefit was paid.

Page 59, paragraph (b), Section 22 — 5th line to read "General Fund" instead of "Expense Fund."

Page 59, Section 23-A. to be substituted by the following:

"Claims for benefits of every nature must be executed under oath by the beneficiary

on forms furnished by the Union, except in the case that the beneficiary is a minor, in which event the claim must be executed under oath by his or her legal guardian or a parent. A claim for mortuary benefits must be supplemented by (a) a certificate of the attending physician or coroner, stating the cause of death; (b) a certificate of the undertaker, and (c) a certified copy of the certificate of death, as filed with the Department of Vital Statistics. The mortuary proof must be filed within sixty (60) days after the death of the insured, at the Supreme Office of the Union. If the certificate provides for funeral expenses, the proofs, in addition to the foregoing, shall include a statement from the undertaker as to the amount of funeral expenses."

Page 60, paragraph (f) — Omit entirely. Considered null and void.

Page 63, Section 26: Funds to be merged into General Fund and Sick Benefit Fund:

(a) GENERAL FUND: This fund is established to consolidate all funds previously employed, except the Sick Benefit and Juvenile Mortuary Funds, which shall continue to be maintained separately. Out of this fund shall be paid the life insurance benefits promised under benefit certificates of the Union, all permanent disability and operation benefits, in these By-Laws provided, all operating and maintenance expenses of the Union, as well as the cost of publishing the Official Organ. This fund shall be maintained by placing therein the net mortuary payments received from all members in accordance with rates required on their respective certificates, together with all accretions of said fund; also, by placing therein the payments received from all members collected, in accordance with the permanent disability and operation benefit rates or dues fixed by the Supreme Committee; also, by placing therein the expense loadings included in the several rate schedules, the rates or dues required for expense purposes as fixed by the Supreme Convention, and all other income not specifically allocated to other funds of the Union.

The technically required reserve to provide for the aforesaid mortuary benefits and such additional contingency reserves as are considered necessary by the Supreme Committee of the Union shall be maintained in this fund at all times.

(b) SICK BENEFIT FUND: This fund is established for the purpose of providing sickness benefits provided for in these By-Laws and for defraying the expenses of the Sick Benefit Department of the Union. It shall be maintained by placing therein the payments received from members insured for sick benefit in accordance with the rates fixed therefore by the Executive Board of the Sick Benefit Department and also of payments received from the Subordinate Societies upon affiliating with the Sick Benefit Department of the Union.

Page 86, Section 36 (k): An addition to be made: "or from certificate cash value."

Page 87 (m): An addition to be made to the existing: "In order to be eligible to run for office in his or her subordinate society, a member must have attended meetings at least four (4) months in the current calendar year."

Page 132, točka (4) se mora glasiti kot sledi: "zašlišanje se vrši najmanj 15 dni po izdaji

poziva."

Page 161: Change heading to read as follows: "Zavorovalnina — Starost bližnji-rojstni dan."

Regarding 70-year old members, they are to be exempt from paying all assessments except the sick benefit, which they are to take care of themselves.

Also all rates of assessment to be inserted in the By-Laws and Rules rather than in a separate pamphlet.

And you who send your sons into battle and forge the weapons of war that spell victory need not be cautioned to keep your courage high and your faith firm.

For we all will crush the tyrants and cleanse the lands of your fathers and bring freedom and peace to all men.

Making the Food Dollar Count!

The economical purchase of food requires intelligent planning. A wise homemaker will be alert to the nutritive value of the foods for which she spends her food dollars.

On a limited income, planning to meet these needs is doubly important. The homemaker on the limited income must first buy the essential foods. She must furthermore select these foods in the least expensive forms. It has been observed that the children in low-income homes where the mother intelligently and devotedly plans for the foods of her family, are frequently better nourished than the children in many far wealthier homes. Why?

Because the most important foods which provide the essentials for a well-nourished family are not expensive. These essentials fall into the following groups: 1 Milk and milk products; 2 Vegetables and fruits; 3 Whole-grain or enriched breads, cereals and flour; 4 Eggs, meat, poultry and fish; 5 Fats and sugars.

The Bureau of Home Economics offers the following suggestions as a summary of all available knowledge about the conservation of vitamin values in the cooking and serving of foods in the home:

Don't stir air in foods while cooking; don't put them thru a sieve while hot; don't use soda in cooking green vegetables; in boiling foods, raise the temperature to the boiling point as rapidly as possible; use as little water as possible; don't use long cooking processes such as stewing when shorter methods are feasible; don't throw away water in which vegetables have been cooked but use it in making gravies, sauces and soups. Prepare all chopped fruit and vegetable salads just before serving.

In shopping for food, shop in person. Do not send children who have no basis for judging values and prices. Shop around, compare prices and keep in touch with current market prices. Study the advantages of different types of markets, such as cash and carry, credit and delivery, curb and public market, co-operatives. Buy where you get the best returns for your money. Take advantage of bargain days and week-end sales.

If at all possible, take the Nutrition course sponsored by the Red Cross, if one is available in your community. It will be well worth your time.
