

BRITSKA ARMADA OBKROŽILA MA- RETSKO ČRTO

Rusi zavzeli železniški center v prodiranju proti Smolensku

NEMŠKA MORNA- RIČNA BAZA BOM- BARDIRANA

Zavezniški stan, Afrika, 23. marca.—Britska osma armada je obkrožila maretsko bojno črto, katero drži Rommelova sila, in prodira do točke, ki je oddaljena samo 30 milj od Gabasa, osištne mornarične baze. Ameriške oklopne kolone so v prodiranju proti Sredozemskemu morju zasedle Maknassy in zdaj ograjuje osištne-komunikacijske sive.

Zavezniški stan, Afrika, 28. marca.—Velika bitka za kontrolo Tunizije se je pričela. Britska osma armada napada maretako črto, ameriške in francoske čete pa so v akciji proti osištini sili Feldmarsala Rommela v južni in centralni Tuniziji.

Britska armada je v prvih napadih prebila maretako črto v dveh krajih, dočim so ameriške oklopne kolone ujele 1400 sovražnikov v prodiranju preko južne centralne Tunizije proti silu Gabasu. Prvi oddelki ameriške armade, kateri poveljuje general George S. Patton, so dospeli do točke, ki je oddaljena 50 milj od obrežja Sredozemskega morja. Operacije zavezniških čet na kopnem podpirajo bojna letala z bombardiranjem osištne pozicije.

Moskva, 23. marca.—Kolone ruske armade, ki prodirajo proti Smolensku, nemški vojaški bazi, 123 milj zapadno od Moskve, so okupirale Durovo, železniški center, in 40 naselbin na severni strani tega mesta, se glasi uradni komunikacije. Ruska bojna črta v dolini reke Donec, ki se razteza od Belgoroda na severu do Harkova na jugu, je bila stabilizirana. Nemška protiofenziva na južni fronti, ki je rezultirala v reokupaciji Harkova, je bila ustavljena.

Komunike pravi, da so Nemci izgubili 5500 vojakov v bitkah z Rusi v enem sektorju centralne fronte v zadnjih treh dneh. Napadi nemških oklopnih kolon na ruske pozicije med Kurskom in Harkovom so bili odbiti. Moskva omenja obnovo bitk na zapadni strani Rostova. V bitki v enem kraju te fronte so Rusi ubili tristo sovražnikov.

London, 23. marca.—Ameriške letalske trdnjave in bombniki so izvršili tri napade na Wilhelms-haven, nemško mornariško bazo, na katero so zmetali več sto bomb, ki so porušile pomole in zanele ogromne požare. Proti napadalcem so se dvignila v zrak nemška bojna letala in v bitki, ki je sledila, so Američani sestrelili več letal. Vsi ameriški bombniki razen treh so se vrnili v svojo bazo po izvršenih napadih.

Angleski letalci so istočasno bombardirali nacističke baze v severni Franciji, Holandiji in Belgiji.

Melbourne, Avstralija, 23. marca.—Ameriške in avstralske čete so okupirale vse ozemlje ob reki Mambari, vzhodna Nova Gvineja po bitki, v kateri je bilo 500 japonskih vojakov ubitih, poročajo glavni stan generala Douglasa MacArthurja. Poročilo omenja bombni napad na Gas-mato, japonsko mornarično bazo na južnem obrežju otoka New Britain. Ameriški letalci so metali dva tisoč funtov težke bombe na to bazo.

Stabilizacija upo- slitve naznanjena

Spencer pojasnil nov sistem

Chicago, 23. marca.—Načrt glede stabilizacije uposlitve v čikaškem industrijskem distriktu, ki naj bi preprečil premeščevanje delavcev iz ene tovarne v drugo, je bil objavljen. William H. Spencer, pokrajinski direktor federalne komisije za dobavo moštva, kateri načeluje Paul V. McNutt, je orisal načrt.

Spencer je v smislu navodil iz Washingtona informiral delodajalce, da ne smejo uposliti nobenega delavca, ki ne predloži dokaza, da je pustil delo z dovoljenjem delodajalca ali federalne uposeljalne službe. On je dejal, da je cilj novega sistema kontrola uposelvanja, ne pa ustalitev dela.

Victor A. Olander, tajnik-blagajnik državne delavske federacije, se je izrekel proti načrtu. Dejal je, da vodi v peanožo. On je v voditeljni uniji Ameriške delavske federacije in Kongresa industrijskih organizacij se bo danes sestali s Spencerjem in razpravljali o načrtu.

Vsi delodajalci v čikaškem industrijskem distriktu so bili in struirani, da morajo podaljšati delovni teden na 48 ur 1. maja v smislu prej objavljene odredbe. Ta velja za vsakega delodajalca v tem distriktu, ki ima osem in več delavcev.

ofenzivo na južni strani reke Jangtse v provinci Hupeh, se glasi uradni komunikacije. Ta trdi, da so Japonci rabili strupene pline proti kitajskim vojaškim enotam, ki so napadale Mitou-shih, japonsko vojaško bazo na južozapadni strani omenjene reke. Zavezniške podmornice, ki operirajo v kitajskih vodah med Sanghajem in Nagasakiem, so potopile tri japonske parnike v zadnjih dneh, poročajo kitajski častniški agentura.

Program za obnovo Kitajske

Dežela je na razpotju, pravi Kaišek

Cungking, Kitajsko, 23. marca.—General Chiang Kaišek, vrhovni poveljnik kitajske oborožene sile, pojasnjuje program obnove Kitajske v svoji knjigi z naslovom "Usoda Kitajske", ki se bo začel izvajati po porazu Japonce.

"Kitajska je zdaj na razpotju," pravi general. "Njen odpor proti japonski sili stopa v novo fazo. Dogovor z Ameriko, s katerim se je odpovedala teritorialnim pravicam na Kitajskem, je ugledil pot za ekonomsko rekonstrukcijo, kakršno je imel na vidiku pokojni dr. Sun Yatsen, ustanovitelj kitajske republike. Usoda Kitajske sloni na ramah našega ljudstva in se odloča v vojnem času. V prošlosti se je Kitajska zanašala na svojo diplomacijo v borbi za svoj obstoj, v bodočnosti pa bo obstoj zavisel od notranje administracije."

Kaišek pripisuje padanje Kitajske in nevarnost njenega narodnega obstoja v zadnjih sto letih krivičnim pogodbam in širjenju tujega vpliva, ki se je pričel, ko je bila dinastija Manču na krmilu. On v svoji knjigi izraža upanje, da politične stranke ne bodo ovirale narodne obnove z nelegalnimi akcijami.

Newyorški nadškof Spellman v Londonu

London, 23. marca.—Nepotrebno poročilo se glasi, da je Anthony J. Drexel Biddle, ameriški poslanik pri ubežnih vladah, konferiral z newyorškim nadškofom F. J. Spellmanom, ki je dopel sem po obisku Vatikana. Poročilo omenja, da je bil Spellmanov obisk Vatikana povezan z "mirovno ponudbo". Nadškof se je na svoji poti iz Amerike v Rim ustavil tudi v Madridu, Spanija.

EDEN DOSECEL GLAVNI CILJ V WASHINGTONU

Predsednik Roosevelt umaknil svoj načrt

USTANOVITEV SVE- TOVNE ORGANI- ZACIJE

Washington, D. C., 23. marca.—Dasi se diskutije med ameriškim voditelji in angleškim zunanjim ministrom Edenom nadaljujejo, se domava, da je slednji dosegel glavni cilj svojega obiska Washingtona.

Poučeni krogi trdijo, da bo Eden, ko se vrne v London, prinesel tja Rooseveltovo zagotovilo, da Amerika ne bo vztrajala pri zahtevi, da se Združeni narodi obvežejo sedaj za povojno kolektivno zaščito. To pomeni, da Amerika ne bo nasprotovala ruski aneksiji Estonije, Letske in Latvije, velikega kroga Finske, vzhodne Poljske in rumunskih pokrajin, med temi Besarabije.

Angleški zunanji minister je odletel v Washington kmalu potem, ko je predsednik Roosevelt naznanil, da namerava sklicati konferenco reprezentantov Združenih narodov, na kateri naj bi razpravljali o povojnih načrtih in kolektivni zaščiti. Churchillova vlada je nasprotovala sklicanju konferencie v interesu britskega imperija.

Velika Britanija bo morda pooblašala svojega črta glavnega ambasadorja v Washingtonu in vzhodno Poljske, ko bo vojna končana, njeno sedanje stališče pa je, da bi vprašanje povojne rekonstrukcije, če bi se reševalo sedaj, lahko povzročilo razkol med zavezniki.

V kongresu je tudi agitacija, da Amerika prevzame kontrolo nad otoki na Pacifiku v interesu svoje lastne zaščite. Argument je, da Japonce ne bi bila izvršila zahrbnega napada na Pearl Harbor, če bi bili Marshallovi, Karolinski, Ladranski in drugi otoki na Pacifiku pod ameriško kontrolo.

Resolucija, ki priporoča, da Amerika začne gibanje za ustanovitev mednarodne policijske organizacije, ki naj bi nadzirala svet in ščitila mir po tej vojni, je bila predložena v kongresu. V senatu so predložili resolucijo senatorji Joseph H. Ball, Carl A. Hatch, Harold H. Burton in Lister Hill.

Kanada omejila izvoz blaga

Carinska uprava objavila regulacije

Fort Erie, Ont., Kanada, 23. marca.—Kanadski carinski uradniki so izjavili, da so dobili navodila od vlade, naj takoj omeje izvoz blaga v Ameriko, ki se tamkaj deli in prodaja v odmerkih. Nove regulacije glede izvoza so takoj stopile v veljavo.

George H. Osborn, načelnik carinskega urada v Fort Erieju, je dejal, da nove regulacije omejujejo tudi izvoz blaga, ki se ne deli v odmerkih, v Ameriko. Nobena pošiljatev ne sme presežati vrednosti \$5.

Omejitev izvoza je bila odrejena potem, ko je več sto ljudi iz Windber, Pa.—Korporal Louis J. Naglic, član društva 174 SN-PJ v Krasnyu, Pa., je od 21. februarja pogrešan na bojišču v severni Afriki. Apel žene kitaj- skega generala

Združeni narodi morajo preprečiti vojno

Chicago, 23. marca.—"Vojna, višek človeške neumnosti, se ne sme obnoviti v bodočnosti, če hočemo, da vsa ljudstva uživajo mir in blagostanje," je rekla žena generala Kaišeka, vrhovnega poveljnika kitajske oborožene sile, v svojem govoru pred množico 20,000 ljudi v Stadiumu. "Le s koncentrirano čuječnostjo in akcijo Združenih narodov in drugih, ki se bodo morali spametovati, bo uveljavljeno načelo, da morajo vsi ljudje imeti pravico da življenja in blagostanja."

Ona ni v svojem govoru orisala samo povesti svojega ljudstva, temveč vseh, obenem pa je obsodila sebičneže iz vseh časov, ki ovirajo one, ki se trudijo v naporih, da postane pravica sila. Ona ni prosila ničesar in oni, ki so pričakovali, da bo ple-dirala za denar in drugo pomoč Kitajski, so doživeli razočaranje.

"Kitajska je spoznala, da je bila zgradnja stene v devetnajstem stoletju, za katero se je izolirala od ostalega sveta, velika zmota," je nadaljevala. "Oni, ki so steno zgradili, so nam v smrtoto."

Po zaključanju shoda se je žena kitajskega generala odpeljala na železniško postajo, kjer je zasledila vlak, ki je odrazil proti San Franciscu.

Revolta v Franciji se krha

Vojaške čete stražijo prelaze

London, 23. marca.—Skupine francoskih upornikov zapuščajo svoja bivališča v hribih province Haute Savoie v bližini švicarske meje, se glase sem dospela poročila. Vsi oni, ki se bodo predali oblastem, bodo poslani na delo v nemške vojne industrije.

Vest iz Švice pravi, da se glavna grupa upornikov še vedno bori proti francoski državni policiji, katero podpirajo nemške in italijanske čete, čeprav je skoro izčrpala zalogo živil.

Okrog 6000 upornikov se še nahaja v hribih. Ti se preživljajo z mlekom in mesom divjih koz. Policijski oddelki stražijo vse prelaze in steze, ki vodijo v hribe. Zavezniška letala, ki so spuščala živila in druge potrebščine upornikom, se niso pojavila nad hribi še več dni.

Dasi višiška radiopostaja zanika poročila o odporu gerilcev, je berlinska priznala, da se rebelne krupe, katere tvorijo izključno "komunisti", skrivajo v savojških Alpah. Naciji trdijo, da je položaj pod kontrolo.

Prejansa poročila so se glasila, da nemški patrolni čolni stražijo Ženevsko jezero, da preprečijo upornikom beg v Švico.

Rusi obnovili produk- cijo olja v Majkopu

Moskva, 23. marca.—Pravda, glasilo komunistične stranke, pravi, da je bila produkcija olja v Majkopu obnovljena. Majkop, središče oljnega polja, so sovjet-ske čete reokupirale 31. januarja.

Sama in zdaj se nahaja v Floridi.

Član v bolnišnici

ROOSEVELT ZA PODALJŠANJE RU- DARSKE POGODBE

Vladni odbor zavrgel peticijo reprezentantov ADF

GÖVERNER GREEN SKLICICAL KON- FERENCO

Washington, D. C., 23. marca.—Predsednik Roosevelt je poslal telegram Johnu L. Lewisu, predsedniku rudarske unije United Mine Workers of America, Charlesu O'Neillu, predsedniku organizacije operatorjev v severnih državah, in Edwardu R. Burku, predsedniku organizacije operatorjev v južnih državah, s pozivom, naj podaljšajo sedanjo pogodbo, katere veljavnost poteče 1. aprila. Ako se sedinjno glede vprašanja zvišanja mezd, mora biti zvišanje retroaktivno do omenjenega datuma.

Operatorji iz severnih držav so izjavili, da bodo upoštevali Rooseveltov nasvet, oni iz južnih držav pa se še niso odločili. Lewis še ni odgovoril Rooseveltu, ki je v telegramu naglasil, da se mora medni spor med njegovo unijo in operatorji rešiti v smislu protistavkovnega dogovora, sklenjenega v decembru 1. 1941.

Rudarska unija zahteva zvišanje mezd za dva dolarja na dan. Ko so se začela pogajanja za sklenitev nove pogodbe, je Lewis informiral operatorje, da rudarji ne bodo delali po 31. marcu, če ne bodo pristali na zahtovo glede zvišanja mezd.

Vojno-delavski odbor vstaja pri medni formuli, ki jo je podal v zadevi "Malega jekla" in katera dovoljuje zvišanje mezd za petnajst odstotkov nad točko, ki je prevladovala v januarju 1. 1941. Odbor je zavrgel peticijo reprezentantov Ameriške delavske federacije, ki so člani odbora, za revizijo medzne formule. Peticija naglašala potrebo osvojitve nove medzne formule, kar draginja narašča.

Springfield, Ill., 23. marca.—Governor Green je sklical konferenco reprezentantov operatorjev in organiziranih rudarjev, da prepreči oklic stavke v illinoiskih premogovnikih. Nesporazum med operatorji in rudarji je nastal glede provizij nove pogodbe.

Povabilo, naj se udeležijo konference, so dobili Ray Edmondson, predsednik dvanajstega rudarskega distrikta UMW, George Campbell, predsednik Illinois Coal Operators Assn., organizacije operatorjev, in člani odsekov obeh grup, katerih naloga je sestava nove medzne lestvice. Governor Green je v pozivu naglasil, da se sporne zadeve lahko izravnavo brez ustavitve dela v premogovnikih. Illinois mora doseči določeno kvoto v produkciji premoga v tem letu, ki je 75,000,000 ton.

Gestapoci pobili jetni- ke v poljskem taborišču

Stockholm, Švedska, 23. marca.—Himmlerjevi gestapoci so pobili vse jetnike v koncentracijskem taborišču v Rownu, vzhodna Poljska. Eksekucija je sledila napadu na nemške stražnike, v katerem je bil eden stražnik ubit. Koliko jetnikov so naciji ustrelili, ni znano.

Kuba dobila ameriške motorne čolne

Miami, Fla., 23. marca.—Amerika je izročila deset motornih čolnov Kubi pri ceremonijah, katerih so se udeležili ameriški in kubanski mornarični častniki. Čolni bodo stražili pomorsko črto med Mehikiškim zalivom in Kubo.

Our Society Forges Ahead

As announced last week, the twelve-month Victory campaign, ending February 28, brought our Society a record number of new adult and juvenile members—a record in which all participants in the drive can take pride.

It is to be noted that in the total gain of more than five thousand are included 1,380 juvenile transfers. This brings the actual number of new members secured during the campaign to about 4,400. The net gain is as impressive as it is vitally important to the steady growth of our Society.

It should also be noted that February, the final campaign month, was by far the most productive, with January running a close second. In February a record of more than six hundred new members was achieved and, in January, more than four hundred new juvenile and adult members were added to the SNPJ fold.

As all previous campaigns, this one also proved that our loyal campaigners reserved their energy for the home stretch period and thus climaxed their efforts in the two closing months with records that will indeed be extremely hard to beat.

On Dec. 31, 1942, our Society had a total of 61,851 members in both departments. Adding the gain made in January and February, the total at the present approaches the 63,000 mark. Thus we see that the membership of the SNPJ is once more approaching the all-time high reached on June 30, 1930, when our Society had a total of nearly 64,000, or, to be exact, 63,945 members in both departments.

Without a doubt, the twelve-month campaign just concluded was one of the most successful campaigns on record. Its success can be ascribed to several factors. Our Society is well advertised, its past performance speaks eloquently in its favor and its liberal principles appeal to our people.

A brief review of the past history pertaining to our membership campaigns and steady growth of our Society is appropriate at this time.

At the end of 1921 the SNPJ had a total of 39,000 members in both departments and by the end of 1922 it already had nearly 43,000. Two years later, in 1924, the SNPJ had 50,189 members, and the following year, in 1925, at the time of the eighth convention, the membership of our Society grew to 55,800.

During all this period, at regular intervals, various membership campaigns were conducted and the membership of the Society grew by leaps and bounds.

In 1927 a vigorous campaign was conducted which boosted the total membership of the SNPJ to 57,892, and at the end of 1928 the total passed the 60,000 mark.

Two years later, in June, 1930, as mentioned above, the SNPJ reached its peak in membership, having nearly 64,000 members in both departments. Needless to say, the economic and industrial crisis that followed the crash of 1929 brought hardships to the members and our Society along with other fraternal societies.

In spite of that, the indomitable will of the leaders and members alike made it possible for our Society to forge ahead once again after it withstood the greatest crisis in its history, and since 1934 its upward trend has been steady.

Early in 1934 our Society was preparing to observe its 30th anniversary. This was the time when the country was beginning to dig out of the severe depression through the gigantic New Deal recovery program.

Once more the SNPJ began to march forward until today, nine years later, on the eve of its 40th anniversary to be observed a year hence, our Society again stands high as a mighty leader in our fraternal world.

Quite appropriately, in recent years our English Speaking Lodges have taken the lead in our great fraternal family. A few years ago the Pioneers of Chicago, Lodge 559, captured the honor of having the largest membership among all lodges. Previously, Naprej of Cleveland, Lodge 5, held tenaciously that place for years, and now this honor passed on to Lodge 6 of Sygan, Pennsylvania, which boasts a total of nearly 1,000 members.

Sygan was able to achieve this feat by taking full advantage of the Victory campaign and by consolidating their fraternal forces. This success is well deserved and we salute our new largest lodge!

Our Front

As the weeks go by and spring is belatedly in the air, reports of Allied successes on all fronts continue to cheer everyone who hopes to see the Nazi-Fascists crushed. For the downfall of the Axis in Europe will also spell the end of Japanese brutality as well as the day of reckoning of all aggressors.

One thing is certain. The Axis powers are a tough nut to crack and it will take quite some time yet before they are defeated. For this reason it is necessary that the full strength of the United Nations is exerted to make the enemy feel its impact. Right now this is being done on the Eastern front by the Russians and in Tunisia by the Americans, British and French. In the Pacific the enemy is faring no better although progress there is such slow.

Carl Sandburg's prose sounds like poetry, but it is more truth than poetry when he writes on current events: "Voices, mouthpieces, organs, we have them. We listen to them. Or we wonder what to make of them. You might take oath that at least one-tenth of one per cent of the absentees in the munitions plants knock off for a day or two once in a while just to see if they can figure out any ordinary case in the day's news like that of Sen. Robert Taft of Ohio crying aloud over the American landscape that Elmer Dabbs, head of the OWI, had "commandeered" or seized by legal force and decree, the big radio networks for a Friday night broadcast to the whole country."

"Here was a man," writes Sandburg, "who before he headed OWI, was the highest paid, farthest shouting, hardest hitting newscaster in the business. And instead of 200 a minute for broadcasting, like he used to get, what is his pay now? Not a cent, nothing, plus the indignity of unjust vociferations of Sen. Taft, whose father's judicial decisions were better grounded," concluded Sandburg.

Among the stars coming to Chicago this week with the Metropolitan Opera is Zinka Milanov, Croatian dramatic soprano, who will appear in the principal roles in two operas, namely, "Il Trovatore" on Saturday evening, March 27, and in "Don Giovanni" on Saturday afternoon, April 3. The latter opera will be broadcast, and will be heard by the millions who listen regularly to the Saturday opera broadcasts.

Incidentally, the papers the other day reported the death in 1941, in Zagreb, of Milka Trdina (Trdinova), 25 years old, Zinka's teacher and herself an opera singer who at the end of the century sang with the Metropolitan opera for several years. Milka created in this country in 1911 the title role of Puccini's "Tosca."

Subelj Top Attraction at Sunday's Benefit

CHICAGO.—Undoubtedly, the main attraction at this Sunday's benefit program at the SNPJ hall will be Anton Subelj, the well known Slovene baritone, who currently sings with the "Met" chorus and who knows how to interpret folk songs better than anyone else. It will be his first appearance among us in six years.

Other numbers include Anna Zankovska, the Ukrainian soprano; Nicholas Komarchuk, violinist; Savva singers; Mary and Milzi Oven, pianists; a group of players in a timely skit; John Rak in a recitation; and Joseph Oven and Charles Pogorelec, speakers.

The Gradisek-Omerza orchestra will play for dancing. Tickets are 50c in advance and 60c at the door. The proceeds will go for Russian relief and for Proletarec. The place is the SNPJ hall on Lawndale; and the time and date—3 p. m., Sunday, March 28. Do not fail to see and hear Subelj!

Work and Grow With SNPJ Juvenile Circles

In an article which appeared in this column two weeks ago, we pointed out the importance of having a Juvenile Circle in every stronghold of the SNPJ and explained briefly the first steps of how to organize one. In this issue of the Prosveta, we will tell you what to do at the first Circle meeting and, also, suggest a few things you might consider at subsequent meetings and gatherings.

Before proceeding with today's article, let us remind you that a Juvenile Circle may be organized in any locality where there is an SNPJ lodge and where there are at least seven (7) juvenile members willing to join. We want you to remember also, that before you lay the foundation of a Circle in your community, make sure of two things: (1) That you have the right kind of adult leadership who is (or are) willing to assume the duties and responsibilities of management; (2) That you have enough juvenile members who are interested and, at least a few of them, capable of carrying out some of the necessary functions of an active Circle.

What to Do at the First Meeting

The purpose of the first meeting is mainly to lay the groundwork of the Circle. All juveniles who attend this meeting are charter members and will later have their names entered on the Juvenile Charter issued to the Circle from the headquarters of the Society.

There are many things to decide or take into consideration at the initial meeting. For one thing, the officers of the new Circle, including the President, Vice-President, Secretary, Recorder and Treasurer (also the Sergeant-at-Arms, if you wish), must be elected. Other committees may be elected or appointed from time to time as there is need for them.

A place for future meetings has to be decided—the local SNPJ hall, some member's home, a school room, or some other public or private place, conveniently located. There is also the question of frequency of meetings—once a month, every week, or every other week.

When that has been settled, you have to find the day of the week and the hour best suited to a majority of the members. Friday evening, during the day on Saturday and, perhaps, Sunday afternoon are ideal days to choose. Only in rare cases and for very good reasons should the meeting date be changed. One rule should be fixed and that is: **Start the meetings at the appointed time. Try to be punctual in everything you do.**

At this opening meeting, a discussion should be held on what to have for an attraction at the next meeting and how to arrange for this to happen in the right way. The Manager should come prepared to make suggestions. If necessary, a committee of three or more of the older juveniles can be appointed to assist him (her) in making and carrying out the arrangements.

If time permits some consideration might be given to the selection of an appropriate name, motto, colors, etc., for the Circle. These are important features, the final choice of which should not be made in haste. Use plenty of time and thought for each selection. Make sure the meaning of the name, motto, etc., have some related connection with the object of the Circle. Interesting contests can be arranged and prizes given to members whose suggestions are chosen as the best submitted.

After adjournment of the meeting, a party should be held in honor of the occasion. This may include a short program of games for the juveniles followed by refreshments served to all present.

Subsequent Meetings and Programs

Programs for meetings and other occasions should be planned from the standpoint of fraternity, entertainment, education and health exercise. Their primary purpose should be to build friendship, character and a strong desire for cooperative activities. Encouragement should be given the members to discuss the subject and the material suggested for future programs. Every avenue of self-expression should be left open to them. At the same time the Circle Manager should be on the lookout for leaders by studying the personality and ability of each member. Leadership qualities take root much faster if a correct analysis is made in the beginning and used as a guide for betterment.

Children naturally take to social life and gayety. They like to belong to an organization which provides opportunity for them to meet, plan and work out their ideas and problems together. They enjoy participation in sports, games and contests of all kinds. Entertainment programs, too, come in for a large share of their enthusiasm and usually inspire them to develop their talents on a higher standard. Picnics, outings, and parties are other forms of pleasure which furnish an outlet for their pent-up thoughts and energy. It has been proved that boys and girls, trained in social, cultural and athletic endeavors, are not slow in forming a strong sense of responsibility and appreciation for things that are useful in later years and, upon transfer to the Adult Department of the Society, more of them are inclined to become active in lodge work, bringing with them a new kind of stimulation and interest.

If you are one who thinks there are not many things you can do in a Circle, here are a few helpful hints and suggestions you can use and improve upon as the conditions in your community permit . . .

As soon as the new Circle is firmly established, plans should be put into effect for the first big social affair, preferably one associated with an important event of the Society or an outstanding holiday occasion. This year the SNPJ celebrates the 30th Anniversary of the Juvenile Department and the 5th Anniversary of the organization of Juvenile Circles, either of which or combined provides exceptional background for commemoration on an elaborate scale.

Good publicity is essential to the progress of every active Circle. Encourage the members to write, draw or sketch and present their work to meetings. Decide which are the best and send them to the **Mladinski List**. A good picture of your Circle's membership, or of the officers, or some activity may also be submitted for reproduction in the **M. L.**

Organize a singing club, a dramatic group or a drill team. Participate in such sports as softball, basketball, volleyball, table tennis, etc. Equip the members with attractive shirts or blouses displaying the SNPJ insignia. Remember that the Society gives financial support for the promotion and development of cultural and sports activities.

Arrange contests to see who can bring in the most new members. Attendance, hobby, quiz contests, etc., all help to create interest and attention. Attend worthwhile and recommended affairs in a body, such as meetings, lodge doings, shows, exhibits, demonstrations, etc.

My Native Land

By Louis Adamic

I am writing a book under the above title, a sequel to *The Native's Return* and *Two-Way Passage*. The following questionnaire is motivated by the hope that I can get some of the readers of *Prosveta* to help me turn out a better book than I might make it without them. My mail address it below. Please answer, as concretely and factually as possible, the questions that interest you. Do not assume that I already know what you can tell me.

What, in your view, are the chief and most interesting characteristics of the Serbians, Croats and Slovenians? I am interested in both positive and negative characteristics; also in those which may be positive under one set of circumstances and negative under another set.

Please illustrate the various characteristics with concrete examples of individual, group or national behavior, which you observed or which are a matter of historical record. I am most eager for such concrete material.

What are your explanations of the various characteristics? That is, how did the peoples acquire them?

How do the national characteristics of the three nations vary, as between the various classes in the population, in the several regions which made up Jugoslavia? That is, how does the Serb city person differ from the Serb peasant? How does the Bosnian Serb or Croat differ from the Shumadijac or the Croat from Croatia? How do the Dalmatians differ from inland Croats? Etc.

What besides geography have the South Slavs in common that can be regarded as certain, probable or possible bases for a worthwhile co-operative and integrating future for the three nations? Please give me concrete illustrative incidents in history or in your experience which support your ideas favoring such a future.

What are the causes, historic or immediate, of such antagonisms as exist among the three Jugoslav peoples. How deep do those antagonisms go? Which are superficial, or have been artificially stimulated, and to what extent? By whom? For what purpose? Give illustrations in concrete, dramatic incidents or facts of the antagonisms. How have some of them been resolved? If not, why not? Please draw on history better still, on your experience and observation.

Most of Slovenian history is largely independent of Serbo-Croatian history, while the history of the Serbians and the history of the Croats have interpenetrated often and for long periods. There were times when trends might have developed toward their becoming one people. If this is correct, what transpired to make them two such distinct nations in spite of their common language? Why? Under which forces? Which of the several historic theories do you accept?

How did it happen, as you know history, that Croats became Catholics and Serbians *pravoslavni*? Do you think, perhaps, that the most serious cleavage developed in religion? Who or what is responsible for it? Is there a solution for it? Why should two brother-nations be antagonistic over two versions of Christianity, both teaching the brotherhood of man?

Was the geographical position of the South Slavs ever an advantage to them? Is it not? If not, can and will it ever be? Why? How?

What were the beginnings of the Yugoslav idea, which was realized, however imperfectly, in 1918? I hold that the most villainous factor working against the development of many potentials in the South Slavic peoples have been the big powers pursuing their imperialistic aims. Do you agree or not? Whether you do or not, give me your reasons for agreement or disagreement. If you disagree, what is your "most villainous" factor in Yugoslav history?

What were the most magnificent, tragic, dismal, or sordid incidents, events, developments and periods in

Serbian, Croatian and Slovene history? Why?

How do you explain the amazing Yugoslav resistance to the Axis?

What are the political and subjective drives of the Pan-Serbian campaign against the Croatian people as a whole, which began early in '41 and is still going on? Has Pan-Serbianism any sort of future?

Were or are there any figures in South-Slavic life who were or are incontestably great as were, say, Abraham Lincoln, Walt Whitman or the late Justice Holmes? If so, who were they and why are they comparable to Lincoln, Whitman and Holmes? If not, why not?

You have heard the remark: a people have the government they deserve. Does this apply to the Serbians, Croats and Slovenians during the career of Yugoslavia as a sovereign state? Why? Or why not?

How do you define the struggle that has developed in occupied Yugoslavia between Mikhailovitch and the Partisans?

Don't you think that, in spite of all her ups and downs between 1918 and 1940 and her quick collapse in '41, Yugoslavia was somewhat of a success? If so, in what way? Please be as concrete and specific as possible.

How do you see the political and social-economic future of the Yugoslav peoples?

Do you favor the restoration of Yugoslavia as it was before Hitler overran it? Is it possible? If you think it is, and you favor it, why do you?

How about a Yugoslav federation with large autonomy for the various regions? If you favor it, how do you visualize its organization? Where does the Karageorgievic dynasty come in? Or does it? If not, do you favor a republic?

How about a Balkan federation or confederation? If you favor it, how do you visualize it? Which countries would be included? How about their kings? Would you have a republic and rotate presidents by nationality? Or what?

How can such a federation—whether Yugoslav or Balkan—be brought about? Would America and/or Britain favor it? Would Russia? Could it come into existence in opposition to Russia's will?

Would you favor an anti-Russian or anti-Communist Yugoslav or Balkan state, assuming such a state is conceivable to you?

Suppose Russia decides to extend her Soviet system over eastern Europe, including the Balkans—would you object? Why, or why not?

Please send me names and addresses of people you may know who were in Yugoslavia early in 1941 or later and have some firsthand concrete information on what happened there in that period.

Again, please do not assume that I already know what you know. Write to me even if it is probable that you will not tell me anything I don't know. Do not hesitate to write me about things not covered by the above questions.

I shall respect, of course, all limitations placed on the use of information sent to me.

Write in English or Serbo-Croatian or Slovenian, on one side of the paper; and please begin your answer to each question on a separate sheet. My address is: Louis Adamic, Milford, New Jersey.
