Prava pijanska bolezen je tu- di jeterna ciroza (Angleži jo i- menujejo: pijanska jetra), ki začetkom včasih ne kaže težjih znakov, pač pa pozneje povzro- či vodeničnost in proti koncu večkrat želodčne in črevesne kr- vavitve ter vodi v smrt. Vem za večje število mož, ki so zapadli tej bolezni in umrli v svojih naj- lepših moških letih. Tudi obolen- ja srca in ledvic so pogosto povzročena po alkoholu. Velika množina tekočine, katere pre- ide v žilje, zahteva seveda od sr- ca mnogo več navora pri bitju. Zato se mišičevje pomnoži, srce se poveča, da zmore težje opravi- lo. Kakor pa drugi organi, ta- ko se tudi srce pri alkoholikih pomašči in degenerira, da konč- no le ne premore pretežkega dela in nastopi vodeničnost. Tako ve- liko in zamašeno srce so anatomi kretili za "monakovsko piv- sko srce", kjer je pogosto pri Monakovčanih, ki zavijajo ne- verjetne množine svojega težke- ga piva. Da srce slednjič kljub temu omaga, temu se ne smemo čuditi. Ako voznik ne zmore klanca z navadno vprego, pri- vzame še par konj — da se pre- maga večji napor. Ako se pa to večkrat ponavlja, tudi dvojna vprega končno odreče.

Alkoholiki pogosto obole tudi na sladkorni bolezni. O protinu je obče znano, da ga največkrat povzroči preobilo zauživanje al- kohola. Tudi o revmatizmu zelo pogosto tožijo alkoholiki, a to največkrat po krivici, kajti one bolečine v nogah, katere imajo za revmatične, so povzročene po vnetih živcih (neuritis), ki je pač res posledica alkohola. Alko- hol povzroča tudi razne ohrome- losti.

Knoblauch je opisal ohrome- lost pri neki mladenki, ki je bi- la nekaj let ljubimka nekega bo- gataša. Ko jo je pa ta zapustil, moralno povsem propadla, se o- kužila, popila po 12 steklenic šampanjca na dan, potem pa bi- la 8 let hroma v bolnici, kjer se ni mogla ganiti iz postelje.

Ker je alkohol eden glavnih povzročiteljev povapnenja žil, je umevno, da so alkoholiki nag- njeni k kapi — ki je najčešče povzročena po krvavitvi iz možgan- skih žilic, ki se vsled povapnen- ja raztrgajo. Istotako ima tudi srčna kap vzrok v raztrganju povapnjene aorte, glavne srčne odvodnice, kar povzroča hipno smrt. Umevno je torej tudi, za- kaj ravno alkoholike ta rada za- dene.

Posebno tesna je zveza med alkoholom in božjastjo. Ne le, da se pri alkoholnih ekscisijh več- krat pojavijo taki napadi, tudi božjastniki dobivajo pogoste in težke napade po zavžitju včasih le male količine alkohola, dočim so oni redkejši in lažji in včasih celo izostanejo, ako se povsem o- pustijo zauživanje vsakoršnih al- koholnih pijač. Je pa tudi po- gubna zveza v tem, da imajo al- koholiki zelo pogosto božjastne potomec.

Navedel sem le glavne in naj- pogostejše telesne bolezni, na katerih pijanci zbole pogosteje od treznih ali abstinentnih ljudi in od katerih nekateri naravnost lahko nazivamo bolezni pijancev, četudi ne zadevajo izključno teh. Alkohol je ravno strup, ki člo- veka stori zanje sprejemljive- lega. Ako torej v teh slučajih alkohol le posreduje obolenje in dostikrat tudi smrt — pa v ne- katerih slučajih tudi sam po se- bi povzroči smrt. Večkrat se člo- veka, da je kdo, največ vsled kake stave, zaužil ogromne množine alkohola in se naenkrat mrtev zgrudil na tla. Bilo je le zastrup- ljenje z alkoholom, ki je bilo ta- ko močno, da je ugonobilo člo- veka.

Kot navadnejše, lažje zastrup- ljenje pa moramo smatrati, vsa- ko pijanost, ki je obnem tudi kratkotrajna blaznost. Izvanred- no velikega pomena pa so blaz- nosti ali duševna obolenja, po- vzročena po alkoholu. Sicer pri vseh raznih blaznostih igra al- kohol veliko vlogo, saj je med bolniki tretjina takih, ki so bili vda- ni pijančevanju — a kljub temu imamo še razna druga o- bojenja, ki so izključno po alko-

holu povzročena in katere nazi- vamo alkoholiske blaznosti. Pato- loško pijanost opažamo pri alko- holičkih (a tudi pri epileptikih in histerikih), pri zakajeni zavesti se pri njih pojavljajo nasilno- sti in zločini.

Tudi kronični alkoholizem vo- di dostikrat do brutalnosti in nasilnosti, glavni njegov znak je duševni propad, zlasti v eti- čnem oziru. Zanemarjanje dolž- nosti in dela in s tem gospodar- ski polom, ker se vse porabi za pijačo, v ta namen se tudi delajo dolgov, zastavlja in prodaja i- metje. Bolnik je povsem nevi- deden, lače povsod krivice svoji nesreči, le v svojem početju ne. Tudi telesno vedno bolj propada, pojavljajo se blodnje in haluci- nacije, povsod sluti zavistnike in sovražnike. Posebno se po- javlja ljubosumje in misel o ne- zvestobi žene, kar vede do ved- nih prepričev, pretepop in včasih celo umorov. — Slednjič naj še omenim pijanski blodž ali tkzv. "delirium tremens", kjer se po- leg želodčnih slabosti, brez- spanja, glavobola, pojavljata strah in preplašenost. Od halu- cinacij so zlasti znane one šte- vilnih, malih, vedno premikajo- čih se živali, muh, miši, itd. Bol- niki pogosto navidezno opravljajo svoja obična dela ter so v ved- nem nemiru. Nekateri alkoholi- ki zapadejo pogosto v ta delirij, nekaterim je celo smrtonosen.

Iz tega žal le površnega in kratkega pregleda spoznamo ka- kovo pogubno vpliva alkohol glede na duševna obolenja in koliko nesreč baš tu povzroča.

Le prado se ugovarja, da alkohol pač ni tako nevaren zdra- vju, ker je toliko pijancev, ki v polni telesni in duševni člosti dosežejo prav visoko starost. Go- tovo ni vsakemu tako poguben, ker sicer bi človeški rod že dav- no izumrl — a škodljivost njego- va je vendar neovržen dokaza- na in on ugonobi nešteto manj odpornih in boleznim bolj do- vzetnih ljudi leto za letom. Že pamet sama veleva, da se mo- ramo varovati, ter se ne smemo slepo podajati v nevarnost, ker ne moremo izključiti, da ona tu- di nas ne doseže.

In vsakdanja izkušnja na ža- lostnih vzgledih kljub vsemu te- mu ne odvrne naroda od pogub- ne strasti, ki zahteva vedno več žrtev. To je ravno prokletstvo in poguba tisočerm in tisoče- rim. Zato pa je opravljeno, da se vedno na novo ponavlja nauk o škodljivosti alkohola.

Da bi bilo redno zauživanje alkohola koristno, to se je že zda- vno znanstveno ovrglo. Kot zdravilo se je res uporabljal; ko sem študiral na Dunaju, je pro- fesor Nothnagel priporočal red- no uporabo alkohola kot zdravi- lo pri mnogih obolenjih, posneje se je temu oporekalo, češ, da i- mamo razna druga zdravila z i- stim učinkom, ter se je alkohol povsem opustil. Zadnja leta pa se zopet pri nekaterih obolenjih priporoča in uporablja, tako pri pljučnici, seveda le v malih do- zah. Povsem krivo je (kot se je to večkrat zgodilo), ako ima bolnik poleg steklenice z zdravi- lom še liter vina in pridno žega po njem. Ako poleg tega prizna- vamo še slabotnim uživanje al- kohola kot krepičo, a le po zdravn- niškem nasvetu in v količinah, od njega določenih, in ako torej alkoholu priznamo malo in na go- tove slujače omejeno vrednost v zdravniškem oziru — moramo nasproti temu ugotoviti, da je mnogokrat povzročitelj obolenj.

To je tem nevarnejše, ker nar- od tega zvečne ne verjame in ker je dotičnik že tako zelo v o- blasti tega zla, da neče in ne mo- re opustiti te škodljivosti. Do- stikrat je tudi organizem že ta- ko zelo propadel in razpadel, da vzdržnost le s težavo premaga bolezen, ako je to sploh še mogo- če. Omejitev alkohola je navad- no zelo iluzorična, ker jo pacijent vedno prekoračuje. V spomin mi prihaja neki dunajski gostilni- čar, ki mi je pravil: "Zdravnik mi je dovolil piti le dva vrčka pi- va na dan, vprašal sem še dva druga in vsak mi je dovolil dva vrčka. To je že šest vrčkov. No šest si jih dovolim pa še sam — torej 12 vrčkov na dan. To je si- cer komaj polovica tega, kar sem doslej pil, pa nekaj mora človek vendarle storiti za svoje zdravje."

Alkohol je škodljiv že s tem, da manjša odpornost proti raz- nim obolenjem ter da po njem oslabiljen organizem obolenje težje prenaša, a posebno še s tem, da sam povzročuje razna o-

The Meeting of the Supreme Board

The regular semi-annual session of the Supreme Board was held in the Home Office of the Society, Aug. 10, 11 and 12, 1933. The following reports were submitted by various committees:

Membership. On December 31, 1932, the Adult Department had 32,797 members and the Juvenile Department 15,498 members; total 48,295 members. On June 30, 1933: Adult Department 30,631 members; Juvenile Department 14,980 members; total membership 45,611. Loss: Adult Department 2,166, Juvenile Department 518, total 2,684. New adult members admitted during the same period—274; deaths—175; expulsions and withdrawals 747; on the passive list—1,518. The Juvenile Department shows a gain of 220 new members; there were five deaths, 226 expelled, and 507 transfers from Juvenile into Adult Department. The total number of passive members is 8,485.

Finances. The financial gain for the first half of the current year, as reported at the session, was \$63,966.06, and the total assets \$5,690,325.89. It was decided that the Finance Committee shall abide by the decisions made at the past convention regarding the investments of the organization's moneys.

Insurance. The sick benefit fund is in arrears \$20,465.94 and is rapidly draining its reserve. The \$1 class alone shows a gain, while the \$2 and \$3 classes are in deficit. Branches in Canada have drawn about \$4,000 more than they paid in assessments. In view of this fact the Administrative Committee was instructed to levy special assessments for the two higher classes of insurance, and a special higher assessment for the members in Canada.

The total insurance paid by the Society from Jan. 1 to June 30, 1933, was \$222,000. A total of \$12,000 was paid from the emergency fund.

Convention expenses. The aggregate cost of the tenth regular convention was nearly \$31,000. The Supervising Committee reports 105 per diem the expenses for which cannot be justified. These per diem amounted to \$682, were approved by the convention committee, and only two delegates have thus far voluntarily refunded their overpaid shares. But the committee, however, has the names of all the delegates who have drawn more than they were entitled to.

Juveniles. A new scale for the Juvenile Department has been approved and will go into effect October 1, 1933. Its provisions are: Members between the ages of 1 and 10 will pay 18c monthly assessments; between 10 and 14—22c; between 14 and 18—25c. But each member will have a reserve collected from his monthly assessment which will be credited to him at the time of his admission into the adult department. Thus, a juvenile member from the age of 1 to 18 automatically will accumulate to his credit \$11 for his assessment at the time of his transfer into the adult department.

Thirtieth anniversary. Next April, when our Society will celebrate its 30th birthday, the official organ Prosveta will come out in a special jubilee edition on sixteen pages. The Administrative Committee shall conduct a special campaign in this connection and, upon demand, will send out speakers at the Order's expenses to federations and branches which will observe this occasion.

Miscellaneous. (The question concerning the passive members and the decision rendered by the Supreme Board, will be found in the official notice below.) The fund for old and disabled members will remain intact up to the time of the next convention.—The condition of the daily Prosveta is unchanged. It was decided that the Nira provisions shall be complied with in all the departments at the Main Office. The salaries remain as decided by the last convention. The Mladinski List will again award its literary contributors, the total amount not to exceed the sum of \$30 per month.—Dr. J. J. Zavertnik was elected supreme examiner.—The question of merger with other fraternal societies (Jugoslav) was discussed at length, and the consensus of the Supreme Board members was that the SNPJ is willing and ready to merge with other fraternal organization on the conditions of equality, but the interest of our members must always be considered first.

DECISION OF THE SUPREME BOARD REGARDING PASSIVE MEMBERS

The Supreme Board at its meeting, August 10, 1933, passed upon the decision that the same resolution shall be applied to the passive members of the Society as accepted for canceled members at the tenth regular convention. By the provisions of this resolution, passive members will be credited for their assessment during their period of passivity not to exceed a total of six months. All assessments in arrears

Labor's Freedom Under NIRA

The enslavement of workers under a corporate dictatorship and outlawing labor organizations from the iron and steel industry for the purposes of the code submitted by the American Iron and Steel Institute, which includes most of the iron and steel corporations, company union code was not accepted by National Recovery Administration. It withdrawn by Robert P. Lamont, president of the Institute.

But this is not the end of the struggle. Lamont declared that the corporation-owned operated company union would not be abandoned but every effort will be made to limit it on the workers without the sanction of code. This statement becomes of great importance to the working masses. If the steel keep the company unions they will try to them in negotiations.

The "employee representation" monster is out of the steel code but it is still in the and steel plants and it remains to be seen will be the standing of this hateful thing.

Nothing is certain for the workers under NRA, not even collective bargaining. Mary Kleeck cancelled her acceptance of membership in the Federal Advisory Council of the U. S. Employment Service as a protest against labor policy of the Administration. The manner of setting the Pennsylvania miners' strike without ruling out company unionism, the President's plea against strikes and any other aggressive action during the recovery program and the fact that the President's industrial meditation board employer members are all officers of corporations operating company unions while only two of the seven members are representatives of labor, have induced Van Kleeck to protest by declining the pointment.

It would be stupid to make a fetish of right to strike by urging strikes for any all purposes, but freedom of action in this matter is absolutely essential to the working masses. Labor's hands must never be tied by own action or by government decree. It would be fatal to its freedom and a menace the future of tens of millions of workers.

What is called "social peace" enforced government action is always dangerous to the who work for a living. It should be remembered that the government is not controlled by labor. A treaty of "social peace" was signed during the World War. For a time it appeared that the workers had made a good bargain. Brisk war production, an upward trend in prices, and an enormous demand for war materials gave workers a sense of security.

But even during the war workers faced just decisions by government agencies. When they threatened to strike they were told they might sent to the trenches. When the war was over the slogan was "business as usual." Labor's "partners," the masters of industry turned to a vicious attack against labor standards. Company unionism advanced with league boots. The class antagonism that been concealed behind the "social peace" through this pretense and the workers, organized and unorganized, had their backs to wall.

Let us not repeat this sad experience. Labor freedom of action must be maintained!

for a period longer than six months must be paid. For example,—a member who has passive for a period of ten months shall assessments into the mortuary fund for months, and receive credit for the remaining six months.

A passive member must, upon coming to refund his assessments into the mortuary fund, pay at least one monthly assessment his debit to the Branch secretary together the assessment for the current month. amount less than this will not be accepted. remaining assessments in arrears may be in one payment or in monthly installments.

Any passive member who does not go himself and refund his assessments into mortuary fund according to the decisions of Supreme Board and the Convention shall be become reinstated as any new member, and forfeit all rights of membership as a passive member, or he shall pay assessment according to a higher rate.

Passive members and Branch secretaries should carefully note these explanations and guide themselves accordingly.

The "Last War"

In the first torrid days of August, 1914, the world reeled drunkenly under the impact of the first blows of the World War—the "last war," the "war to end all wars."

(Millions of men were mobilized, called to the colors, exorted in the name of the Most High to go forth and slay.

In the first torrid days of August, 1914, the civilized portion of the human race stood aghast at the thought that despite the veneer of civilization and the attempts of noble souls to create an internationalism that would make wars impossible, wars were still with us.

Napoleon once said he aimed to make wars as terrible as possible, for in only that way could wars be made impossible. But Napoleon erred, for as in his time so in ours wars are declared by statesmen, and are fought by common soldiers—while the masses suffer untold agonies. And despite the almost miraculous ingeniousness of machinery of mass-destruction wars continued to be declared and fought. For there is a power greater than moral force that makes wars inevitable.

The only way to make wars impossible is to get rid of that power!

When the war broke upon a stunned world Americans were happy that they were out of it. President Wilson urged us to be "neutral in thought as well as in deed." America rejoiced—for a while in its neutrality.

But it was not long before the neutrality melted away and clamorous politicians were doing all in their power to get us in the war, while a wealthy manufacturer of dynamite and other explosive financed a great campaign to "sell" America the idea of becoming armed.

Something had happened, something that involved the material welfare of America; no, not of all America, but of the dominant banking and industrial classes of America.

American bankers became involved in the fortunes of war to the tune of hundreds of millions of dollars in loans, and American industrialists became involved to the tune of billions of dollars' worth of business.

AND THEN AMERICA, led by the kept press, CEASED TO REJOICE IN ITS NEUTRALITY. And then Americans were led to believe that hatred of war as such was somehow shameful!

We were dragged into the war; and the war dragged to a close. NO MORE WAR! shouted the peoples of the world. NO MORE WAR! echoed the statesmen who had made the system out of which war came, as they vainly tried to patch up the damage they had wrought.

And so they made a peace that was worse than war, and out of that "peace" have come angry and terrible problems that have again brought us to the verge of a war so terrible that it is possible that civilization will be unable to survive it.

NO MORE WAR! That is a good slogan, for the person who sneers at pacifism is a fool or a knave, while the person who even admits the possibility of war as a necessary policy of peoples is an enemy of the human race.

But the person who closes his eyes to the awful danger of war is likewise so blind as to be classed as an infatuated fool.

Let us fight against war; but in fighting against war let us realize that war grows out of certain conditions and that the only war to strike at war is to strike a blow at the causes out of which wars arise.

There is danger of war everywhere; let us face that awful fact. There is one way to destroy that

danger of war, and let us face that, too.

Let us build a workers' world; let us create a ring of workers' republics in every part of the world; let us exalt the interests of the men and women and children who make the world and its greatness and beauty above the shabby material self-interest of bankers and industrialists, who have led the people to the shambles so often.

We hear the throb of the drums and the clamor of the "patriotic" orators. We hear the blaring of the bugles and the tramp-tramp-tramp of the men getting ready for the next blood-bath. Let us raise our voices so that those dread sounds will be drowned out by the fraternal cries of workers' unity, so that there will rise full and clear above the clamor and clangor the rallying-cry of those who will make wars impossible for all time:

The Real Test

General Hugh S. Johnson, administrator of the National Industrial Recovery Act, has repeatedly stated that it is not his duty to organize either Labor or industry. He emphasizes the fact that it is his own supreme duty to see to it that every provision of the National Recovery Act is enforced.

"It is the duty of this administration," he says, "to see that all Labor, organized as well as unorganized, gets a square deal, and the administration is organized to do and will do that duty. It is the duty of this administration to require the inclusion in codes of the mandatory conditions of Section 7 (of the Recovery Act), and to see that these conditions are complied with, and it will perform that duty."

What are the mandatory conditions of Section 7 General Johnson promises to enforce? Here they are:

"Every code of fair competition, agreement and license approved, prescribed or issued shall contain the following conditions:

"That employees shall have the right to organize and bargain collectively through representatives of their own choosing, and shall be free from the interference, restraint, or coercion of employers of labor, or of their agents, or in self organizing, or in other concerted activities for the purpose of collective bargaining or other mutual aid or protection;

"That no employee and no one seeking employment shall be required as a condition of employment to join any company union, or to refrain from joining, organizing or assisting a labor organization of his own choosing."

The very letter of the law outlaws and forbids the organization of a company union for it would be an utter impossibility to organize a company union without interference from the employer. The yellow dog contract is likewise outlawed.

This is the law General Johnson says he will enforce.

Yet the steel industry, the lumber industry, the meat packing industry and a score of other huge industries are already forming company unions to defeat the very spirit and letter of the National Industrial Recovery Act. Big business is out to tweak the nose of the federal government in the present crisis as it has always done in the past.

The real test will come when the steel industry lays its cards on the table and calls for a showdown. Then Labor will know once and for all if General Hugh S. Johnson was chosen for his courage or for his ability to say one thing and then do the very opposite.—"M. U. A."

Pennsylvania's Disgrace

The low wages and long hours imposed on women and minors by many Pennsylvania employers, brought to light by the Gallagher commission investigating sweatshop conditions, are a deep disgrace to the citizens of that state and a discredit to the state government for its failure promptly to remedy the situation.

Testimony before the commission revealed that in Pittsburgh the wealthy Aluminum Corporation of America pays hundreds of women \$1.10 a day in the place of men formerly employed at \$5 to \$6.

Factory owners pay girls 2 cents an hour and compel them to make silk dresses at 20 cents each with wages of only \$3 for two weeks' work. They also take on girls as "learners" for three or four weeks without pay and then lay them off after one week at \$5. Girls with nine weeks' experience were paid \$2.98 for two weeks' work.

The testimony also revealed that owners of 5 and 10-cent stores work their employes an average of 60 hours a week for \$7 and compel them to work Sundays preparing the stock. In a sale contest one store owner compelled girls who failed to sell an average amount of goods to carry unwrapped nursing bottles to and from work.

The inhuman wages, hours and working conditions imposed on women and girls by the sweatshop employers of Pittsburgh are duplicated by unscrupulous employers in other industrial sections of the state.

The conditions revealed by the Gallagher commission are a severe blow to the prestige of Pennsylvania. The state has labor laws galore, but they do not enable the authorities to smite the sweatshop owners.

A mandatory minimum wage law which prohibits the employment of women and minors at wages unreasonably low and not fairly commensurate with the value of the service rendered, with adequate penalties for violation, seems to be absolutely necessary to end the economic slavery imposed on thousands of Pennsylvania's women workers by profit-mad employers.

Gov. Pinchot should act promptly and convene a special session of the legislature for the purpose of wiping out of Pennsylvania's industrial life the stigma of sweatshop employers and starvation wages.

We Sign The Pledge

America is making a covenant with Franklin D. Roosevelt to do certain things: Employers of labor will work their workers a limited number of hours and pay a minimum wage; children will not be worked at all until after they have reached the age of 16 years; the general public will bestow its patronage only upon those manufacturers and merchants who agree to meet the terms laid down by Mr. Roosevelt.

Whether the plan will head us out of the valley of depression to the broad and lofty plateau of prosperity remains to be seen. However, certain factors have already developed to make us believe that the thing will be a flop.

The basic industries, notably steel and autos, have plainly indicated that they intend to continue operations for the benefit of owners and stockholders and not for the welfare of workers. Even Miss Perkins was obliged to tell the steel magnates in pointed language that their wage code is too evasive to jibe with the spirit of the National Recovery Administration.

With the past performance of the Steel Trust in mind, there can be very little doubt that everything possible

will be done by that group of grafters to evade giving workers a larger share of the wealth they create. It is scarcely a risk to predict that the Administration will find it necessary to protest repeatedly against the actions of the big manufacturers as time goes on.

Nor can the smaller profiteers be expected to cheerfully surrender any portion of their profits—if any—in order that their workers may have more money to spend. Already there are rumors of speed-ups to make workers produce as much for the \$14-week minimum as they would have produced in a longer working week for the same amount of money under "rugged individualism."

And as for the workers, it is expecting rather much of them to believe that they will refuse the lower prices made possible by sweatshop labor to carry their insufficient wages to merchants who handle only "fair" products at higher prices.

It is possible, of course, that Franklin D. has taken account of the difficulties which stand in the way of success for his blanket code. It may also come to pass that the Administration is prepared to use the iron fist to force all elements into line.

However, if force is found necessary, that will be a sign that the Administration's plans have failed and that all semblances of individual freedom have disappeared. America is not far from Fascism right now, and it is quite possible that the next few months may see willing co-operation displayed by barefaced dictatorship.

For the present, however, America has signed the pledge and the Blue Eagle screams—much as the grand old bird of freedom screamed during those bunk-ful days when workers were conscripted for democracy and profiteers were grabbing everything in sight.

Food, clothing and shelter have been provided and hundreds of families have been saved from being broken up and scattered, never to again be reunited. Members have dug down deep into their own slim finances and taken from their own meager store of goods to supply the dire need of a suffering Brother or Sister.

Did you ever give a nickel to a man or woman in distress because he or she held a policy in the same commercial insurance company that you did? Of course not. It is ridiculous question. Yet, the brotherly tie of mutual fraternal protection has brought forth many a needed nickel and hundreds of ill-spared dollars which made the donor draw up his belt another notch and deprive himself still further of the desirable things of life. And in every instance he has done it with a smile and a hearty hand-clasp of encouragement. The thousands of recipients of this help during the past three severe winters and discouraging summers will not soon forget. With the full effect of the National Industrial Recovery Act they are going back to work. They will soon be self-supporting. They will again become producers and consumers. When that not-far-distant day arrives the fraternal benefit societies will reap their reward.

The fraternal benefit societies met their responsibilities of the depression years squarely and fully. There was no evasion or side-stepping. They will stand some nine million strong behind President Roosevelt in his administration of the National Industrial Recovery Act. Make no mistake about that.—The Fraternal Monitor.
