## Sen. Mansfield poziva k popuščanju Vzhodu

Vodnik demokratske večine v zveznem senatu se zavzema za izboljšanje odnosov z Vzhodno Evropo.

WASHINGTON, D.C. — V preteklih dneh smo ponovno slišali v senatu pozive k pomiritvi s komunistično vzhodno Evropo, ki je prenehala biti en sam trden in discipliniran blok, ki se je "praktično odpovedala nasičju kot sredstvu v mednarodni politiki", ki je prenehala biti "napadala". G. Kennan vidi v novi politiki do Sovjetske zveze in ostale vzhodne Evrope edino sredstvo, ki naj prepreči tretjo svetovno vojno z atomskim uničenjem. Bivši poslanik ZDA na Japonskem Reischauer je svaril pred "nepotrebnim strahom" pred rdečo Kitajsko, ki še dolgo ne bo sposobna nastopiti proti Sovjetski zvezi ali Združenim državam.

Tema glasovoma se je pridružil tudi sen. M. Mansfield, vodnik demokratske večine v senatu. Svoje tovariše v senatu je pozval, naj ne dovolijo, da bi "vietnamska tragedija" prepričila "trezni preudarek" korakov, ki naj izboljšajo odnose med Zadhom in Vzhodom.

## Bonn želi konferenco "velikih širih" sil

Njeno ponovno sklicanje je predložila Moskva. Bonn je predlog takoj podprt.

BONN, Nem. — Že med zadnjo svetovno vojno so se veliki zaveznički, Anglija, Amerika, Francija in Rusija, dogovorili, da bodo usodo Nemčije obravnavali na posebnih konferencah štirih zunanjih ministrov. Takoj po vojni je Moskva začela sledno sabotirati delo takih konferenc, dokler niso l. 1959 popolnoma zaspale. Zadnjim takratnim sestankom sta prisostvovali tudi delegaci Zahodne in Vzhodne Nemčije, seveda le kot opazovalki. Sedaj je Moskva sprožila idejo, da bi se konference obnovile. Na moskovski predlog je takoj pristala Zahodna Nemčija in predlagala Ameriki, Franciji in Angliji, naj rusko idejo sprejmejo.

Bonnska vlada misli, da bi morala konferenca začeti takoj obravnavati razročitev srednje Evrope, reguliranje osebne in blagovne prometa med obema Nemčijama itd. Konferenca naj bi tudi čim preje ustanovila posebno komisijo obeh Nemčij, ki naj študira znani Potsdamski sporazum in predlaga, kako bi se posamezne točke tega sporazuma dale izvršiti.

Bonnska vlada je tudi namignila, da bi vprašanje priznanja Vzhodne Nemčije "na novo proučila", ako bi postala Vzhodna komunistična Nemčija "bolj demokratična".

Ker je Moskva sprožila to idejo, je verjetno, da je druge zaveznice iz zadnje svetovne vojne ne bodo vzbogle, če ne bo De Gaulle kaj padlo v glavo.

## Kongresni republikanci so pokaali zobe

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Kongresni republikanci so oživeli, iščejo demokratski večini pokati zobe. Sicer pa, kaj je pravaprav demokratska večina? V enatu imajo konservativni senatorji dobro polovico glasov, rajti z republikansko manjšino v važnih zadevah navadno s demokratsko stranko z juga žeže. V predstavnškem domu maju napredni demokratje le koli 150 sigurnih pristašev, okoli 80 južnjakov simpatizira z republikanci, kar še ostane demokratskih kongresnikov, pa igrajo na neutralno struno. Ta zmesjava v demokratskih vrstah daje republikancem od dneva do dneva več poguma. To vidimo skoraj vsak teden kongresnega zasedanja.

Republikanski senatorji so se na primer sedaj vrgli na kritiko demokratske finančne politike, torej ravno tja, kjer je Johnsonov režim najobčutljivejši. V pristojnem odboru obravnavajo sedanji senatorji predlog administracije, da se povira dovoljena meja federalne zadolžitve od \$330 bilijonov na \$337 bilijonov.

## Kitajski izgredi pred poslaništvu postajajo političen barometer

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Dokler so v Peipingu rdeči gardisti demonstrirali le proti russkemu in jugoslovanskemu poslaništvu, je svet smatral vse skupaj za notranjo komunistično zadevo, ki nima pomena za mednarodno politiko. Sedaj pa so kitajski komunisti začeli demonstrirati proti tujim diplomatom in poslaništvi vsepoprek, doma in na tujem.

V Peipingu so na primer vzeli na tarčo tudi francosko poslaništvo, cesar v Parizu sploh razmeti ne morejo. V Parizu so pa rdeči kitajski študentje demonstrirali pred russkim poslaništvom, pa jih je pariska policija hitro spravila pod ključ. Kitajski komunisti so organizirali demonstracije celo proti russkemu poslaništvu v Hanoiu in tako spravili neutralno politiko severovietnamske vlade v veliko zadrgo. Francoska diplomacija se je že take razjezila, da se izmika uradni stikom s kitajskimi diplomati. Kadar želi kitajski diplomat razgovor z njimi, pošiljajo na sestanke pomorne tajnike posameznih poslaništev. Kitajci so da je demonstrirali tudi v kanbodžanskem prestolici Phnompenu, seveda proti russkim diplomatom. Skupili so jo pa v iraškem prestolici Bagdad. Tam je 11 kitajskih študentov hotelo demonstrirati pred russkim poslatom, pa so jih domačini kar amč pošteno prematili.

Dogajajo se torej čudne stvari, ki zanje ta trenutek še ni mogoče najti prave izloge, tako trdijo diplomatski rogi v Washingtonu.

## JOHNSON "NE VE NIČ" O NAPORIH HANOIA ZA MIR

Predsednik ZDA je dejal včeraj na tiskovni konferenci, da "on ne ve nič o resnih poskusih" Severnega Vietnamca za mirovne razgovore, povčno pa je poudaril pripravljenost iti preko pol pota v vsakem takem naporu.

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Na tiskovni konferenci včeraj je predsednik L. B. Johnson malo ohladil govorice o pripravah za razgovore o končanju vojne v Vietnamu, ki so zadnje dni krožile tako tu, kot v Londonu, Parizu in Rimu. Dejal je, da on ne ve nič o "kakem resnem naporu" Severnega Vietnamca za take razgovore in za končanje vojskovanja, da pa je pripravljen ustaviti bombardiranje Severnega Vietnamca, kakor hitro bo ta napravil "kakršenkoli korak", ki bi to opravičeval. Nato je naglo dodal: Doslej še niso napravili nobenega!

"Iz poročil, ki jih imam jaz, in iz znanja, ki mi je bilo prineseno, jaz ne vidim nobenega resnega napora druge strani iti konferenčni mizi in končati vojno," je odgovoril predsednik Johnson časnikarju, ki ga je vprašal o tem ali bi mogle zadnje uradne izjave v Hanoiu privesti do prekinutih bombnih napadov na Severni Vietnam in do razgovorov o končanju vojne.

Predsednik je govoril pomirljivo, pa vendar odločno. Ponovil je željo po končanju vojne in svojo pripravljenost iti preko pol poti, če bi nasprotna stran pokazala dobro voljo. "Vsekim dogovor bo vključeval sporazum obhrambne strani in določeno popustitev obhrambne strani," je dejal predsednik.



## Tarts For A Festive February Party



In the midst of winter, February's festive holidays bring a welcome excuse for entertaining. Attractive Cherry Treasure Tarts are appropriate for any of the February holidays. These dainty little pastries are so easy to make yet they have the look of real party fare. Your favorite pie crust mix and canned cherry pie filling simplify preparation as well as assure excellent results.

Dress the tarts for a party with confectioners' sugar icing and a sprinkling of chopped pecans. Actually, your family will enjoy Cherry Treasure Tarts any time of the year; they make swell lunch box treats, too.

### CHERRY TREASURE TARTS

Makes 2 dozen tarts

One 10-oz. pkg. Flako Pie Crust Mix 4 tablespoons cold water Cherry pie filling

Heat oven to hot (425°F.). Empty contents of package into bowl. Sprinkle cold water by tablespoons over mix. Stir lightly with fork until just dampened. (If necessary, add another one-half tablespoon water to make dough hold together.) Form into ball. Divide dough into two equal parts. With lightly floured rolling pin, roll one part out on lightly floured board or canvas to  $\frac{1}{4}$ -inch thickness. If dough sticks, add a little more flour.

Cut with a floured  $\frac{3}{4}$ -inch round cutter. (An empty can,  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup capacity, with top removed works nicely.) Repeat with other half of dough. Place tarts on ungreased cookie sheet. Place scant teaspoonful of cherry pie filling in center of each pastry circle. Fold circle in half. Dampen bottom edge with water. Seal top and bottom edges together by pressing with tines of fork. Cut slits in top to allow steam to escape. Bake in preheated oven (425°F.) 15 to 18 minutes. While still warm, frost tarts with icing; sprinkle with a few chopped pecans.



### TV Football Fans Will Continue To Get Plenty of Action

Although the leagues have merged, the NFL is committed through 1967 to follow the television policy that flooded pictures into cities conducting games. The CBS network must deal again for 1968 and magazines say they can end their "experiment." Nobody yet has ever taken back something given; besides, if the NFL does insist, it will obviously mean a loss of revenue. So don't worry about the free show; it's here to stay.

Best forecaster anywhere around the playoffs was Don Meredith, Dallas quarterback, who shocked the press — and no doubt the fans at second hand — when he stated the Cowboys were "very capable of achieving 28 points and maybe a field goal, too, for 31." The losers got 27 against Green Bay and would have had 28 if a try for point had been made.

Next year, an NFL player might participate in 24 games. That means six exhibitions, 14 games, two playoffs in the new sectional setup, one Super Bowl, and the Pro Bowl.

Long season? Eight years ago, 18 was a long season — four exhibitions, 12 games, a playoff and the Pro Bowl.

New Loop Should Learn Lesson From American Basketball League

The new American Basketball Association hopes to operate next fall in Seattle, Atlanta, Phoenix, Cleveland, Pittsburgh, New York, Louisville, Minneapolis, Los Angeles and Anaheim, Calif. It plans to solve its No. 1 problem of no star players by raiding the NBA for talent. Abe Saperstein tried this back in 1961, when he launched the old American Basketball League, and would up with people like Dick Barnett and Kenny Sears. Saperstein's league lasted less than two years, folding under losses which totaled more than \$1 million.

### Rain Holds Gate to 15,062, Lowest in Event's History

Los Angeles, Calif. — The seventh Pro Bowl, played in a rain-storm which began the night before and continued most of Sunday, attracted a crowd of 15,062, sitting under 10,000 umbrellas.

It was the smallest turnout since the series began in 1951.

The advance ticket sale had indicated a crowd of 50,000, some 10,000 under the recent average.

The Super Bowl, played a week earlier, had drained part of the interest. For the last four years in the Coliseum, the Pro Bowl had pulled crowds of more than 60,000.

This one was a financial success only because of television revenue.

### Taxes May Eat Up Half Of Bobby's \$100,000

Baltimore, Md. — According to one accountant, close to half of Orioles star Frank Robinson's 1967 salary of \$100,000 will go for taxes.

Federal, California state and Baltimore city earnings taxes would gobble up about \$45,000, the accountant says.

"But I have a hunch Robinson will take advantage of the provision in the Internal Revenue code that allows you to average your income over a four-year period for tax purposes," the accountant explained. "That is, over a four-year period ending in 1967."

"That would cut his average salary down to about \$70,000 and maybe knock \$5,000 off his taxes. That would leave him with \$60,000."

The program, first of its kind to be held, is jointly sponsored by the Greater Cleveland Chapter of the United World Federalists and the Political Science Club of John Carroll University. Conference chairman is Gary Klesch, JCU student and student chairman of the UWF.

Theme of the Conference is "The Challenge of the Expanding World Community." Keynote speaker will be Mrs. Marion McVitty of New York who has been an accredited non-governmental representative and observer at the United Nations, serving unpaid, throughout its existence. She will address the conference at 8:30 p.m. Friday, Feb. 17.

The morning seminar on Saturday will be conducted by Father G. G. Grant, S.J., associate Professor in Philosophy at Loyola University. Father Grant has been an American delegate to the Congress of the World Association at Vienna in 1961 and Tokyo in 1963. His talk will be followed by workshops and discussions.

Professor Covey Oliver, former U.S. Ambassador to Bolivia will speak in the early afternoon.

A feature at 4:15 p.m. will be a debate on the question, Resolved: That the international community can guarantee civil rights. Ohio State University participants will take the affirmative with students from Kent State, the negative will be presented by students from Bowling Green State University and Oberlin College.

A reception and banquet Saturday evening, February 18 will conclude the formal program. Speaker of the evening will be the Hon. Zenon Rossides, Ambassador to the U.S. from Cyprus and Permanent Representative to the United Nations. He will discuss "The United Nations: The Problems Facing Us." Arnold Zander, national president of the United World Federalists will introduce the Ambassador.

In addition to general sessions, panel discussions and workshops, the program will include a performance of Sartre's "The Respectful Prostitute," a play dealing with civil rights, and, as the concluding event, a dance for student delegates.

Colleges taking part in the program in addition to John Carroll are Western Reserve, Ursuline, Baldwin-Wallace, Cleveland State, Ohio University (Athens), Notre Dame College, Case, Ohio State, Kent and Bowling Green State Universities, Oberlin and Lake Erie Women's College.

Registration will open at 5:00 p.m., Friday, February 17 in the Sheraton-Cleveland. Fee for students is \$4.50 which includes the banquet Saturday evening. Banquet tickets are also available to the general public at \$4.50.



## Sandwiches Make A Meal



Either an American Heroine (top) or a Monte Christo make a hearty sandwich meal. An 8-inch "heroine" the Borden Kitchen way: Slice a hero roll lengthwise into three layers. Spread the bottom layer with lettuce leaves, three slices of American process pimento cheese and sliced tomatoes. Coat both sides of the middle layer with mayonnaise and place atop the tomatoes. Spread mustard on the underside of the top layer and complete the sandwich. Spear candied midget gherkins, cherry tomatoes and sandwich pickles on food picks and secure sandwich. Then try this one:

Monte Cristo Sandwich  
(Makes 2 sandwiches)

3 to 4 tablespoons new Danish margarine or butter, softened	4 slices (one-half 6-oz. pkg.) Borden's Natural Swiss Cheese
6 slices white sandwich bread	1 egg
2 slices cooked ham, about 1/8-inch thick	1/4 cup homogenized milk
4 to 6 slices cooked white chicken or turkey	2 tablespoons new Danish margarine or butter
	Aunt Jane's Sweet Gherkin Pickles

Spread butter or margarine evenly on one side of 1 bread slice. Top with 1 ham slice and one-half the chicken or turkey slices. Spread margarine evenly on both sides of second bread slice. Place over turkey layer. Top with 2 slices cheese. Spread third bread slice evenly with margarine on one side. Place over cheese. With a sharp knife, remove crust. Cut sandwich in half. Secure sandwich halves with wooden food picks. Repeat procedure for second sandwich. In a mixing bowl, combine egg and milk; beat together until well blended. Dip sandwich halves in egg mixture to coat. In a heavy skillet, melt 2 tablespoons margarine, or butter over medium heat. Brown sandwich halves evenly on both sides. Remove picks. Garnish with sweet gherkin pickle.

**THE NEED TO PUT OUR FINANCIAL HOUSE IN ORDER.** The most urgent decision that Congress faces at this session is how to pay the nation's bills and meet the country's financial responsibilities. It was just a year ago that the President broke the \$100 billion federal spending barrier for fiscal 1967 with an announced budget of \$112.8 billion. At the same time he predicted that the nation would run in the "red" by only \$1.8 billion. Now the President admits that total federal spending for the fiscal year which ends June 30, 1967 will hit the figure of \$123.7 billion, with a deficit of \$9.7 billion. This staggers the imagination of virtually every American citizen. But that isn't all! The President is now asking for \$135 billion to run the Federal government for fiscal 1967-68. Even if we accept this year's figure as valid and accurate, it represents an increase in Federal spending of \$58.5 billion a year, or 76 per cent, since the 1960 fiscal year, the last full year of the Eisenhower Administration, which was the last time the budget was balanced.

## Electric Power Today

Back in 1752, a distinguished founding father of America, Benjamin Franklin, experimented with electricity by flying a kite into the sky. Since then Americans and citizens of many other countries have been searching for better and better ways to harness electrical power in the service of man.

Electricity, like the air we breathe, is so fundamental to our daily routine that most of us tend to ignore it until something happens and we temporarily lose the use of it. Without it there would be no modern communications, no television, no radio and very few machines operating in home, office or factory.

To keep the system going, there are 3,600 separate power systems within the United States. They vary greatly in size, types of ownership and range of power supply functions. About 20 percent of them are publicly owned and coal is the major source of energy used to drive electrical generators, with natural gas, water power, and oil supplying most of the remainder.

In the last decade nuclear energy has been used to make steam, which in turn is used to produce electrical energy.

Despite the vast increase in use and variety of electrical power, the cost is going down. By December 1964, average costs had been reduced by more than three percent from a 1962 base. Final figures for 1966 are expected to show an additional two or three percent reduction.
