Zarja News
On October 30, on the stage of the S.N.D. on St. Clair in Cleveland, Singing Society Zarja will recreate an incident of old Slovene life with the operetta "Kovačev Student."

The sequence of the story must have occurred again and again in the lives of peoples in various circumstance — the wealthy, the middle class and the peasant, for it is a story of human endeavor and natural reaction in any status of life.

However, we are primarily concerned with the particular incident which took place in the lives of Kovac (Frank Kokal) and Meta (Aggie Polshak), a village blacksmith and his wife who had the ambition and a little money to send their only son, Janez (Tony Elersich) to a distant city university for an education. With this "ace" in hand, the parents hope to raise their social standing and to even live a life free of financial worry as a result of their investment in the son's education. But the unthinking youngster takes advantage of the situation and regularly writes his quota of "Dear Dad" letters, naturally requesting ready cash for his school expenses. Father Kovac, so illiterate he needs the letters interpreted by the village postman (Tony Perusek) is yet clever enough to sense possible deceit and decides to check on the sad tales of denial and want.

Kovac arrives in the university town in the early evening and heads for the neighborhood

of the school. In the immediate vicinity, he witnesses the carousing of four inebriated students portrayed by Frank Elersich, Andy Turkman, Albert Fatur and Tony Elersich, one, who is Janez, son of Kovac. The young braggart boasts of the ease with which he receives money from home for their drinking parties and wishes the penalty of acquiring a dull education were not so taxing on his brain and energy. The angry father realizes the futility of spending his hard earned money on the wastrel son and literally drags the bewildered boy back to the home village and determines the boy shall take up the honest if common blacksmith trade of the family. Janez must agree.

Time passes and the final scene of the incident shows Janez, under his father's supervision, content and happy, exercising his brawn hammering out horseshoes in tune to the songs of his carefree days at school. Interrupting the reminiscing, come three prosperous looking gentlemen who greet the laboring Janez in familiar tones and chide him for forgetting his old student friends, Kek, Krok, Zejko and Mucek. Yet after the acknowledgement of their past acquaintance, the four awkwardly try to recapture the familiarity of the days gone by and find that time and the difference in social standing has created a barrier that is difficult to overcome.

Wise old Kovac comes to the rescue by inviting them all to drink, be merry as in the old time and soon the warmth of the wine melts all their foolish inhibitions and good fellowship is restored among the quartet as they sing their pledge of eternal friendship no matter what the future may bring.
