### Gonja proti sovjetski vladi postaja absurdna

Posledice neprijazne politike bodo morali trpeti ameriški delavci

Washington, D. C. — (F. P.) — Člani nižje zbornice kongresa se bodo morda kaj naučili, kadar začnejo s preiskavo o "zaroti" sovjetske vlade, ki jo je razkril newyorški policijski komisar Whalen in o kateri se je vršilo tajno zaslišanje. Resolucija, katero je predložil kongresnik Hamilton Fish, je vsebovala besedilo, ki je bilo naperjeno proti sovjetski trgovski organizaciji Amtorg. Radi pritiska od gotove strani je Fish pozneje spremeni besedilo resolucije v toliko, da se preiskava ne bo vršila proti Amtorgu, temveč o aktivnostih komunističnih agitatorjev v Združenih državah.

Brezposelnost, ki se še vedno širi, dela preglavice administraciji in zato se boji podzvzeti drastičnih korakov proti Amtorgu, ker se boji, da bi taka akcija bila na škodo ameriški trgovini. Sovjetska unija se je zavzela za industrializacijo ogromne dežele in namerava izvršiti precejšen del tega dela v prihodnjih petih letih. Ameriška masna produkcija je uspešnejša kot so druge metode, zato je na povabilo sovjetske vlade odšlo na stotine industrijskih ekspertov v Rusijo, da pomagajo pri graditvi novih tovarov in industrijskih mest. Veliko število ruskih inženirjev je prišlo tudi v Združene države v svrhu proučavanja ameriških metod. Razni zvezni departamenti prejema poročila od svojih ljudi, da industrializacija v Sovjetski uniji hitro napreduje.

Ako bo kongres preiskoval trgovinsko poslovanje med Združenimi državami in sovjeti, bo ugotovil, da je bilo v prejšnjem letu izvoženega blaga iz Amerike v Rusijo v vsoti \$120,000,000. Ako bodo člani kongresa pokazali, da ne marajo te trgovine, bo potem prišla v roke britskih tovarnarjev, ki jo bodo sprejeli z odprtimi rokami, in brezposelnost, ki je že sedaj občutna v industrijskih državah kot so Pensylvanija, Ohio, Illinois in druge, se bo še povečala. Ta reč je bila tudi namignjena administraciji od strani Ameriške trgovske zbornice, ki ji načeljuje industrijski magnat iz Chicaga in Detroita. Ameriška trgovina je padla v prešlih šestih mesecih v vseh inozemskih državah razen v Rusiji. Bojazn pred sovjetsko vlado, ki jo kaže administracija v Washingtonu z uvedenjem persekucije radikalnih elementov v Ameriki, ki jih skuša potlačiti, bo rodila slabe posledice v trgovskih odnošjih med Združenimi državami in sovjeti in posledice bodo trpeli delavci.

Potres v Perziji se pomavlja  
Teheran, Perzija, 13. maja. — Potresni sunki v okolici Tabriza in v Salmasu se ponavljajo in število mrtvih je od zadnjega tedna naraslo na 3000. Večera se je v Salmasu tresla zemlja in obnem je razsajala silna nevihta, tako da je grmel v zraku in pod zemljo. To je povzročilo strašno paniko med ubogimi praznovernimi ljudmi.

Papež se jezi nad slikami  
Vatikan, 13. maja. — Papež Pij je večerjaval katoličane, da ne smejo posetiti razstave slik v Benetkah, ki je zdaj v teku. "Sveti oče" pravi, da so slike nemoralne in je škandal, da se take slike razstavijo v katoliški državi kot je Italija, ki ima pogodbo z Vatikanom.

Ruski otroci zaigrali vas  
Nižni Novgorod, U.S.S.R., 13. maja. — Otroci, ki so se igrali z užitnicami, so večerjaval znetil požar v vasi Satkaji. Zgorole je 170 hiš in mnogo skladišč ter drugih poslopj.

### Trgovci preganjajo organizatorje

Šestnajst organizatorjev vrženih v ječo, ker so agitirali za uničenje med farmakimi delavci

Los Angeles, Cal. — (F. P.) Trgovci in bogati farmerji v Imperial dolini so se odločili, da bodo držali delavske organizatorje v zaporu in v to svrhu jim je vsako sredstvo dobrodošlo. Šestnajst organizatorjev, obtoženih kršenja zakona proti kriminalnemu sindikalizmu, ker so skušali organizirati farmske delavce, se nahaja v zaporu. Za izpustitev iz zapora so zahtevali za vsakega organizatorja poročstvo \$15,000 in vsi poskušali obrambnega odbora, da se vsota zniža, niso prinesli nobenega rezultata.

Obrambni odbor je vložil apel pri distriktnem sodišču, da se zniža poročstvo, toda to ni do sedaj storilo še ničesar v tem oziru. Okrajni šerif Gillette je podal izjavo, da bo dal aretirati vsakega organizatorja, ki se bo pojavil med farmakimi delavci v Imperial dolini. Ta šerif je znan radi svoje brutalnosti in je bil že enkrat kaznovan, ker je napadel in vrge iz svoga urada odvetnika, ki je prišel k njemu, da dobi informacije o zaprtih organizatorjih.

V akcijo je sedaj stopila Unija za ameriške civilne svobodščine in se pridružila obrambi zaprtih organizatorjev.

Družina protoplakla dekle do smrti na "prošnjo duha"

Las Palmas, Kanarski otoki, 13. maja. — Oatudna tragedija kmečkega vyzarstva in praznovnosti, ki je zahtevala človeško žrtve, se je odigrala večerj v vasi Teide na otoku Teneriffu. Tam v hribih in revni bajti je živela družina z imenom Valido: oče, mati, tri hčere — in duh pokojnega sina Fernanda, ki je umrl pred enim letom. Družina je verjela, da je "duh" umrlega vsak dan z njimi. To vero so podedovali po svojih prednikih iz Španije, kjer je v srednjem veku cvetela povsod. To je vera primitivnega krščanstva in špiritizma.

Ker je "duh" živel z njimi, so se vedno pogovarjali z njim z raznimi magičnimi obredi. Pred kratkim se je "duh" prikazal nemu v družini v sanjah in ga prosil, naj se ena sestra žrtvuje zanj, ker on preveč trpi. Nato so tri sestre pokojnika žrebale med seboj in najmlajša, Colendaria po imenu, stara komaj 16 let, je potegnila žreb. Nato jo je oče privezal na posteljo in vseh pet jo je teplo z jermeni po nagem telesu. Strašno mučenje je trajalo šest ur. Medtem, ko je eden ali ena bicala dekleta, so ostali trije klečali v kotu in molili litanije. Tako so se vrtili, dokler ni deklica umrla pod udarci. Čez dva dni, ko se je raznesla vest o dogodku, je policija aretirala vso družino.

Prevažalec opeke zastavkani  
New York. — Stavbinski podjetnik bodo morali v kratkem času zadovoljiti zahtevam unijskih prevažalcev opeke, ki so zahtevali za višjo mezo, ako ne bodo imeli na glavi še drugih štrajkov. Ako se podjetniki ne bodo podali, bo kmalu zmanjkalo stavbinskega materiala, ker ga ne bo nihče prevažal.

Vozniki opeke zahtevajo devet dolarjev meze na dan, kar je en dolar več kot so prejimali doslej.

### Senat sprejel vse predloge proti brezposelnosti

Washington, D. C. — Senat je 12. t. m. sprejel tretji načrt newyorškega senatorja Wagnerja za olajšanje brezposelnosti. Načrt določa, da zvezna vlada odpre posredovalnice za delo v sporazumu z državnimi posredovalnicami. V ta namen se porabi letno štiri milijone dolarjev.

### 28 linčarjev aretiranih

Sherman, Tex. — Do torka zjutraj je bilo aretiranih 28 moških, ki so zadnji petek sodelovali pri linčarskih orgijah, ko je več tisoč glav broječa drhal razdejala sodnijsko poslopje v dinamit in z dimom zadušila zamorca, čigar truplo so potem vlekli po ulicah. Kasneje so linčarji požgali tri bloke zamorskih hiš.

### Čikaški planetarij odprt

Chicago. — Novi planetarij ali zvezdni muzej, edini v Ameriki, je bil odprt ob 12. maja. Ob sredah, sobotah in nedeljah je prost vstop, druge dni pa 25c. Kdor se zanima za zvezde in sploh gibanje nebesnih teles, naj obišče planetarij. Dobra šola za vsakega. Nahaja se v Grant parku ob jezeru.

### Samomor brezposelnih delavcev

Chicago. — Miss Evelyn Winograde, 833 N. Hoyle ave., stara 25 let, je 12. t. m. skočila skozi okno desetega nadstropja North American Buildings in obbležala mrtva na cementnem tlaku stranske ulice v downtownu. Bila je dolgo časa brez dela in brez sredstev za življenje. Več drugih sheboyganskih rojakov se udeležil izleta S. N. P. J. v Jugoslavijo. — Glorija Strmič, hričena sopraniška, priredi v nedeljo 2. maja koncert v tamonjem Hrvatskem narodnem domu.

### INDIJSKA VLADA VABI VSTAŠE NA KONFERENCO

Generalni štrajk v Bombaju in nove praske v Solapurju; nove aretacije

Simla, Indija, 13. maja. — Lord Irvin, viceraj Indije in glava indijske vlade, je večerj naznanil, da se doigo pričakovana konferenca s predstavniki indijskih ljudstev glede dominijonskega statusa Indije vrši v prihodnjem oktobru v Londonu. Predstavniki vseh strank so povabljeni na konferenco.

Bombaj, 13. maja. — Večera je bila razglašena generalna stavka v Bombaju in znak protesta proti aretaciji Abbasa Tjabbija, 80-letnega naslednika Gandhija v vodstvu kampanje pasivnega odpora. Večina trgovin je bila zaprtih.

Sinoči so izbruhnili novi izgredi v Solapurju, ki pa niso dolgo trajali. Pojačane vojaške čete so kmalu naredile mir in večje številno izgrednikov je bilo aretiranih. Angleški bojni aeroplani so večerj obiskali severni distrikt od meji Afganistana, 20 milj od Pošavarja, kjer se hribovski rodovi gibljejo v guerilski kampanji. Hribovci so se takoj umaknili, ko so zagledali letala v zraku.

### Zaščita političnih beguncev

Liberalci razpravljali o tem vprašanju na sestanku

New York. — (F. P.) — Kako zavarovati pravice političnih beguncev, ki iščejo pribežališče pred tiranskimi vladami v Združenih državah, je bilo vprašanje, o katerem so razpravljali na formalnem sestanku Arthur Garfield Hays, Forrest Bailey, A. J. Muste, Norman Thomas, Lillian Wald, H. R. Mussey in drugi poznani liberalci.

Na sestanku je bilo zaključeno, da se zainteresirani prominentne Amerikance v sodanje pomankljivosti imigracijskega zakona, ki zankuje tradicionalne pravice beguncev, ki iščejo zatočišče v Združenih državah. Imigracijski zakon, kakršen je, v veliko slučajih forsira vlado, da kooperira z maščevalnimi naklepi fašističnih diktator, ki preganjajo svoje državljane, ki so nasprotniki diktature, kadar se zahteje pod okrilje druge vlade. Vsi tisti, ki so zainteresirani v pravice političnih beguncev, je bilo sklenjeno na konferenci, bi formalni narodni komitej, čigar glavna naloga bi bila delati na to, da se imigracijski zakon amandira.

Mnenje grupe, ki se je zbrala na sestanku, je bilo, da bi bilo neumestno, ako bi se amandiralo zakon glede vstopa begunca v to deželo, temveč naj bi se amandirale regulacije naselilnega zakona o deportaciji tistih, ki so prišli nezakonitim potom v Združene države tako, da bi varovala politične pribežnike, ki sploh ne morejo dobiti potnega lista od vlade dotične države, iz katere pobegnejo.

### Nove smernice v politiki

Williams napoveduje, da bo morala Ameriška delavska federacija spremeniti svojo taktiko glede političnih vprašanj

New York. — (F. P.) — Izvolitev kandidatov tretje politične stranke in spremenitev američne, katere zastopa Ameriška delavska federacija, vse to bodo posledice splošne nezadovoljnosti s sedanjim republikanskim režimom, izjavlja Howard Y. Williams, tajnik Lige za neodvisno politično akcijo, ki se je baš te dni vrnil s svoje ture po zapadu.

"Velika kriza brezposelnosti, industrijska depresija in nezadovoljnost med farmerji radi nezadostne pomoči od strani zveznega farmskega odpočnega odbora, carinski škandal, izjavljenje londonske mornarične konference, je pripravilo delavce in farmerje na odprto revoluto", pravi Williams v svojem poročilu.

"Centralne delavske unije v vseh ameriških mestih so skrajno nezadovoljne a sedanjo politiko, ki jo vodi Ameriška delavska federacija", je nadaljeval Williams. V mnogih ameriških industrijskih mestih, kjer je unijsko gibanje močno, so delavske unije organizirale svoje politične stranke, da si tako zagotovijo zadostno protekcijo za svoje članstvo, kateremu grozi brezposelnost, "yellow dog" pogodbe in nezadostna zaščita na stare dni. Vse to so znamenja, ki kažejo, da bo morala Ameriška delavska federacija spremeniti svojo politično taktiko, ako ne boje njeni voditelji doživeti poraza.

Williams je dalje napovedal zmago Floyd Olsonu kot kandidata farmer-laboritor za gubernerja države Minnesota, treh kandidatov te stranke, ki kandidirajo v nižjo zbornico kongresa. Prilika je dobra za izvolitev socialističnega kongresnika v Milwaukeeju, Readingu in New Yorku ter v nekaterih tekstilnih mestih vzhodnih držav.

### Kapitalistični sistem ni perfecten

New York. — Vsi vitalni odloki, ki se tičejo tekstilne industrije, prihajajo od ljudi, ki kontrolirajo banke in druge finančne institucije, izjavlja M. D. Crawford, ekonomski ekspert pri listu "Daily News Record", glasilo tekstilne industrije. Problem, pred katerim stoji tekstilna industrija radi nadprodukcije, ne more biti rešen s taktiko, ki jo vodijo tekstilni tovarnarji, pravi Crawford. Še nikdar prej v zgodovini ni produkcija bogastva grozila človeštvu z bankrotom iz vzroka, ker je vsega preveč. To je rezultat sedanjega sistema produkcije in distribucije in o takem sistemu, ki povzroča take razmere, se ne more reči, da je perfecten.

### Mlada letalka leti v Avstralijo

London, 13. maja. — Amy Johnson, 23-letna letalka, se je podala sama samcata na polet v Avstralijo v svojem malem aeroplanu. Doslej je srečno dosegla do Ranguna v Indiji. Polet mora biti izvršen v 15 dneh, če hoče letalka doseči rekord.

### POLITIČNA MOČ AMERIŠKEGA DELAVSTVA

Bitka glede Parkerja v senatu je pokazala, da imajo zamorec več vpliva v politiki kot delavske unije

Washington, D. C. — Opozicija proti potrditvi Parkerja članom zveznega vrhovnega sodišča je prišla v glavnem od dveh strani: Organizirano delavstvo, ki mu je nasprotovalo iz vzroka, ker je odobril "yellow dog" pogodbo premogovne družbe v West Virginiji, in zamorec, ki so mu nasprotovali radi njegovega stališča o volilni pravilčnosti. Herbert R. Mengert, politični poročevalec pri listu "Cincinnati Enquirer", piše, da ako bi se vprašanje glede potrditve Parkerja tikalo samo protestov od strani delavskih organizacij, bi se senator McCulloch iz države Ohio sploh ne osiral na nj.

Predloga, da se razveljavi zakon o "yellow dog" kontraktu je bila dvakrat poražena v državni legislaturi, pravi Mengert. Toda niti en član legislature, ki je glasoval proti predlogi, ni bil poražen pri volitvah. Delavske unije so vpile in protestirale, in to je bilo vse.

Toda opozicija zamorcev je delala senatorju McCullochu precej skrbj. "Zamorski volilci v državi Ohio niso bili še nikdar tako neodvisni kot so sedaj", pravi Mengert. "Zamorec so še večkrat pokazali, da lahko slomijo politične okove, v katerih so bili držani."

Res inenten komentar o politični zavesti in moči organiziranega delavstva v industrijski državi kot je Ohio.

Sambo, nekdanji suženj, ki ga je republikanska stranka vodila na nos od časa državljanske vojne, ima več političnega vpliva kot organizirano delavstvo potem, ko že stideset let ponavlja fraze o nagraditvi prijateljev in kaznovanju sovražnikov.

### Petdnevnik za lesno delavce

Vzrok je nadprodukcija. Brezposelnost tare tudi gospodarje

Settle, Wash. — (F. P.) — West Coast Lumbermen asociacija je ukinila pomodno delo na parnih žagah in delavci so pričeli v prvih majem delati le pet dni v tednu. Poročilo asociacije kaže, da je moralo stideset parnih žag prenehati s delom radi nadprodukcije lesnih izdelkov, ki jih podjetniki ne morejo spraviti na trg. Cena lesu je padla skoro za polovico v zadnjih dveh mesecih.

Prenapojen trg je udaril tudi gozdarske delavce. Delo v šumih počiva in več sto delavcev je radi tega izgubilo delo. Brezposelnost obeta biti še večja, kajti lesne družbe so že naznanile, da bodo ustavile vse delo v gozdovih najmanj za tri mesece.

Atentatorji na "Popolo di Trieste" v Trstu — Slovenci

Mnogo aretacij. — Izredni tribunal pride v Trst, kjer bo sodili atentatorje. — Štirje aretiranci baje že priznali

Ljubljana, 28. aprila 1930.

Bilo je 10. februarja, ko je v poslopu fašističnega lista "Popolo di Trieste" v Trstu eksplozivna bomba ter porušila del poslopa ter težko ranila enega uradnikov Nerrija, ki je poškodbam kmalu v bolnici podlegel. Ta atentat je razburil vso italijansko javnost, Mussolini je razpisal stotisoč lir za nagrado onemu, ki izsledí atentatorje, vlada je Nerrijevi vdovi nakazala veliko podporo, časopisi pa so kričali ter hujevali proti atentatorjem, ki naj bi bili ali fašistični disidenti ali komunisti oz. socialisti ali pa Slovenci-nacionalisti. Vrh šile so se preiskave, zasliševanja, mnogo so jih pozaprlji, a spet izpustili, ker so dokazali nedolžnost, in vse je kazalo, da bo stvar ostala nepojasnjena. Umolknil so in skoroda se je že popolnoma pozabilo atentat.

Pred dvema dnevoema pa so italijanske oblasti razširile preko časopisja vest, da so krivec izsledeni, zaprti ter da so povečini vse že priznali. Atentatorji so bili Slovenci.

Italijanski tisk poroča, da so bili atentatorji Zvonimir Milost, Ferdinand Bidovec, Franjo Marušič in Vekoslav Valenčič. Prva dva smatrajo za prava izvršitelja atentata, slednja dva pa da sta pomagala pri pripravah. Zvonimir Milost je jugoslovanski državljan s Sušaka, ostali trije pa so italijanski državljani. Ta trojica je obdožena tudi atentata na "svetlinik zmage", ki stoji na temeljih stare avstrijske utrdbe forta Kresida. Tem trem pripisujejo še eno dejanje: poskus požiga italijanske šole na Katinari.

Dalje so aretirali še eno skupino, ki da je zakrivila požig italijanskih šol na Proseku in Zgoniku. Požig šole na Proseku so izvršili baje Vladimir Štoka, Anton Ukmar, Vekoslav Španger in Dragotin Rupelj, v Zgoniku pa Ivan Obad v družbi Špangerja, Štoka in Rupelja.

Službeno poročilo pravi, da so vsi razen Valenčiča priznali svojo krivdvo. Aretirani so in se nahajajo v koprskih zaporih ti-le mladinci.

Povečini so forej aretiranci stari krog 24 let.

V zaporu so menda že od atentata, ko je policija zaprla nekaj sto Slovencev ter italijanskih socialistov, misleč, da so atentatorji vsi kakor iz teh vrst. Med preiskavo dozdaj so ugotovili, da sta se Milost ter Bidovec spizlala v poslopie "Popolo di Trieste" ter tamkaj položila bombo ter se spet odplazila, ne da bi ju bil kdo opazil. Bombo sta baje prinesla dva dni pred atentatom v kovčegu iz Knežaka Marušič in Valenčič, ter sta jo skrila začasno v neki banki.

Pred dvema letoma je na Proseku zgorel Rekratorij Lega nazionale. Poslopie je bilo popolnoma uničeno in je škoda znašala 100.000 lir. Po dveh letih trdijo zdaj, da so to storili Štoka, Ukmar, Rupelj in Španger.

Fašistično časopisje bruha zdaj ogenj na Slovence ter podčrtava zlasti dejstvo, da je eden atentatorjev jugoslovanski državljan, ter poziva izredno sodišče, naj strogo sodi ne le po samezna dejanja, marveč cel sistem propagande, ki gre za tem, da se tujerodec ne bi sprizajnil z italijansko narodno mislijo. Ital. vlada je prepovedala vse slovenske organizacije, iz teh pa so nastale tajne teroristične skupine, ki vršijo atentate.

Izredni tribunal, ki bo sodil te atentatorje po zakonu o zaščiti države in fašističnega režima, bo sestavljen tako kot pri smrtni obsodbi Gortana. Predsedoval mu bo general Christini. Tribunal je prišel v Trst ter se bo razprava proti obtožencem vršila že ta teden. Tako vsaj napovedujejo.
