PLEMENSKO SO- VRAŠTVO SKOPI- JE DELAVCEM

Industrijski magnati želijo dobiček radi tekme med belopoltnimi in zamorskimi delavci

New York. — (F. P.) Ko se je 422 stavbinskih delavcev v mestu New Yorku pridružil grupi tristo zamorskih delavcev, ki so izstopili iz krajevne unije, ki jih je diskriminirala in so ustanovili novo unijo, v katero so imeli dostop belopoltni in zamorski delavci, je bil s tem storjen korak, ki nudi edino praktično rešitvijo plemenskega vprašanja, ki dela toliko preglavic v vrstah organiziranega delavstva.

Dr. Will W. Alexander iz Atlante, Ga., ustanovitelj komisije za medplemensko kooperacijo, je dejal, da ima plemensko sovrastvo svoj izvor v kompetitivni med belopoltnimi in zamorskimi delavci. Belopoltni delavci v svojem zamorskem tovarišu samo tekmeča in sovražnika, ki ga izpodriva iz delavnice in zavzema njegovo mesto. Delavske unije se niso nikdar zavezale, da bi organizirale zamorske delavce in potem se čudijo, ako so zamorski delavci pripravljeno delati za nižje mezdje kot belopoltni, ne upoštevajo pa dejstva, da so sami največ krivi za obstoječe razmere, ker ne priznajo zamorskega delavca sebi enakopravnega.

Sovražen sentiment proti zamorcem je posebno izrazil v južnih državah. Pred kratkim so belopoltni organizirali dve organizaciji v Atlanti, Ga. Imenovali se Asociacija ameriških delavstev in Belopoltni križarji. Prvi nameruje biti "wizard" klanske organizacije William Joseph Simmons, drugi pa H. J. Gewiner, ki pravi, da šteje njegova organizacija že nad dvajset tisoč članov. Namen obeh organizacij je vzdrževanje nadvlade belopoltnih nad zamorci, pomoč svojim članom pri iskanju dela in obramba konstitucije. Kako organizaciji tolmáča obrambo konstitucije, je razvidno iz napada na zamorske delavce, ki so delali na železniški progi v Lounou, Ark., ko jim je belopoltna družba zažgala šotorišče in jih izgnala iz mesta.

Unijaki delavci bi se lahko spomnili, kako so belopoltni delodajalci "protektirali" zamorske delavce, ko je bilo treba razbiti veliko stavko klavniških in jeklarskih delavcev l. 1919. Importirali so zamorske delavce, ker so jih rabili za stavkolomce. Če bi bili zamorski delavci organizirani, bi bilo to nemogoče, ker pa zamorci nimajo dostopa v unije, ki jih kontrolirajo belopoltni delavci, je bila stavka zlomljena. To dokazuje, da delodajalci ne dajo nič na superiornost belopoltnih delavcev, kadar rabijo zamorce, da jim pomagajo pri uničevanju delavskih organizacij. Proffit je glavno drugo je delodajalcem postopranska stvar. Delavski voditelji, ki zabranjujejo dostop zamorcem v njihove unije, bodo morali prej ali slej izpoznati, da plemensko sovraštvu škoduje je delavskemu gibanju, ne pa delodajalcem.

Druga vest se glasi, da je papeški tajnik kardinal Pacelli, odšel na počitnice v Svico, kjer bo konferiral s voditelji nemških političnih strank.

Kandidata za kongresnika sta James P. Sheehan in William F. Quick v distriktih, ki ju sedaj zastopata reakcionarna pristaša stare garde Stafford in Schafer. Poleg tega voditelj socialistične stranke upoča, da bo okraj Milwaukee poslal več njihovih kandidatov v državno legislaturo.

Chicago. — American State banka v East Chicagu je zadnje dni zapira vrata in njen predsednik, Hazel G. Groves, ki je ob enem okrajni blagajnik v Lake Okraju, je izginil neznan kam. Dejavní nadzorniki zdaj pregledujejo knjige in račune banka in okrajnega finančnega urada. Groves je bil dolgo let vodja republikanske politike v East Chicagu, Ind.

Washington, D. C. — Letošnji pridelavek krompirja v Združenih državah je devet odstotkov manjši kot je bil lani, poročajo pojedilski department. Računa se na 300 milijonov bušijev ali 2.76 milijona prebivalca. Lani je bilo približno štiri bušije na osebo.

Konvencija rudarskega distrikta

Vprašanje zavarovanja soper brezposelnosti tvorilo predmet razprav. Val uradniki pomnožno izvoljeni

Hazleton, Pa. — (F. P.) — Thomas Kennedy, tajnik stara rudarske unije, je na konvenciji odmeza distrikta rudarske unije urgiral zavarovanje soper brezposelnosti in starostno pokojnino kot edino zdravilo proti postopanju delodajalcev, ki odpuščajo delavce, ki so izgubili vse svoje sile v industrijah. Vprašanje brezposelnosti, je dejal Kennedy, postaja čedalje važnejše v politiki in organizirani delavci bodo morali napeti vse svoje moči, da prisilijo člano državnih zbornice na sprejetje delavskih zakonov.

Tajnik distrikta John Youdrishin je poročal, da se poškode med rudarji čedalje bolj množijo in da je bilo v prošlem letu izplačanih skoro milijon dolarjev odškodnine poškodovanim rudarjem. Odškodninski zakon v Pennsylvaniaji je pomankljiv in Youdrishin je priporočal, da bi vsak član plačal \$1 izrednega assessmenta letno v posebni sklad, iz katerega bi se črpala sredstva za boj za izboljšanje odškodninskega zakona.

Delegatje so ponovno izvolili vse uradnike distrikta. Predsednik distrikta je Michael Hartnedy, prvi podpredsednik pa Hugh Brown.

Hooverjev sin je jetičen

Washington, D. C. — Dr. Joel T. Boops, zdravnik v Bell Hill, je poročal 22. t. m., da je Herbert Hoover mlajši, predsednikov sin, bolan na pljučni tuberkulozi.

Profesor pobija staro teorijo

V svojem govoru je pokazal na hibe sedanjega družabnega reda

Minneapolis, Minn. — (F. P.) — Stara teorija, ki se večkrat poudarja v Ameriki, da se kompetentni in sposobni ljudje brez posebnih težav povzpnejo do vrhunca in dosežejo uspehe v življenju, je bila krepko broč od dr. John La Lappa, načelnika departmanta socialnih znanosti na Marquette univerzi, ki je govoril na konvenciji javnih delavcev, ki se je vršila v tem mestu.

"Obstojeli družabni sistem ne daje nobene garancije sposobnim ljudem, da bi prišli na važna mesta v političnem in javnem življenju," je dejal Lapp. "Vprašanje sposobnosti ne igra glavne vloge, temveč v večina slučajih sile, sreča in denar, ki služi kot tovarna, da nekateri pripežajo na politična mesta v javnem življenju. Ekonomski negotovost je največje zlo v Ameriki, ker onemogoča brezposelnost, in najboljše zdravilo proti temu bi bilo zavarovanje soper brezposelnosti. Drug velik problem so vsilivi stroški zdravniške oskrbe. Val kot polovica ameriških delavcev ima zadostne protibole in v slučaju bolnosti v njihovi družinah, Amerika je edina velika industrijska država na svetu, ki ne nudi delavcu nobene pomoči, kadar se postavlja in ni več sposoben za delo v industrijah."

Lapp je nadalje omenil veliko brezbratstvo med ameriškega delavstva, kar ne pusti dovolj prostora za razvoj produktivnosti, ki so edina garancija za izboljšanje višjih mezd in za izboljšanje njihovega ekonomskega položaja.

Domaj drošč

Is Kanado, Wis.: Mihael Pleš, dobro znan in eden izmed prvih slovenskih naselencev v tem kraju, je izvršil samomor 21. t. m. Star je bil 87 let. Vzrok: bolezen in starost. Enostavno se je navlečil žolčenja.

Is Milwaukeeja: John Ermenc, slovenski kandidat, je bil pri primarnih volitvah zadnji teden nominiran za kandidata v poslansko zbornico na socialistični listi. Dobil je 511 glasov v dveh vardi. Njegova protikandidata sta republikanec Jensen in demokrat Prabhakani.

Is Clevelanda: Pred par dnevis pokopali rojaka Franka Cesarja, star 20 let, ki je bil ubit v kolistju s motornim kolesom. Imel je vojaški pogreb, ker je apadal k državnim milicij. Farmer Hugo Eisner, ki je povzročil Cesarjevo smrt, je izvršil samomor s strelkom v jezero.

Is Clevelanda: Umri je Pavel Mohorčič, star 62 let, samec in doma iz Hrvače na Notranjskem, kjer zapušta enega brata. Tu je bival 26 let. — Zedno nedeljo pokopane je imel G. Banovec svoj zadnji koncert v Clevelandu, ki je bil dobro obiskan.

Is Chicaga: Jugoslovanski protestni shod proti fašističnim umorom v Trstu je imel okrog 700 prisilencev, večinoma dalmatinskih Hrvatov in Slovencev iz Prekmurja in od cerkve. Bila je dolga vrsta govornikov, toda samec eden je govoril, pravzaprav djal svoj govor, angleško. Edini govornik, ki je govoril s delavskega stališa in obsodil fašizem v splošnem, je bil br. Vincent Cankar, predsednik SNPJ.

Dva sovjetska vojaška poveljnika ustreljena

Varšava, 23. sept. — Tu poročajo, da so sovjeti zadnje dni obsodili na smrt in ustrelili dva poveljnika rdečih čet v Minsku. Eden je bil Hijač, vodja pošpolka, drugi pa Sokolov, vodja letalske eskadre. Oba sta bila spoznana krivim veleladja.

Peiping, 23. sept. — Mandžurski diktator je naredil "mir" — Stara teorija, ki se večkrat poudarja v Ameriki, da se kompetentni in sposobni ljudje brez posebnih težav povzpnejo do vrhunca in dosežejo uspehe v življenju, je bila krepko broč od dr. John La Lappa, načelnika departmanta socialnih znanosti na Marquette univerzi, ki je govoril na konvenciji javnih delavcev, ki se je vršila v tem mestu.

Nekateri krogi so v skrbeh, da bo Čang zahteval prevladno ceno za svojo uspešno intervencijo, morda kontrolo nad Nankingom. Medtem pa poročajo, da je Čang Kailak, predsednik nacionalistične vlade, ponudil Čangu provincio Čihli, vključilval Peiping in Tientain, ter deset milijonov dolarjev, ako mu pomaga pobiti rebele.

Sovjetska pšenica raz- burja Ameriko in Evropo

Zahteve ameriških reakcionarjev po "drastični akciji". V Zensvi se je, kar je bila napočila vse evropske trge s pšenico

Chicago. — Voditelji škalske borse so v pondeljki zablili s pripravo glede sovjetskih štinskih spekulacij v Ameriki in Evropi. Zensvi se je, kar je bila napočila vse evropske trge s pšenico. Voditelji so zaključili prvo sejo s obveljnostjo, da se niso prejeli vseh informacij od Hydeja, pa morajo počakati.

Medtem je prišel kup vesti iz Evrope, da so sovjeti zadržali evropske trge pšenice in prisilili dežele zahtevajo v Zensvi, da Liga narodov začne koncentrirano akcijo proti Rusiji.

Alexander Legge, predsednik zveznega farmarskega odbora, se strinja s poljedelskim tajnikom, da je sovjetsko delo škodljivo na ameriške farmarje. Drugi javni funkcionarji so manj razburjeni in pravijo, da Rusi delajo le to kar delajo ameriški spekulanti in spekuliranje na borsah je zakonito. Senator Capper iz Kansasa zahteva, da vlada prepove vse spekulacije s pšenico in s spre štine borse.

Zenska, 23. sept. — Agrarne dežele v vzhodni Evropi so zagale obupen krik proti "dumpanju" ruske pšenice na trga. Rumunski trgovinski minister in delegat na skupščini Lige narodov Virgile Madgearu je večerjal zahteval, da se Evropa zavaruje s sidom "prednostne carine" proti Sovjetski uniji, Ameriki in Argentini, ker to je stvar življenja ali smrti za kmeta v Rumuniji, Ogrski, Jugoslaviji in drugih poljedelskih deželah Evrope. Madgearu je pladiral, naj Liga narodov reši agrarno Evropo pred izvozom iz Rusije, Amerike in Argentine.

Ob enem je prišla vest iz Londona, da je angleški trg pšenice padel pod težo ruske pšenice, ki jo sovjeti "dumpajo" po nizki ceni. Sovjetska vlada je majše drugo floto 28 angleških ladij za izvažanje pšenice po vsem svetu. Italija je poplavljena s rusko pšenico.

Sovjeti prodajo kitajsko prego Amerikanom?

Tokio, 23. sept. — Tu se je raznesla vest, da se grupa ameriških kapitalistov pogaja s sovjeti za nakup ruskega dela kitajske vzhodne železnice v severni Mandžuriji. Vest je povzročila veliko paniko v japonskih vladnih in bizijskih krogih.

Številne brezposel- nih v Illinoisu raslo

Zaposelnost v mesecu avgustu se je zmanjšala za 14% v primeri s prejšnjim letom

Springfield, Ill. — (F. P.) — Medtem, ko so delegatje državne delavske federacije na svoji konvenciji v Springfieldu debatirali o kompletnem vprašanju brezposelnosti, ki je nastala v času Hooverjeve biznijske administracije, je državni delavski department objavil številke o zaposelnosti v državi Illinois v mesecu avgustu. Številke prikazujejo, da je bilo število delavcev, ki so bili brezposelni, v avgustu 1930 za 14% več kot v istem času leta 1929. V tem mesecu je bilo manj povpraševanja po delavcih kot v juliju in število brezposelnih se je vsililo, mesto snikalo, kot so nekateri pričakovali.

Na konvenciji delavske federacije so se glasilce ostre besede proti kapitalističnemu sistemu in to od ljudi, ki so na prošlih konvencijah grmali proti socializmu in radikalizmu v delavskih unijah in so bili pripravljani na političev vsakega radikalnega gibanja med delavci.

Nasodovanje strokovnih delavskih organizacij je bilo rangaljeno, ko je bilo podano finančno poročilo, ki izkazuje, da ima federacija v blagajni samo \$20,767, več tisoč dolarjev manj kot v prejšnjem letu.

DEPRESIJA PO- VEROČA BOLEZNI

V tem se strinjajo državne in privaatne zdravniške avtoritete

New York. — (FP) — Odkar je v tuku industrijska depresija in brezposelnost, prihaja vedno večje število bolnikov, ki trpe na mentalnih in drugih boleznih v newyorški bolnišnici, je dejal zdravstveni komisar dr. J. G. W. Greoff. Vzrok porastu bolezni je po mnenju Greoffa brezposelnost in depresija, ki gonita ljudi v obup, da postanejo bolni duševno in fizično.

V psihiatrskem oddelku v bolnici Bellevue se je število bolnikov zvišalo za 2,508 v prvi polovici tekočega leta v primeri s isto dobo prejšnjega leta. Val bolniški oddelki so prenapolnjeni, posebno oni, kjer se nahajajo pacienti, ki bolehalo za prolektarso boleznijo susico. Tako izjavlja dr. K. Martin, direktor Bellevue bolnišnice.

Slično poročilo je izdal državni zdravstveni department, ki pravi, da se smrtni slučaj poveljali za 8% v državi New York, odkar traja industrijska depresija. Zmanjšalo se je tudi število rojstev, dočim so smrtni slučajji med dojenčki narastli.

PRIGANJAŠTVO POŠTNIH U- SLUŽBENCEV

Položaj uslužbencev je pod sedanjim režimom slabši kot je bil pod Burlesonom

Washington, D. C. — (F. P.) — R. W. Hanson, nadzornik poštne departmanta v Baltimoru, je objavil v glasilu federacije poštne klerkov, članek, v katerem kritizira idijotski sistem distribucije poštne pošiljatev, ki ga je uvedel generalni poštar Brown. Generalni poštar je pričel smanjševati število poštne uslužbencev s namenom, da pokaže ekonomijo in varčevanje v poštne departmanta. Pri tem nasprotuje vsakemu izboljšanju razmer uslužbencev in se sklicuje, da ima na razpolago na tisoče prostov, ki bi s veseljem sprejeli mesde in bi bili zadovoljni a položajem kakršen je. Hanson izjavlja, da so bile razmere celo pod reakcionarnem Burlesonom ugodnejše kot so sedaj.

"Dnevno dobimo na tisoče pritožb radi netočnega dostavljanja pošte," pravi Hanson, "ker nimamo radi Brownove odredbe zadržati moči na razpolago za uspešno poslovanje. Na stotine klerkov je prišlo/ostih delati česturno delo, za katero pa ne prejmejo nobene plahe, ker morajo proučevati novi sistem po končanem rednem delu."

Glasilo federacije poštne klerkov sugestira predsedniku Hooverju, ki je predložil in izjavil naj postane, da se delavci ur v svrhu boljšega poslovanja v poštini državi. Dodim James J. Davis, tajnik zveznega delavskega departmanta, večkrat naglašajo potrebo visokih mezd za vladna uslužbence, je Brown nasprotnega mnenja in oboja stala člana Hooverjevega kabineta.

Novo revolucio se ku- halje v Južni Ameriki

V Chileju, Urugvaj in Ekvadorju se nahajajo

Santiago, Chile, 23. sept. — Vlada naznanja, da je pravčasno zadušila pokus revolucio v Concepcionu, mestu v južnem delu republike in 400 milj od tu. Pet vojaških voditeljev in dva ameriška letalca je bilo aretiranih.

Buenos Aires, 23. sept. — Is Montevideja poročajo, da je vojni minister, general Manuel Oribe, resigniral v znak simpatij s rebelnimi elementi in urugvajski armadi. Armada je prešla s rebelnim gibanjem.

Quito, Ekvador, 23. sept. — Predsednik ekvadorske republike, Ayora, je sinoli tajni, da je dežela s zvernostjo revolucije. Rekal je, da govornici o vstaji razširjajo komunisti, ki bi radi naredili smeljnjeva v Colegio Nacional so zaslužili dijaki, ki zdaj dnevno privražajo politične demonstracije proti vladi.

Koliko svobode so imeli izletniki SNPJ v Jugoslaviji? Samo v par slučajih so bili nadlegovani od policije. Doljarji so izvalili mnogo koncesij.

V Jugoslaviji je že poldrugo leto diktatura, ki je drastično omejila svobodo govora, zborovanja in tiska. Pravzaprav ni bilo tam nikoli te svobode. Cenzura je bila vedno kakor prej v Avstriji in pod diktaturo je še povečana in poostrena. Za vsak zborovanje in javen govor je treba dovoljenja od policije — iz od raspoloženja lokalne policije je odvisno, kako daleč sega dovoljenje. V tem oziru je ljubljanska policija še najbolj raspoložena in popustljiva, velik manj pa je zagrebška in belgradska.

Izletniki SNPJ nismo šli v Jugoslavijo, da bi tam odprto agitirali ali demonstrirali, toda jezikov si tudi nismo pustili zavazati, če je prišla prilika, da kdr kaj reče kar morda ni ugajal vladajočim silam. Marsikater izletnik je na glas povedal svoje mnenje — in nekateri sem že omenil s imenom — če mi ni bilo kaj prav, pa ga ni nihče motil. Zdi se, da je višja oblast nalašč zadržala oči in ušesa ter pustila izletnike, naj se vedejo "po ameriško" in se svobodno izražajo kolikor hočejo.

To je bilo najbolj očitno na ameriški dan v Ljubljani, ko je bila izletnikom in gostom dovoljena velika veselica na prostem v parku Tivoli in zvečer banket s obširnimi govorniki in programom. Dekreti zahtevajo, da se vsaj govori takih prilikah prej predlože spisani policiji, toda na našem banketu ni tega storila niti polovica govornikov. V govorih je padlo precej ostrih besed, ki bi bile gotovo izvalje naplembo časopisja, če bi bile objavljene, toda policijski komisar, ki je sedel pri mizi, je vse preslišal. Naravno so začeli Amerikanci — zato so se še domaće okorajžili in izrekli nekaj zelo pikrih in vse je bilo dobro.

Novi odmevi tržaške tragedije

Ljubljana, 11. sept. 1930.

Skoroda ves evropski tisk se vedno piše s protesti o tržaški justifikaciji. Italijo že nekoliko skrbi vse to, posebno pa ne ugaja Italiji dejstvo, da je celo več velikih angleških listov pisalo nezadovoljno o tej zadevi. "Manchester Guardian" je s ostrimi besedami obsodil justifikacijo 4 Slovencev v Trstu. Fašistično Italijo so zadeli očitki tega časopisa v živo. Časopis pravi, da naglica obsodbe in justifikacije nima le vzroka, da napravi vti v Jugoslaviji in da izvaja, marveč je to gotovo tudi znak težkega notranjega položaja Italije. Angleški list, glasilo Lloyd Georgea, pravi dalje dobesedno: "Obsojenci pripadajo tisti kategoriji teroristov, ki so vedno uživali simpatijo liberalnega javnega mnenja, in katerih somišljeniki so položili temelj svobodi in neodvisnosti Italije. Petičje in protesti so se poslali v Ženevo drug za drugim v upanju, da bo Društvo narodov rešilo življenja ubojencev; toda to upanje je bilo zaman. Naglica obsodbe in usmrtiltve je zanesla v obrat tistina, ki ljubijo stvar svoboda." In dalje spet: "Za obsojence fašizem ni samo pomenil izgube velike svobode, ki so vsakemu Slovaku drage, ampak tudi sistematično razmerovanje in tlačanje narodnjakov, zoper katerega žal ni drugega orodja, kakor ono, ki se si ga v vsakem položaju posluževati Italijani sami, namreč: veledajalca. Oni so ravnali proti fašizmu tako, kakor je svoj čas ravnala Italija proti Avstriji. In fašizem se je obnašal proti obsojencem, kakor se je Avstrija obnašala svoj čas do Italijanov. Za tistega, ki pozna zgodovino, je jasno, da imamo v slučajni v Bazovici pred seboj uprav klasičen primer takine justice, ki ima svoje nesoglasne posledice."

Tudi "Central News" protestirajo proti načinu obsodbe in usmrtiltve in proti načinu, kako so v dveh dneh pregledali ves material, ki bremeni obtožence. Nezadovoljno je, da so že 8 ur po razsodbi izvršili justifikacijo.

They are imbued with the modern tendency of all youth to plumb the unknown, test the untried, and attempt the accomplishment of what older counsel has warned can not be done.

The forms, manners, customs and general attitude toward one another of but two decades ago are gone—dormant as we may. And the Slovene National Benefit Society has recognized this fact and has readjusted herself to this newer way of procedure, five years ago, by inaugurating a New Youth Movement in establishing the subordinate English Speaking Lodges, and through them has given our progressive young people a chance to be heard.

Our youth did not want to "run the show," but it did ask for its rightful place on the program. So far it has proved that it has new ideas, and it stands willing and ready to back them with a confidence and enthusiasm that is astonishing. Various Hints

I thought I would wait and see what others will have to say about the Friendly City's first anniversary affairs. Enough was said already, so all I need to add is to either agree or disagree with the reports concerning the affairs.

Being a peace-loving person I agree to a certain extent with all of them, except Bro. G. who stated in Prosveta that all the program was in English, which he thought was not right. For the love of Pete! We had nine speakers and at least five of them spoke in Slovene. Yet, Bro. G. suggests that we be more thoughtful about such things in the future. We will, but Bro. G. must "listen in" before he makes another comment like that.

Personally, I think that the affairs could have been better attended. But there are such excuses as: poor times, not interested in the doing of lodge, do not like this or that person, therefore shall not go, etc. As far as I can observe things, I think that only two excuses can really be considered true: Poor times and—not enough cooperation among us all.

The Singing society Bled "could not" sing for us, but we should worry! There are about a dozen of singers in our Lodge, who used to or still sing at Bled's. So if we choose to, a singing group can be soon organized for our affairs. Yet, it is too bad that some folks just can't realize how much we need to cooperate with our youth. No one need to think for one short second that our cultural organizations can go on without our active youth. And "active" youth is what we have in the Friendly City lodge. That has often been proved; nobody can deny it. We hold no grudge—no at all—yet, Bled deserves some criticizing, for its own good. Singing societies, composed of workers, should serve the workers' organizations first—religion should have nothing to do with it.

I am not writing these words just because I am an atheist, but because I feel that things like that should be stressed a bit now and then, especially when they are carried too far.

I am willing, much willing to do all I can for the working people, for my own class, regardless of their beliefs or religions, but I will not under circumstances work in any way for the religion they may have.

Our lodge joined the "Prosveta Matice," recently, and a few weeks ago some literature in the form of brochures was sent to us and was distributed among our members at the last regular meeting. How many of you have read it?

Perhaps, some of you may think love stories and Wild West novels are more interesting and pleasing. But so is dessert sweeter and better tasting food than vegetables; yet, if we wish to have good health, we must eat more of not so tasting vegetables. Remember that cheap reading matter had never made anyone a thinker. Dreaming about the sweet dreams of the impossible is as useless as trying to empty the ocean. You proletarian youngsters will have happiness and a better life only, if you will work hard for your rights as working class.

The other day I had a chance to have a nice talk with a couple of fellows who are very much in love with the present system, because they are paid to be, and because they never had any hard times under this wonderful system. One of them said that things will always be as they are: rich and powerful shall rule the un-powerful and poor. "It may be so by your way of thinking," I said, "but you must admit that the whole works of the present system will positively had to be reorganized in order to keep alive the human machines, who were thrown out of jobs by the steel machines." He looked a bit surprised and I presume he thought, "Why should a woman of the poor class

bother with things like that—and a foreign-born woman at that?" But he agreed with me, anyway, and said that it was true that prosperity is not as well distributed as some try to say that it is. He also agreed with me that prohibition is everything but a blessing to the "God's Country." Gee, but I do like to make them puzzled, those uppish, educated workers for capitalism.

As I do not think it worth while to give another answer to Bro. Schmittzer about socialism, I'll just put down the words of O. O. McIntyre, whose "New York Day by Day" I read regularly in the local paper, which is, I might mention, a republican or better a capitalistic paper. This is what he said in his column recently: "I am not a Socialist, yet it strikes me—the clearest political thinker in New York is Norman Thomas, recent Socialist candidate for Mayor. He has the patience, culture, vision. There are few men in whose hands the metropolis would be so safe. And there is not one into whose hands it is less likely to trust itself."

Make your own comment and try to think a bit about this statement. The prizes for the Membership Campaign are very inviting. Let's get some of them, Friendly City folks. There is plenty of room in our Lodge for any number of new members, adults or juveniles.

Be it resolved that the Little Fort Lodge, No. 568, go on record as being in favor of the publication in Prosveta of all minutes of all Supreme Board meetings; and

Be it further resolved that a copy of this resolution be spread upon the minutes of this meeting and that copies of this resolution be sent to the Supreme Board and to the official organ, the Prosveta.

RESOLUTION FOR THE RELEASE OF TOM MOONEY AND WARREN BILLINGS

WHEREAS, Tom Mooney and Warren K. Billings, labor organizers, have now been in prison for 14 years since their imprisonment in California in 1916; and

WHEREAS, we are absolutely convinced that these martyrs to the cause of labor are innocent of the crime for which they were convicted, their conviction having been brought about as a result of their activities on behalf of the workers, thru bribery, perjury and intimidation;

WHEREAS, the innocence of these two men has been further proven by the recent confession of John McDonald, the star witness against them in the original trial, that he was paid to give false evidence against Mooney and Billings; and

WHEREAS, this confession by McDonald is not alone, but stands together with the statement of 11 of the 12 jurors who convicted Mooney and Billings that they now believe that the men are innocent, the declaration by Judge Griffin, the trial judge in the case that "Mooney job is one of the dirtiest jobs yet ever"; the exposure of Gurnea, witness for the prosecution, as a perjurer, and other numerous facts.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this organization, Antislavery Federation of S.N.P.J. go on record demanding the immediate and unconditional release of Tom Mooney and Warren K. Billings; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That we call upon all workers and labor organizations to pass similar resolution and do all in their power to secure the release of these two labor champions; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That we go on record condemning any further refusal to release these two men, and we believe that this proves justice in the United States which is administered in the interests of the bosses and against the workers; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That we are in favor and will cooperate in every move to establish a united labor front to secure the release of Tom Mooney and Warren K. Billings, and we instruct our officers to take all necessary measures in that direction; and
