PRESS TELLS OF MANTLE CLUB TREATED HERE LAST APRIL

Mantle Club, that mysterious organization which charges \$20 initiation fee and \$2 monthly dues without giving the paying member any return for his money outside of a weekly meeting, came into the limelight again in a series of articles written in the Cleveland Press by William Miller.

Readers of the English Section will recall that on April 17, 1937 this sheet printed a series of articles on the Mantle Club, advising its readers to investigate the club and receive something more than pep talks from Mantle Club officers before paying the high initiation fee and monthly assessments.

The Cleveland Press articles told that there are 1550 members in the club, which give the Mantle Club an income of some \$3000 a month, not including initiation fees from new members. William Miller, writer of the articles, joined the club and discovered that officials would reveal nothing of their purposes. Meetings are held every Monday in the Ballroom of Public Hall. Every member before he is formally accepted is told of past failures of Mr. Monjar, head of the Mantle Club. Members are warned that exposes of the club will be attempted. Mr. Miller found that despite this only two applicants took their money back. Meetings consist

mainly of pep talks. Autocratic rule prevails over all club matters; members have no word in the management of the club; there are a set of by-laws but there is only one copy and that is in the headquarters. A monthly publication, "The American Key," written by Monjar himself blasts against all New-Deal measures, against unions, against all isms. Members receive nothing definite for their money.

This sheet's articles on the Mantle Club told that the club was undemocratic as long as it does not reveal its management to the members. It told of Monjar's previous failures and warned members to think twice before joining.

Since our expose, many stories of the Mantle Club have come to our attention. Among the most significant one is the fact that the Mantle Club took up so much time of one leader in a church club that he had to choose between the two—he chose the Mantle Club.

Clergy, especially in the Slovene parishes, where some are only too anxious to blast forth on issues which often have more of a political aspect than a religious one, should look into this "secret" society which is diverting religious fervor into other channels.

Dalmatian Ruled Hawaii

Researches in history revealed this week that a Dalmatian count ruled Hawaii at one time. His death finally led to revolution and the eventual occupation of the island by the United States. The husband of the late Hawaiian queen Lydia Liliukalani (1888-1917) was a Dalmatian nobleman. His name was Count Ivan-Jerko Domonis of the Island Rab, who deserted from the Austro-Hungarian navy in protest against the confiscation by the State of his family's lands.

His subsequent travels finally took the young Croatian to Honolulu, capital of Hawaii, where he fell in love with the queen. They were married and the queen continued to rule the islands until Count Domonis' death in 1890. Then unable to cope with state matters after losing the help of her husband, the queen resorted to dictatorial measures which ended in revolution, the proclamation of the Hawaiian republic in 1893 and the eventual occupation by the United States.

A heavyweight who is gaining much prestige in fistic circles is Jimmie Adamick, a Slovene from Midland, Mich. Undoubtedly every reader of sports pages has seen his name in connection with knockouts he gained in rapid succession throughout the country.

So impressive has been his record that sports fighters are gradually talking about him as a strong contender for the heavyweight crown.

Adamick is managed by Jack Kearns, who "found" him. It may mean something to some that Kearns also "found" Jack Dempsey. Kearns says that before another year Adamick will knock down any fighter traveling in the squared circle. A match was talked between Schemeling and Adamick, but Schemeling did not desire Adamick's blasts before he met Joe Louis.

An interesting battle came about recently when two outstanding Slovene heavyweights met. Johnny Erjavec, Duluth, Minn., fighter who fought in Cleveland sometime ago met Adamick. Adamick won by decision after he knocked down Erjavec seven times.

Adamick is 21 years old. He started boxing when a kid. Last year he engaged in 43 fights, winning 37 by knockouts. He is 5 feet 11 inches tall and weighs 188 pounds.
