Will Upsets Feature Midwest Basketball Meet? Possibly

Heavy Honors in Probable Class, While Girls Laurels Set in Balance; Florians Favorites

Waukegan, Ill.—Will 1936 be a year of upsets? Whenever a reputedly stronger team loses to an opponent who is not supposed to have a chance, most people label it as an upset. Of course the rooters of the winning team however, have nothing else to say but "I told you so." This was the case of the game of last Sunday played by the St. Joes and St. Mary's of Waukegan. Most people said the outcome of the game isn't at all in doubt, but the play of St. Joe's outclassed that of an over confident St. Mary's and the results were a victory for St. Joes, their very first victory over St. Mary's.

Is this upset just the beginning of greater and even more surprising reversals? If St. Mary's lost by a mere three points to the champ St. Florians and St. Joes have defeated St. Mary's by seven points, does this indicate that St. Joes who to date had but a mere outside chance, size up as strong as St. Florians if not even more powerful? If it does then we have three strong contenders St. Florians, St. Mary's of Waukegan and St. Joes of Waukegan not to say anything of such reputedly strong outfits as St. Michaels and the Joliet Boosters.

If in previous tournaments there have been one or two favorites, in this it would seem that there are five at least who must be rated on a par. We regret that the Waukegan-Milwaukee games have not materialized because they would have given us an opportunity to measure the strength of Milwaukee. As matters stand now, they are the darkest of the dark horses. But will they be sufficiently strengthened to actually cop the championship? If so, this would be the greatest upset of all upsets.

Chicago rates as a strong contender, worthy of the respect of all other entrants. It seems that no one fears Chicago like in the days of old when Chicago feared Purdue. But this very lack of caution may be the undoing of one of the favorites. This would not surprise us in the least, because as we started out to say, this year may be the year of the great upsets.

All these remarks of ours refer to the heavyweights. The lightweight situation seems to be very well in the hands of the

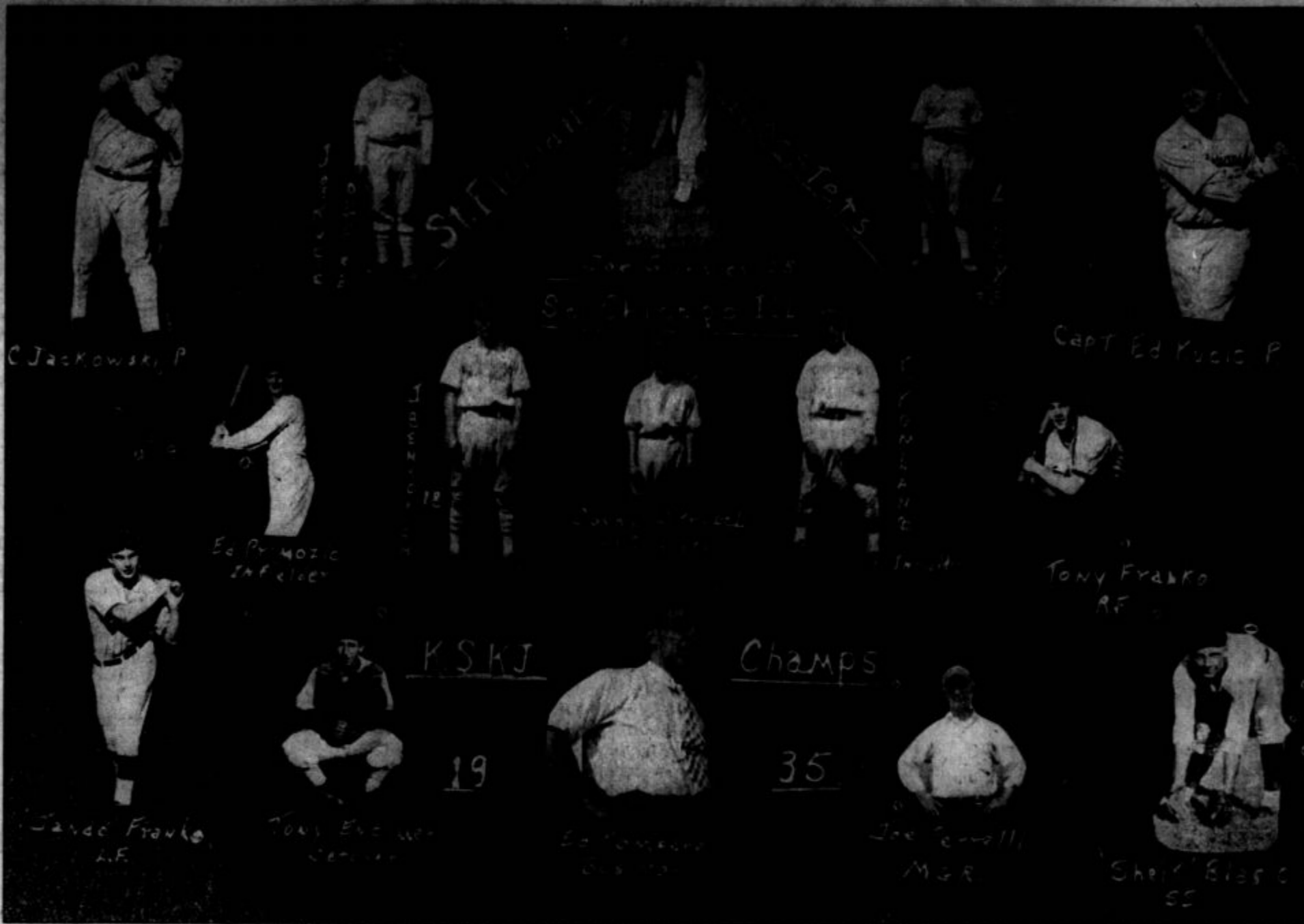
West Allis, Wis.—To get dressed up usually means that it will cost you something, but here is one chance to dress up, and in a funny manner too, and win a prize.
