Otroška paraliza spet narašča v Chicagu

Podadmiral Kijosi Haasagawa, vrhovni poveljnik japonske bojne mornarice v kitajskih vodah, je opozoril tujce na obnovev bombardiranja Nankinga. Pozval je poveljnike bojnih ladij drugih držav, naj se umaknejo najmanj 11 milj, ker Japonska ne bo prevzela odgovornosti za življenja tujcev.

Podadmiral Harry E. Yarnell, poveljnik ameriške bojne mornarice v kitajskih vodah, je dejal, da bosta dve bojni ladji, Luzon in Guam, protekrali lastnino in življenje Američanov, ki so še ostali v Nankingu. Poslal je noto Haasagawi, v kateri ga poziva, naj instruirajo svoje sile, ki napadajo Nanking, naj ne streljajo na ameriške bojne ladje v pristanišču tega mesta. Francoske in angleške navalistične avtoritete so tudi naznačile, da bodo bojne ladje ostale v bližini Nankinga.

Montreal, Kanada. — Canadian Car & Foundry Co. je naznanila, da je prejela naročilo iz Turčije, naj zgradi 40 bojnih letal za turško vlado. Za ta letala bo Turčija plačala kanadski kompaniji \$2,000,000.

Koliko uspeha bo imela ta mirovna in združevalna kampanja, se še ne ve. Green in Lewis sta vsak po svoje trmoglava in ločijo ju tudi nekatera načelna oblačilnih delavcev, Rooseveltova desna roka. On vneta pomaga, da pride med Lewisovimi in Greenovimi unijami čim prej do enotnosti.

Jersey City, N. J. — Stavka v trgovinah Eagle Co. je bila končana, ko je kompanija priznala unijo in sklenila pogodbo. Ta kompanija ima več kot 300 trgovin v tej državi. Unija klerkov, ki je izvojevala priznanje, je včlanjena v Ameriški delavski federaciji.

Akron, O. — Delavci v tovarnah Goodrich Tire & Rubber Co. so se z 8212 proti 834 glasovi izrekli za unijo kavčukarskih delavcev, da jih reprezentira pri kolektivnih pogajanjih. Unija je včlanjena v Odboru za industrijsko organizacijo. S. H. Dalrymple, predsednik unije, je dejal, da so delavci dali odločen odgovor onim, ki trdijo, da gibanje CIO ne uživa zaupanja pri delavcih. Volitve so pokazale, da je politika CIO prava in da ima zaslobo pri delavcih, ki so usposleni v industrijah masne produkcije. Nekaj dni prej so se delavci v tovarnah Goodyear izrekli za unijo CIO kot predstavnicu pri kolektivnih pogajanjih.

ADF proti ustavitvi tretje stranke

Vlada naj služi vsem slojem, pravi Green

Washington, D. C. — (FP) — William Green, predsednik Ameriške delavske federacije, je v svojem govoru po radiu ponovno naglasil, da je njegova organizacija proti formiranju neodvisne delavske politične stranke. Dejal je, da so organizirani delavci pripravljani sprejeti odloke vlade in da odklanjajo posebne privilegije. Oplazil je ponovno Johna L. Lewisa, načelnika CIO, ki je v svojem nedavnem govoru kritiziral predsednika Roosevelta, "največjega delavskega prijatelja od vseh, ki so bili že v Beli hiši."

Green je govoril o demokraciji in ciljih organiziranega delavstva. "Vedno smo in bomo naglašali, da so delavci svojstven del ameriškega naroda," je dejal. "Demokracijo tolmavimo v širokem obsegu, ki vključuje vse aktivnosti svobodnega naroda. Kot državljani zahtevamo, da vlada služi vsem slojem, ne pa posameznim skupinam. To je demokracija. Delavstvo se smatra kot del socialnega reda in doslej se ni osvojilo filozofije, ki govori o razredih in razrednih razlikah. Ono neče biti nad ali pa pod politično in ekonomsko stopnjo drugih grup. Delavci pri volitvah glasujejo za one kandidate, ki so po njihovi sodbi najboljši, toda izvoljeni uradniki morajo biti reprezentantje vseh. Vaak poskus kupovanja naklonjenosti od vlade smatramo za čin, ki zasluži osodbo. Kljub temu smo nedavno videli, da je načelnik CIO zahteval usluge od vlade kot nagrado za finančno podporo v zadnji volilni kampanji."

Green je dalje rekel, da uradniki in člani Ameriške delavske federacije žanjejo koristi in blagoslov demokracije ter svobodne vlade, zato ne zahtevajo posebnih privilegijev od vlade. Demokracija vlada mora slušiti vsem, ne samo nekaterim. Formiranje neodvisne delavske politične stranke bo ADF objavljal, ker je to v nasprotju z njenimi tradicijami. Green je napovedal, da bo federacija na svoji konvenciji, ki se prične 4. oktobra v Denverju, Colo., ponovno naglasila svoje nadstrankarsko stališče.

Imele niso nikakih aktuarskih lestvic za plačevanja asesamentov in legalni rezervni sklad jim je bil nepoznana stvar. Toda čas in razvoj sta prinesla velike izpremembe. Deloma pod pritiskom državnih postavodaj in deloma po iniciativi bratskih organizacij samih, se je vpeljalo mnogo koristnih izprememb, ki so ugodno vplivale na rast in napredek teh organizacij. Legalna rezerva "paid up insurance", "extended insurance", "loans on policies" in drugi podobni za članstvo ugodni pogoji so omogočili uspešno konkurenco napram zavarovalnim družbam. Danes imamo v Ameriki nad 200 podpornih organizacij, 105,000 lokalnih društev in 7 milijonov članov.

Ruska revolucija. Zastarna vlada je pristala na zahtevo vojaških in delavskih svetov, da uporna generala Kornilova sodijo vojaški porotniki.

Bolezni zločinca

Znanost se trudi na vse načine, da bi odkrila izvore, vzroke in razloge zločinskega nagnenja, nakar bi lahko poskušala uspešno zdraviti. Problem zločinstva je namreč eden najtežjih problemov ameriške družbe, ki namo na materialni strani stane Združene države trinajst milijard dolarjev letno.

Pred kratkim sta dva čikaška zdravnika izzvala senzacijo, ko sta poročala, da sta s preizkušnjami na jetnikih v okrajnem zaporu prišla na sled biološkemu vzroku zločinskih tendenc. V poročilu pravita, da sta našla v hrbtnici zločincev gosto, mlečno tekočino, kakršne ni v hrbtnici normalnih oseb, nakar sta dognala, da ta tekočina prihaja od propadanja stanic v možganih. Zdravnika izjavljata iz tega, da zločinski karakter izvira iz slabosti ali pomanjkanja nekih celic v možganih, vsled česar je zločinec nezmožen za samokontrolo.

Ta teorija — naj bo tudi dejstvo — bo slabo naletela pri avtoritetah, ki se trdno drže staroga principa, na katerem še danes stoni kazensko pravo. Na podlagi tega principa in prava večina zločincev stori zločin iz svoje proste volje, vsled česar je podvržen odgovornosti in kazni. Princip individualne odgovornosti, ki izvira iz davne in barbarske preteklosti — iz one preteklosti, v kateri niso nikdar poskušali zločinca poboljšati, pač pa so se nad njim kruto maščevali (zob za zob, glava za glavo!) — je kajpada zelo komplicirana reč in v večini primerov je silno zmoten.

Ameriško kazensko pravo tudi sloni na principu maščevalnosti in vse protizločinske kampanje gredo za tem pravcem, da se ljudje zastrašijo, da se bodo ball kazni. Te kazni podarjajo tudi mladini v šolah. Ko je bila pred sto leti v Združenih državah kampanja za ustanovitev javnega šolstva, je odlični učitelj Horace Mann izjavil, da so šole potrebne, ker bodo naredile ljudi pošteno. Kolikor več denarja pojde za šole, toliko manj ga bo treba za zatiranje zločincev! To se pa ni izpolnilo. Danes je šolstvo v Ameriki, javno in privatno-versko, razvito kot še nikdar prej, toda paralelno pljuskajo valovi zločinstev tako visoko kot še nikdar prej.

Jasno je torej, da same pridige in samo zustranjevanje ne more iztrebiti zločincev. Socialnim večakom je to že davno znano in polagoma prihajajo do tega prepričanja tudi zdravniki, ki bolj in bolj priznavajo, da so zločinske tendence posledica nekih organskih bolezni oziroma telesnih defektov, vsled katerih se človek ne more kontrolirati.

Kadar bo to dejstvo docela dognano in priznано, tedaj bo treba radikalno revidirati sistem kriminalne justice. Zavreči bo treba vs sistem, ki sloni na principu proste volje, odgovornosti in maščevalnosti. Zločinci iz navede morajo priti v bolnišnico namesto v ječo, kakor to še delajo z blazneži. Blazneže so nekoč — zlasti v blaženem krščanskem veku — tudi zapirali, priklepali in pretepali kot "od hudica obsedene" stvore.

Zločinska dejanja pa niso le posledica telesnih defektov — semkaj spadajo predvsem seksualni in druge vrste manjki — temveč so v veliki meri tudi socialna bolezen. Človek s telesnimi defekti, ki se ne more kontrolirati, mora imeti tudi priložnost za škodljiva dejanja — in teh priložnosti ima na izbiro v današnjem ekonomskem in socialnem sistemu.

Sistem individualnega gospodarstva in privatnega dobička sam od sebe navaja k sebičnosti, prevaram in goljufanju, izkoriščanju in ropanju drugih. Noben ekonomski sistem na svetu, kar jih je že bilo, se ni dal takih priložnosti za denarne zločince kot jih je dal baš kapitalistični sistem. Vsa ta sistem je v bistvu eno samo raketirstvo! Vsi denarni zločini izvirajo naravnost iz tega ekonomskega sistema in 90 odstotkov vseh zločinov v Ameriki se izvrširadi denarja, katerega tolikim ljudem manjka po krivici!

Znanost bo torej morala zavzeti široko polje in vključiti tudi ekonomske in socialne vzroke, če bo hotela zajeti vse vzroke zločinskih valov. In same operacije na defektnih žlezah zločincev ne bodo zadostovale. Potrebna bo predvsem korenita operacija na družbinem sistemu, če bo znanost hotela iztrebiti vse priložnosti za zločinske tendence, navade in čine.

Comments On This and That

"A PLAGUE ON BOTH YOUR HOUSES"?

Time and again we have emphasized that the Bourbon extremists on the Right neither admit nor practice any democracy towards labor in industrial unions.

Bourbon extremists a la Tom Girdler, Ford, and others ignore any new law favoring labor, turn a deaf ear to collective bargaining, and they would prefer to settle all labor conflicts with private or public armed forces. These are the so-called "die-hards" or industrial fascists who know only themselves and their "good old times" and do not care to hear about the demands of the present.

Extremists, however, do not exist only on the side of the industrial fascists. They exist also in the ranks of labor, and wherever they are found, they are more detrimental than valuable to the cause of labor and industrial unions. Such extremists practice democracy only by word of mouth; in actuality they would resort to any kind of force to achieve their end.

Some months ago, especially in the state of Michigan, various such "wild" strikes, not approved by the labor leaders, were staged. That this was a fact is proved by the statement of the union leaders who threatened to expel all those extremists who in the future did not respect the clauses of collective bargaining.

Another extremely unfortunate case arose in Ohio where the union itself expelled three local organizers of the CIO. One of them, Gus Hall, upon his arrest, was found with dynamite in his possession. Hall admitted that he intended using dynamite on the strike front.

Such incidents are of no benefit whatsoever to workers and strikers; they do, however, give the extremists on the Right—Bourbons and financial and industrial magnates—opportunity to brand the entire CIO movement with criminal conspiracy. Dynamite has played a mighty and bestial role in the history of American labor from the side of capitalistic provocateurs; in spite of this, they masterfully exploit any similar incident on the side of labor extremists. Hundreds of workers have been plunged into prisons, and some are still serving their terms because of irresponsible persons. Many a strike has been lost because of criminal elements that were counted among the sincere and level-headed workers who had no criminal intentions.

Such incidents have provoked the foolish statements of William Green, who, to the glee of the capitalistic press, cynically points to the CIO as an organization of communistic criminalities. As though the A. F. of L. can boast of a clean slate! As though they have forgotten the incident of the McNamara brothers!

It is nothing new nor unusual that into the CIO, among the great majority of truthful and idealistic members, have sided a few "revolutionists", dynamite-lovers, who think that every strike is a "revolution" and that they are called upon to lead this "revolution."

It should be the duty of the members of these unions, and especially the leaders and responsible officers, to get rid of these meddlers as soon as possible if they wish their future strikes and organizations to be successful.

The workers must achieve respect for their new organizations. How will this be possible if their own demands are not kept? How will the workers hold the criminalities of the opposite side to count, if they will be burdened by the same thing on their own?

When Roosevelt made the statement: "A plague on both your houses," he adjudged both factions equally. This is by no means proper, since the criminal deeds of the workers up to the present are but a hair's breadth in comparison with the wrongs of the magnates. And finally: the overwhelming majority of sincere, true workers cannot be responsible for the small number of extremists.
