## HOOVER IZZVAL BESEN KONFLIKT V KONGRESU

Zahetva drastične zakone za izvedbo prohibicije. Enforsarski aparat je temeljito skrahiral.

Washington, D. C. — Predsednik Hoover je 18. januarja vrgel bombo v obe zbornice konгрesa, ko je predložil poročilo svoje preiskovalne komisije o polomu pravosodnega ustroja v deželi in v posebnih poslanici priporočil, da se kongres takoj vrže na delo in drastično spremeni aparat za izvajanje prohibičnega zakona. Komisija poroča, da je ta aparat absolutno skrahiral in da prohibicije v resnicici nikjer ni, das obstoji ž deset let na paširju.

Hoover priporoča šest drastičnih sprememb v Volsteadovem zakonu in sistem federalne justice. Prvič se mora vsa stavba zveznih sodišč reorganizirati: drugič je povečati stare in zgraditi nove ječe ter spremeniti sistem pomločevanja; vsa obmejna straža od Kanadi in Mehiki mora priti pod eno vodstvo; sprememb v proceduri toženja kršiteljev; federalni komisarji morajo dobiti večjo oblast, da bodo lahko sami sodili v manjših slučajih brez porote; poseben zakon za Kolumbijski distrikti in spojitev prohibičnega oddelka z justičnim departmantom.

Mokri kongresniki in senatorji so tako izjavili, da nove narobe pomenijo nova nasičila in krvolutja; pomenijo, da se število arretacij zviša za 50 odstotkov. Hooverjeva komisija poroča, da je bilo v zadnjem fiskalnem letu arretiranih 80,000 oseb v Združenih državah. Zdaj hočejo to število podvajiti!

Na drugi strani so suhi poslanci aplavdirali Hooverjeva priporočila. Ker imajo suhači večino v obuh zbornicah, ni najmanjšega dvoma, da bodo Hooverjeve reforme tudi sprejeti. Medtem morajo vsa druga vprašanja počivati in kongres bo granel mogoče celo zasedanje o besasti prohibiciji.

## Brezposelnost v državi New York

Nastopila je v vseh industrijsih. Najbolj je prizadeta kovinska industrija.

Albany, N. Y. — (F. P.) — Od leta 1920, ki je v zgodovini zaznamovalo kot leto panike, se ni nastopila tako občutna brezposelnost v newyorskih industrijsih kot v mesecu decembru v preteklem letu. To poročilo je dal v javnost državni delavski department. Zaposlenost je padla za 10% v mesecu decembru kot kaže študija, ki je bila podvzeta v 1,500 tovarnah.

Vse industrije so poročale o padcu zaposlenosti, toda najbolj so prizadeti delaveci v kovinski industriji. V avtomobilski industriji se je zaposlenost zmanjšala za petnajst odstotkov. Slična poročila prihajajo iz vseh mest, ki imajo razvito industrijo.

## Wheeler okrcačil propa- gatorje visoke carine

Rajonski tovarnarji gulijo delavce in odjemalce

Washington, D. C. — (F. P.) — Ameriški delavski sloji morajo plačevati oderuške cene za rajonske izdelke in delavec, ki so uposleni v rajonskih tovarnah, prejemajo najnižje mezde od vseh delavcev, ki so uposleni v ameriških industrijah, je dejal senator Wheeler iz Montane, ko je ostro kritiziral propagatorje visoke carine na rajonskih produkcijskih podjetjih, ki je zamisljena v Hawley-Smootovi predlogi.

Wheeler je cital številke iz poročila blivšega carinskega komisarja David J. Lewisa o profitih American Viscose Co., ki producira dve tretjini rajonskih delavcev. V preteklem letu je ta družba napravila 48% čistega dobička. Ustanovila se je l. 1922. V podjetje je vložila deset milijonov dolarjev, njen čisti dobiček pa je v preteklem letu znašal \$88,306,000.

"Ne vem, kako veliko vsoto denarja so rajonski tovarnarji poklonili v blagajno republikanske stranke v zadnji predsedniški kampanji," je dejal Wheeler, "ali dobro vem, da je bila njihova darčeljivost bogato poplačana. Ameriško ljudstvo, ki kupuje izdelke te angleške družbe, ki operači ameriške tovarne, je grdo izkorishčano, kljub temu pa propagatorji visoke carine na rajonskih izdelkih že, da bi bilo

DuPont rajonsko podjetje je drugo po obsegu in produkciji nemško podjetje v Elizabethtonu, Tenn., je tretje. Wheeler je pokazal na dogodek v Elizabethtonu v preteklem poletju, kot tipičen dokaz, kakšne blagovalne uporabljajo ameriški delaveci v rajonskih tovarnah. Visoka carina ščiti le bogate tovarnarje, dočim so delaveci izpostavljeni izkorisčanju in nimajo od visoke carine nobenega dobička."

Bivši carinski lobist Grundy, ki je bil povzdignjeno v zveznega senatorja, je mirno sedel in poslušal, ko je Wheeler kracil propagatorje visoke carine. ## Editorial Notes

## The Riddle of the Universe

It must not be supposed, however, that modern science has shattered our old ethics along with the Kantian dualism, and left us nothing in its stead. The feeling of duty or obligation is a psychological reality which cannot be denied, but it is not dependent upon a categorical imperative—it is a product of the social instinct found in all gregarious animals. Thus modern ethics is based, not upon the dogmas of Christianity or the idealistic philosophy, but upon solid biological facts, as outlined at length in the evolutionary writings of Herbert Spencer and others.

Man is a social vertebrate, and like all animals of this type, has two sets of duties—one concerned with his own individual welfare, the other with the welfare of the group to which he belongs. The two obligations are equally natural and equally necessary. The motive behind one group of responses is called self-love or egotism, that which conditions the other set of responses is known as altruism—regard for others. A social animal like man cannot live unto himself alone, and he must realize that the benefits of organized society are not free, but must be paid for by assuming a share of the burden common to the social group. The prosperity of the individual members of that community, and an injury to the group as a whole is an
