Podmornica ustavila Nemški jetniki ameriško ladjo

Nadaljnji trije angleški parniki potopljeni

Mobile, Ala., 12. sept. — Visok uradnik Waterman Steamship Corp. je sinoči naznanil, da je nemška podmornica ustavila parnik Wacoeta, last te korporacije, v bližini irskega obrežja. Člani posadke podmornice so preiskali parnik in potem dovolili, da lahko nadaljuje svojo pot proti Glasgowu, Škotska, in od tam proti New Yorku. Preiskava je trajala tri ure.

N. Nicolson, podpredsednik omenjene parobrodne družbe, je dejal, da je prejel kablogram od G. Sella, kapitana parnika Wacoeta, da je poveljnik podmornice dejal, da bodo vsi ameriški parniki, ki se ne bodo ustavili na povelje, napadeni. Waterman Steamship Corp. je obvestila federalno pomorsko komisijo in državni department o incidentu.

New York, 12. sept. — Družba United States Lines je dobila radijsko poročilo, da je bil angleški tovorni parnik Blairgloz torpediran in potopljen v bližini irskega obrežja po nemški podmornici. Člane posadke tega parnika je vzela na svoj krov ameriška ladja American Shipper.

Poleg tega parnika so nemške podmornice potopile nadaljnja dva angleška parnika. Odkar je Anglija napovedala vojno Nemčiji, so nemške podmornice potopile že petnajst angleških parnikov.

Izboljšanje rusko-japonskih odnosov

Tokio, 11. sept. — Premier Abe je dejal, da njegova vlada študira metode glede izboljšanja odnosov s sovjetsko Rusijo. Nekateri krogi so mu že svetovali, naj sklene nenapadalen pakt z Rusijo. On je tudi opozoril Japonce, da je mnenje, da Japonci lahko izsilijo umik zapadnih vojsk s Daljnega vzhoda "zelo nevarna ideja."

Unija zahteva izključitev komunistov

Racine, Wis., 11. sept. — Aaron B. Mentch, predsednik tukajšnje delavskega sveta, katerega govori sedemnajst unij, zahteva izključitev komunistov iz državnega centralnega sveta CIO. "Mislim, da smo soglasni v tem, da morajo biti komunisti in njihovi podpredniki v centralnem svetu, kjer imajo važne pozicije, izključeni," je dejal Mentch.

NACIJI SE ZANAŠAJO NA POMČ RUSIJE

Velike diplomatske aktivnosti v Berlinu

NEMŠKO-FRANCO-SKI KOMPROMIS?

Berlin, 12. sept. — Diplomatična pogajanja se nadaljujejo in naciji se silno trdijo v naporih, katerih cilj je tesna kooperacija s sovjetsko Rusijo. V Berlinu upajo, da sosedje Poljske in Rusije ne bodo alarmirani, "ko se bo ruska vojna mašina začela valiti preko Poljske."

Hitler je svojega vojaškega glavnega stana vodi diplomatska pogajanja. Bernardo Attolico, italijanski poslanik v Berlinu, bo obiskal Hitlerja ta teden. Poslanik je sicer zbolel in ako ne bo mogel potovati, bo obiskal Hitlerja grof Magistrati, pravni svetovalec italijanskega poslanstva.

Zdaj, ko je Nemčija dobila na svojo stran Rusijo in je ta obljubila nacijem kooperacijo, prevladuje v Berlinu upanje, da možnost kompromisa med njimi in Francijo ni izključena. Andre Francois-Poncet, francoski poslanik v Rimu, se je vrnil v Pariz po konferenci s Mussolinijem in tu napoveduje, da bo on skušal pridobiti francosko vlado za sklenitev kompromisa z Nemčijo, čeprav so se bitke med Francozi in Nemci na zapadni fronti pričele.

Naznanilo, da bo Anglija blokirala Nemčijo, ne pripisujejo velike važnosti. Ako bo Berlin pridobil Francijo za sklenitev kompromisa, bo to udarec Angliji in obenem dokaz, da je podcenjevala moč in udarno silo nemške oborožene sile. Nacijijska Nemčija in komunistična Rusija sta se odločili za strmoglavljenje britske sile.

Naciji upajo, da bo izbruhnila revolucija v poljski Ukrajini. Ta bo pospešila razpad Poljske. Ne Velika Britanija in ne Francija ne bosta mogli preprečiti debakla, ko se bo pričela gibati ruska oborožena sila.

Vest iz Washingtona, da je Amerika ustavila izvoz orožja in bojnega materiala v Kanado, ko je slednja napovedala vojno Nemčiji, je bila sprejeta v Berlinu z navdušenjem na znanje.

Kanada pošlje vojake v Evropo

Nemške podmornice v bližini obrežja

Ottawa, Kanada, 12. sept. — Poskus, ki naj bi odgodil odhod kanadskih vojakov v Evropo, je bil poražen v parlamentu, ko je bil sprejet predlog glede ustanovitve vojnega sklada v vsoti sto milijonov dolarjev. Šest članov delavske stranke, katerim se je pridružila grupa desetih liberalcev, je pobijalo predlog, da preprečijo odhod vojsk v Evropo, ki pa je bil pri glasovanju sprajet s 161 proti 15 glasovom.

Premier Mackenzie King je dejal, da bo zadeva pošiljanja vojsk kmalu rešena. Če bi bil amandment opozicije sprejet, bi to oviralo kooperacijo med Kanado in Anglijo v izvajanju obrambnih načrtov. King je dejal, da so nemške podmornice v bližini kanadskega obrežja in da bojna letala se lahko pojavijo vsak čas.

V avstrovni vojni je Kanada mobilizirala armado 619,000 mož in izmed teh je bilo 450,000 poslanih v Evropo. Kanadske vojne izgube v svetovni vojni so znašale 55,943 mrtvih in 149,732

Kanada je uradno stopila v vojno večeraj. Ona bo tudi ekonomsko kooperirala s zavezniškimi državami v vseh zadevah, ki se nanašajo na vojne operacije proti Nemčiji.

London, 12. sept. — Premier Neville Chamberlain se je zahvalil Kanadi, "ker se pridružila Veliki Britaniji v borbi proti agresiji nacijejske Nemčije," v telegramu, katerega je naslovil predsedniku vlade Kingu. Chamberlain pravi v telegramu, da je kanadska napoved vojne Nemčiji "velika pobuda."

Nacijska Nemčija mora biti poražena, pravi angleški minister

Miru ne bo, dokler ne bo nacizem strt na vsej črti. Francoske čete prodirajo naprej v Saarški dolini in zasedle so nadaljnja štiri nemška mesta na severozapadni strani Maginotske trdnjavske črte. Nacijijski naznanili obkrožitev poljske armade, Poljaki pa trdijo, da uspešno odbijajo napade sovražnika na vseh frontah

London, 12. sept. — Anthony Eden, bivši zunanji minister, ki je stopil v Chamberlainovo kabineto kot minister za dominijone, ko je Velika Britanija napovedala vojno Nemčiji, je sinoči v svojem govoru, ki je bil razširjen po vsem svetu, dejal, da miru ne bo, dokler ne bo nacizem in vse, kar ta predstavlja v zatiranju, brutalnosti in krvočnosti, izginil s sveta. To je zadeva, ki ne dopušča nobenega kompromisa.

"Diktator Hitler je namenoma provociral vojno z invazijo Poljske," je rekel Eden, "pod pretvezo, da ni hotela sprejeti mirovnih pogojev, katerih ji ni nemška vlada niti predložila. Poljska je bila pripravljena na pogajanja z Nemčijo, kakor je bila Češkoslovaška, toda Hitler se je poslužil sile. Odlučitev je padla in on bo nosil odgovornost za posledice. Anglija nima nobenega spora z nemškimi ljudstvom, toda vojna ji je bila vsiljena in ona se ne bo obrnila nazaj, temveč vtrajala v boju do zmage."

Eden je dalje rekel, "da so se gospodarji Nemčije v zadnjih osemdesetih letih petkrat spuščili v agresivno vojno. Proti mirni Danakl l. 1864, proti Avstriji l. 1866, proti Franciji l. 1870, proti vsemu svetu l. 1914 in proti Veliki Britaniji, Franciji in Poljski v tem letu. Odlučili smo se za vojno, da dokažemo, da se agresija ne izplača in da verujemo nemško ljudstvo, da se bomo borili do zadnjega. Nacizem je le začasen pojav. Noben sistem, ki sloni na sili, se ne more vzdržati. Po Hitlerjevi krivdi bomo morali zgraditi novo civilizacijo s prelivanjem krvi, toda zgradili jo bomo. Zeleni smo drugače, a naše želje se niso izpolnile. Sile, ki so neprestano na delu, so močnejše nego posamezniki. V novi civilizaciji bomo našli svobodo, priložnosti in upanje."

Po Edenovem govoru je ministarstvo za informacije naznanilo, da so angleške čete dospelo v Francijo in se pridružile francoskim v prodiranju po nemškem ozemlju.

Lord Beaverbrook, izdajatelj več listov, je v svojem Evening Standardu objavil uvodnik, v katerem je zahteval odločno borbo proti nacijijski Nemčiji. "Kakšna vojna je to?" vprašuje. "Zadeva je resna in narod se čudi. Pričakovali smo, da bodo spopadi takoj sledili napovedi vojne. Z zapadne fronte ni skoro nobenih novic. Vprašanje je, ali je naša borba proti nacizmu odločna tako kot dovoljuje naše sile? To vprašanje zahteva odgovor?"

Basel, Švica, 12. sept. — Sem je dospelo poročilo, da francoske čete prodirajo naprej v Saarški dolini in so zasedle nadaljnja štiri nemška mesta. Ta so Brenchelbach, Uttweiler, Peppenkum in Mendelsheim. Vsa ležijo na severozapadni strani Maginotske trdnjavske črte. Poročilo dostavlja, da so nemške straže večeraj prvič prekoračile mejo in stopile na francosko ozemlje, a so bile po bitki s Francozi pogrnane nazaj.

Pariz, 12. sept. — Poveljstvo armade je sinoči naznanilo, da so francoske čete okupirale velik kos nemškega ozemlja v ofenzivi na Saarški dolini. Iz naznanila sklepajo, da se bo kmalu vršila srdita bitka med Francozi in Nemci ob sto milj dolgi fronti, ki se razteza med rekama Moselle in Ren. Francoski vojski letalci so večeraj napadli s bombami koncentracijska središča nemškega vojskovanja na tej fronti.

Berlin, 12. sept. — Največja bitka od svetovne vojne se bliža koncu, se glasi poročilo nemških vojaških avtoritet. Ta bo rezultirala v uničenju poljske armade in padcu Varšave. Nemški topovi so razdeljali več mostov čez reko Vistulo, ostale pa zasedli. Tri poljske armade, ki štejejo 350,000 mož, so obkoljene in preti jim uničenje.

Poznan, glavno mesto provinca istega imena, bo kmalu v nemških rokah. V tem mestu živi veliko Nemcev in poveljstvo nemške armade upa, da bo okupacija izvedena brez posebnih posebnih posebnosti. Nemci so zasedli Lodz večeraj in arditte bitke se zdaj vršijo nekaj milj severno od tega mesta in v bližini Kutna. Slednje mesto leži 60 milj zapadno od Varšave. Nemška divizija pod poveljstvom generala Blaskowitza je pričela ofenzivo na tej fronti.

Budimpešta, Ogrska, 12. sept. — Poljska radiopostaja v Varšavi je danes kjutraj naznanila, da so poljske čete ustavile prodiranje sovražnika in da uspešno odbijajo naokoke nemškega vojskovanja na vseh frontah. Odločna obramba Varšave po štirih dneh obleganja je prišla Nemce v umik. Poljska armada je zasedla utrjene pozicije na vzhodni strani reke Vistule in ustavila nacije.

Prejane poročilo po radiu se je glasilo, da so Poljaki pregnali Nemce iz predmestij Varšave. Nemški letalci so uprizorili sedemnajst napadov na Varšavo. Bombe so porušile več hiš in ubile ter ranile veliko število žensk in otrok. Topniško in letalsko bombardiranje se nadaljuje. Dva nemška bombnika sta bila sestreljena, ko sta se pojavila nad Varšavo. "Varšava je postala krvavo bojišče," je rekel naznanilec po radiu. "Varšava in Poljska ne bosta premagani."

Italijanske čete odhajajo v Libijo

Vlada ponovno posvarila prebivalce

Rim, 12. sept. — Poročila, da Italija pošilja čete v Libijo, avto kolonijo v Afriki, ki mejni na Tunizijo, francosko kolonijo, so se pričele širiti, ko je več tisoč vojakov dospelo v Neapelj. Diplomatski krogi ugibajo, ali se je Mussolini odločil za okupacijo Tunizije zdaj, ko je francoska armada zavojevana v bitkah z Nemci na zapadni fronti. Vodilni krogi še niso pojasnili, kaj so pravi nameni Italije v evropski vojni.

Trije delavci v Genovi so bili večeraj aretirani na obtožbo širenja lažnih govoric. Neki fašist je bil izključen iz stranke iz istega razloga. Kakšna poročila so širili aretiranci, ni znano. Vlada je ponovno posvarila prebivalce, da se morajo pokoriti Mussolinijevemu povelju, ki je, da morajo delati in molčati.

Parnik Bremen v ruskem pristanišču

Riga, Latvija, 12. sept. — Nemški parnik Bremen je dospel v Murmansk, pristanišče sovjetske Rusije ob Arktičnem oceanu. Tako se glasi som dospelo poročilo.

Navali na trgovine Moskvi

Sovjetski tisk napoveduje poraz Poljske

Moskva, 12. sept. — Navali na trgovine z živili in banke v Moskvi se nadaljujejo, ko ruske čete prodirajo na zapadno mejo v Poljske. Potrdilo, da je sovjetska vlada pozvala rezervistično vojsko, je vest, katero so objavili Rdeča zvezda, glasilo Prosveta.

"Naloga militaristična pripravila je bila ojačana," piše ta "Ta je najbolj važna obrambna odredba naše države."

V svojih komentarjih Izvestija, glasilo vlade, in Pravda, organ komunistične stranke, izražata uradno sovjetsko mnenje, da Poljska ne bo mogla dolgo obstati nemški oboroženi sili. Poljska je že izgubila glavno militarni in ekonomsko bazo in nje je gotova stvar. Za to sta glavni Velika Britanija in Francija, ker ne nudita Poljski nikakršne pomoči. Poljska ni imela močnih trdnjav na svoji zapadni meji in se ne more ustrezno opremljati modernimi in dobro opremljenimi nemški vojni mašini.

V Moskvi poročajo, da Maksim Litvinov, bivši zunanji komisar, je v palači Spiridonovki, ki je zdaj rezidenca Vekoslava Molotova, sovjetskega premierja in zunanjega komisarja.

Riga, Latvija, 12. sept. — Vlada je pozvala tri letniške rezerviste pod zastavo, toda baltičske čete niso posebno razburjene zaradi poročil o mobilizaciji sovjetskih čet in bojnega materiala na zapadno mejo v bližini Poljske. Nemški državljani v bližini državah so bili informirani iz Berlina, da lahko ostanejo v teh državah.

Gitlow dokončal svojo izpoved

Pravi, da so ameriški komunisti del Stalinske vojaške mašine

Washington, D. C., 12. sept. — Ben Gitlow, bivši glavni tajnik komunistične stranke v Združenih državah in dvakrat podpredsednik kandidata te stranke, je dokončal svoje pričanje pred Diesovim preiskovalnim odborom. Stiri dni je razkrival obojestranske aktivnosti svoje bivše stranke, katere glavni vodja je bil poleg Fosterja sedem let.

"Moje pričanje je obenem izpoved," je zaključil Gitlow. "Čučil sem za svojo dolžnost, da povsem vsu resnico. Enkrat sem prejel, da komunistično gibanje prinaša boljše življenje delavstvu in vsemu človeštvu, toda spoznal sem, da mu prinaša baš nasprotno: propast. Komunistične stranke ne smatram več za iskreno politično gibanje, pač pa za del militaristične mašine, katere glavni stan je v inozemstvu."

Gitlow je tudi rekel, da so ameriški stalinovci glavna gonilna sila pri CIO. Izmed 40 članov izsekativne CIO jih je 22, ki so člani komunistične stranke ozirnoma so njihovi "sopotniki", to je simpatiki, je rekel Ben Gitlow.

Sodnik udaril unijo časnikarjev

Chicago, 12. sept. — Sodnik John J. Lupe je odločil, da mora unija časnikarjev plačati denarno kazno \$500 zaradi žaljenja sodišča. Spoznal jo je za krivo krivnico in junkcije, katero je izdal sodnik Grover C. Niemeyer v zadnjem februarju. Ta prepovedanje piketiranja in nadlegovanje firm, ki oglašajo v Hearstovem listu. Unija vodi stavko proti Hearstu od zadnjega decembra. Odvetniški unije je namočil, da bo vložil priziv proti odločbi sodnika Lupeja.

Mož je bil ta dan v sejmu v Sezani, kjer je prodajal znane nanoške sajence za zelje. Baval se je za kupčijo že dolga leta in je bil znani kot prodajalec zlasti po Zgornjem Krasu. Kljub visoki starosti 81 let ni hotel opustiti svojega posla, ker je bil še čvrst in zdrav, in je tudi letos zopet krenil na kupčijo. Ko se je po omenjenega dne že vrnil domov in je hotel na dvorišču pred avo-vo jo hišo stopiti z voza, ga je zadela. To pa se jim ni posrečilo, temveč so bombe padle na Koroško Belo in zažgale nekaj hiš. Ker je takrat vladala velika suša in je bil močan veter, se je ogenj hitro razširil na ostale hiše. Vladalo pa je tudi pomanjkanje vode in tako so morali ljudje le gledati požar. Takrat je pogorelo 45 hiš z vsem imetjem vred.

Živa plamenica

Gorka, avgusta 1939. — V Morskem se je pretekli dni zgodila težka nesreča. Ko so avtomobilisti prevažali bencin, je 14-letni Josip Blažič z zanimanjem opazoval to delo. Nesreča je hotela, da je po nerodnosti prevrnil posodo z bencinom in se ves polil. Ker je kadil, se je kmalu vnela bencinska para ter nato še obleka. Na mah je bil ves v ognju. Prisotni so takoj pogasili ogenj in avtomobilisti so ga odpeljali v bolnišnico, kjer so ugotovili težke opekline po trebuhu in udih. Naslednjega dne je nesrečni deček v strašnih bolečinah umrl.

Tihotapci ranili finančnega stražnika

Ledine, avgusta 1939. — Blizu državne meje pri Ledinah je finančni stražnik M. Piva ponoči zaslišal sumljivo gibanje in govorjenje v gozdu. Ko se je približal, je počil strel in kroglja mu je šla tik čela. Začelo se je streljanje vseprek, dokler niso prišli drugi stražniki iz bližnje vojnice na pomoč. Med tem časom pa so tihotapci že izginili. Ko so preiskali gozd, so našli nekaj praznih revolverskih nabojev in več posod z živim srebrom ter lopato. Po vsem se zdi, da je moral biti kakih pet oseb, ki so hotele prekorčiti državno mejo z dragocenim blagom.

Iz Slovenije

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Trepča Mines Ltd. je angleška rudniška družba, ki ima svoj rudnik v Trepčah blizu Kosovske Mitrovice. Prizadetih je okoli 3000 delavcev, zapustiti morajo rudniška stanovanja, oni namočenci, ki imajo trimesečno odpoved, pa ostanejo do poteka pogodbe v obratu. Korak uprave rudnika Trepče pomeni hud udarec ne le za delavce, ampak za vso okolico. Stvar torej ni samo delavcev, ampak tudi širše javnosti, pa magari je družba ustavila obrat samo začasno.

Trepče Mines Ltd. je bila osnovana 1930. leta. Angleški kapital je vložil v cinkovi, svinčni in srebrni rudnik delniške glavnice 1,120,213 angleških funtov. Ker družba trdi, da ne more zvišati mezd, pogledimo, kakšne dobičke je imela v prvih osmih letih.

V osmih letih je družba zaslužila v teh rudnikih čiste dobičke 2,150,309 angleških funtov. V osmih letih je potemtakem znašal čisti dobiček družbe nedvomno več, ker se dobički v bilanci skrivajo, kakor dvakratni znesek vlozene glavnice. Obrestovanje kapitala, ki kapital v osmih letih dvakrat pomnoži, je prav dober verziški posel, ker pomeni najmanj 25 odst. obrestovanje.

Razprava v tej žalostni zadevi bi morala biti že 26. aprila, ko je bil obtožen je Janez Letonja. Na podlagi nekega anonimnega pisma, ki ga je prejelo državno tožilstvo v Mariboru, pa se je pokazalo, da je izvršil umor Jože Narat po naročilu in prigovarjanju Janeza Letonje. Razpravi je predsedoval dr. Cemer, prisodniki so bili dr. Senjor, dr. Kuder, Habermut in dr. Germovšek. Obtožbo je zastopal državni tožilec dr. Trampuš. Izmed devetih repatic, ki so jih odkrili letos, je bila za prsto oko vidna le repatica Jurja Ahmarov-Hassel ali 1939 d, in še ta le za kratak čas. Zgoraj imenovani repatici in repatici Kozik-Peltier se dajo za silo opazovati v vadmim daljnogledom, ostalih pet so ugotovile s pomočjo fotografije in zelo močnimi daljnogledi.

Vsako leto odkrijejo normalno 4 do 8 novih repatic. Da so jih letos odkrili več, gre lahko na račun res večjega števila repatic ali pa na natančnejšega opazovanja neba z modernimi opazovalnimi in iskalnimi pripomočki.

Ben Gittlow, ki je bil sedem let glavni tajnik — od 1922 do 1929 — komunistične stranke v Zdrženih državah in dvakrat kandidat za podpredsednika republike, torej visoka glava med komunisti, je 7. septembra 1939 izjavil pred Diesovim preiskovalnim odelkom v Washingtonu, da je komunistična stranka za časa njegovega tajnikovanja prejela od kominterne v Moskvi \$100,000 do \$150,000 vsako leto; to znači, da je prejela skupaj do malega milijon dolarjev v sedmih letih.

To pa še ni vse. The Daily Worker, glavno komunistično glasilo v Ameriki, je od leta 1924, ko je bil ustanovljen, prejemal letno \$35,000 od kominterne vsa leta, dokler je bil Gittlow tajnik — in najbrže prejema še danes.

Gittlow je dalje povedal, da so ameriški komunisti leta 1922 nakolektali milijon dolarjev za sestradane Ruse, ko je bila v Rusiji lakota, toda Rusi niso dobili niti enega centa! Kolikor ni denarja ostalo v Ameriki, je bil poslan v Francijo in tamkaj razdeljen med komunistične stranke raznih dežel za propagando.

Ko so ameriški komunisti v dvajsetih letih (1920-1939) vodili kampanjo proti Johnu Lewisu z namenom, da razbijejo rudarsko unijo UMWA, jim je kominterne dala za ta boj \$100,000, je dalje povedal Ben Gittlow. "Komunistična stranka upravičuje vsak zločin, ki ji pomaga njeni stvari," je izjavil Gittlow pred Diesovim odelkom. To pravi danes Gittlow, bivši socialist, ki je bil poleg Fosterja glavni voditelj komunistične stranke celih sedem let! Ali mislite, da ne ve, kaj govori? Kot bivši socialist je imel Gittlow še toliko poštenosti, da je pustil komunistično stranko, ko je spoznal do dna njene zločine.

Zakaj to pišemo? Zato, ker je SNPJ, posebno pa njeno glasilo Prosveta, že dvajset let tarča indirektnih in razbijajočih komunističnih propagand, dočim so nekateri gl. odborniki SNPJ tarča direktne in najnesrampejše iste propagande. Baš zadnje čase so slovenski službe Stalina obdolitve vsi gl. odbor SNPJ, da daje iz jednote blagajne plačo uredniku Proletarca — \$35 na teden — in to so zapisali v svojem glasilu brez najmanjše trohice kakšnega dokaza. Med tem pa izjavlja bivši komunistični vodja Gittlow, da je The Daily Worker, glavno komunistično glasilo v Ameriki, sedem let prejemal \$35,000 iz Moskve — in najbrže še prejema!

Iz tega lahko vidite koliko smete verjeti komunistom, koliko jim smete zaupati, kadar kaj kolektajo — kolektajo pa zmirom, kakor cigani, za vse mogoče reči. Radovedni smo koliko so res dobili španski lojalisti od vseh onih kolekt, ki so jih kontrolirali komunisti v Ameriki...

Taktika komunistov zdaj je, da se zavrtajo v vsako delavsko unijo in vsako drugo organizacijo, o kateri mislijo, da jo lahko izkoriščajo zase. 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Moji vtisi s pota in s proslave v Penni

V. Cankar, gl. predsednik

Ko sem se zadnjič poslavljaval od naših ljudi v zapadni Penni, je več članov izrazilo željo, da bi kaj napisal v Prosveti o svojih vtisih med njimi, zlasti pa so želeli, da bi malo opisal potek slavnosti 35-letnice, ki se je vršila 19. in 20. avgusta v Mason-townu pod pokroviteljstvom federacije naših društev v okraju Fayette in Green. Razume se, da sem jim moral objubiti in storiti bi rad to še prej, pa mi vsled drugih nujnih opravkov, ki sem jih imel med tem, skoraj ni bilo mogoče priti do tega. Prizadei naj mi torej oprostite, če sem nekoliko pozen.

Moja pot iz Chicaga sicer ni bila naravnost v Pennsylvanijo, pač pa sem se moral poprej ustaviti v Detroitu. Glavni odbor je na svojem polletnem zborovanju zaključil, da se z gl. nadzornikom Milanom Medvedom udeleživa letne konvencije organizacije National Fraternal Congress, ki se je tam vršila vse prejšnji teden. Iz Detroita sem krenil še le proti Penni in ker je moja pot vodila skozi državo Ohio ter skoraj tik Clevelanda, sem se odločil, da se spomota ustavim še v naši slovenski metropoli v Ameriki, v glavnem pa, da si ogledam nov Slovenski dom, ki so si ga naši rojaki, živci na zapadni strani mesta, pred kratkem nabavili.

Veliko hvale sem že prej siljal o tem domu, zato me je še toliko bolj zanimalo in želel sem ga osebno videti. Nisem pa pričakoval, da bom tam našel toliko različnih in za nas pripravnih reči ter da se bo tudi meni izredno dopadlo. Znano mi je namreč, kako je običajno z našimi domovi po raznih naselbinah: štiri stene tvorijo dvorano za ples, pod dvorano pivnica in cela reč kje v strmini na skrajnem koncu mesta. Tukaj pa sem našel vse nekaj drugega. Dom Slovenca na zapadni strani Clevelanda sestoji iz več akrov po prijaznem hribočku se spenjajočega zemljišča v sredi naše naselbine. Zemljišče je zasajeno z zlahkimi drevmi in grmovjem, pod drevesi se zeleni domača kosena trava, ob potih in obronkih pa te pozdravljajo številne, prijazne se smehljajoče cvetice raznih vrst. Običajne dvorane ne vidiš, pač pa razna poslopja, ki so služila prejšnjemu bogatemu lastniku v razkošje in katera so naši predelali in spremenili tako, da jim služijo za zborovanje, za igre in zabave ter skoraj za vse potrebe naših društev. Izgleda skoraj tako, kot da je bilo tisto imetje ohranjeno neoparčeno in neporabljeno za stavbišča ali kake druge namene nalašč radi naših ljudi, oziroma da bo kdaj služilo potrebam našega družinskega življenja. In v resnici bo to lahko vzgledno narodno središče, samo če bo dovolj potrebnega razumevanja za stvar ter sloge in kooperacije med prizadetimi. Kolikor sem mogel razvideti, je vsa stvar pametno organizirana in poskrbljeno je tudi za potrebne dohodke, kar je seveda zelo važno. Vodstvo je v dobrih rokah in do sedaj so pokazali dovolj skupnosti in medsebojnega sodelovanja.

Iz Clevelanda sem jo ubral skozi Youngstown in pri East Liverpoolu preko reke Ohio v Chester, ki leži na severozapadnem repu države Zvezne Virginije, koder vodi glavna cesta in kmalu nato sem se že znašel v državi Pennsylvaniji. Svet po državi Ohio je večidel ravan in ceste so izvrstne, zato se lahko prevozi velika dajava v primeroma kratkem času. Toda, ko zapustiš Ohio in se prepelješ čez veliko reko, se začne pot čez tedanjen prihoda vedno stanova v Združenih državah in 3) da je dobrega moralnega značaja ter 4) da ni podvržen deportaciji.

Treba si je zapomniti, da novi zakon nikakor ne more pomagati onim, ki so prišli nezakonito od 1. julija 1924 naprej. Taki ljudje so in ostanejo podvrženi deportaciji, ako jih priseljeniška oblast zasači.—FLIS.

In kako so si oddahnili, ko se prikažejo na stopnicah pred dvorano golobučni France Barbič in njegovi sinovi s svojimi harmonikami in drugimi instrumenti, ki so jih prinesli s seboj. Ljudstvo bi menda ne pričakovalo bolj neestrno niti, če bi imel priti sam predsednik Zedinjenih držav. Vsaj tako je izgledalo. France in ostali člani njegovega orkestra so nato bili trajno središče vse večje pozornosti in zanimanja vse do polnoči ali doker nismo zaprli.

To je bilo v soboto zvečer. Prava slavnost s programom pa je bila določena za drugi dan ali nedeljo popoldne in zvečer. In tako je bilo. Zato naj zadostuje, če omenim, da je bilo zapisanih v programu 18 točk, v resnici pa predvajano precej več. Program je otvoril br. Dornik kot predsednik federacije s primernim nagovorom, nakar je izročil vodstvo br. Francetu Tomiču, ki je od mlade generacije. Spočetka je nastopal bolj boječe, potem mu je pa šlo zmeraj boljše in lepše in avojo nalogo je dobro izvršil. Sledili so govori ostalih odbornikov federacije in nekaterih društvenikov, ki so vsi dobro povedali. Marsikaj, kar smo slišali od njih, bi delalo čast izvešanemu govorniku. Tragična usoda ustvaritelja sovjetskega gledališča

Sfinga sovjetake Rusije ne preseneča sveta samo s političnimi, ampak tudi z umetniškimi procesi. Kakor zapadejo neandromorfi v nemilost še večerj vsemogočni sovjetski politiki, tako izginejo s površja lahko tudi najbolj slavljene umetniki. Dolga je vrsta imen slavni pisateljev, pesnikov, slikarjev, igralcev itd., ki jih je doletela nepričakovana usoda: bili so izločeni iz sovjetake skupnosti, nekateri pa celo tudi zaprti ali usmrčeni. Sedaj se jim je pridružil še glavni predstavnik novega boljševskega gledališča, svetovno slavni režiser in igralec Vsevolod Majerhold. Pred nedavnim časom je bil Majerhold prijet in zaprt, nekaj dni nato so pa "neznanici" vrtili v stanovanje njegove žene Zinaide in jo umorili.

Vsevolod je pričel svojo umetniško pot za časa carske Rusije v znanem Moskovskem hudožestvenem teatru kot igralec. Polagoma se je pa ves posvetil režiji in postal eden izmed najbolj znanih in slavnihih ruskih režiserjev, daš je vzbujala njegova smer vedno veliko polemik za in proti. Po odhodu iz Moskovskega hudožestvenega teatra je deloval nekaj časa v gledališču genialne igralkice Vere Komisarževskaje, v katerem je prav 26. marca 1. 1917 pripravil premiero Lermontove drame "Maskarada", s katero se je končala za vselej zveza ruske carske rodovine z ruskim gledališčem. Naslednjega dne je bilo že konec carizma. Majerhold sam je po kratkem kolebanju prešel k boljševikom, ker je bil prepričan, da bo tako lahko do viška razvil svojo lastno smer, ki naj bi postala sploh smer nove sovjetske gledališke umetnosti. V tem se tedaj tudi res ni zmotil. Boljševizem, ki je iskal zlasti tudi v umetnosti svoj lastni "proletarski" in "kollektivistični" izraz, je razglasil Majerholdovo sceno za uradno sovjetsko gledališče in njegovo smer nove vladavine.

Sovjetska vlada je Majerholda moralno in stvarno podpirala in mu tako omogočila največji razmah. Sama ga je poslala z njegovo igralsko skupino vred celo na gostovanje v tujino, da bi pokazala viašno in smer nove ruske boljševiške umetnosti buržujskemu svetu. Ta gostovanja tudi res niso ostala brez nasledkov. Skoraj pri vseh evropskih narodih, posebno pa pri Nemcih in pozneje Čehih, se je pojavilo več gledaliških avantgardistov, ki so skušali posnemati Majerholdovo umetnost. Zlasti vnet njegov posnemovalec je postal znani nem-

ški levičarski režiser Piscator, katerega je postavila pozneje nacionalno-socialistična Nemčija na indeks kot propagatorja po židovstvu zasnovane "izrojene" umetnosti. Sovjetski dnevní in revialni tisk je slavil Vsevoloda Majerholda kot največjega graditelja nove boljševiške umetnosti. O njem in njegovem delu je bilo napisanih in izdanih nešteto studij. Mladi ruski boljševiški režiseri in igralci svet je naravnost tekmoval, kako bi posnemal Majerholda in se mu najbolj približal.

Dvajset let je trajala ta velika Majerholdova moč in slava, nato je pa pričela naenkrat ugastati. Boljševiška umetnost je pričela na celi črti zapuščati prvotne novotarje in iskati poti nazaj k predboljševiškim ruskim tradicijam. Dotedanjo uradno boljševiško umetnost so pričeli sami boljševiki napadati in odklanjati na podoben način, kakor nemški nacionalni socialisti "izrojeno" umetnost. Lotili so se tudi Majerholda in njegovega gledališča. O njem je bilo vedno manj glasov in nazadnje se njegovo ime sploh ni več omenjalo. Na letošnji pomladanski konferenci sovjetskih voditeljev gledališč in režiserjev je A. Višinskiji odkrito napadel Majerholda in mu očital zablodo. Majerhold sam je moral "priznati", da trdi Višinskiji resnico. "Obžaloval" je, da je toliko časa taval v zmoti in a tem toliko škodoval sovjetskemu gledališču.

Njegovo gledališče so nato zaprli in — kakor smo že omenili — te dni so zaprli še njega. Zakaj? Teža doslej še ni bilo mogoče izvedeti. Po vsej verjetnosti ga dolže protiboljševizma. Tako žre boljševiška revolucija nenemoma dalje svoje prve silnove. —r.

Po novem zakonu je omogočeno iznozemcem, ki so prišli v Združene države, med dnem 3. junija 1921 in dnem 1. julija 1924, ali o zakoniti pripustitvi onih, o katerih ni najti nikakega zapiska, da smejo legalizirati svoje bivanje v tej deželi. Do sedaj so mogli legalizirati svoje bivanje le oni iznozemci, ki so prišli do 3. junija 1921. Ako je iznozemec prišel nezakonito, oziroma ako ni najti zapiska o njem v priseljeniških spisih, more zaprositi za legalizacijo na tak način, da mu oblast izda spričevalo o registraciji "certificate of registry". Ko si to priskrbi, more zaprositi za državijske papirje.

Inozemci, ki so prišli nezakonito pred 1. julijem 1924, niso sicer podvrženi deportaciji radi nezakonitega bivanja, ali niso mogli do sedaj urediti svojega stanja, ako so prišli po 3. juniju 1921. Sedaj pa to morejo.

As the big capitalist nations of Europe go to war to butcher countless hundreds of thousands of men, women and children, we recall the sayings of Gene Debs who dared to speak out against the horrors of the last war and who was put in jail because he dared to tell the truth that the last world war was ironically waged

to "save the world for democracy," was waged principally as a commercial war. No one but the rich benefited from the struggle. Ten million good people were killed in the war and millions of others like you and I have suffered ever since. That is why we want to keep America out of this war now being waged again "to save democracy." It was the ruling financiers of England who put Hitler in power. We knew that and fought against Hitler all the while and now that he has gotten out of their control, they have had to declare a war and they will kill millions of innocent souls to satisfy their greed for money and power.

Gene Debs said, "I know that it is the ruling classes that make war upon one another, and not the people. In all the history of this world, the people have never yet declared war. Not once. I do not believe that really civilized nations would murder one another. I would refuse to kill a human being on my own account. Why should I at the command of anyone else, or at the command of any power of earth?"

With the coming of war, the voice of the Socialists will be heard more and more because Socialism means, "A coming phase of civilization, next in order to the present one, in which the collective people will own and operate the sources and means of wealth production, in which all will have equal rights to work and all will cooperate together in producing wealth and all will enjoy the fruit of their collective labor."

At the National SNPJ Day celebration in La Salle, Professor Maynard C. Krueger elucidated that we have nothing to gain from war. Our problem is to solve the unemployment question by building and manufacturing and otherwise producing things which can be useful to humanity rather than weapons of destruction. He made it plain that the war now being waged to get rid of Hitler can only bring on added burdens and hardships and that unless the problem of unemployment is tackled properly, we stand at the brink of Fascism in America. Last Sunday Professor Krueger was again on the National Broadcasting Company's network with the U. of C. Round Table discussion. Here he again repeated some very pertinent questions and emphasized the necessity for keeping America out of war. Professor Krueger has been on the network many times. In fact, he has been on the air two Sundays in succession now.

In Our Neighborhood

Last Sunday it was the Poles who staged a protest meeting against Nazi aggression into their homeland. They were joined by the Czechoslovaks, for whom protest meetings have become more or less the order of the day since the Czechoslovak sell-out last year and who in the common cause against the menace that threatens both peoples—and all peoples—have forgotten the grievance against the Poles who snatched their little bite, while the grabbing was good, from Czechoslovakia last year. Which is as it should be.

But more and more as these mass demonstrations take place for the defense of liberty abroad, and while they are an excellent reaffirmation of the desire for democracy among all peoples, it seems that we should begin more and more to probe deeper and deeper into the causes of our own canker sores right here and now.

The NOW is the most important thing. For if dictatorships, which we abhor and cannot permit to flourish if mankind is to survive, have established themselves there must have been very definite causes which nurtured them. And these causes we have aplenty HERE AND NOW.

Why don't we, for instance, not only stage a protest but follow it up with some form of action to prevent further occurrences of incidents like this: The Nation reports that "On August 11, in New Jersey, seven Negroes, migratory workers in the potato-growing region near Cranbury, were awakened in the middle of the night by a gang of fifteen masked whites. The cabin in which they were living was wrecked and its seven occupants were routed out. All were stripped naked; two of them, a man and his wife, were carried four miles and then covered with white enamel which was beaten into their bodies with a rubber hose. They were told to 'head South'."

Why don't we look into the plight of the California fruit pickers, so admirably documented by John Steinbeck in "Grapes of Wrath"? Are the methods used by the deputies against the "Okie" driven off of their land and enticed by false circulars to migrate to California any different from the foreign fascist methods of plunder?

Can we afford to close our eyes to conditions that exist in the "deep South" while we take time only to deplore the messy state of European politics?

Can we pass up the crime not only against those involved but against the whole nation of San Antonio peacemakers, working for 5 cents an hour or less, and many of them syphilitic cases as reported in a recent article of the "Forum" magazine—"San Antonio, Shame of Texas."

How can those so enthusiastic about helping out the foreign powers to trample fascism on the slogan "Fight for Fascism" close their eyes to the very conditions in their own country that are leading straight to fascism, just because their emotions have been aroused by propaganda of the warmongers?

How much right have we to point our fingers at any foreign power? How much are we doing to fight the menace within our own borders?

"Our neighborhood" embraces all peoples with all their nationalities and customs and hopes and errors. But "our neighborhood" is also made up of units. And only good, healthy units can make up a good, healthy whole.
