Na ovoj sudbenoj parnici je bilo 47 svjedoka od strane države Michigan, dok su oko 20 imali optuženi. Taj proces je trajao cijelo sedmicu dana od 9.30 do negda i 10.30 na večer. 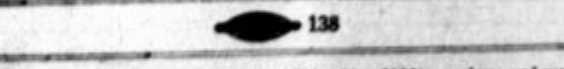

toda kaj pomagajo najboljši zdravniki in bol-
ničarke, če pa nimajo najboljših pripomočkov.
Poslopja so moderna, toda stene so umazane,
sobe z bolniki so polne mrčesa, stenice in druge
nennage, radiatorji puščajo vodo, da teče v po-
tokih po sobah in oprema v oddelkih za ope-
racije in ostalo kirurško službo so še iz pre-
jšnjega stoletja!

Samo kratek citat iz Smithovega poročila
nam lahko poda vso mizerijo tega velikega
zavoda:

"V okrajni bolnišnici je oddelek za zdrav-
ljenje raka, ali oprema v tem oddelku je še iz
dobe volovskega voza in prostora za bolnike je
tako malo, da morajo na stotine bolnikov po-
slati proč. Rak je ozdravljiv, če se zdravi pra-
vočasno, ali kaj naj stori revež, ki nima denarja
za privatno bolnišnico, v javni bolnišnici mu
pa rečejo: Ne moremo te vzeti, ker imamo pre-
več bolnikov!"

Bolnišnica je prenatrpana, tako da bolniki
in zdravniki dobesedno gaziijo drug po dru-
gem. Pravilna postrežba v taki gneči je ne-
mogoča in zdravljenje se vrši z največjo na-
glico. Bolniki tudi ne dobe prave in zadostne
hrane. In bolniki so "zdravi" in poslani do-
mov, ko so še napol bolni — samo da naredo
prostor novim trumam bolnikov, ki prihajajo
dan za dnevom.

Zakaj so takšne razmere? Zato, ker ni do-
volj — denarja. Zavod se vzdržuje z javnimi
dohodki iz davkov — in teh ni nikdar dovolj.
To je politična institucija in vodstvo mora gle-
dati, da ne dela preveč stroškov, da varčuje.
So tudi diskriminacije. Ljudje, ki imajo v vla-
dajoči mestni mašini prijatelje, so dobro po-
streženi — čeprav bi morda zmogli zdravljenje
v privatnem zavodu — reveži pa, ki nimajo ni-
kjer političnega "pulla" pri vladajoči kliski, so
na vsem prikrajšani.

Končno je še nekaj, kar je v navadi po vsej
Ameriki. Javne institucije se zanemarjajo z
nekakšno naslado v prid privatnim instituci-
jam. Javni zavodi so "pankrti", ki nalašč ne
sme pokazati napredka in za nobeno ceno ne
sme nadkriliti silnega slovesa privatnih zavodov!
Javni zavodi so nekakšno zlo, ki ne sme
živeti ne umreti, le životariti!

Dr. Morris Fishbein, vodja zdravniške orga-
nizacije American Medical Association, je pred
nekaj dnevi grmel v radiu proti — socializira-
ni medicini. Rekel je, da ameriška privatna
medicina stoji visoko nad vsemi deželami na
svetu, v katerih so zdravniki pod državno kon-
trollo.

Dr. Fishbein seveda ni povedal, da privatna
medicina služi le bogatim in da je v Zdrže-
nih državah na milijone ljudi, ki si ne morejo
privoščiti zdravil in v javnih bolnišnicah ne
najdejo prostora niti poštene postrežbe. Javne
bolnišnice ne smejo dobiti toliko denarja, da bi
se lahko opremlje z najmodernejšimi pripo-
močki in najboljšimi zdravniškimi štabi, ker
potem bi nadkrilile privatne bolnišnice.

Javne bolnišnice v Ameriki morajo biti mi-
zerne in vsestransko zanemarjene, da potem
lahko razni Fishbeini kažejo s prstom nanje,
češ, poglejte, kako zanikrna je javna medicina!

Politični in socialni zločini, ki jih počenja
ameriški bogataški razred, smrde do sonca.
Ameriška medicina s svojim ogromnim in naj-
modernejšim aparatom in s svojim največjim
osebjem na svetu — okrog 130.000 zdravnikov
in 300.000 bolničark — bi lahko služila vsemu
amerškemu ljudstvu na vsej črti, ako bi bila
socializirana in tako organizirana, da bi služila
le zdravju. Namesto tega ta medicina v privat-
nih rokah služi le — boleznim, hoče imeti le
bolnike in dosti bolnikov, da si kuje denar iz
bolnih ljudi. Rezultat tega nečloveškega siste-
ma je, da je na tisoče zdravnikov brez dela in
na milijone bolnih siromakov brez zdravnika.
Dol z nečloveškim, zverskim sistemom!

Več inozemcev išče držav- ljanstvo

V svojem letnem poročilu za fiskalno leto
1935 komisar za imigracijo in naturalizacijo
Daniel W. MacCormack poudarja znaten po-
višek v številu inozemcev, ki so zaprosili za
državljanstvo papirje. V fiskalnem letu, ki se
je končalo dne 30. junija 1935, je bilo izdanih
136.524 "prvih papirjev" napram 108.079 v l.
1934 in 83.046 v l. 1933.

V letu 1935 je bilo vloženih 131.000 proš-
en za "drugi papir", t. j. za naturalizacijo in
118.945 inozemcem je bilo podeljeno ameriško
državljanstvo. Odbitih prošelj je bilo 2763.
Sodišča so razveljavila 864 državljanskih pa-
pirjev in skoraj polovica teh je bila pridobi-
la na goljufiv način. Vsled investigacije,
vedene v New Yorku, so bile razkrinkane sa-
tematične goljufije v imigracijskih in natu-
ralizacijskih slučajih. Visoke vsote so bile iz-
dane za krive priče in za ponarejanje zapisov
o prihodu s strani raketirjev, ki so delali v
zvezi s federalnimi uradniki. Investigacija je
dovedla do 424 aretacij in 83 deportacij.
Mnogo državljanskih papirjev je bilo razve-
ljavljenih in 29 federalnih uradnikov je bilo
postavljeno pod obtožbo.

V zvezi z agitacijo proti inozemcem, ki se
izvaja v tej deželi, komisar MacCormack zopet
poudarja, da podlaga teh napadov tvorijo naj-
bolj fantastična pretiravanja. Navadni Ame-
rikanec, ki ni poučen o stvari, si predstavlja,
da inozemci kar trumoma prihajajo v to de-
želo, in zato veruje v vse pretirane trditve, ki
jih sliši. Dejanjski pa je število priseljencev
skoraj brezpomembno. Od l. 1931 je več ino-
zemcev zapustilo Združene države vsako leto
kot jih je pa prišlo. Ni res, da imamo 20 mi-
lijonov inozemcev, kot nekateri demagogi trdi-
jo, marveč le približno pet milijonov. Pribli-
žno 1.500.000 pa je dobilo "prvi papir" direk-
no ali potom staršev.—FLIS.

Editorial Notes

New Candidates

It should be understood at the outset that we are not referring to any political candidates, although particularly at this moment that would not be amiss. We are speaking of new candidates or applicants eligible for membership in the Slovene National Benefit Society.

The by-laws of the Society, in section 1 of article 22, regarding the eligibility for membership, state the following requirements:

"Any male or female person of good character, and speaking one of the Slavic languages, or is descendant of the Slavic race, not below the age of 16 nor above the age of 50 years, may be admitted to membership in the Slovene National Benefit Society. In case one of a married couple is able to speak any Slavic language, they may both become members, as may their sons and daughters also. In special cases the Administrative Committee shall have the power to decide upon admission into membership of persons not of Slavic origin. The members of the SNPJ Juvenile Department from 16 to 18 years of age and who are in good health shall be admitted to membership with full rights and duties and may become insured up to the amount of \$500 death benefit and \$1 sick benefit without medical examination. A member of the Juvenile Department who is ill at the time of his entry into the Adult Department, may be insured for death benefit only to the amount of \$500; he may become insured for sick benefit when medical examination shows he has thoroughly recovered."

Required Qualifications

Section 2 of the same article states in part that the following requirements be observed:

"Any applicant who possesses the required qualifications may be proposed for membership at a regular meeting by a member in good standing, who has known the applicant for at least three months, and the proposal shall likewise be seconded by a member in good standing. The branch president shall then appoint a committee . . . and the applicant and the committee shall be responsible for all the statements . . . This provision shall apply unconditionally for all applicants."

Section 3 of the same article reads: "The medical examination shall be witnessed by the appointed committee whose duty it shall be to see that the applicant truthfully answers all questions asked. If the examination physician is lax in conducting the examination the branch shall call his attention thereto, and if he fails to comply with the notice, the Supreme secretary shall employ the services of another physician. Every applicant shall be medically examined within thirty days from the date of the proposal for membership at the branch meeting; if he is not examined within the specified time, the proposal shall be null and void, but such applicant may be proposed anew and he shall wait another period of thirty days for the vote upon his admission."

Admission of Juveniles

The by-laws of the Juvenile Department of the Slovene National Benefit Society have the following provisions:

"The Slovene National Benefit Society shall admit children into its membership, the Juvenile Department, and the Juvenile fund and the entire management of this department shall be maintained separately from that of the Adult Department."

"Children between the ages of six months and sixteen years may be admitted as members of the Juvenile Department. Admission shall be granted upon application of the parents or relative of the child or by an adult upon whom the child is dependent for his support and who shall assume the responsibility of paying the monthly assessments regularly and vouch for all the statements on the application. Application for admission into the Juvenile Department shall be made only upon such forms as furnished by the Supreme Office and submitted at the Branch where the child shall be proposed by some member of the Branch . . . Every child must be medically examined and pronounced physically fit before he is admitted into the Society . . . Children with physical deformities or those designated 'fair' or 'doubtful' risk shall not be accepted into membership."

The above provisions, qualifications and requirements should be observed by every branch, its officers and members. It is only at rare intervals that we speak of these requirements in these columns, taking it for granted that the membership and particularly lodge officers are sufficiently acquainted with them. Every organization has its rules and regulations by which its members must guide themselves. Read the by-laws for further particulars about these and other specifications important to every member and lodge. From time to time we shall deal with other sections of the by-laws. Get your copy of the by-laws from your branch secretary.

Whole Story of Fraternal Acts Cannot Be Told

Answers to the questionnaires on fraternal activities, sent out by the National Fraternal Congress, are being collected by the national secretary or other officer of the various societies. When this work is completed, it is believed it will be a most convincing answer to the question of why the fraternal benefit societies should not be classed with commercial life insurance organizations.

Complete as is the questionnaire to show what is being accomplished among the lodges in the way of material help and assistance, it cannot possibly tell the whole story. Nor could it all be told were twice the amount of effort spent on questions and answers. There are those little friendly acts, gentle thoughts of kindness and of love, that are extended to brothers and sisters in illness or distress, that never will find adequate expression in cold, black type.

As an example, we recently read in one society's magazine of the comments of some of the lodge members who have been devoting their time to answering the questionnaire for their subordinate body. One of these writes:

"I have carefully compiled this report, getting information from the recording secretary's books and the treasurer's books and my own books. The actual figures are correct but I really couldn't estimate the fraternal service given during the past four years, in dollars and cents. I made 488 personal calls myself in 1934 and as many in preceding years. Our officers have gone to the homes where there was death and helped the family with service and furnished automobiles for the funerals."

This was written by the financial secretary of a large woman's lodge, and no doubt expresses the feelings of many other lodge officials. Here is another excerpt from a letter received by this same society from another lodge official:

"Hope this report will help in its small way to fulfill the purpose for which it is given. It is hard to put down in cold figures the amount of love and fraternal spirit back of such figures, even though in some cases the figures are small."

These two reports are by no means exceptional, and are not reprinted as such, they but point to the vast amount of unwritten welfare work carried on by the fraternal lodges. They are not all in the strict sense of the word "charity" acts. They are done in the spirit of brotherly love and co-operation. They are of a wide range and diversification and include such kindly helps in time of accident or illness as helping a brother to complete his planting, harvesting his crops, building a barn or aiding in the "raising" of the same; replacing valued and much needed stock, such as a cow or horse, where the brother was without the necessary funds to do this. And so the story could be carried on to great length—true in every detail, with names and places if necessary.

But, unfortunately, these acts are chaptered from the unprinted story of fraternalism, and many, many of these demonstrations are locked inviolate within the hearts of the participants. Such praise for the lodge as can come from these acts must therefore be by word of mouth from the members. Therefore, every lodge member has a certain responsibility in referring to these good deeds of the lodge members whenever and wherever opportunities arise. One never knows when such fraternal seed will fall on fallow ground.

We Need a Party

Yukon, Pa.—A picket line in front of a factory, a WPA strike, a demonstration against Fascism or the organization of the unorganized, be it automobile workers in Detroit or tenant farmers in Arkansas, is met with the greatest resistance of Big Business and their watchdogs, the police, militia, thugs, etc. In the last few years workers have begun to see the necessity of political action.

Martial law by Democratic Gov. McNutt in four counties in Indiana, where the militia smashed picket lines, threw tear gas in Terre Haute; concentration camps for strikers in

Democratic Georgia for the first time in the U. S. A.; attempts to smash the Southern Tenant Farmers' Union in Sen. Robinson's Arkansas by evictions and terrorism; troops patrolling the Embarras under the General strike in Frisco under the Republican administration in that city; the dark days of '29 and '33 will be long remembered; the shooting of the veterans at Anacostia Flats in '32; jobless fighting evictions in Chicago; murdered miners and textile workers striking against starvation met with fire and sword; suppression of civil and trade union rights; graft and corruption, be it in the party of Mellon or Roosevelt, all this has spurred labor to political action. And nothing can stop

it. Growing out of the immediate needs of the people is a Farmer-Labor Party.

In Oregon and Connecticut, the state Federations of Labor are taking a referendum vote among their members on that question. Labor Party conferences are to be held in Illinois, South Dakota and Rhode Island, also in a number of cities in the New England states. In Toledo, Frisco and Detroit Labor Party candidates polled huge votes in the last elections. Whether a Farmer-Labor party will be organized and piece candidates in the presidential elections in '36, is doubtful. The sentiment for such a party has grown tremendously in the last few years,

especially in sections where labor disputes threatened to become bitter struggles.

A party rooted deeply in the elements whose political and economic interests are contrary to the group who control the financial, political and industrial life of the country, to my opinion, would be a Popular American form of a Political Front. It would be a blow against Fascism; it would strengthen the ranks of Organized Labor; it would be the dawn of the new era in the lives of the toilers either by Brown or by Victor Frank.
