Our Growth in August

Our Jubilee Campaign is a Successful Venture

It is gratifying to note that our Jubilee Membership Campaign is speeding along at a moderate pace and is steadily bringing up its production. Considering the adverse conditions, our campaign thus far has been a successful venture.

During the month of August, 263 new members joined the Slovene National Benefit Society—165 new adult members and 98 juveniles.

In the previous five months of the drive 1098 new adult members and 845 new juveniles joined the Society, or a total number, in that period, of 1853 new members in both departments.

The total gain in membership during the first six months of our national campaign, ending August 31, netted a total number of 2116 new adult and juvenile members.

Lodges 106 and 716 of Imperial, Pa., take first and second honors, respectively. Lodges reporting gains in procuring new juvenile members, are: No. 569, Fontana, Calif.; No. 49, Girard, O.; No. 16, Milwaukee, Wis., and No. 118, Pittsburgh, Pa.

The first and foremost thought in the minds of our loyal workers is and should be to show by actual figures their fraternal spirit and interest in the campaign and their organization. It is the united work of our faithful members that will bring the drive to a successful termination.

The first six months of the campaign were successful; more than two thousand new adult and juvenile members were secured in that period. Will the remaining period be as successful? There remain but three months in which to procure new members under the campaign provisions.

The NRA effectively organized industry through codes of "fair competition." so-called codes of fair competition authorized the various industries to go the limit in ing charges. Since April 15, 1933, the retail food chants have forced up food prices to 231 cent, according to the official report of the S. Bureau of Labor Statistics.

There is not a single industry in America which has increased its wage scales 15% instead of expanding employment most industries have curtailed it. Instead of short hours of employment to give work to more ple, most of the large industries have lengthened work hours and inaugurated speed and stretchout schedules of production.

If ever there was a need of organization all workers, it is now. With the cost of living on the increase and employment on the decrease the inevitable result should be applied to everyone, unless there is a militant campaign to increase wage scales. Only a legal union, backed by the economic strength of millions, can successfully cope with the needs of organized industry.

The trade union movement offers the hope of those who toil. And not until the workers are as strongly organized as are the employers will there ever be an adjustment is honest, human and worthwhile.—M. U.

"Pay-triotism" in Munitions

Again Andrew W. Mellon is in court for a charge of cheating on his income tax return. The last time it was a criminal action. time it is a civil suit. Mr. Mellon, as we says he is being persecuted. In 1931, right in the middle of the depression, Mr. Mellon reported that he had a income of \$10,890,485, but after his expert through presenting their claims for losses various kinds, he paid a tax on only \$1,927. He succeeded in dodging more than 80 per of the tax.

The government claims that his gross come was really \$15,951,568 and that he sh have paid on a net of \$13,482,660.
