Pri slovenskih farmarjih v New Yorku

Lepi travniki in livade, kolovoz ob robu gozdov in njive dišeče ajde, nadsev za ljubko, poznoletno solnce me je izvalilo iz hiše, da sem domalega ves popoldan potoval čez nezna-ne, domovine me spominjajoče hribe in doline. Kadar se je solnce malo preveč oprilejo zemlje, je zapihal izza javorjeve šume veter; kadar me je ušajala hoja po plati, sem stopil k robu gozda, sedel k robidnemu grmu in se nazobal plavočrtnih jagod. Da žajo čisto ohladim, sem se stopil skozi šumo, katere drugi kraj je že izdajalo modro nebo, prodirajoče vedno bolj skozi vejave. Na oni strani se ga tik do gozda strnišče po ovsu, dalje spodaj pa, za obronkom, se rdeči odcvetajoča ajda. Rume-ne alve in plave češplje so v obronku, farmarja pa nikjer, da bi se jih človek res lahko do-akode najdel.

Potekle so ure, popoldan se nagiba h kraju, treba bo torej domov. Da si poličem najbliž-je poti, mi bodo pokazali far-marji na onem koncu njiv. Rav-no so pripeljali govedo v hlev, torej so doma. Stopajo mimo jablan sem razmišljal, da-li bi jih obgovoril po naše; kajti ro-jaki so mi pripovedovali, da tod živijo največ slovenski farmar-ji. Prišedši do stajne sem postal, da od razgovarjačih na dvori-šču ujamem kakšno besedo in se po tem ravnam. Naši so bili. Ujel sem namreč zanimiv "slo-venski" razgovor:

"Žan je sik. Ti bo pa Majk helpov sajlo nafilat. Jaz bi ti šur kaj pofiksov, pa sem sam bizl, ker ona hodi včas bejbite k Meri in pa da jim kaj poklina in haus kipa..."

Ne bilo bi lepo dolgo priu-škovati, ker to so čisto osebne stvari naših farmarjev v New Yorku, ki niti mene niti čitate-lja ne smejo brigati. Samo to-liko sem poslušal, da uganem govorico, kar pa ni bilo baš lah-ko, vzlic glasnemu in različne-mu govorjenju. Približam se jima torej in ju povprašam:

"Kateri rot..."

Soseda me gledata. Presene-til sem ju z vprašanjem, ker me ne poznata. Iz hleva pristopi-še gospodinja, ki se je baš pri-pravila za mleko in pomila po-sodo za mleko. Val mi dopove-dujejo, kod naj grem, da bom prej doma; pravzaprav pa da se mi ne mudi in da sem lahko z njimi nekaj časa, da se kaj po-govorimo. Odkod si in po kaj prihajaš, so prva vprašanja, na-to se razvije zaupen pomenek, kakršen je znan le med kmeti v domovini. Gospodinja prinese lepih pisanih jabol in drugega sadja, gospodar pa mi ponuja čistega lankega mošta. Nihče nima sicer veliko časa, kajti po-gospodinjiti je treba; nakrmiti živino in pomoliti, pogledati v avinjak, kjer se je baš skotilo ducat pisanih pujskov, dati ko-ruze in ajde perjadi; lačni so otroci in čakajo vsak svojo de-la. Teško jim je, da ni več ča-sa in tudi meni je težko, da mo-ram oditi: toda dogovorili smo se, da se snidemo zvečer in se kaj več razgovorimo.

S kolovozu, ki je od obeh strani zakrit z živim plotom, se

zdajci začuje peket in ropot. Staromodni "buggy" je in na njem sedi sključen starček a povešenim bičem v roki.

Možič uljudno pozdravlja; po-vpraša, kako kaj režejo novi no-ži za sekanje koruze, in ne da bi čakal odgovora, se ozre po meni, ko se pripravljam na odhod: Hočem li prisesti?

Seveda! Mož si zadovoljno nabese novega čika, za spozna-nje dvigne bič in kobilica poteg-ne. "Odkod prihajaš?" me vpraša mož.

"Iz Chicaga." — "Iz Chicaga? — Ali bo zmagal Hoover?"

Zdi se mi, da z enim očesom gleda kobilico, z drugim mene. Moču se pozna, da je navdušen republikanec, ki ne pričakuje, da bi mu ugovarjal.

Slovenskim farmarjem v New Yorku se ni treba bati, da bi jim zmanjkalo dela in se jim tu-di ni treba bati, da bi jim nedo-stajalo ječa. Največ se ukvar-jajo z mlekarstvom in polja ob-delujejo le za pridelovanje kr-me, katere je treba včasih še dokupovati. Med njimi je tudi nekaj kokoferejcev, tupatam čebelar, toda glavno je sanje mlekarstvo, ki prinaša stalen dohodek. Seveda pridelajo tu-di krompirja za dom in za trg ter raznih zelenjav.

Živine imajo po dvesto do štirideset, ali tudi več ali manj. Čez dan se živina pase — saj paze je dovolj — zvečer pa jo odženejo v hleve, ki so pri slo-venških farmarjih skoro dole-dno vzor snage in lepega reda. Molezje ne samo moški, kakor je običajno pri Amerikancih, temveč tudi ženske; včasih kar val v družini, ker je to tudi po-trebno, posebno če si še niso preskrbeli molskega stroja, ki pa se ga Slovenci odkraja bran-ijo, ker ne verjamejo, da bi mogli opraviti tako dobro delo kot ga opravijo roke. V jutra-njih urah pa, ko se glase prvi petelini, odvažajo poleti mleko na tovornih avtomobilih v me-sta in na postaje, da ga vlaki takoj odpeljejo v par sto milj oddaljeni New York ali v tovar-ne za sir. Iskupček pride v obračunom koncem meseca; včasih je precej težak, kar pač odvi-si od krme, kajti — slovenski farmarji v New Yorku še niso pozabili — krava pri gobcu mol-ze.

Včinoma vsi imajo precej velike družine. To so največ že po rodu kmetovalci, ki so prišli s kmetiji v domovini, in so se leta in leta ukvarjali po rudni-kah ali po tovarnah v ameriških mestih, a so se končno naselili na farme, kjer so po prestalih prvih letih trdega boja postali precej neodvisni in so dandanes zadovoljni bolj kot mogoče kate-rakoli slovenska kolonija v A-meriki. Njih kraji so lepi in prijazni, zemlja rodovitna in voda dobra. Zato le smigajo z glavo, če jih kdo vpraša, da-li se bodo še odselili od tam. Na-stanili so se za stalno.

Editorially Speaking

Freedom. We have not stressed strongly enough the fact that the Slovene national benefit society is founded on a free thought basis, and that this basis, as provided in its by-laws, must remain unchanged, unless decided otherwise. Any such change must come through democratic procedure, by a three-fourths majority vote of all delegates and members of the supreme board present at three consecutive regular conventions of the Society, or by a three-fourths majority vote cast by the members at three consecutive referendums, with the provision that there shall elapse a three year interval between such referendums. These provisions in the by-laws of the Slovene national benefit society are plain and easily comprehensible; they are straightforward statements.

An article which appeared in last week's issue of the Prosveta, however, purports an idea contrary to the declaration of principles as found in the by-laws of the Slovene national benefit society. It occurs quite often, it seems, that members are wrongly informed, intentionally or otherwise, and are misled, instead of enlightened on the subject. They would do well, whenever any doubt enters into their minds, if they would resort to and consult, first of all, the right source, the Society's by-laws, for any matter pertaining to subordinate lodges and their membership.

It is stated quite clearly in the organization's by-laws, what qualifications one must have in order that he may become a member, as well as what responsibilities he will have upon becoming a member of the

Slovene national benefit society. Therefore, there should not exist any vagueness about the validity, rights and duties of the members.

The Slovene national benefit society offers to its members freedom of thought. That is as liberal as any similar society can offer, and as democratic, as well as plainly stated, as any other organization is offering today. No restrictions are made in the by-laws with the intention of limiting anybody's personal beliefs. Our by-laws guarantee absolute freedom; you may do as you please, as long as you abide by the by-laws of the Order. The Society insures to its members personal freedom of religious, philosophical, ethical and political creeds. In other words, the Society does not interfere with one's personal beliefs, and, of course, its subordinate lodges must likewise abide by the by-laws of the Society.

Further object of the Society is to enlighten its members culturally by awakening in them a real sense of democracy and by education on the basis of its principles, as stated in the first sentence of the Declaration of Principles, resolutions, and other provisions passed by the conventions, referendums and by the supreme board.

The founders of the Slovene national benefit society were in the beginning well aware of the fact and significance of these principles, for they knew that an organization founded on so solid a ground, is bound to prosper. They knew that limitations, dogmas, and interference of personal beliefs do not have any place in a well organized order, such as the Slovene national benefit society.

By Fanny S. Copeland. Sibenik comes third among the Adriatic harbor towns. There is a family likeness between all these cities. The houses are very tall, and there are no streets, only narrow alleys which keep cool as cellars in summer and afford shelter from the strong Dalmatian winds. In Sibenik I could not even discover street names. But there is a big square by the quay, and a wide avenue at the other end of the town which serves as market place.

There was a Zrinjaki who had a hunting-lodge for killing turks, for all the world as if they had been grouse. And there was that other Ban Nikola Zrinjaki who defended Saiget against Soliman the Magnificent, till the mighty Sultan died of sheer vexation at his failure to storm the little fortress with its small garrison of frontier Croats.

After Soliman's death Saiget was indeed taken—a kind of propitiatory offering to his manes—and the Christian defenders perished to a man. The German poet Koerner wrote a somewhat juvenile drama in verse on the subject (of course he believed the Croats to have been Magyars), and the Croatian composer Zajc used Koerner's text for an opera, The Zrinjaki March, which you are sure to hear at least once during your visit to Jugoslavia, is the best bit out of it.
