— PREGLED NAJVAŽNEJŠIH DOGODKOV —

— Te vesti so bile pripravljene v četrtek popoldne —

Reagan branil svoj dolgoročni program za modernizacijo ameriških obrambnih sil — Kmalu bo objavil predlog za reformo davkov

ANNAPOLIS, Md. — Preteklo sredo se je predsednik Reagan udeležil slavlja na tukajšnji vojaški mornariški šoli, ko je prejelo diplomu 1.032 graduantov oziroma novih mornariških častnikov. V svojem govoru je Reagan odločno branil dolgoročni program moderniziranja ameriških obrambnih sil, ki ga mnogi v Kongresu kritizirajo. Slišali boste, je dejal Reagan, da so stroški previsoki, da je breme na davkoplačevalce prehudo. Jaz pa trdim, je nadaljeval predsednik, da bi ZDA preveč stalo, ako ne bi bile pripravljene učinkovito in uspešno kljubovati vsakemu možnemu nasprotniku. Mir lahko branimo le, če so ZDA močne. Mladi oficirji in njih družine so Reagana nagradili z navdušenim aplavzom.

Prihodnji teden bo predsednik objavil svoj osnutek za temeljito reformo davčnega sistema. Namen osnutka je doseči pravičnejši obdavčevalni sistem. Kot kaže, bodo dohodki zvezne vlade ostali na isti ravni kot sedaj, nekatera podjetja in posamezniki bodo pa več plačevali, drugi pa manj. Tudi v zveznem kongresu je več načrtov za spremembo davčnega sistema. Tako Reaganova administracija kot zvezni kongres sta pripravljena o nujnosti davčne reforme, nista pa čana o nujnosti davčne reforme, nista pa enotnega mnenja glede podrobnosti. Zaradi tega bo razprava v kongresu dolgotrajna, kongresni opazovalci pa menijo, da letos najbrž ne bo sprejeta in od predsednika Reagana podpisana nobena od predlaganih načrtov.

Aretiran je 22-letni mornar na letalonosilki Nimitz Michael Walter — Njegov oče že v priporu — Vohunila naj bi za ZSSR

WASHINGTON, D.C. — V sredo je bil na letalonosilki Nimitz aretiran mornar Michael Walker in obtožen vohunjenja za ZSSR. Pri Walkerjevi postelji so mornariški policaji našli zaboj, v katerem je bilo veliko strogo tajnih dokumentov in fotografij. Zaboj je baje tehtal kar 15 funtov. Pretekli ponedeljek so agenti FBI aretirali Walkerjevega 47 let starega očeta in tudi njega obtožili vohunjenja za ZSSR. Kot kaže je oče, John Walker, vohunil za Sovjete celih 18 let, torej tudi v času, ko je sam služil v ameriški bojni mornarici in to nekaj let na podmornicah na jedrski pogon.

Zanesljivi podatki o vohunski aferi so skopi, vendar vse kaže, da je bilo vohunjenje družinska zadeva oziroma, da sta bila vpletena le oče in sin. Po nekaterih vesteh sta Johna Walkerja prijavi FBI celo njegova žena in hčerka.

Dobro poučeni viri v Pentagonu vedo povedati novinarjem, da je bilo kompromitiranih veliko zaupnih podatkov predvsem glede ameriškega znanja o premikih sovjetskih bojnih in tovornih ladij po Sredozemskem morju. John Walker st. naj bi svoj čas precej vedel tudi o postopku, po katerem bi ZDA iz jedrskih podmornic izstrelile medcelinske rakete zoper ZSSR. Tako oče kot sin sta bila strokovnjaka za komunikacijo in kot sta bila imela dostop do tajnih šifer. V Pentagonu pa poudarjajo, da so šifre zamenjane skoraj dnevno in so podatki o teh, ki sta jih mogla posredovati Walkerjeva, kmalu zastarali. Isto naj bi veljalo za podatke glede premikov sovjetskih ladij itd.

Bombna eksplozija v Bejrutu ubila najmanj 60 oseb, ranila pa več kot 200 — Srditi boji med muslimanskimi skupinami samimi

BEJRUT, Libanon — V sredo je v ulici v vzhodnem, krščanskem delu Bejruta eksplodirala bomba, ki je povzročila strašno razdejnanje. V eksploziji je bilo ubitih več kot 60 oseb, več kot 200 jih je pa bilo ranjenih. Med žrtvami je veliko otrok, ker je prišlo do eksplozije zelo blizu šole, ki so jo prav v tistem trenutku zapuščali učenci. Bomba je bila v avtomobilu in je bil ubit sam voznik. Radi tega menijo preiskovalci, da je bomba predčasno eksplodirala. Nobena organizacija še ni prevzela odgovornosti za eksplozijo.

Še vedno potekajo srditi boji med močno oboroženimi muslimanskimi milicami. Na eni strani so pripadniki šiitskega Amal gibanja, na drugi pa Palestinci, ki so menda povezani s PLO. Šiiti nasprotujejo vrnitvi v Bejrut in okolico PLO enot. Kot kaže, imajo Amal borci prednost v bojih, ki se bijejo večinoma v palestinskih begunskih taboriščih in naselbinah. Radi vedno večje anarhije in ubijanja, so vedno glasnejši klici, naj intervenira sirska vojska in napravi red. V neprestanih bojih od nedelje je po nepotrejenih vesteh padlo najmanj 200 oseb, do 1000 jih je pa ranjenih. Med ubitimi in ranjenimi prevladujejo, kot vedno, civilisti.

Indijski premier Radživ Gandhi podpisal več sporazumov z ZSSR — Sovjeti želijo obdržati tesne odnose z Indijo

MOSKVA, ZSSR — Ta teden se je mudil na uradnem obisku v ZSSR indijski predsednik vlade Radživ Gandhi. Gre za prvi obisk v tujino Gandhija od oktobra lani, ko je prevzel dolžnosti po atentatu na njegovi materi Indiri Gandhi. Pod vodstvom Indire Gandhi je bila Indija navezala zelo tesne gospodarske in politične odnose s Sovjetsko zvezo, očitno pa je, da želijo Sovjeti to prijateljstvo ohraniti. Radživ Gandhi je namreč v prvih mesecih svojega vladanja kazal več zanimanja za kapitalistično usmerjeno ekonomsko prakso kot je kdaj kazala Indira Gandhi.

V Kremlju sta Radživ Gandhi in sovjetski voditelj Mihail S. Gorbačov podpisala vrsto sporazumov, po katerih bo ZSSR odobrila 1,2 milijarde dolarjev kreditov Indiji.

V prihodnjem namerava Gandhi obiskati tudi ZDA.

San Salvador, El Sal. — El Salvadorska vojska je sporočila, da namerava začeti z novo ofenzivo zoper gverilce. V zadnjem času je vojska namreč odkrila in zaplenila 3 velika skladišča orožja in streliva, ki so ga imeli pripravljene gverilci. Po svoji radijski postaji so pa gverilci napovedali nov val napadov na prometne žilice in elektrarne.

Khartoum, Sudan — Nova sudanska vlada je izjavila, da bo pretehtala vse dosežanje pogodbe, ki so v veljavi med Egiptom in Sudanom. Najnovejša pogodbe, ki jih je bil podpisal z Egiptom strmoglavljene predsednik Gaafar Nimeiri, bodo razveljavljene, ker ne predstavljajo volje naroda. Opazovalci sudanskih razmer govorijo o postopni radikalizaciji nove vlade.

Bruselj, Bel. — Obrambni ministri 14 NATO držav so izjavili na sestanku v tem mestu, da bodo povišali izdatke za obrambne namene v prihodnjem letu za 3 odstotke.

CELOVEC, Avstrija — Dne 24. marca letos je minilo 150 let od rojstva slavnega fizika, našega rojaka Jožefa Stefana, nekdanjega profesorja in rektorja na dunajski univerzi, člana akademije v Uppsali, Švedska, ter dopisnega člana akademij v Münchnu in Würzburgu; leta 1883 je bil izvoljen za prvega predsednika elektrotehniškega društva na Dunaju. Društvo se je velikemu znanstveniku oddolžilo za njegove zasluge in ob 75-letnici njegove smrti ustanovilo nagrado, zlato Stefanovo častno medaljo, ki jo podeljuje avstrijskim in tujim znanstvenikom za pomembne zasluge na področju teoretične in praktične elektrotehnike in elektrogospodarstva.

Kot znanstvenik se je Stefan uveljavil na vseh področjih tedanje fizike, bodisi kot teoretik ali eksperimentator. Plod njegovega dolgoletnega znanstvenega dela je več kot 80 razprav, ki jih je zvečine objavljaval v poročilih dunajske akademije. Prve njegove razprave so bile s področja mehanike; največ se je ukvarjal z gibanjem tekočin, zlasti s pojavom difuzije. V področje mehanike so dijo raziskave o transversalnem in longitudinalnem gibanju prožnih palic, o nihanju prožnih teles in sestavljenih strun ter o uporabi železnih palic za določanje zvočne hitrosti. Te raziskave so ga

vodile v študij akustike, kjer je določil hitrost zvoka v plinih in trdih telesih.

V kaloriki se je Stefan zanimal predvsem za problem širjenja toplote, zlasti toplotne prevodnosti plinov. Poskusi so ga pripeljali tako daleč, da se je lotil tudi proučevanja toplotnega sevanja v odvisnosti od temperature.

Leta 1879 je odkril po njem imenovani zakon o toplotnem sevanju (znan tudi kot Stefanov sevalni zakon), čigar ustrezna stalnica se imenuje Stefanova konstanta. Na osnovi tega zakona je izračunal temperaturo na površju Sonca.

Pomembno je tudi Stefanovo delo na področju elektrike in magnetizma. Bržkone pa ne moremo kar tako prezreti dejstva, da ima Stefan največ zaslug, da je zaslovel fizikalni inštitut dunajske univerze doma la po vsem svetu kot edinstvena »dunajska fizikalna šola.«

Filozofska fakulteta dunajske univerze je v šolskem letu 1869/70 izbrala Jožefa Stefana za dekana; v naslednjem letu je postal rektor dunajske univerze. Leta 1865, ko je bil star komaj 30 let, je postal »pravi« član akademije znanosti in umetnosti na Dunaju, deset let pozneje je bil izvoljen za tajnika njenega matematično-naravoslovnega razreda, leta 1885 pa za podpredsednika akade-

mije. Z izvolitvijo v svoje vrste so ga počastile tudi tuje akademije in znanstvene ustanove.

Jožef Stefan slovi kot izjemen fizik in matematik, manj pa ga naši ljudje poznajo kot pesnika. Navduševal se je tudi za glasbo in petje, saj je bil kot visokošolec celo pevovodja slovenskega pevskega društva na Dunaju. Na celovški gimnaziji je bil Janežičev učenec. Bil je zaveden Slovenec. V sebi je čutil tudi pesniško žilico. Tako je že kot srednješolec in pozneje kot študent dunajske univerze prispeval nekaj izvirnih pesmi v Slovensko Bčelo, potem v Bleiweisove Novice in končno še v Einspielerjevega Šolskega prijatelja. V četrtem letniku Šolskega prijatelja (1855) je objavil pesem »Hrasti«, ki jo je uglasbil znani slovenski skladatelj Radovan Gobec.

O Stefanovi osebnosti povejmo, da je bil sprva vesel, razigran mladenič, ki je marsikatero prsto uro rad preživel v družbi prijateljev, potem pa je živel v pravi meniški preprostosti samo za svoje znanstveno delo. Toda leta 1891 je le dočakal blagodejno spremembo, ko je našel dolgo pogrešano življenjsko družico in se oženil v Brežah na Koroškem.

Žal mu ni bilo usojeno, da bi dolgo užival toplo jesen življenja. Spomladi leta 1892 je resno zbolel in potem ni več okrevaj, čeprav je še 15. decembra predložil dunajski akademiji razpravo o elektriki. Tri dni pozneje ga je zadela kap; nezavestnega ga je 7. januarja 1893 smrt rešila bolečin in dolgega trpljenja. Zadnji dom ima na dunajskem centralnem pokopališču.

Znanstveni svet se je dostojno oddolžil Stefanovemu spominu. Dela velikega pokojnika so predstavili na zborih kemično-fizikalnega in elektrotehniškega društva, 31. maja 1893 pa tudi na slavnostni seji akademije znanosti in umetnosti na Dunaju. Na njej je takratni generalni tajnik akademije, E. Suess, v svojem govoru pose-

bej poudaril Stefanovo slovensko narodnost.

Dve leti pozneje je kemično-fizikalno društvo v arkadah dunajske univerze odkrilo doprsni spomenik slavnega znanstvenika svetovnega slovesa. Po drugi svetovni vojni so v Ljubljani po Jožefu Stefanu poimenovali nuklearni inštitut, ki je danes vodilna slovenska znanstveno-raziskovalna ustanova.

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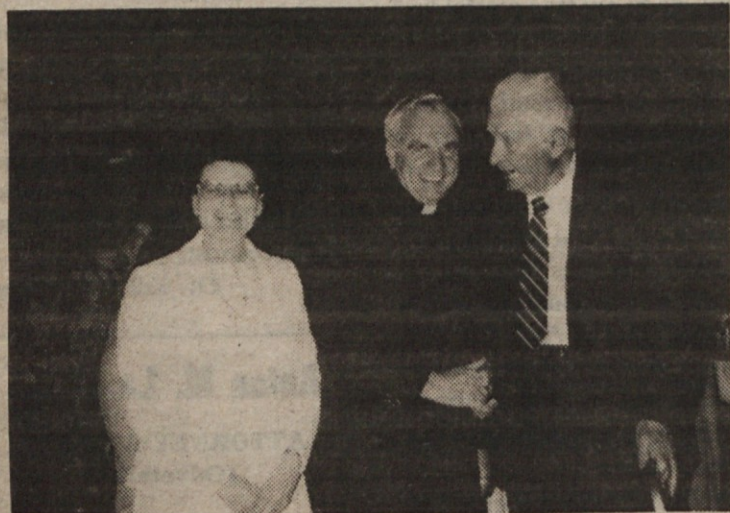

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Dancing On The Graves?

The Slovenian people have lived in the area which now forms the northwestern part of Yugoslavia for over fourteen hundred years. During most of this time they were ruled by foreign nations, and on many occasions were subjected to prolonged attacks by neighboring nations.

Particularly brutal were the Turkish invasions during 15th, 16th, and 17th centuries. However, in terms of suffering, torture, and loss of property and lives, there was no more tragic a period in Slovene history than the period between 1941 and 1945 when the nation was the victim of foreign occupation and even worse, of a communist revolution.

The locations of Teharje, Kočevje, and Škofja Loka were the places of the worst massacres.

Škofja Loka is a small, more than thousand year old city. During the Second World War it was occupied by the Germans, and the castle in the city turned into a Gestapo station. It was from this castle that many Slovenes were sent to the concentration camps of Dachau, Buchenwald, and Mathausen, and in this castle the fate of Slovenian hostages was determined.

On one occasion 30 hostages were killed in a single day. In May of 1945 the castle was taken over by the victorious revolution, and even darker days followed: those are described in the book, "The Tragedy of Viktring" (printed in the USA in 1960). An eyewitness of the events there is retold by one of the persons who miraculously escaped by pretending death.

"At Trata (the rail station of Škofja Loka) it was even worse. They began opening the boxcars. The frenzied mob surrounding the boxcars was screaming like a pack of wild animals. The Communists began hitting us over our heads with thick wooden clubs (p.62).

"We then stood in a long line on the road. When ordered, we had to run, with all our belongings, forward, backward, lie down, rise up, and march in parading step. People shouted at us and spit on us. We entered the castle from the lower side. Inside a waiting group of partisans immediately set upon us, beating us with clubs and with the butt ends of their rifles. We discovered that many Croats, so frightened and beaten they didn't even dare speak, were already imprisoned in the castle.

"We were led into rooms, where they took away all our belongings, and then started beating us again. We couldn't sleep the whole night. Our only wish was that our relatives would never find out what was happening to us.

"On the morning of May 30, 1945, they tied our hands behind our backs and left us this way until the evening (p. 68). In the evening they lined us up, tied us together in pairs, and then tied the whole group together with a line through the middle. During the night they led us away.

"After a one-hour walk we stopped in front of a huge pit. At that moment machine guns opened fire on us. I want to stress that neither I nor anyone else had been tried or convicted of any wrongdoing, or even interrogated, before being led to our intended deaths. There were 42 persons in my group, another group was behind us.

"At daybreak I saw the place of the massacre. The pit had already been covered. I remained nearby the next evening and again I heard the machine guns and the cries of dying people."

During these days approx-

imately one thousand Croats were killed. Many of them were women and relatives of Croatian ministers and functionaries. Fifteen hundred Slovenes were also killed. Most were marched out of the castle and killed in the surrounding countryside. Some were tortured and killed right in the castle or in its gardens. Afterwards the castle was used as a prison for women.

From the beginning of civilization people have gathered at sites of battles, cemeteries, and other places of human tragedy in quiet and composed respect. This is especially so in places of torture and massacre. On the site of former German concentration camps at Dachau, Buchenwald, and Auschwitz, for example, even food and drinks are prohibited. In San Isidro, California, a McDonald restaurant was recently torn down and a memorial built following a multiple murder which occurred there.

The Slovenia Immigrant Society (SIM) of Ljubljana, however, has in a deliberate action totally incomprehensible in a civilized world, chosen Škofja Loka, its castle and garden around it, as the site of its annual picnic and dance and the celebration of the victory of the revolution.

It should be pointed out, and this is documented in history, that dancing over the graves of one's defeated enemies was a custom practiced only by the most primitive, barbaric, and uncivilized tribes in the distant past. Visitors to Škofja Loka during these festivities, on first weekend of July, should, therefore, be aware that they are not only attending a happy "party", but they are participating (probably unknowingly) in a barbaric custom which has not been practiced since the dawn of civilization.

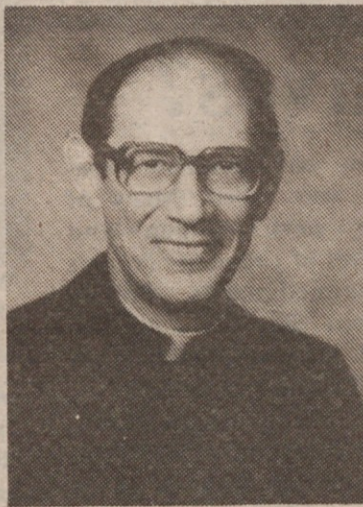

"Memorial Day" gives us an opportunity to ponder on the precious gifts God bestowed on our country and the great responsibilities we have as a nation. On this weekend, we have to rededicate ourselves to the preservation of our values, our freedoms, our spiritual, moral and material well-being.

It is in this spirit that the City Administration joins in the memorial services to be held under the sponsorship of our auxiliary Bishop A. Edward Pevec and the Cleveland Slovenian parishes at 3 p.m. on May 26 at St. John's Cathedral. This holy liturgy will be dedicated to the commemoration of all who gave their lives during the war in the struggle against totalitarian systems, including the 12,000 Slovenian victims of VETRINJE who helplessly lost their lives immediately following the end of World War II in Slovenia.

To them, and to the tens of thousands of other Slovenians who sacrificed their lives for a better future, go our prayers and assurances that the Cleveland community -- a new home to great numbers of immigrants and refugees -- will continue to promote and preserve these values they valiantly fought for, so that one day all nations of the world may share with us those precious rights and values which are part of our national and human heritage.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, George V. Voinovich, Mayor of the City of Cleveland, do hereby designate and proclaim May 26, 1985, as "SLOVENIAN MEMORIAL DAY" in Cleveland. I have also issued an Executive Order to display the historic Slovenian flag above City Hall on the same day.

Lest We Forget

Their names are Janez Avsec, Marko Baraga, Jakob Bavec, Matija Martincic, Feliks Palcic, Vinko Telic, Lado Znidarsic, Matija Osaben, Stanko Zalar, Stanko Turk, Franc Arko, Ivan Drobnic, Franc Hiti, Ivan Marolt, Joze Krasovec, Ludvik Modic, Franc Ponikvar, Anton Urbas and Anton Cimperman.

The names are not unlike the names of Catholic War Veterans No. 1655 which are read aloud each year at St. Vitus Church on Memorial Day Mass for those who had served their country in World War II and those who died in service. But they are not the names of Catholic War Veterans. Theirs are names of men from Stari Trg, Lož, Velike Lašče, Bloke, Cerknica, and Loški Potok.

They and perhaps two thousand other men, women and children just from this one region perished in 1942-5 and after World War II at the hands of their own countrymen.

Theirs is only one chapter in the plan of genocide perpetrated by the Slovenian Communist Party over their own people. No graves, no monuments, no candles, no public mention of their names is allowed in their homeland to remember them.

Bishop Edward Pevec said it well in his spiritual message that these things tend to fade away from memory in time, but the memories that they

died for, their families, home, nation and God are the things which are written deeply in people's hearts and will never fade away. They can kill the body but they cannot still the spirit. The injustice born of Cain and unbridled human passion touches everyone and hurts all.

The American-Slovenians and friends of Slovenian people will come together this Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock at a Mass offered by Bishop A. Edward Pevec. They will remember the twelve thousand victims and those other thousands whose graves dot the Slovenian countryside.

They will pray for the strength of relatives of victims who for forty years silently endure the pain of injustice and humiliation.

They will pray for the perpetrators of killings in a spirit of Christian reconciliation and forgiveness, because without that, no light can shine into hearts of men and women in the land of our forefathers.

And in the spirit of gratitude, the Slovenian community will pray for all American-Slovenian patriots who served and died in World War II, in Korea and Vietnam. They,

too, died for their families, home, country and God.

The six Slovenian parishes in northeast Ohio with their Pastors and Bishop Edward Pevec invite all men and women of good will to this extraordinary Memorial Mass at St. John Cathedral on Sunday, May 26 at 3 p.m. Let us be united in our common prayer for peace, justice and freedom in our country and in the land of our forefathers.

Slovenian Holocaust

Sunday afternoon, May 26, at 3 p.m. Slovenians of Greater Cleveland and outlying districts will assemble at St. John's Cathedral downtown. The occasion will be a memorial service to honor all the Slovenian dead of World War II and the civil war in Slovenia after the war.

In particular, the observance will mark the slaughter and execution of some 12,000 homeguardsmen during the last week of May and first week of June, 1945, known as the Vetrinj Tragedy.

The Mass for the dead will be offered by the Right Reverend Edward Pevec, of the Cleveland Diocese, himself a Slovenian and very sensitive to the tragedy. He will be assisted by the Right Reverend Monsignor Louis B. Baznik and other Slovenian priests from the Cleveland, Akron, Barberton, and Lorain parishes.

The events leading up to the tragedy in the Spring of 1945 are described in detail by Nikolai Tolstoy, nephew of the famous Russian novelist. The article appeared in the *Encounter* magazine published in London entitled, "The Klagenfurt Conspiracy". As a result of this interest, the BBC in London presented a half-hour program in which former officers of the British Army described their reactions to the forced return by subterfuge Slovenia. The military, on their word of honor, promised the 12,000 Slovenian refugees they would be transported to Italy, safely away from their victors in the civil war. Instead they were turned over to their enemies in Slovenia, who marched them to an open pit and executed them machine-gun style. Of the 12,000 men along with some women and children, only three or four escaped to tell the world about this tragedy.

What's 12,000 today, as one radio personality put it, "Who Cares?" First of all they were all living human creatures who paid with their lives by murder. More importantly, to get a better perspective, a comparison with Americans today reveals the enormity of the tragedy. On the basis of present U.S. population, the 12,000 would be equivalent to 2,000,000 Americans murdered. Moreover, most of the 2,000,000 would be of arms-bearing age, teen-ageers and perhaps to 30 or 35 years of age. Their crime? They formed part of the national guard of Slovenia, a home guard, set up for the protection of the Slovenian population during the war and revolution.

Where is Slovenia? It is a small province in northern Yugoslavia, tucked in between Austria, and Italy, and the southern Alps. I call it the poor man's Switzerland. It was the first of the Slavic nations to be Christianized, some thirteen hundred years ago. The oldest Slavonic

manuscript is Slovenian, the *Freising Fragment*. After centuries of dominance under the Habsburgs, it gained its partial independence and freedom as part of the Federation of Serbs, Croats, and Slovenians, called Yugoslavia.

On this occasion, the first public display of the recently completed portrait of the late Gregory Rožman, Bishop of Ljubljana, Slovenia will be made. The portrait will be blessed by Bishop Edward Pevec.

The portrait was commissioned by a group of Slovenians in Greater Cleveland. The portrait will be sent to Celovec (Klagenfurt) Austria, to the newly constructed Slovenian student center there. It will be displayed permanently in the library and reading room which were financed from the Bishop Rožman Memorial Fund, established by donations from all over America.

Bishop Rožman was born in Carinthia, Austria, where a large Slovenian minority exists. This province was cut off from Greater Slovenia at the conclusion of World War I. Bishop Rožman was Bishop of Ljubljana, the capital of Slovenia. He remained bishop of Ljubljana until his death. Again by subterfuge he was invited during the war to Austria by friends to escape execution at the hands of the revolutionaries. He came to America and spent his remaining days as a guest of the late Right Reverend John J. Oman, pastor of St. Lawrence Church in Cleveland.

The portrait of the bishop was painted by Mr. Joseph Cintron, professor of art at the Cleveland Institute of Art. Bishop Gregory Rožman is less known of prelates ostracized by Communist revolutions and the aftermath of the great second world war. He belongs to that coterie of churchmen that included Alojz Cardinal Štepinac, Archbishop of Zagreb, and Joseph Cardinal Mindszenty, Archbishop of Budapest, Hungary.

Persons who knew Bishop Rožman said he was too good and too quiet, too self-effacing. He died in total obscurity, patiently bearing his cross, which was his chosen motto as bishop.

What you should know about Medicaid

Medicaid Title XIX is a Federal and State funding to pay for care in a Nursing Home when a person becomes eligible in accordance with the requirements set forth by Medicaid.

Recently, the Department of Welfare had their name changed to the Department of Health and Human Services. In Cuyahoga County, the Department of Health and Human Services is located at 3121 Euclid Avenue, Third Floor, Cleveland, OH 44115 -Telephone: 391-9100, extension 224. Information regarding the eligibility can be obtained by calling that number.

When a resident in a Nursing Home is about to deplete their funds, certain steps should be taken to protect both the Nursing Home and the resident. Last year, with the passage of Senate Bill 98, prepaid burial contracts have been revised to include irrevocable prepaid burial contracts.

Prior to this change, a limit of \$1,500.00 was allowed for burial expense. Effective with the change in policy, as of December 1, 1984, the ceiling of \$1,500.00 was removed since it was impossible to have any undertaker give a dignified burial at that amount. You can now put aside a reasonable amount for burial providing the contract specifies the type of burial, and the amount deposited in a bank with payable on death (P.O.D.) account, payable to the funeral director. This contract must be signed by the applicant, and/or guardian or responsible party and the funeral director.

Residents who wait to apply for Medicaid when their funds are exhausted or nearly exhausted have no funds available to set aside for burial. You should consult with the Department of Health and Human Services or the Social Service Department in the Nursing Home regarding this matter. Reference should be made to the Manual Transmittal Letter No. 195, dated November 28, 1984.

Each resident must first contribute all of their resources including Social Security, Pensions, Rental, or other forms of income and allow to maintain \$25.00 per month for personal spending. The State will pay the difference between the resident's resources and the per diem cost of the Nursing Home.

For example: A Nursing Home that might cost \$50.00 per day or \$1500.00 per month based on a 30-day month would have to contribute all of their resources, (i.e. - \$400.00 less \$25.00 or a total of \$375.00, and the State would pay \$1125.00, making up the total of \$1500.00).

An applicant or a responsible party, or legal guardian, can become a payee by applying to the Social Security Administration, and the Social Security payments will be forwarded to the payee. The

payee must then submit them to the Nursing Home the full amount less \$25.00 allowed for personal spending.

To make sure that there will be some funds available for burial, the applicant and/or responsible party should file an application after a burial contract has been completed so that the amount deposited in the bank for the burial will be protected. Your Nursing Home Social Worker and/or Department of Health and Human Services can provide more information in this matter.

At times, persons might dispose of their assets, either cash or property, to become eligible for Medicaid. The Department of Health and Human Services may ask for five years of income tax returns to check for any transfers or income that was being received.

The following documents are necessary to be sent out with your Medicaid application. Photocopies of documents are suggested. Do not send originals.

1. Your Social Security Card
2. Proof of identity (driver's license, voter's registration card, credit card with signature, etc.)
3. Proof of citizenship or alien status (birth certificate), baptismal record, voter's registration card)
4. Proof of age
5. Proof of residency
6. Proof of income
7. Proof of assets.

These are some of the documents needed. A complete list of the documents can be obtained from the Department of Health and Human Services.

An application from Ohio Department of Human Services, Form No 3191, must be completed in detail. The Welfare Department will also provide you with an application information letter.

Due to the increase life span, more and more persons will be exhausting their funds or life

savings if they become confined to a Nursing Home. These requirements are set forth in order that only those who are in need obtain financial assistance. Care should be exercised to avoid any misrepresentation since signatures are required and an affidavit made stating that the information is correct. Currently, there is a two-year period prior to the date of application that is carefully examined to see if any assets were transferred in which the amount received was not at the fair market value, and such proceeds used entirely by the applicant for the benefit of the applicant and/or recipient.

For more information regarding any of these items, consult the Social Service Department at any one of the agencies that might be involved in providing such care. Social Service workers at the various hospitals and nursing homes should be consulted since there are changes constantly being made regarding this matter.

While being a businessman in the Euclid area for many years, he has served as President of the Euclid Chamber of Commerce.

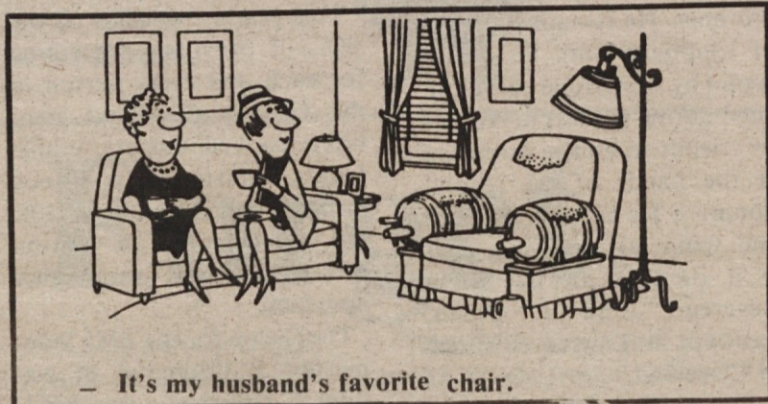

IN LOVING MEMORY

Remember Those Old Automobiles?

In my recent articles about old time landmarks and places which was written mostly from memory, I was urged by some of my friends and acquaintances to submit another article. So I have done research on the evolution of the American automobile which has become the backbone of our present economy.

In my research I became amazed at the impact Cleveland has had in the automobile industry in the early part of the 20th century until now. Cleveland was the inventive and manufacturing auto hub of the country, in fact, the world.

You will see in scanning over the list of cars that approximately 70 gasoline and 14 electric autos were made here and about 36 in the northeast part of Ohio.

Some of the cars were invented elsewhere, but it seems the majority came to Cleveland to begin their production.

The greater part of the early car inventors had a short tenure due to lack of financing or their product was not practical.

There was great rivalry among the early car manufacturers. They had cross country races and most places out west didn't even have roads. I believe they went through as many hardships as the pioneers in wagon trains to get from one coast to the other.

I have seen photos of autos stuck in mud up to their axels, drivers and cars splattered with mud. About 1920 I remember seeing the only Stanley Steamer. It belonged to the Butala family (the shoe store people at 64th and St. Clair). I often wondered how it would be riding in the summer with all that steam hissing under the hood.

As I was looking at color photos of cars made from 1920 to 1935 I noticed the styling reached the ultimate pinnacle. They were really classics that are worth over \$100,000. It takes up to six or eight years to restore some of them.

It brings back memories of the twenties when we sat on the porch of the late Seršer Hotel (Bridge Tavern) on E. 152 St. We would see who could identify the most cars that passed by. The early cars each had a distinct hood and radiator that could be identified. Here is a list of cars that were made in various parts of the country:

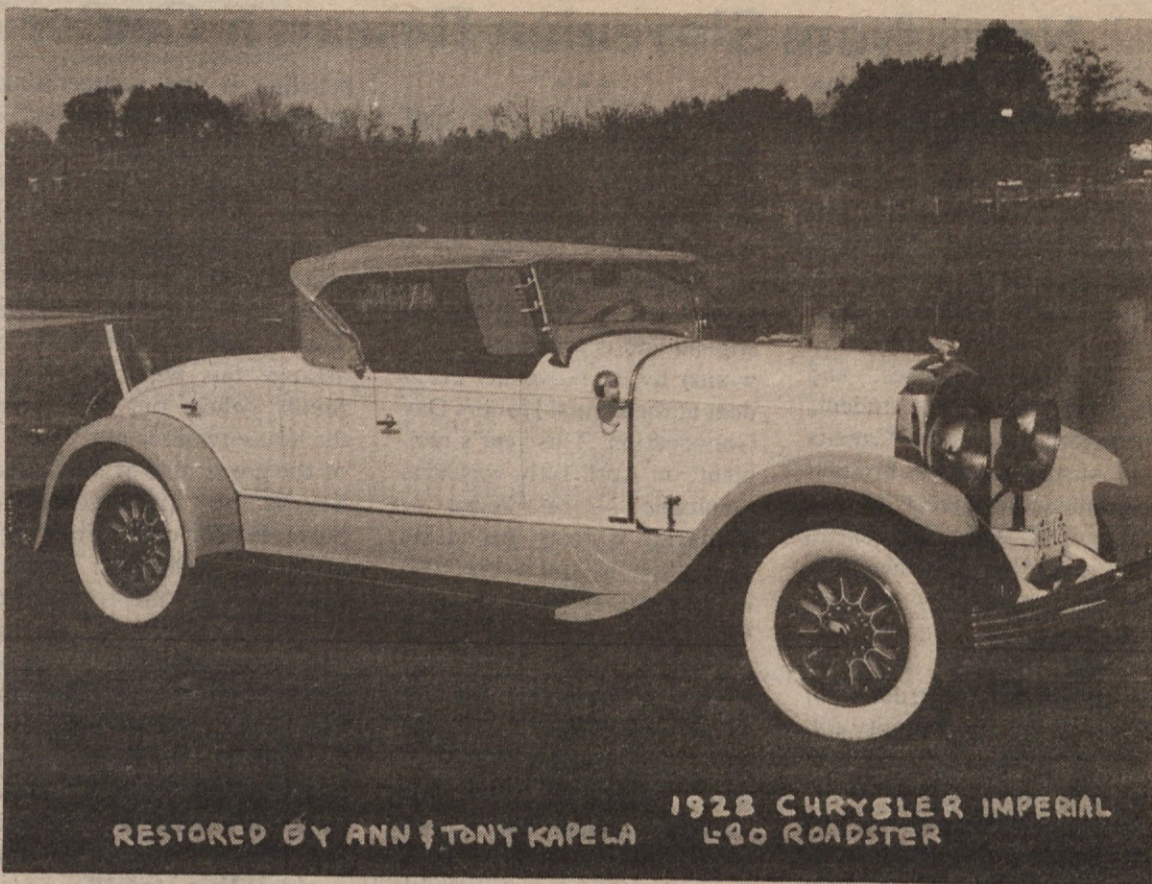

David Stalzer and the Slovenian Women's Union of America; Mr. Edward Krasovich, for his fine translation of Msgr. Zaplotnik's biography of one of our prominent missionaries; and Mrs. Antoinette Simcic and Mrs. Mary Ivanusch, whose very impressive accomplishments as teachers of Slovenian language, opera singers, and capable organizers since the 1920's have again been publicly recognized for the 70th anniversary of the Slovenian National Home on St. Clair. We also congratulate one of our earliest trustees, Cleveland Mayor George Voinovich, on his selection as president of the National League of Cities, another unprecedented accomplishment by a son of a Slovenian mother.

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PARMESAN CHICKEN

- 1/4 cup fine dry bread crumbs
- 4 tablespoons grated Parmesan cheese
- 1/4 teaspoon oregano leaves, crushed
- Dash garlic powder
- Dash pepper
- 2 pounds chicken parts
- 1 can Campbell's Cream of Chicken Soup
- 1/2 cup milk
- Paprika

Combine crumbs, 2 tablespoons Parmesan, oregano, garlic, and pepper; roll chicken in mixture. Arrange in 2-quart shallow baking dish (12x8x2"). Bake at 400°F. for 20 minutes. Turn chicken; bake 20 minutes more. Meanwhile, blend soup

and milk; pour over chicken. Sprinkle with paprika and remaining Parmesan. Bake 20 minutes more or until done. Arrange chicken on platter. Stir sauce; serve with chicken. Makes 4 servings.

BLONDIES

(A takeoff on brownies for those who prefer their chocolate in smaller doses.)

- 1 cup butter or margarine
- 2 cups firmly packed light brown sugar
- 2 eggs
- 2 teaspoons vanilla extract
- 2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 package (12 oz.) semisweet chocolate chips

Preheat oven to 350°F. Grease and flour a 15 1/2 x 10 1/2 x 1-inch jelly-roll pan; set aside. In medium saucepan melt butter or margarine over low heat. Remove from heat; add sugar and stir until dissolved. Add eggs and vanilla; continue beating until smooth, scraping sides of saucepan occasionally. Stir in flour and salt just until blended. Fold in chocolate chips. Spread in prepared pan.

Bake 25 to 30 minutes, or until toothpick inserted in center comes out clean. Do not over-bake. Cool completely in pan on wire rack. Cut into squares. Makes about 18 squares, about 335 calories each.

APPLE CHOCOLATE WALNUT CAKE

- 1/2 cup butter or margarine
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 egg
- 1 2/3 cups sifted cake flour
- 1 1/2 cups chopped walnuts
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon

- 1/2 teaspoon allspice
- 2 tablespoons breakfast cocoa (not instant)
- 1 cup applesauce, heated
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Cream butter to consistency of mayonnaise; add sugar slowly; cream until fluffy. Add egg; beat well. Add a little of the flour to walnuts. Mix and sift remaining flour, salt, baking soda, spices and cocoa. Add flour mixture alternately with heated applesauce to creamed mixture. Stir in vanilla. Spoon into greased and floured 9-inch tube pan. Bake in preheated oven for about 40 minutes or until cake tester comes out clean. Cool in pan 10 minutes. Remove to rack to finish cooling. Frost and decorate as desired.

- 1 cup butter
- 2 cups sugar
- 4 eggs
- 1 cup mashed ripe banana
- 4 cups unsifted all purpose flour
- 2 teaspoons double acting baking powder
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 3/4 teaspoon salt
- 2 cups crushed pineapple undrained
- 1 cup flaked coconut

Cream butter with sugar. Add eggs. Mix in banana. Mix flour with baking powder, soda and salt. Add to batter. Fold in pineapple and coconut. Pour into 2 greased 9 x 5 loaf pans. Bake at 350° for 60 to 65 minutes or until done. Cool 5 minutes; remove from pan.
